AT THE MERCY OF THE TORRENT.

SERIOUS SITUATION IN TEXAS.

KNOXYILLE, Tenn., Aug. 16.—The hostilities between the miners and the militia men have reached a grave condition, for the miners are dynamiting in a fozen places on the K. and O. and Knoxville and Walden's Ridge Railroad to wreck any train carrying militia. To-night through mail trisins could not go forward, and it is believed the United States authorities will have to interfere. PHILADELFIHA, Apa. 16.—Charles. W. Riggin, boatswain's mate of the United States steamer Baltimore, was buried on Saturday with great pomp and ceremony. The Patriotic Order of America, Sons of Veterans, Junior Order of American Mechanics and other patriotic orders contributed liberally toward the fund raised to bring the body home, and turned out in large numbers with a great dipplay of flags, banners and brillfant uniforms to take part in the funeral. There were many Grand Army men and naval veterans also in the procession, which contained about 5,000 men. The route from Independence Hill to Woodlawn Cemetery, about five miles, was lined with about 200,000 pectators.

Capt. W. W. Ker graphically described the brutal attack upon the American sailors in Valparaiso. Rev. Dr. MacGregor pronunced a glowing eulogy on Riggin and paid a tribute to American patriotism. A detail of marines from League Island Navy Yard fired the salute over the grave, and sailors from the receiving ship St. Louis acted as a guard of honor. Members of the National Guard of Pennsylvania and New Jersey participated in the parade.


