

MAUDE TABOR DIED AS RESULT OF AN **ILLEGAL OPERATION**

Body Embalmed in Lye and Formaline, Is Belief of Prof. Warthin.

Lawton, Mich., Dec. 11.—Science cleared up part of the mystery of Maude Tabor's death today when Professor Warthin, expert pathologist of the University of Michigan, reported to Van Buren County authorities that the former teacher of languages came to her death as a result of a hemorrhage during induced childbirth. induced childbirth.

Far more startling, however, was the report of Professor Warthin that it was his belief, Maude Tabor's child actually nis benef, mande randr's child actuary had been born, probably dead, and that after the mother's death and before rigor mortis set in, the body of the child had been replaced in the mother's body.

Murder Theory Refuted. Professor Warthin's finding was based on exhaustive microscopic examination of the vital organs of the dead woman.

Disposing of the theory of possible murder. Professor Warthin pointed out in his report that the hemorrhage was undoubtedly unexpected, that the attendants of the woman had neglected to provide surgeon's gauze with which to stop the hemorrhage, this fact being revealed through absorbent materials used, consisting of old cotton cloths, even silks, a considerable quantity of which were found with the body. No Constitutional Disease.

Professor Warthin expressed the be-lief that the induced child birth occur-red between the eighth and ninth month nd that instruments had been used in the delivery. The condition of the body indicated that whoever attended the woman had some technical skill, though probably not a physician.

No signs of constitutional disease were found in Professor Warthin's examination, at least none that could have caused her death. Changes in the body vere such that no evidence of poison

Body Preserved in Lye. Laboratory tests indicated that the body, after death, had been partially embalmed, probably by an alkaline fluid. Professor Warthin expressed the belief the substance might have been lye. Presence of red blood cells indicated also that some other substance, possibly fornaline, had been used in the embalm-





PENSION SCHEME IS ADOPTED BY HYDRO **POWER COMMISSION**

2.500 Permanent, Employees Are Affected.

INSURANCE PLAN ALSO

Mortuary and Sick Benefits Provided For-Commission To Bear Cost.

TORONTO, Dec. 10 .- A pension system, affecting over 2.500 permanent employees of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission, has been put into effect by the commission, acting under au-hority given by the power commis-

"Pensions," however, imperfectly de-ribed the plan adopted by Sir Adam eck, chairman of the commission, and

Beck, chairman of the commission, and his colleagues, since provisions is made for death and sick benefits, and for a saving system for female employees to take the place for pensions.

The plan, as outlined by Sir Adam Beck today, provides for benefits for employees under four headings, the cost in each case being borne entirely by the commission

Where an employee has been in the service of the commission for not less than fifteen years, he is to be retired on pension when he reaches the age of 66 years, or earlier if permanently disabled or injured. The pension will be one-eightfeth of the employee's average salery for the lest five years, much be one-eightieth of the employee's average salary for the last five years, multiplied by the number of years of service. Thus an employee receiving \$1,500 a year salary, and having served 40 year, would on retirement be given a pension of \$750 a year, or half pay.

Insurance Plan.

The insurance plan provides that in case of the death of an employee the estate of the decased shall receive five per cent of the salary of the man each year with the commission, provided, however, that it is not more than twice the annual salary. Where the

twice the annual salary. Where the employee has served the commission for 20 years at the time of death, his dependents will be entitled to one year's salary.

A sick benefit scheme has been adopted which provides benefits after a waiting period of seven days. Women employees, owing to their shorter periods of unemployment are not included in the pension or insurance though they are covered by the sick benefit scheme. The commission has adopted a novel way of taking care of them by deciding to set aside for each their employment with the commis-

MONTREAL, Dec. 10 .- Of a fleet of 250 vessels built on the Great Lakes for the United States Emergency Shipping Board which were scheduled to come down the St. Lawrence during the navigation season of 1919, 234 have come down. Ten ships sailed from here with cargoes for the United Kingdom, ten for the Mediterrane n. and the balance took coastwise cargoes. Altogether about 100.000 tons of cargo was carried in United States ships overseas, of which approximately 65.000 tons went to the United Kingdom, and 35.600 tons to the Mediterranean.



ROME, Tuesday, Dec. 9.-Deputy Benteni, Socialist, and Deputy Crispoldi, Catholic, discussed in the Chamber today King Victor Emmanuel's speech from the throne. The former denounced every part of the king's address. He declared that the Socialist group was in favor of a republic, not because of their love of a republic, but in order to insure the triumph of Socialism.

Deputy Grispoldi criticized the failure of the king to lay greater emphasis on the development of education, but lauded the speech as a whole. He was much heckled by the Socialists, who objected to his compliments to the king saving his certified to help completely and the speed of the completely and the speed of the socialists. king, saying his party had recognized the pope, and not the king as their head, always calling the latter a

When Deputy Crispoldi spoke favorably of the League of Nations the Socialists hissed and shouted: "It does not exist. What we want is a society of peoples."

Deputy Crispoldi said: "One thing alone can save us in this critical situation. That is a spirit of Christian resignation." The Catholics applauded, but the Socialists again hissed and shouted: "Shame on you, acolytes." The deputy said the object of the Catholics was to bring about a vast economic, social and moral reconstruction. Turning to the Socialists, he detion. Deputy Crispoldi asserted that governmental institutions must be made more popular among the masses. He urged the Government to protect those who fought for Italy and those who still wore the military uniform. He said his party desired legal recognition of all Catholic organizations. The Socialists interrupted, and the deputy explained that the party desired that this recognition be extended to all organizations without distinction of faith. He praised the Socialists for their work in raising the masses from ignorance. The Socialists retorted: "When we did this your priests were against us." Urges That Question of His Extradition Be Seriously Considered.

THE HAGUE. Dec. 16.—(By the Associated Press.)—"If previously we have not regarded him as a danger to our country, he is now proving to be a danger," said Deputy Sannes in the Chamber of Deputies today, referring to former Emperor William of Germany. The deputy was dealing with a book written by Carl Kautzky, a German socialist, which Sannes declares showed that the former emperor was the cause of the world war. The data in Kautzky's book is said to have been obtained from official archives in Berlin.

Deputy Sannes asked the Government to reconsider the question of the sojourn at Amerogen of the former emperor, and seriously to consider the question of his extradition.






