New York, March 29.—A despatch from London says: Before the end of June the Allied armies will strike neously, blows on all fronts with the object of bringing the Kaiser to his knees and ending the war before Christ-

"This combined offensive, it was held in London today, is the certain result of the great war council of the Allies, which closed at Paris last night. The Allied forces may begin to move before the Crown Prince ceases his offensive movement at Verdun.

"The Allied drives may be preceded by other German attempts to break the western front, it is generally believed There are persistent rumors that the Germans have used the long lull at Verdun to shift troops for a blow at some other sector of the front.

'No further statement of the results of the war council sessions at Paris will be given out, it was stated authoritatively today.'

Province Progressing as Never Before in Its History — People's Money Carefully and Honestly Expended and Their Interests Well Looked After.

Provincial Secretary's Comparison Between Present Methods and Those of Grit Regime a Strong Indictment of Latter's Stewardship-Criticisms of Hon. C. W. Robinson and W. E. Foster Proved Erroneous and Show Lack of Knowledge.

Fredericton, March 29.-Hon. Dr. Landry made the third budget speech of his career as Provincial Secretary, in the Legislature this afternoon, and while it was in some respects a departure from the usual style of speech heretofore delivered on such occasions, it lacked none of the eloquence and comprehensiveness to which the House has been accustomed of late years.

In the course of his remarks, which held the closest attention of the entire House for upwards of two hours, Dr. Landry presented facts and figures which could not fail to convince any impartial individual that under the administrative methods now in vogue, the province is progressing in a manner and at a rate never hitherto experienced in its history. While the speech naturally dealt very largely with statistics it was couched in such language as made this feature of it as interesting as possible and comparisons which the Prov. Secretary was able to present to House of financial conditions as they exist today and as they existed during the late government's regime provided a strong indictment of the latter. He showed that despite the war, revenue continued as buoyant as ever with every prospect of a continuance of such satisfactory conditions.

In the course of his speech Dr. Landry took occasion to refer to the criticisms of provincial finances by Messrs. C. W. Robinson and W. E. Foster, and had no difficulty in showing that these gentlemen, when they undertook to discuss the matter, not only displayed an entire lack of knowledge of it, but an inability also to properly understand the ordinary principles of finance, to say nothing of systematic bookkeeping. Their figures and conclusions were utterly erroneous, as was very readily proved.



THE VALLEY RAILWAY.

The Times last evening devoted considerable space to arguments in favor of the East Side route for the Valley Railway. These do not appear at all convincing and can easily be disposed of. 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




