Washington, Feb. 1. -Following a conference today between President Wilson and Secretary of State Lansing, the opinion became generally prevalent in official quarters that a break in diplomatic relations with Germany seemed inevitable, although it was thought probable that an ultimatum or warning to the Berlin Government might precede this action.

The view was taken widely in official quarters that the United States could not let the situation stand unchallenged.

New York, Feb. 1 .- The American Line steamship St. Louis will sail Saturday as scheduled and no effort will be made to paint the ship in conformity with the regulations prescribed by the German government as a guarantee for the safety of the vessels flying the American flag, according to announcement today by officials of the International Mercantile Marine, which controls the American Line vessels.
