Liverpoot, Nov. 13.—James Kier Hardie, Socialist member of the House of Commons, addressed a meeting of of Commons, addressed a meeting of Socialists here to-day. He announced that he would shortly introduce in Parliament a bill providing for the nationization of mines. Fifty millions of pounds would represent the capitalized value of the coal pits in Creat Britain. The State could raise a loan of this amount at 2½ per cent, and take over the mines.

A Grand Trunk Financial Scheme. ONDON, Nov. 13 .- The Grand Trunk ompany invites the present proprietors to apply for £500,000 worth of perprietors to apply for £500,000 worth of per-petual 4 per cent, consolidated debenture stock at 94. The objects of this stock are to replace £122,600 spent in redeeming the northern extension bonds and to replace the terminable loans. The directors claim the result will be to reduce the interest charges.

Matters had reached the point at which he thought steps might be taken by the Government with advantage to all concerned. He had therefore addressed to the employers and miners respectively a duplicate letter containing this passage: "It appears to the Government that advantages might accrue from a free discussion of the points at issue between the parties under the chairmanship of a member of the Government, who it is hoped will not be unacceptable to either side. Lord Rosebery has consented at the request of his colleagues to undertake the important duty which the position involves. I therefore invite the miners' and employers' federations to send representatives to the conference to be held forthwith under his chairmanship." Mr. Gladstone's statement was cheered heartily.

Ten Thousand People Throng Depot at St. John

To Welcome the Recently-Imprisoned Editor, J. V. Ellis.

An Ovation Such as the City Has Seldem Seen-Torchlight Procession, Bands of Music, an Address, Congratulations, Epecches and General Jubilation.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Nov. 13 .- It has been many years since such a spontaneous and orthusiastic demonstration has taken place a this city as the one to-day to J. V. Ellis, dditor of the Globe, on his return from fredericton, where he had been in prison or 30 days, under circumstances well

known.

The train containing Mr. Ellis arrived at 6:30, and the depot contained fully 10,000 people. The scene as the train came to a standstill beggars all description, the cheers of the immense crowd and the music of two bands creating a scene of wild enthusiasm.

As Mr. Ellis stepped from the train the City Cornet Band played "Home Again," and after greetings from dozens of representative citizens, barouches were taken and the largest procession which has moved through the streets of St. John for many years started for the residence of Mr. Ellis. As the procession left the depot the Fusiliers Band struck up "Johnny Comes Marching Home Again," and the crowd went fairly wild.

At 80 clock Ellis left his tesidence in a barouche under escort of a monstrous torchlight procession of the Ship Laborers' Union, Shipwrights' and Caulkers' unions, and proceeded to the institute, where an immense crowd awaited him. Ellis was given a perfect ovation, and after order was restored John McMillan, chairman of the meeting, read an address signed by hundreds of citizen on behalf of the Liberal party of New Brunswick.

The address says: "We feel that you did admirable service, not only to our party but for the people, in exposing to just opproblium the conduct of a returning officer by which a defeated candidate was deciated to be elected to a seat in Parlament to which his opponent had

His official mission is to inquire into the horticulture of the various countries of the earth for the information of the government which he represents. He has spent several months in California, a week in Oregon, some time in British Columbia and the Northwest, and a period at the World's Fair. Mr. Smith is the son of a foremost Australian horticulturist, and is a recognized authority on the subject. He is also a journalist of prominence, and corresponds for several of the leading papers of his own country.

"This is my first visit to Canada," said Mr. Smith to an Advertiser reporter yesterday morning. "I am both delighted and surprised at what I have seen. The people of Australia have very little knowledge of your country, which they look upon as a region in the frozen north. A visit would soon correct that impression. I was astonished at the fine climate and the horticultural possibilities of yours Northwest. Why, you grow every fruit that we do in Australia, with the exception of oranges, apricots and other tropical products. I thought to have found there

"Words cannot describe it. I spent most of my time in the horticultural building, where I had plenty of opportunity to examine Canadian fruits. Grapes are an immense factor in Australian horticulture."

Benefit of Water Communication.

It is evident that the Manchester ship canal, which will open on Jan. 1, will obtain a large share of its business from cotton-carrying steamers. The managers of the canal say that several steamers have already engaged to bring cotton from New Orleans and Galveston to Manchester direct, and 323 apinners, owning more than 20,000,000 spindles and consuming about 350,000 tons of raw cotton yearly, have signed a statement booming the new route. They pledged themselves to give preference, when buying to arrive, to cotton shipped direct, and when buying on spot, to cotton imported direct and stored in Manchester. The present cost of conveying a ton of cotton from a ship in the Liverpool docks to Manchester is 13 shillings and 8 pence, while the total amount payable to the ship canal on cotton landed in the Manchester docks for canal toll, wharfage and landing will be 7 shillings. In order to encourage shipowners to begin loading vessels for Manchester, the canal company have agreed not to charge ship dues upon cotton vessels delivering cargo in Manchester during the cotton season ending October, 1894. The Disaster of a Strike.

The coal war in England has ceased to be a question of economics, and has become one of common humanity. All the horrors of famine are now reging in the mining districts. The newspapers are filled daily with the appalling story of death, destitution and mute endurance. The terrible record of the London dock strike five years ago did not match the present truth about the English midlands. The newspapers to-day, for instance, tell about one community of 1,200 families which existed two or three weeks on two meals a week of plain bread supplied by charity. This pitiful ration has now been cut down to one meal a week. The response of the authorities to this situation is the dispatch of a special train from London this morning loaded, not with bread, but with metropolitan police. Starvation that is invisible awakens lukewarm sympathy in English breasts. Besides, most charitable folk consider that they are doing much more than their duty in the enforced contribution of an extra sovereign a ton on all the coal they burn.

Public condemnation is about equally divided between the masters and the men in the present situation. A paltry 5 percent, obstacle now prevents a settlement. The mean assert that it represents the difference between living wages and slow starvation, between hie and death. The masters declare that it is the margin between profit and loss, and if the matter is compromised now the battle will be fought over again next year. 

### To-Day's British Cables.

No personal or financial news this week has excited so much comment as the retirement of a man whose signature is better known and more widely distributed than any other in all the world. The name of F. May will no longer appear on the Bank of England notes. It is no secret that his resignation of the office of chief cashier was given under pressure. There is no imputation against May's integrity, and the bank will not suffer through him. The cause of the trouble is certain revelations regarding the brokerage firm of Coleman & May and its connection with large trust companies which are now in liquidation. Broker May in this firm is the son of Chief Cashier May. The affairs of the trust com panies were found to be in a disgraceful condition, and the stockholders will lose millions. Cashier May was interested in these concerns, and so, on his recommendation, were customers of the Bank of Eng-Coleman & May unloaded before the crash came. The governors of the Bank of England deemed it best that May should retire. He had held the position twenty years, and was virtually manager of the world's greatest financial institution.

Benefit of Water Communication. It is evident that the Manchester ship canal, which will open on Jan. 1, will obtain a large share of its business from

canal, which will open on Jan. I, will obtain a large share of its business from cotton-carrying steamers. The managers of the canal say that several steamers have already engaged to bring cotton from New Orleans and Galveston to Manchester direct, and 323 spinners, owning more than 250,000,000 spindles and consuming about 350,000 tons of raw cotton yearly, have signed a statement booming the new route. They pledged themselves to give preference, when buying to arrive, to cotton shipped direct, and when buying on spot, to cotton imported direct and stored in Manchester. The present cost of conveying a ton of cotton from a ship in the Liverpool docks to Manchester is 13 shillings and 8 pence, while the total amount payable to the ship canal on cotton landed in the Manchester docks for canal toll, what fage and landing will be 7 shillings. In order to encourage shipowners to begin loading vessels for Manchester, the canal company have agreed not to charge ship dues upon cotton vessels delivering cargo in Manchester during the cotton season ending October, 1894. This will be a saving to the ship of I shilling and 3 pence net a ton.

The newspapers to-day, for instance, tell about one community of 1,200 families which existed two or three wecks on two meals a week of plain bread supplied by charity. This pitiful ration has now been cut down to one meal a week. The response of the authorities to this situation is the dispatch of a special train from London this morning loaded, not with bread, but with metropolitan police. Starvation that is invisible awakens lukewarm sympathy in English breasts. Besides, most charitable folk consider that they are doing much more than their duty in the enforced contribution of an extra sovereign a ton on all the coal they burn.

In a few moments the lad returned, but to his horror he saw his little sister hanging in the air suspended under the neck by the swing rope. He rushed to her and littled from his hands to the ground. In leaning on the rope the weight on the cart caused it to move from under her, and she fell forward with the rope across her neck, the force being so great that she was unable to extricate herself from the nose.


