Brussels Jug. 11.—A German offensive movement north of Liege has begun and a big battle is impending. Clashes have occurred at Tongres, Tirelmont, St. Trend, Orzmall and Gussenhaven. French artillery is hurrying through Brussels. German reinforcements are constantly reaching the Muerthe. The Liege forts are still under bombardment.

New York, Aug. 11.—The French war office announced late today that French and German forces are engaged along frontier for a distance of twenty miles. The opposing outposts were in contact at Longwy, Languyon and Marville in France and at Virton in Belgium. The German advance is moving toward Stenay where attempt will be made to cross the Meuse river. Fighting at the above points is taken to indicate a German mass movement to force an entrance into France. No details of the invading army's strength is ob-

The war office this afternoon issued an official statement nnouncing that the French had been compelled to evacuate Muelhasen in Aslace. The army operating against Neu Breisach was driven back by an overpowering German force to the outskirts of Meulhasen where it made another stand. It is believed a great battle is now in progress there. The German main army in the north is reported to be entrenching it-self on the river Ourthe, while two divisional cavalry had advanced as far as Longres, north of Liege. These and other indications point to general advance which will be opposed by the allied forces of Belgium, France and Britain.

A Brussels despatch says comparative quiet prevails since the attack on Fort Seraing Sunday night was repulsed with great loss to the Germans. Leige forts still are holding

out, and according to the statement from the Belgian war office "can do so indefinitely."

ABOUT BANK OF ENGLAND

Africa not to be Established

Special Cable to The Standard throug Central News Agency London, Aug. 11.—Official denial wa nade this evening by the Bank of England that it purposed to establish branches at Ottawa and in South Af-

rica.

Ottawa, Aug. 11.—The cables despatched from London today stating that the Bank of England intended to open a Canadian branch at Ottawa, with a view to accumulating a gold supply here from the perment of specie due in the United States, is not confirmed. It is pointed out that the Bank of England could not open a branch in Canada without first getting a charter from parliament, and there has been no indication of any move of this sort yet.

It is believed here that what is intended is an arrangement with the Canadian Royal Mint for the holding of gold due the bank on this side of the Atlantic at the Ottawa branch of the Royal Mint. Instead of sending gold shipments from the United States to the Bank of England under war conditions, and at war fisks, it could be sent to the mint here. Against this gold, as thus held here, the bank by arrangement, would be in a position to issue its notes. Before notes can be issued the gold must be in the actual possession of the bank, and the depositing of it in the Anint here would be considered legally sufficient to enable the bank to issue notes against it.

WAR NEWS FROM BRUSSELS

Causing Lengthy Delay of Despatches - No Direct Communication With Austria or Germany by any Route.

New York, Aug. 11—Advices to the Associated Press from London state that an increasingly rigid censorship is being imposed on all matter from Brussels. This increases the delay on such despatches as are allowed to come through. The French Cable Company, which, except those with terminals in the British Isles, is the only direct line in Europe now in operation, has given notice that the congestion on the lines is such that all messages are subject to a minimum delay of forty-eight hours. In an effort to avoid this delay, direct despatches of the Associated Press, and the wireless companies operated from New York. On Sundary and the wireless company said that it had been received in Germany, but since from Paris are being routed through London, but the delay there is also very great. Despatches which left Paris early yesterday are being received with a delay of from fifteen to seventeen or more hours, and other Paris despatches have suffered even greater delay in transmission.

Montreal, Aug. 11—"The ocean route is clear from Montreal to Liverpool, and any ship can sall when she pleases in perfect safety."

This announcement was made today by R. S. White, collector of customs. 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

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NEW BRUNSWICK FORESTS ALWAYS SOURCE OF WEALTH

With reasonable care lumber cut would continue as big as at present, statement of J. Fraser Gregory before Dominion's Royal Commission-Held priv-

That with reasonable care of its forests New Brunswick can continue indefinitely to cut as much lumber every year as it does at present was a statement made by J. Fraser Gresory before the session of the Dominion's Royal Commission yesterday afternoon. Another important statement made by Mr. Gregory was that whereas some years seven-eighths of the lumber cut was exported, at present about fifty per cent, of the cut was sold in the home market, which was becoming more important every year.

To W. Lorimer who suggested that the wastage of the mills might be used profitably for the manufacture of alcohol or other by-products, Mr. Gregory said that the individual mill owners had not taken up this matter but thought something might be done if the government by experiment showed them the way.

Mr. Gregory preferred the Quebec system of leasing for twenty or thirty years. Under the Quebec system it a leasee took measures to conserve and reforest his holdings, he was sure of reaping the benefit, whereas under the New Brunswick system it a leasee took measures to conserve and reforest his holdings, he was sure of reaping the benefit, whereas under the New Brunswick system there was always the chance that at the end of a stated period somebody else might bid in the land. He thought the pulp industry should be made subservient to the lumber industry, if the pulp men were allowed to cut every tree before it seeded, it would not be long before the cut over areas would become barren.

Sir Alfred Bateman. W. Lorimer and Sir Rider Haggard questioned Mr. Gregory at some length in regard to lumbering conditions in New Brunswick and Quebec.

Private Session



London, Aug. 11.—Despatches to the Times from The Hague and to the Times from The Hague and to the Telegraph from Masstricht, sent under yesterday's date, agree that the struggle for possession of the forts at Liege is being carried on continuously and giving rise to terrible scenes of bloodshed and of heroism. At noon, the despatches say, the Germans were making flerce efforts to silence the forts nearest the city proper, and the defenders were gallantly holding out against almost constant bombardment. The Germans made a desperate at tack on Fort Serains, south of Liege, on Sunday night, and were repulsed with heavy loss. It is estimated that 300 Germans were killed within a narrow half square mile. A bridge which Germans were reossing was shattered by the fire of the fort, which had an exact range. The Germans attempted the assault with great courage, Some of their dead were found directly in front of the barbed wire fencing at the head of German soldiers. Their bodies were buried near the fort.



He began fighting with burly lumbermen who objected to his grub and graduated into the professional ring at the age of nineteen. After whipping a number of fairly good white men, Barry tackled Sam Langford and Jack Blackburn, the African scrappers, but found them a little more than he could handle, although he made a good showing. A few years ago Barry was looked upon as one of the most promising of the white hope" bunch. He whipped Gunboat Smith at Oakland in 1910, putting over the sleep punch in the 9th round. A little later he met Sam Langford over the long route at Vernon, and put away in the 16th chapter by the Tar Baby. He then knocked out Sandy Ferguson at New Orleans, fought draws with Tony Ross and Joe Jeanette, and again defeated Gunboat Smith at Oakland. In 1912 Barry went to Australia, but the climate didn't seem to agree with him. for he was knocked out by Sam Langford, and lost to Sam McVey and Porky Flyan.
