RESURFACE DOWN TOWN PAVEMENT

City Council Will Make an Effort to Shift the Cost to the Property Owners.

FIGHT WITH ST. RAILWAY

Board of Works Decide to Take Bull by Horns and Remove the Snow From the Streets.

At the meeting of the board orks, held last evening, the question of resurfacing the Richmond and Dundas street pavements, was taken up, and the orinion of the solicitor will be obtained as to whether or not the city has power to lay the pavements this

A letter was read from City Engin-eer Graydon recommending that they be resurfaced. He pointed out that the last payment on the debentures was due this year, and he thought that the work could be done and payments made next year. He recommended that the street railway allowance be done in brick.

Costly Repairs.

The committeemen agreed with the suggestion. It was pointed out by Mr. Graydon that the city paid \$2,400 each year for repairs, and during the past five years had paid out over \$10,000 on this work. The cost he estimated to be \$22,700.

"The idea is a good one," said Mayor Beattie. "The difficulty has been that the debentures were for five years longer than the Barber Company's guarantee, and we have been unable to do anything. I am not quite clear as to the right of the city to do this work this year, and in order to find out we had better allow the chairman and the engineer to interview Mr. Meredith on the subject."

"We can save at least \$2,000 this year if we can resurface the pave-ment." said Ald. Saunders. "The mayor's suggestion is the proper one.' It was agreed to, and Ald. Tancock and Mr. Graydon will see Mr. Meredith

SAYS SCIENCE PROVES THERE'S AN AFTER LIFE

Dr. Guthe Says That Personality Spirit, Goes on Developing Despite Death.

Ann Arbor, Mich., Feb. 10.—"If you claim that personality is both matter and mind, both physical energy and consciousness, are we not completely destroyed when death claims our bodies?" is the question Dr. Carl E. Guthe, professor of physics, answered in lecturing to students of the University of Michigan on the probability of life after death without reference to a religious
