A HINT TO FARMERS -- We learn from United States' papers, that our enterprising neighbours, not satisfied with supplying Great Britain with flour, Indian, meal, wheat, &c., are giving their vessels deck loads of live stock, which bring remunerating prices in England. Is it not a matter of surprise that the farmers of New Brunswick do not ship in the fall of the year, (when our vessels cannot carry deck loads of deals to Great Britain,) deck loads of sheep, geese, poultry, when they can do so at a triffing expense, by crecting a trame work on a ship's deck. A vessel of 800 ions register would carry in this way 500 sheep, and in like manner geese and poultry. We observe by our English papers. that the prices of this description of stock, would amply repry the shipper. For instance, a good spring lamb here is worth 7s. 6d. sterling-in England, after a weeks feed on shore this lamb would be worth from 30s. to 35s. sterling ; the freight could not cost more than 7s. 6d., yielding a profit of at least 15s. sterling.
