# ASKS CITY FOR CASH BONUS OF \$300,000 Says London Should Do Something for Company in Return for Improvements --- Will

G. T. R. MANAGER SURPRISES COMMITTEE

Not Guarantee to Remove Any of the Existing Tracks.

### What the Grand Trunk Wants.

A cash bonus of \$300,000, or the equivalent of the bonus in an exemption from taxation for the next 25 years.

To effect this, the company is willing to have its assessment fixed at the sum of \$275,000 for the period named.

The company is now assessed for something over \$500,000, and when its improvements have been made it is expected that its assessable property in London will be worth \$750,600.

No clause in the agreement with the city which says that the company is liable for damages to land, or to life or limb, through the making of the improvements.

A 56-foot opening at Colborne street. No stipulation as to the class of material to be used for the trestle-west of Richmond street.

No stipulation as to where the new depot shall be built. An 86-foot opening at Wellington street.

No stipulation as to when an overhead bridge at Egerton street

shall be built No stipulation as to the number of level tracks which shall be run by the company, where the overhead tracks are also to run.

Absolutely no subway, for pedestrians or vehicles at William street. The city must take the two walks over the tracks or nothing. Mr. McGuigan states that the company will spend in London the sum of \$1,250,000 if the improvements are proceeded with.

The company to guarantee to erect a steel trestle west of Richmond street to the river.

A 90-foot opening at Wellington street.

A 90-foot opening at Colborne street. The two overhead walks at William street are agreeable to the

The construction within two years of an overhead bridge at Ege

The company to light all the viaducts.

That in case at some future time the company shall decide to elevate its tracks east of William street, provision shall be made for the opening up of a subway at William street.

The railway committee of the city council met Manager McGuigan and Superintendent Brownlee, of the Grand Trunk Railway, with their solicitors yesterday afternoon, in the city hall and the result was that the company made the city a proposition which took the committee's breath away. It was that the company be given a cash bonus of \$300,000 for making the proposed improvements here, or else that the company's assessment be fixed at the sum of \$275,000 for the next 25 years, which would mean a saving in taxes to the company equal to the cash bonus asked.

Chairman Garratt, and all the members of the committee, including the mayor, with City Solicitor Meredith. were present. The meeting was called for 3 o'clock, but owing to the breakdown of an engine at Dorchester, the officials did not reach the city hall until after 5 o'clock.

The reporters were excluded from the meeting, but not until such times as the committee decided by a vote to remove them.

City Solicitor Meredith first approached the newspapermen and informed them that Mr. McGuigan would like them to absent themselves, but the reporters declined to leave until

ordered to by the committee. Before Chairman Garratt put the vote, which was opposed only by AldJ Gillean, Manager McGuigan made a statement. He said that the character, of the meeting had changed very much since he was informed of it.

Objected to Newspapermen.

"I may as well tell you now," he said in the most emphatic manner, "that the Grand Trunk will not under any circumstances accept the agreement as drafted by the city of London. There are several clauses in it that we absolutely refuse to accept. I do not feel that it is right that I should be called upon to discuss this matter in the presence of the newspapermen. If it is desired by the city I will make a statement in writing as to what the ompany will do, but I positively refuse to be quoted while discussing the agreement.

"I am of the opinion that while the city and company are very far apart just now, a friendly discussion may do much to bring both parties together, and I think the best interests of the city and the Grand Trunk will be served by asking the reporters to withdraw."

After hearing this statement Ald. Gillean withdrew his objection, and the committee decided that the reporters

### Kitchener Under Fire. The controversy kindled by the feud

between Lord Kitchener and Lord Curzon over matters of Indian policy, has been supplied with fresh fuel by a special correspondent of the London Times, whose letter has created a sensation in England. This writer, who has known Lord Kitchener for many years, says his conclusions have been forced upon him by five months' careful inquiry and confidential conversations with many officers of both Brit-1sh and native army, as well as with European civilians and Indian gentlemen of position and repute. He begins by inting out that military service has been a tradition of the finest races of India from time immemorial and that as soon as they had been taught to realize the supremacy of the British power they transferred their service to all their old loyalty and on the one condition that their customs and prejudices should be treated with consideration. The native army in India is, therefore, a voluntary army in a much higher sense than the British army. Unfortunately, the Times' correspondent says, there is too much reason to believe that this is a factor which Lord Kitchener has failed altogether to appreciate. He adds:

the native army has created both within and outside its ranks the impression that he holds it in very slight esteem, and that he regards its peculiar customs and traditions with Impatience as senseless obstacles to the homogeneity of an ideal army. The mere neglect of personal courtesies to which native officers have hitherto been accustomed and the absence of those kindly manifestations of comradeship which endeared so many of his predecessors to the Indian army would not alone have important a place. sufficed to create that impression, had not various suggestions emanating from headquarters tended also to grouse apprehensions of far-reaching changes in the organization of the Indian army. Many of these suggestions were doubtless merely speculative, and were wisely abandoned even before they had taken sufficient shape to be embodied in formal records. But, even when they never went beyond the stage at which they could still be overtaken by official denials, they went far enough to create an atmosphere of distrust and alarm which the denials fatled to ener at the same time overlooked, or underrated, the effect upon the native army of some of the most important features in his scheme for the redistribution of garrisons. Whatever the technical merits of that scheme-upon which there is by no means a consensus of the best military opinion-it unquestionably tends to divorce the native soldier more and more from his home, and to render more difficult and less frequent the periodical visits on furlough which he has hitherto been able to pay to his family. Andrew Carnegie, in advocating his dream of an Anglo-Saxon political reunion, once suggested that Canada might one day annex the United States. sador at Washington: "The United States Government re sion of their deepest gratitude and most profound appreciation of the munificent contribution which the Canadian Government has proffered for the relief of the distressed citizens of San Francisco. They feel sure that the Canadian Government will understand that they appreciate their generous action none the less highly because of the conclusion which they have reached that outside assistance





# \$250,000 ANNUALLY FOR UNIVERSITY

Sum To Be Taken from Succession Dues.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, May 2. - The evening session of the Legislature was taken up with the address of Premier Whitney, in moving the university bill into the committee stage, and Hon. Mr. Harcourt's reply on behalf of the Opposi-

There was a small attendance of members, but educational experts, including all the members of the commission, were present in force. Hon. Mr. Ross and Hon. Mr. Hanna were both absent through illness.

The Premier, after reading nearly said he had no apology for making the main portion of his upon the report of the commission. The Government indorsed all the conclusions cited therein, and had seen the way clear to adopt all the recommendations except as to the endowment of land. As a money endowment the Government proposed a sum to be equal to a sum based on the average of three years' revenue. The percentage had not been fixed, but the endeavor would be to secure to the university a sum of about \$250,000 annually. Therefore, the administration took full responsibility. The authorities of all the institutions concerned were in full accord with the bill. The Government

was actuated only by a burning desire for the success of the university, in which they had every confidence. He had the personal satisfaction of knowing that the Government had redeemed its every pledge regarding the university, and looked for no higher honor than the Government was achieving by putting the future of the institution on a firm basis.

Mr. Harcourt, in reply, referred to the interesting fact that 56 years ago Dr. Goldwin Smith, a member of the present commission, was appointed by the Imperial Government to report on a scheme of reform for Oxford University. The present commission had performed its work with "zeal, tact, good sense and zeal," the words applied to the Oxford commission by Mr. John Morley. Mr. Harcourt thought Toronto University should pay more attention to the scientific side of education, instead of subordinating it to the human, or the culture side. He quoted statistics to show that the Liberal Government had not been niggardly with the university. Speaking of the report, Mr. Harcourt agreed in the main with its conclusions, but he took issue with some of the reasons advanced for these conclusions. He denied that there had been any decline of public sympathy for the university, or any partisanship in connection with its administration. The Premier's motion was carried at 10:30 p.m.


