Cattle Show and Fair.

The Charlotte County Agricultural Society will hold a Ploughing Match on Monday the 17th day of October, next, at 10 A.M., and the Annual Cattle Show & Fair of the Society, will take place the following day, Tuesday, 18th October, at 11 A.M., in the Town of St. Andrews, when the following Premiums will be offered, subject to the Regulations hereinafter mentioned:

ON PLOUGHING MATCH.

To be performed with horses.—First Class, 1st premium 20s.; 2d do. 20s.; 3d do. 15s.

Second Class.—Ploughmen under 25 years of age: 1st premium 20s.; 2d do. 15s.; 3d do. 10s.

CATTLE AND STOCK.

Brood Mares with their spring Colts. 1st premium 20s.; 2d do. 15s.

Colts, geldings or fillies under 3 years old. 1st prem. 12s. 6d.; 2d do. 10s.; 3d do. 7s. 6d.

Bulls over 2 years old. 1st prem 10s.; 2d do. 7s. 6d.

Cows.

1st prem 10s.; 2d do 7s. 6d.

Heifers under 3 years old. 1st prem 10s.; 2d do 7s. 6d.

Regulations for the Ploughing Match.

1. Each Competitor shall plough three ridges of land 12 feet in width, and about 15 rods in length, as staked off; the ridges to be gathered.

2. The furrows to be nine inches wide and six inches deep.

3. The Lots to be ploughed will be assigned to each competitor by lot.

4. One of the horses in each team must be the property of the person entering the same, and owned in this County, and the Ploughmen must be inhabitants of the County.

5. Each Ploughman must drive his own horses.

6. No wheels will be allowed on any of the ploughs entered.

7. The competitors will be required to start at 10 15 A.M. by signal.

8. The ploughing to be finished in four hours, after which the Judges will be called in to inspect the work done; any ploughman who has not finished his work at that time, will forfeit his right to any premium.

9. The Secretary will be at the field (of the situation of which notice will be given at 9 o'clock A.M., to receive entries from intending competitors who have not previously entered their names; and all persons intending to compete must pay an entrance fee of 5s each, unless paid up members of the Society, and no entries will be received after 10 A.M.

For Cattle Show.

1. All animals must have been the bona fide property of the person entering the same, and have been kept in this County not less than 6 months.

2. All crops, dairy produce, domestic manufactures, &c., must be bona fide the property of the person entering the same, and the growth and production of this County.

3. Persons desirous of competing at the Cattle Show must hand a list of their stock or articles entered to the Secretary before 11 A.M., on the day of the Show, and if not paid up members of the Society must pay an entrance fee of 10s. each. No entries will be received after the hours above specified.

4. Members of the Society will be allowed to pay their subscription for the current year at any time previous to the Ploughing Match.

5. No person shall receive more than one Premium on the same kind of live stock, nor on the same kind of any other article exhibited by him.

6. Cattle and Horses competing must be provided with suitable halters.

7. No Judge on any description of article entered, to enter an article of the same kind for competition.

8. Judges have the right of rejecting any or all of the articles entered, should they think them unworthy of premiums; and the Judges are particularly requested to strictly enforce this rule.

9. A bushel measure has been provided for measuring grain, root crops, &c., and their relative values will be adjudged, according to the weight per bushel.

10. In future, all persons receiving Premiums from this Society, and who may be found to have accepted them in violation of the Rules of the Society, will be prosecuted by the Society to recover back the amounts received by them.

A suitable field will be provided for the reception of the Cattle.

The Premiums will be paid in C. C. Bank Notes.

A Revolution took place in Costa Rica on the 14th August.—President Mora was made prisoner and banished from the State, and Dr. Jose Maria Montelegrue was placed provisionally at the head of affairs. Gen. Mora, commander of the forces in the capital, and Gen. Canas, Minister of Finance and War, were likewise banished. President Mora issued a protest against the action of the revolutionists, and against the validity of all acts emanating from any unconstitutional government which may exist in Costa Rica during the term for which he was elected—viz. for six years, from May, 1859, to May 1865. It was supposed the other States of Central America would assist in restoring President Mora to power.

LORD HENRY SEYMOUR.—The telegraph announces in another column that this celebrated individual has munificently endowed the Paris hospitals. His income was 180,000 per annum and, after a life of great dissipation, he bestowed it on all charitable institutions. The French papers have panegyrized him since his decease; for though born and educated in England, he had long been distinguished as a veritable Frenchman, a man of much spirit and one who gave tone to society there. In youth he was Hercules, and would frequently take by the neck the most powerful men he could encounter, such as porters and truckmen, to test his strength. Giving himself entirely to pleasure, there was no folly, no noisy party, such as masquerades or midnight orgies with their concomitants of rows and assaults on watchmen, that he did not share; at least, everything of a like nature was invariably attributed to him, whether he was present or absent.

Lord Seymour was to the sporting world of France what Beau Brummel was to the fashionable society of England. He completely revolutionized Frenchman's ideas of horse-back riding he introduced by percept and example, a taste for fine horses, for races and hunting, and he was the actual founder of the now celebrated Jockey Club. But he squandered his money; became almost impoverished, and returned to England penniless. Some years subsequently, however, his mother's property, left him, retrieved his fortunes, and he went back to Paris, an older if not wiser man. He had meantime become very corpulent, and the great heat of the past summer proved fatal to him. Long a subject to inflammatory rheumatism and latterly to gout, his physician recommended to him exercise, travel, and salt water, but

he obstinately refused to leave his favorite haunts, and he died in Paris on the 20th of last month, at the age 54.—[Boston Transcript.]

The Western Judiciary.

In a recent lecture before the Mercantile Library Association of Boston, Josiah Quincy Jr., speaking of the practice of electing cheap judges, quoted from Governor Ford's History of Illinois, and gave an amusing account of the action of one of those judges in the case of a man who was convicted of murder. The criminal was named Green; and when the judge came to pronounce the sentence he said:—

"Mr. Green the jury in their verdict say you are guilty of murder, and the law says you are to be hung. Now, I want you and all your friends, down on Indiana Creek to know that it was not I that hung you but the jury and the law. Mr. Clerk, look and see if that will come on Sunday. After the judge had been informed that four weeks from that day would come on Thursday, decision was about to be recorded, when the Attorney interposed and said:—"May it please the Court, in such cases it is usual to prepare the criminal for his execution by some appropriate remarks tending to impress upon him the greatness of his crime, and also the necessity for a future world." "Well," said the judge, "he knows as well as if I should preach to him four weeks. You understand it so, don't you, Mr. Green?" "Yes," said Mr. Green, and so the matter ended.

AERIAL SHIP.—An aerial ship called the City of New York intended for a transatlantic voyage, has been in the course of construction for some months past in the vicinity of New York, and now so nearly completed that she will be ready to undertake the trip in October. The command who has charge of the enterprise is Mr. Lowe of New Hampshire, who has made several successful ascensions.

The dimensions of the airship are greater than those of any balloon previously built. The capacity of the gas-receiver is 725,000 cubic feet; the aggregate height of the balloon, from the valve to the bottom of the boat, is upwards of 300 feet; the diameter, 130 feet. Mr. Lowe proposes to go directly from New York to London in 48 to 64 hours.
