STILL HAMMERING AT RUSS LEFT FLANK:

The Japanese Are Preparing to Attack Kuropatkin's Center.

Czar Loses 2,000 in Bitter Conflict-Japanese Victors in Week-Long Fight.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 28, 2:15 a.m.— According to the Associated Press Mukden dispatches the Japanese on Sunday evening crossed the Shakhe River, but the place of crossing was eliminated by the censor. The advance was checked by Russian reinforcements. This is the most important news from the scene of the war tonight. Fighting is continuing on the Russian left flank with indications that the Japanese are planning a demonstration against the center, but the Russians believe their positions are impregnable.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 27. - 7 p.m. - A dispatch from Gen. Kuropatkin, dated Feb. 26, says: The enemy is continuing the offensive against the front of Tsinkhetchen detachment and has turned both its flanks.

The Japanese have also advanced against Kantie Pass, turning our left flank, but all his attacks on Tangu and Beydaling have been repulsed. His offensive movement against Bomapudz has also been repulsed. At some positions our riflement forced the Japanese outposts to retire. Col. Gorsky was severely wounded. May Attack Russ Center.

Mukden, Feb. 27.-The Japanese crossed the Shakhe River last evening, having driven in the pickets of the Russian advance. On the right flank all is quiet, but the movements of the Japanese indicate an intention of attacking the Russian center at least in the way of a demonstration. Heavy firing continued today to the eastward. The soldiers of the Tsinkhetchen division are in good spirits, in spite of the heavy losses they have sustained, and the necessity which compelled them to retreat. They are encouraged by the execution they wrought upon the Japanese, whose bodies were piled in heaps outside the redoubts at Beresneff Hill and the trenches at Tsinkhetchen. Yesterday there was a violent snow storm of heavy and wet snow. The temperature during the night moderated. The present operations commenced Feb. 19, when the Japanese made a ize the minds of the revolutionary leadnight attack on Haba Pass, seven miles south Tsinketchen. On Feb. 30 they attacked Vanzi Pass, seven miles southeast of the Tsinhmatcher positions, which are far in advance of the general front of the army. The Russians made a counter-attack Feb. 21, and temporarily gained ground, but in the evening of Feb. 22, in the face of superior numbers, they were flanked and retired on the fortified line at Tsinketchen positions with artillery and outflanking the Russian infantry. The Russians evacuated Tsinketchen Feb. 24, and retired, fighting a stubborn, rear-guard action, and halting at Da and Che Passes. Fled in Confusion.

Ottawa, Feb. 27. - In the House today, Mr. W. F. Maclean, the member for South York, started a somewhat warm debate by quoting from Le Soleil, Quebec, a passage in which he said it was intimated that Manitoba was to be punished for her school policy. The passage, which appeared

on Feb. 17, is as follows: "The school legislation of the little province (Manitoba) is not of a nature districts. The Northwest has its separate schools. Manitoba has abolished them. Every god act has its reward; every bad act its chastisement. Manitoba will remain lowest with her pretentious law."

Mr. Maclean then cited the clause of the Dominion lands act, which gives to the Western Provinces and Territories absolute control of the school lands. If, argued Mr. Maclean, we were governed by the Prime Minister's statement the other day, the Dominion lands acts, which devoted school lands to public schools, and not separate schools, was to be changed as regards Manitoba. He said the Government seemed now to be bound, in virtue of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's course on the Northwest autonomy bill, to introduce legislation for Manitoba. Neither Mr. Sifton nor Mr. Greenway were present. Possibly they were by their absence protesting against the educational clause of the autonomy act.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier replied: "So this motion to adjourn was only made to bring up such a ramshackle question as this, it I may so term it." He compared Mr. Maclean to a Don Quixote, "running after windmills." It was absurd to say, on the basis of Le Soleil's observations, that the Government intended a remedial bill for the Province of Manitoba. There wasn't a scintilla in the article, anyhow, to jus-

tify such a deduction. The thing, continued the Prime Minister, was absurd. To be quite categorical, he would state that as the Liberal party in 1896 had not intended to bring in a remedial bill, neither was It the intention to do so now.
"But what about the Dominion

lands act?" Mr. Maclean asked. The reply was that the Government did not contemplate an amendment to the Dominion lands act either. Mr. Maclean, Sir Wilfrid Laurier showed, was trying to create a false impression and arouse unfair impressions somewhere. 

Fate of Those Immured in Russian Prisons.

CONFINEMENT IN DARK CELLS

Many Prisoners Driven to Insanity or Sulcide-Slow Hangings-The Eyehole Torture.

Paris, Feb. 28.-Well may the in habitants of St. Petersburg shudder as they glance beyond the Neva, at the dark fortress whence, each hour. the north wind brings across the river the discordant sound of its melancholy bells. Melancholy indeed, for nothing sion sit upon its granite walls, says the St. James Gazette. Here Peter I. tortured and mutilated his enemies. Here he slew his own son Alexis, and to this dungeon, during the licentious reign of the empresses, omnipotent favorites consigned aspiring rivals. And since then whole generations of men and women, for no other crime than love of their oppressed country, have entered these gates, often to

leave them no more. The horrors perpetrated within the fortress of St. Peter and St. Paul and the Schlusselburg are typical of the prison system all over the Russian Empire, and in spite of official efforts to suppress the facts it has been possible to obtain the truth, both from former officials and from those who

have suffered. A special refinement of the Russian prison system in the case of political prisoners and suspects, who are not given a short shrift on the glacis or the gallows, is continued solitary confinement until, as in the case of that splendid intellectual reformer, Dmitri Pissareff, they can be reported as "harmless." Some prisoners here were relieved of their senses quite gently and almost politely. They were shut up in comfortable cells, well lit by electric light, and for mental pabulum they were supplied with only religious and technical works. When insanity or suicide supervened, the appointed

end had been secured But the doom of others presents even greater features of horror. Imagine a dark, damp cell, measuring about ten by six, beneath the level of the surrounding waters, in which the chained man or woman is condemned to lie in absolute idleness, studiously isolated from any intercourse with human beings. There is no bed, no sort of pillow, nothing whatever to cover the body but the prisoner's gray cloak. The amount allowed for food is five farthings a day, which provides

Is it possible that Dr. Osler as physiologist is under a professional bias when he deals with psychology? Making due allowance for the subtle relationship of body and mind--for the physiological basis of psychology-is it true that the brain is so absolutely the siave of the other organs, taking its tone from the physical system? It cannot be an inexorable law of nature, seeing that some of the greatest intellects have dwelt in feeble bodies. Alexander Pope was a dwarf, sickly and deformed from birth: Keats and Tom Hood wrote imperishable verse while dying of consumption; Cowper's poetical faculties were not impaired by the ind at intervals. Sir Walter Scott was not only a cripple from infancy, but he had the head of an idiot, so that his growing brain could only make room for itself by forcing up the vault of the skull bodily. He wrote some of his greatest novels after his health had been undermined. John Ruskin complained that the quality of Scoti's work began to fall off from the time of his first serious illness, adding that "every pang of the stomach paralyzes the brain." But he had mistaken the date of Scott's first illness, for after it were produced "Rob Roy," and "The Heart of Midlothian." both composed through recurrent fits of intense bodily pain. Ready to Begin.

Mr. Charles M. Hays, president of the Grand Trunk Pacific, spoke in optimistic language of that great enterprise before the Canada Club, Montreal, the other evening. Four thousand miles of track are to be laid before 1911, the estimated expenditure on roadbed and stock being \$148,000,000. Of this about eighty-eight million dollars will be spent by the Grand Trunk Pacific and the remainder by the Government, for the eastern division, Winnipeg to Moncton, Twenty thousand men will be employed in the operation of this great system when it is completed, and nearly as many will be employed in its construction, Mr. Hays says the prairie country traversed by the road will yield 30 bushels of wheat to the acre. He estimates that Canada has eight times the wheat-producing capacity of the United States, and says that because of this, and the fact that the production of wheat is decreasing and the consumption increasing in the United States, the wheatexporting business of this continent is being rapidly forced into Canada's hands. He sees a great future for the new road as a highway between the Occident and Orient, as it saves 1,500 miles between Yokohama and Liverpool, compared with United States

There is now an absolute assurance that no difficulty will be encountered in financing the new railway. In a few months these millions of British capital will begin to pour into Canada, and will find their way into every channel of trade, with benefit to the whole country. Canada should enjoy a healthy boom during the next ten years.
