London, Oct. 5. Layard, British Minister, and Mr. Chaudard, French Minister, presented their credentials to President Sarrano at Madrid on Saturday. Both Ministers addressed him as "President of the Executive Power," and neither alluded to the Republic.

The Vienna New Free Press says the Danish Government has sent a note to Berlin with reference to the expulsion of the Danes from Schleswig, showing they are liable to expulsion only for violation of the laws.

The Telegraph learns from a Catholic digvijary that the Duke of Northumberland is about to become a convert to the Catholic faith. The report is doubtful.

Prince Napoleon defeated at Ajaccio. There are fears of a disastrous flood in the River Nile.

The situation at Buenos Ayres is desperate. Rigorous measures have been adopted by the Government to quell the insurrection.

Garibaldi requests the electors to vote for those in prison for political offences.

New York, Oct. 5. Wild Texan steers injured nearly fifty people in the lower part of New York city on Saturday.

At Walker's Depot, Nevada, on Saturday night, three men were killed and one fatally wounded in an affray growing out of a dispute among the trustees of the Justice Mining Company.

HARVEST PROSPECTS.—The European harvest prospects are represented to be better than they have been in several years; so good, indeed, that the Continent, instead of competing with Great Britain in the wheat markets of the world, is likely to have a liberal surplus to contribute to British deficiencies. And even the British deficiencies promise to be less than usual—certainly less than last year.

A PROFITABLE RISK.—Something less than a year ago a young man of not very strong constitution, had his life insured for \$6000 in one of the companies doing business in this city, paying as a premium about \$130. A great many people who knew him were surprised that he passed, as he was known to be in delicate health. He had the policy, however, and there was no disputing the fact. Some time afterwards he decided to go to California for the benefit of his health, and he sold out his interest in the business he was prosecuting here. He sold his life insurance policy, the purchasers being three of his friends, who paid him \$200 each, taking equal shares in the profits arising from his possible death, and agreeing to make equal payments to continue the policy in force until that event should happen. It happened much sooner than was expected. A few days ago his former partner, one of the holders of the policy, received information of his death at Nevada on the 11th ult., having succumbed to the disease after a few days illness. It is believed that the amount of policy (\$6000) will be paid as soon as the usual and necessary forms have been complied with.—[Halifax Express.]

THE PORTO RICO MATTER.—A Washington special states that though the Secretary of State denied that Germany was attempting to acquire the island of Porto Rico, it is known that he promptly made enquiries relative thereto. It is stated that Russia is fully aware of the intention of Bismarck to acquire a foothold in America, and with the assurance that we will not permit the transfer of colonial possessions in America from one European nation to another, is prepared to ally with the United States in the event that Germany determines to force her aspirations. The dispatch closes as follows: "In the event that the State Department adopts and adheres to the doctrine laid down in the message of 1869, which I have designated as the "Grant doctrine," it will be construed as a determination on the part of this government not to allow Germany to have even a depot or naval station in American waters. Moreover, in sympathizing with the Carlist movement and the refusal on her part to recognize Sarrano, which is duly alluded to by official dispatches received in Washington last night, it is regarded as an omen of war in which the United States will necessarily be involved, unless the broad proposition laid down by President Grant, that European governments having colonial possessions in American waters can no longer transfer them, from one power to another, should be acquiesced in by England, Spain and Denmark.

ARREST FOR MUTINY.—As before reported the captain of the bergam "Formosa," of Miramichi, which arrived on Tuesday, had a good deal of trouble with his crew (all coloured) Three men named Storer, Booth and Palmer, who seized the captain by the collar and threatened to throw him overboard on Sunday last, were arrested yesterday afternoon under a warrant by a County Constable, and afterwards taken to jail. When the constable was leaving the ship, the other four men, Curtis, Young, Linton, and Grant, perished in getting into the boat saying that they were going on shore, and would not go on board the vessel when ordered by the captain. One of them, Grant, told the captain that if he had to stay on board the vessel last night he would murder him. The boat then came on shore with the whole crew, and the captain gave the last named four in charge to the police, who locked them up in the station. They will probably be tried before the Police Court. The first named three will probably be tried before the County Stipendiary. The whole seven are as ill and hard looking creatures as have come into this port for some time.—[Halifax Chronicle.]

ST. ANDREWS, OCT. 7, 1874. Agricultural Fair. The Ploughing Match of the Charlotte County Agricultural Society, will take place this day, on the Amis House farm; and the Cattle Show and Fair is to be held at the Society's grounds, Bay Side, on Friday next, 9th inst. It is said that there will be a fine display of farm produce, and that the cattle show promises to surpass any previous exhibition. We understand that arrangements are being made to supply a substantial dinner for those who may require one while attending the Fair and Show.

RAILWAY CHANGES.—Mr. Brydges' recent visit to the Maritime Provinces, was, from his report, one of inspection of the management, &c., of the Intercolonial Railway. We only know Mr. Brydges as an official, and must judge of his acts as such. It is clear from the extracts of his report which are published, that the management in all cases was not such as could be desired, and that abuses had crept in which required removal. We have heard of some changes recommended by him, which have not yet been published, but it is probable that they will go into effect about the first of January. There appears to be a good deal of firmness and decision in the Department.

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Rev. Mr. CARRUTHERS, from Scotland, will preach in Greenock Church, on Sabbath next, morning and evening.

GRAND GIFT ENTERPRISE.—A committee of Stockholders have issued an advertisement in the "St. Croix Courier," for the purpose of raising means to finish the large Hotel near the Railway Station in this town. They offer inducements for the purchase of tickets, which will probably secure that success which it deserves, as the want of a large hotel for summer visitors has long been felt; several families from our own Province and the United States, would make St. Andrews their residence during the summer months. Some of their friends who have been here for the past two years, have expressed themselves delighted with the sea-bathing, driving, fishing, &c., and the robust health which they acquired during their short sojourn in our healthy locality.

Messrs. J. & C. Short, launched at St. Stephen on the 26th ult., a splendid barque named the "Lytton," of 700 tons, and classed S-3, 1-1, for 8 years. The vessel is owned by Messrs. Z. Chipman, and J. R. DeWolfe, of Liverpool, England. Messrs. Short's name as builders has long been established in this Province and England. They are to launch another vessel from their yard in Calais in a few days.

The weather begins to feel fallish, and fires are acceptable morning and evening; the vines and flowers were nipped on Tuesday night by frost.

An American speculator visited Clare, N. S., last week with the object of purchasing all the geese in that section, to be shipped alive to Boston. The accommodation in the Institution for the Deaf and Dumb, at Halifax, being inadequate to the wants of the establishment, the Directors have issued an appeal to the public for aid in enlarging the buildings. They have undertaken the work, which is to be completed by the 1st of December next, involving a cost of about \$5,000.

International Courtesies and Contests.—The Lord Mayor of Dublin has been enjoying for some days past, the civic hospitalities of New York and Brooklyn, and the Irish team of rifle-men have come to shoot against a team of American amateurs at Creedmoor. It is so rare to find a distinguished Irishman "feted" in this country, who does not avow himself a rebel against the British crown, and who is not made much of for so doing, that the conjunction of an Irish loyalist, and an honored guest of the municipality of New York in the Lord Mayor of Dublin, is a more than usually noteworthy event. As it is almost equally rare to find an "international" contest which passes off without any bad blood, and in which vanquished as well as victors, are perfectly satisfied with the arrangements made for the struggle, the match between the Irish and American rifle-men at Creedmoor deserves to be remembered for at least this refreshing distinction.

DEATH OF W. H. NEEDHAM, Esq.—After our issue last week, intelligence of the death of Mr. Needham, was received. He died while returning from attending Court at Woodstock, Mr. Needham was a man of great talent; a Barrister, formerly a legislator, and also at one time Mayor of Fredericton. As an old school mate, we sincerely lament his removal.
