Helsingfors, March 7.—All classes of citizens at Kronstadt, the great Russian navel base near Petrograd, have united in the uprising against the soviet government, says a dispatch to the Russian union agency here. Organization of the revolutionary committee, which later became the provisional government, was carried out without the participation of political parties, and its members were chosen almost exclusively from seamen and workmen having no political affiliations.

# REV. B. H. ROBINSON **GIVES PROTESTANT** VIEW OF DIVORCE

Says Catholic Stand Splendid in Theory-But Recalls "Ne Temere."

"At the present moment there is a movement in favor of establishing divorce courts in Ontario, and there is in this city a lawyer whom you all know, whether you like him or not, who has on his list 100 applications for divorce."

In these words Rev. B. H. Robinson, in these words Rev. B. H. Robinson, in the contract of t

minister of the Memorial Methodist Church, prefaced his sermon on the Protestant attitude toward divorce in addressing a large congregation last night. Mr. Robinson based his remarks on the nineteenth chapter of St. Matthew, eighth verse: "Moses, owing to the hardness of your hearts, suffered you to put away your wives, but in the beginning it was not so."

"One organization," continued Mr. Robinson, "is putting up a splendid light not only against the establishment of divorce courts in Ontario, but against the whole principle of divorce, and that is the Roman Catholic Thurch.

Splendid in Theory.
"The Roman Catholic Church is splendid in theory, but this does not always ork out in practice, as in the case of e Ne Temere decree. This is an im-oral procedure by which this church is assisting in separating men and wo-men who have been married in all good aith. Therefore, I cannot wholly accept the Roman Catholic attitude towards divorce, but it is the Protestant attitude that I have now to investigate. "I believe that Jesus would not have the marriage bonds dissolved without good cause, and I believe that marriage s a divine institution meant to work out for all that is noble in the charoter of human destiny; but I also be-eve that he made one reservation, amely, that infidelity was one reason

for the dissolution of the marriage tie.

"There are some things that enter into that relationship which makes the continuance of that relationship impossible, and if there is one thing that s going to hinder the working out of

God's will, it is domestic impurity.

"To my mind the granting of a divorce decree is not separating a couple where this trouble has occurred, is only a legal recognition of the fact that they have already been separated In all honesty I believe that the inocent party should have liberty to nvoke the law and have permission to

"On the other hand, I think that the lyorce law is absolutely wrong that llows the guilty party to remarry, but If both are guilty there should be no reason under heaven why their marrying again should be permitted.

"I do not believe that it was in the mind of Jesus Christ that where there

was an innocent man or woman, that hese parties should be debarred for life rom working out the destiny for which od intended them."

Wife Eloped in Absence.
Mr. Robinson then related the case a young man who got married in ste before proceeding overseas, and hose wife eloped on the eve of his aturn. "It surely cannot be the ew," exclaimed the preacher, "that as clean a young man as you could ever find, should be compelled to live alone for the rest of his life. It does seem o me that the fair and reasonable hing to do is to grant that boy his perfect freedom and give him permision to remarry. If you could annul uch a marriage, then by all means null it, for I don't like that abominable


Favored New York Law

He considered that Canada today stood in a most enviable position re-garding divorce, when adultery and desertion were the only two legal causes. There were also less than 100 divorces granted in Canada in a year. This, he thought, was a mighty fine record, and it would have to be guarded


