Stone, one of the commissioners of the road.

Starting with May 1 the C.P.R. will assume the management and operation of the line but no marked changes are expected until after the completion of the Fredericton and Minto line, which will form the connecting link between the N. B. C. and R. Co. line and the C.P.R. lines. It is expected that the new road will be ready for operation late this summer and when it is taken over by the C.P.R. they will be able to give through connection to Norton over their own system.

STRUCK OLD WRECK

Baltimore, April 29.—Schooner Alice Holbrook (before reported) struck a submerged wreck of an old steamer and in 20 minutes the vessel filled; on making soundings around the wreck it was found that the Holbrook had struck fairly between the two boilers in the wreck, driving the stem through and smashing in the star-board bow about four feet below the water line; further soundings showed 14 feet of water frm the top of the boiler on the port side to the water's Ourface; vessel has been stripped of Salls and everything of value. She will be a total loss.

New London, Ct., April 28.—Schr. Pell-S. C. Vought, of Cold Spring, N. Y., went ashore off Guil Island today and is probably a total lose. She was loaded with lumber and was bound for Greenport. The captain and crew of two men were taken off the boat by the lighthouse keeper.



The réport of the Leaflet editor was received and approved. The paper has paid over \$472 to the mission fund furing the year.

Miss Louise Simonds in the diocesan treasurer's report showed the vast strides being made. In 1904 the receipts for the year were \$84, the organization had 13 branches and 365 members. This year the receipts were \$3,105.56 from 68 branches of 1,707 members. Including the balance from last year \$3,787.63 was at the disposal of the auxiliary. Of this \$2,262.75 had been paid out, leaving a balance of \$1,524.88.



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


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
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
