FIERCE STORMS

A Cyclone Plays Sad Havoc in Illinois-Death by Lightning.

Centralia, Mo., May 21.—A funnel shaped cyclone a half mile wide passed a mile from here yesterday afternoon. By it a number of dwellings were totally destroyed and many persons injured, some fatally. Barns and fences were swept away, and chicken shops and stocks killed in large

and chicken shops and stocks killed in large numbers.

BLOOMINGTON, Ill., May 21.—Yesterday afternoon a terrific cyclone wrecked the various lines of the Chicago and Alton Railroads and also those of the Wabash at Centralia, Mo. At 3 o'clock another cyclone swept across the Chicago and Alton at Ladonia again, completely cutting of communication. Great damage was done, and at Ladonia many people were injured and some are reported killed.

No licenses to sell intoxicating liquer have been issued for South London. Why is so important a district slighted by the license commissioners? Surely it is not tair to so wide an extent of territory that it should be left without a supply of liquor dealers. When we came into the city it was upon the distinct understanding that we should be treated like other parts of London. Now, here is East London with its tavern, and the central wards also have their places for selling beer and whisky, whereas we, who are equally important, are deprived of our right to buy our drinks with ease. We should not be compelled to come to the city when we want a drink of whisky. The taverns should be parcelled out like the electric lights. Why not arrange to have one on Stanley street, one at Clark's bridge, another on Queen, and one in the neighborhood of the new fire hall? If you can get any more, let there be a fair division. Some intermeddling person may say that the planting of taverns in this manner would encourage drinking here more than now takes place. I admit that; but remember that the drinkers would be helping to pay the city taxes. The taverns would be paying licenses, and though the money disbursed for drink would not be spent for ment, groceries or clothes, it would still be helping to reduce the taxes. Then it is known that very tew arrests have taken place for drunkenness in South London. The patrol wagon has not been needed on this side of the river, and the police have had next to nothing to do. We pay our share of the patrol wagon's maintenance. We pay for police service. Let us have more tayerns and more work for our public servants. Galt, C.J., held that the charge against the plaintiff was a criminal charge and that the action was not frivolous or trivial, within the meaning of the provision of the Libel Act (sec. 9), with regard to security for costs. Snow, for the plaintiff, contra. Appeal dismissed with costs, the court holding that the statement could not be said to have been published in good faith or for the public benefit.



No such dis graceful discrimination could take place under the municipal lists, upon which, as Hon. Mr. Mills pointed out, the people had voted without complaint for sevencees

Then there is the expense. The cost of the first revision, paid out of Dominion taxes, was \$409,317. 

Crop Prospects in Kent.

J. J. Spettigue, an esteemed citizen of London, who has been visiting in Kent county nearly two months, writes from Cedar Springs as follows: "With regard to the crops in this part, and I have traveled considerably over it, I find on the Ridge reaching almost all the way from the Eau through to Blenheim, Cedar Springs and on to Leamington in Essex, there has been no growth for the last two or three weeks; in fact the fall wheat is suffering for want of rain; but as you go north towards Chatham it has suifered very little. The land is deeper and holds the moisture longer. I was quite surprised to have seen an article in the AdversiseR two weeks since stating that the fruit crop had suffered almost total destruction. Nothing could be more misleading or further from the truth.
