Russia has made a partial concession to Great Britain in connection with the Dardanelles question. # The Treadgold Concession.

The agitators in the Yukon and the Opposition at Ottawa have succeeded in killing the Treadgold concession, but it is doubtful whether they are in a position to congratulate themselves The report of Judge Britton, who went to the gold country as a commissioner to investigate the concession, shows that the clamor against the undertaking was far from reasonable. Mr. Treadgold is an English capitalist, the owner of mining claims in the Klondike, who was given privileges and con. cessions in consideration of spending within two years not less than \$250,000 in hydraulic construction, so as to sup ply miners with water to work their claims. Some scheme had to be provided whereby water could be supplied on a large scale, so as to work partially exhausted beds and low-grade gravel The cost of these hydraulic operations was, of course, beyond the individual miner. 




