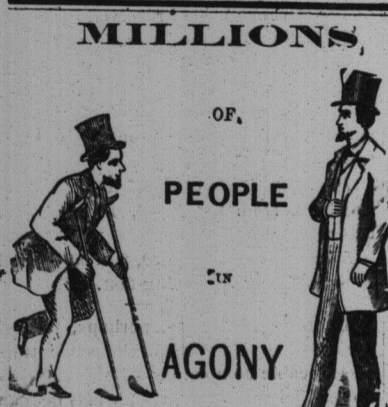

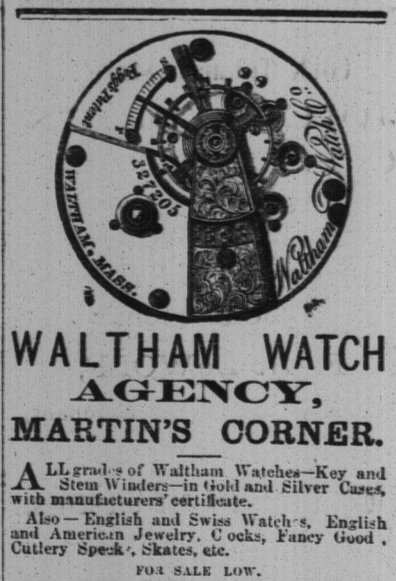

Canadian, British and Foreign.

LONDON, Jan. 28. Consols 92 1/2; breadstuffs quiet. Price of Liverpool is improving. The steamship Drummond, from Bremen for Baltimore, returned to Southampton towing the Deutschland, disabled, having broken all the blades of her propeller by coming in contact with wrecked matter. All well on both vessels. There are the vessels seen passing Hart Castle, last evening, and not the Baltimore and New York, as reported. The loyalist army in Navarre is advancing on the Carlists, and has already captured several positions. King Alfonso was present. Brig Helyear, of Nova Scotia, has been abandoned at sea. Crew rescued, and carried to Queenstown. A bill has been drafted which authorizes the French Government to make concession for the construction of a submarine railway tunnel between France and England. Copies have been distributed among members of the Assembly. New York, Jan. 28. Gold 112 1/2; exchange \$1.874 a \$1.90. The U. S. House of Representatives has been in continuous session for 24 hours at noon, and the prospect was that it may last some days. A Government Defeat. OTTAWA, Jan. 29. East Middlesex has returned the Liberal Conservative, Macmillan, who has defeated the Radical candidate by over 170 majority. LONDON, Jan. 28—Evening. The electors of Greenwich, last night, adopted a resolve expressing confidence in Gladstone and regretting his retirement from the leadership of the Liberal party. In the French Assembly, yesterday, another exciting discussion took place on the Constitutional bill, and developed the fact that there is a division in the Republican ranks such as is likely to defeat the amendment in favor of the formal proclamation of the Republic. New York, Jan. 29. Gold closed yesterday at 113 1/2. (Special to Daily News.) OTTAWA, Jan. 28. London and Huron dominions are fixed for the 11th of February. There was a meeting of the Cabinet today. The Supreme Court bill and the appointment of Deputy Minister of Militia were discussed; also the Lepine proclamation. There are two aspirants for the office of Deputy Minister of Militia—Col. Macpherson, Chief Clerk of the Department, and Col. Faunt, who has never had any departmental experience. The French Ministers favor Penet, and the English ones Macpherson. There will probably be some noise before the appointment is made. Late deputy Favory, who has been imprisoned, has written to the Department to say the whole staff are incapable, and particularly Macpherson. Contents for Georgian Bay Branch of the Pacific Railway have not yet been awarded, although the time of opening has long since passed over. It is said that there were only three tenders, and they being of such an unsatisfactory nature were accepted. It is hardly probable that they would be satisfactory, considering that no survey of the route has been made. A pretty girl named Mc Donald, a nun, escaped from the Convent, in Montreal, last night. She alleges that she was cruelly treated and kept in solitary confinement, and was about to be placed in a cell for some offence made by her. She refuses to return, although the nuns are doing all that can be persuaded her to do so. BATHURST, Jan. 28. The Carleton inscription is over and peace reigns again. Thirteen of the principal rioters were lodged in goal this afternoon. The valiant army who paraded the streets and levied black mail on women and individuals along the corners and garrets when the officers of justice approached. An inquest was held today on the body of Clifford who came to his death as he thrust his head through the flooring of a garret in which some of the rioters were lodged, and was shot in the head, falling dead without a word or struggle. The rough stairs leading to the room had been taken down and the constables took away a portion of the flooring in order to reach the rioters, having to pile up furniture to do so. After Clifford was shot there was firing on both sides for some time, in which Missions and Lantiques were shot. The former threw up his arms and fell, uttering groans.
