N., in charge of the United States navy radio service, is in charge of the station, which will be operated by the Navy Department in the interest of the owners. The action was taken to preserve the neutrality of the United States, in accordance with President Wilson's executive order of August 5, 1914. The action size places the only two radio stations regularly communicating with stations in Germany under the direct control and operation of the United States, the high power station at Tuckerton, N. J., having been taken over by the government last fall.
