GERMANS RETIRING TO THE DVINA LINE; RUSSIANS REPORT A GREAT RETREAT

Hindenburg's Forces Falling Back On North Russian Front, Destroying Bridges, Roads and Buildings.

Petrograd, Oct. 25.—The German retreat on the northern end of the front continues. The war office reports that the Russian vanguards lost touch in some sectors with the retiring Germans, who destroyed all bridges, roads and

On Tuesday the Germans were reported to be on the Rodenpois-Turkaln line.

This line indicates an extensive retreat by the Germans, who are now back nearly to the Dvina River region. Rodenpois is on the Great Jaegel River, about twelve miles north of the Dvina. Turkaln is on the Little Jaegel, seven miles from the Dvina

LANDING FRUSTRATED. Petrograd, Oct. 25.—German attempts to make another landing on the Werder Peninsula in the region of Tomba were frustrated yesterday by Russian artillery fire, the war office announced today.

The Russian statement says that the Germans who left their advanced positions so far have retired about fifteen miles in the Riga region, near the Pskoff Highroad, and in the sector of the Little Jaegel River.

Amsterdam, Oct. 25.—It is learned that the schools of Cologne are closed on account of the increase in what is called "hunger typhus," a type of dysentery caused by the bad quality of food, especially the bread produced within recent months. There are tens of thousands of cases all over the country. Vienna reports an increased number of cases of this malady.

Official notices published in German papers show that "the domestic front" is sustaining the greater food scarcity. The pressure of the price of bread is increased everywhere, as from today it is officially admitted that there is practically no fish obtainable throughout the country nor are there even faintest hopes of this state of affairs being remedied in the future. Fruit is extremely scarce; sugar has gone up fifty per cent in price; the milk supply, together with that of butter, is also highly unsatisfactory.

Failure of Some To Report For **Examination After Applying** Reduces Total.

FOUR RECRUITS COME UP

Three Don Khaki and One Is Rejected by Medical Boards.

The failure of men to report for medical examination after making out application papers reduced the number examined under the military service act by the three medical boards at the armories on Wednesday.

Four men were examined with a view

to enlistment making the total for the day 147. One man was rejected. The three accepted were P. Bostwick, who was born in Poland and was recruited by the British and Canadian mission in Detroit; H. EVERY RETURNED MAN HAS CHANCE OF SECURING VOCATIONAL SCHOOL COURSE FOR BETTER POSITIONS

Soldiers Must Be Informed of Opportunity, Says Dominion Inspector, After Going Over Work Being So Successfully Carried On In This City.

Professor H. E. Haultain, provincial vocational officer was in London Wednesday to consult with H. B. Beal and other local vocational training officials regarding the work of training returned soldiers for renumerative occupations.

Vocational training for soldiers who, because of wounds sustained in action, are unfit to return to their former occupations, has become most important throughout the Dominion, and it is expected that additional training schools and training facilities will be required shortly to accommodate the increasing number of students.

Professor Haultain impressed upon those in charge of the work in London the necessity of ascertaining whether every returned man has been informed that the chance of acquiring an education in practically any kind of work lies open to him through the medium of the vocational training school.

During the last month many men from the city have been sent to Guelph to learn agriculture and other sciences. Following Professor Haultain's tour of vocational training centres he will tubmit a report of his observations to leadquarters.

Question—I am a farmer owning 250 acres, 90 of which is in crop. In addition i have 13 cows, 40 sheep and a number of horses and pigs. One son is the only help I have. He was married on October 10, 1917, and is in possession of 100 acres of land. Has he sufficient grounds upon which to claim exemption? T. A. T. Answer—As your son was married after July 6, he is considered unmarried under the act, and is therefore included in class one. His reasons for claiming exemption are apparently sufficient, but it is impossible to forecast what the decision of the tribunal would be.

"The action of the food controller has been anticipated for some time. Foreigners and those who have been accustomed to using butter substitutes will too doubt be glad to purchase margarine, but inveterate butter eaters will find it hard. The food value of margarine is as high as butter, but it is not so palatable. There are many different varieties of margarine; the unadulterated, pure substance, and the stuff containing various percentages of butter. It is questionable what variety will be used, but it is certain that colored oleo will be banned from the country.

Few Factories Expected.

Authority to raise a loan of nine million kronen was voted 227 to 170.

Will Class One Provide The One Hundred Thousand Men? It will be greatly to the advantage of Canada if the entire quota of 100,000 men to be raised under

the Military Service Act can be secured from the first class; that is, from the men between the ages of 20 and 34 who were unmarried or widowers without children on July 6th, 1917.

This is almost self-evident for the following reasons:

it is admitted that, between the ages of 20 and 34, the average man is at the height of his physical strength and is most adaptable to the change of conditions from civilian life; the military Service of unmarried men and widowers without children would occasion less distress than that of most others, since they are largely without dependents. Also, it would entail less financial burden for Canada, through separation allowances, etc.

Authorities estimate that, after all proper examinations have been allowed, Canada should be able to produce from the first class 100,000 men fit for service, so the drain upon the man power of the country will not be severe.

Members of Class One will be well advised to present themselves for examination immediately to the Medical Board in their district. Upon examination as to their physical fitness, they will be placed in

one of the following categories: Category A—if fit for service in overseas fighting units.
Category B—if fit for service overseas in Army Medical Corps, Forestry Battalion, etc.

Category C—if fit for service in Canada only.

Category E—if unfit for military service of any nature.

If not placed in category A, the applicant will know that he is not liable for immediate service, but will go to the Post Office and send in a claim for exemption with his Medical Certificate attached, when he will receive in due course a certificate of exemption until those in his medical category are summoned for service.

Where a man, who is placed in category A, feels that exemption should be allowed, an application form can be secured from the postmaster. This form, when filled in, will be forwarded by the postmaster to the registrar of the district, and the applicant will be informed by mail as to the time and place for the consideration of his application by the Exemption Board.







The two men tried to imbue Rasputin with the idea that he had great political talents. and that it was a pity he had not yet turned these into account for the good and the welfare of Holy Russia. Rasputin did not believe in the sincerity of his newly acquired advisers, but he was shrewd enough to see that their help would be of wonderful value to him. It was easy to throw in a word now and then, either in the shape of a jest, or of a remark uttered inadvertently and unintentionally, but yet sure to bear fruit in the future. The great thing was to give to Rasputin the idea that he was a personage of importance.
