



## STRIKES SCHOONER

The Eastern Corporation steamer Governor Dingley, in command of Captain Mitchell, while leaving this port for Boston Wednesday morning, at 9.30 o'clock, collided with the American schooner M. V. B. Chase that put into this port Tuesday afternoon from Windsor, N. S., bound to New York lumber laden. It was very dense fog at the time the steamer struck the Chase. She was lying at anchor in the channel near the red buoy right in the track of vessels going and coming into the inner harbor and the harbor master sent word to Captain Tuttle of the schooner by Edward Doherty to shift his vessel further in toward Fort Dufferin out of the way of vessels that would pass in or out. This he neglected to do.

When Captain Mitchell sighted the vessel the Dingley was going slow and orders were given to back at full speed, which no doubt prevented a more serious accident. As it was the steamer struck the schooner forward on the port side breaking her catheads and started her bulwarks, also some of her running gear. The Governor Dingley did not receive any damage and proceeded on her voyage to Boston via Eastport. The schooner was brought up to the inner harbor and anchored in the stream where temporary repairs will be made before sailing for New York.


