Miss Graves refuses to return to work unless more accommodation is given. Baptists have had a foremost place in the education of young women. Do they intend to hold it? We think so. The public schools look to us for well-trained, highly cultured teachers. Our work in purifying and perfecting public sentiment, makes it necessary to keep our ladies' college in a high state of efficiency. 
