

FREDERICTON, Wednesday 20th January, 1836.

HE House having, by several Proclamations, been prorogued until this day, then to meet for the despatch of Business, and being met—

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, requiring the attendance of the House in the Council Chamber.

The House attended, and being returned—

Mr. Partelow moved for leave to bring in a Bill, for the establishment of a Public Penitentiary for the City and County of Saint John.

Leave granted.

Mr. Speaker then reported, that His Excellency had been pleased to make a Speech to both Houses, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, to prevent mistakes, obtained a copy; which he read to the House, and is as followeth :---

"Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, "Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

66 IN again meeting you in General Assembly, I have to congratulate you on the happy and prosperous condition of the Province, which leaves me little to submit to your deliberation beyond the renewal of the Revenue Law, and the provisions for the ordinary services, and also to recommend to your liberal consideration such measures as the public spirit and enterprize now so fully manifesting itself amongst us may require, divested, as I feel confident they will be, of every other feeling than a due regard to the general interests of the Province.

"There are, however, two other subjects to which I have before adverted, but which appear to me to be of such great importance, that I feel it my duty, again to call your attention to them. The mode in which the Statute Labour on the Public Roads Roads has been hitherto applied has been found to be altogether inefficient for the purpose intended, and the necessity of an improved system in this important particular is very apparent.

"The Bounty so liberally granted by the Legislature for the endowment of Parish Schools, is frequently rendered ineffectual from the want of proper qualification and ability in the Teachers, and, I regret to say, has in too many instances been abused by their immoral conduct. These evils arise from the want of some proper established mode of examination of Applicants for Licenses, both as to their moral character, and to their fitness, in other respects, for the office of Instructors ; and I therefore recommend these subjects to your deliberate consideration.

"Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

" I have directed the Treasurer's Accounts to be laid before you, which will shew a most gratifying increase of Revenue as compared with the preceding year, and will enable you to continue the accustomed aid and support to all those institutions and objects of public utility, which have hitherto been fostered and maintained by the liberality of the Legislature.

" Mr. President, and Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, "Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

"His Majesty having been pleased to confirm the Act to provide for the Custom House Establishment, and graciously to accede to the terms proposed for relinquishing the Quit Rents, I have only to express my satisfaction at the final settlement of these two important questions, the latter of which is acknowledged to have been one of great interest to all His Majesty's Subjects in this Province, who, I confidently trust, will duly appreciate this additional mark of His Majesty's liberality and paternal regard for their welfare.

"I am instructed to lay before you some important communications from His Majesty's Government, which I shall take an early opportunity of doing by Message."

On motion of Mr. Crane,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed, to whom may be referred all matters which may hereafter arise that may in any way be supposed to affect the privileges of this House.

Ordered, That Mr. Crane, Mr. Johnston, Mr. L. A. Wilmot, Mr. Weldon and Mr. Street, be a Committee therefor.

Mr. Speaker informed the House, that the Clerk had communicated to bim that the office of Clerk Assistant to the Assembly had become vacant by the removal of Thomas S. Wetmore, Esquire, from the Province, and that he now nominated George Lee, Junior, Esquire, to that office; which nomination was approved of by the House.

Mr. Lee, after the requisite oaths, took the seat assigned him at the Clerk's Table. On motion of Mr. End,

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in answer to His Excellency's Speech at the opening of the Session.

Ordered, That Mr. End, Mr. Partelow and Mr. Brown, be a Committee to prepare the Address.

On motion of Mr. Johnston,

Resolved, That a Select Committee be appointed to take into consideration the state ot all the Roads of Communication in the Province, and to report the same to the House; and also to report what sums it may be necessary to grant for repairing and improving as well the Great Roads as Bye Roads.

Ordered, That Mr. Johnston, Mr. Taylor, Mr. Crane, Mr. Stewart, Mr. Connell, Mr. Brown, Mr. Ford, Mr. Hayward, Mr. Freeze, Mr. Street and Mr. Partelow, be a Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Street,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to examine what Laws have lately expired or are near expiring, and report thereon to the House. Ordered, Ordered, That Mr. Street, Mr. Robinson and Mr. Hill, be a Committee therefor. On motion of Mr. J. M. Wilmot,

Resolved, That a Committee of Trade be appointed, to whom shall be referred all matters which may in any way affect the Trade of this Province.

Ordered, That Mr. J. M. Wilmot, Mr. Rankin, Mr. Wyer, Mr. Slason and Mr. Burns, be a Committee therefor.

On motion of Mr. Brown,

Resolved, That no Petition be received or Bill brought in after the 16th day of February next, except by special leave of the House.

On motion of Mr. Hayward,

Ordered, That the Journals of this House be daily printed, or as soon as a copy thereof can be prepared by the Clerk, and that the Printer do furnish *Two Hundred Copies* thereof for the use of the Legislature.

On motion of Mr. Connell,

Resolved, That a Select Committee be appointed to take into consideration the expediency of improving the Navigation of the Rivers, Bays, Harbours and Creeks, in this Province.

Ordered, That Mr. Connell, Mr. Hanington, Mr. Johnston, Mr. Clinch, Mr. Taylor, Mr. J. M. Wilmot and Mr. Street, be a Committee therefor.

On motion of Mr. Wyer,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed, whose duty it shall be to take into consideration all matters relating to Light Houses within the Province, and to report thereon from time to time to the House.

Ordered, That Mr. Wyer, Mr. Rankin, Mr. Robinson and Mr. M'Leod, be a Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Robinson,

Resolved, That a Standing Committee be appointed to examine and report on Public and Private Accounts.

Ordered, That Mr. Partelow, Mr. Robinson, Mr. Woodward, Mr. Rankin and Mr. Stewart, be a Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Brown,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to take into consideration all matters connected with the state of the Finances of the Province, and report thereon to the House.

Ordered, That Mr. Brown, Mr. End, Mr. Partelow, Mr. Gilbert and Mr. M'Leod, be a Committee therefor.

On motion of Mr. End,

Resolved, That Two Hundred Copies of His Excellency's Speech be forthwith printed for the use of the Legislature.

On motion of Mr. Robinson,

Ordered, That the House do to-morrow go into Committee of the whole in consideration of His E. ellency's Speech.

Mr. Speaker laid before the House,

"Abstract from the Weekly Balance Sheet, shewing the average amount of the Liabilities and Assets of the *Commercial Bank of New Brunswick*, for the half year ending the 10th day of October, 1835."

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Whereas serious apprehensions are entertained by this House, from the report made by a Select Committee of the House of Commons, to whom was referred the question of the expediency of making some change in the existing Duties on Foreign and Colonial Wood, that an attempt will be made, during the next Session of the Imperial Parliament, to effect such alterations therein as will have a tendency, if carried into operation, to affect deeply the immense interests connected with the Wood Trade, as well as to involve in ruin a large class of His Majesty's faithful subjects in this Province, who have embarked their capital with a view to the present protection being continued; therefore Resolved, *Resolved*, unanimously, That an Address be prepared to be presented to His Majesty and the Imperial Parliament on this all important subject, and that His Majesty's Legislative Council be requested to join in said Address; and further

Resolved, That a Committee of this House be appointed to join such Committee as the Legislative Council may appoint to prepare the same; and that a Committee be also appointed to acquaint the Legislative Council with this Resolution.

Ordered, That Mr. Partelow, Mr. Rankin and Mr. End, be a Committee of this House, to prepare the Address; and further

Ordered, That Mr. Partelow and Mr. Johnston be a Committee to acquaint the Legislative Council with the aforegoing Resolutions.

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from I. W. M. Irish, of Saint John, Merchant, praying a return of Duties, paid at the Province Treasury, on sundry articles imported into Saint John from Nassau, New Providence, in March last, for the reasons therein stated; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee of Supply.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

THURSDAY, 21st January, 1836.

Prayers.

Mr. Partelow from the Select Committee, appointed in the year 1834, to examine and report on the Accounts of the late Attorney General, reported, that since making a Report at the last Session, they had under their further consideration during the recess various other matters connected with those Accounts, and now submitted another Report relative thereto; which he read.

The Report being handed in at the Clerk's Table-

Ordered, That it be accepted; and

On motion of Mr. Johnston; further

Ordered, That one hundred and fifty copies thereof be furnished for the use of the Legislature.

Mr. Hill, by leave, presented a Petition from William Porter and 53 others, Inhabitants of the County of Charlotte, praying that an Act may pass for the incorporation of a Bank at Saint Stephens; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Mr. Hill moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to incorporate sundry persons by the name of *The President*, *Directors and Company of the Saint Stephens Bank*, in the County of Charlotte.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from the Board of Health for the City and County of Saint John, praying that a grant may pass to enable them to erect a suitable Building on Partridge Island, for the accommodation of sick and distressed Emigrants; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Mr Hill, by leave, presented a Petition from Abner Hill and 48 others, Inhabitants of the County of Charlotte, praying an Act may pass to incorporate *The Saint Stephens Rail Road Company*; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Mr. Hill moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to incorporate the Saint Stephen Rail Road Company. Leave

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. Connell, by leave, presented a Petition from A. K. Smedes Wetmore, Esquire, and others, Inhabitants of the County of Carleton, praying a further grant towards the encouragement of a Steam Boat to ply between Fredericton and Woodstock; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee of Supply.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Whereas some applications for Acts of Incorporation have already been presented to this House, and there is reason to believe many more will appear during the Session; and whereas the Bills to be founded upon such applications require mature deliberation, and to be carefully examined and considered, in order that proper protection should be afforded to the Public; therefore

Resolved, That all such Bills be referred to a Special Committee to report thereon. Upon the question for adopting the Resolution, the Committee divided :---

Yeas, 12.

And it passed in the affirmative.

Ordered thereupon, That Mr. Partelow, Mr. Connell, Mr. Brown, Mr. Street and Mr. Chandler, be a Committee therefor.

Mr. J. M. Wilmot moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to regulate the election of Church Wardens and Vestry in the Parish of Portland.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. Hill, by leave, presented a Petition from John M'Allister and others, Inhabitants of the County of Charlotte, praying an Act may pass to incorporate *The Palfrey* and Bolton Brook Company; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Mr. Hill moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to incorporate The Saint Stephens Whale Fishing Company.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. M⁴Leod, by leave, presented a Petition from Edward B. Smith, Esquire, Clerk of the Peace for King's County, praying that the Bouuty on certain Grain raised in 1852, may be granted, to enable him to pay Hugh Smith the person who raised the same, the claim having been omitted to be included in the General Certificate ; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Street, by leave, presented a Petition from Willard Broad of Newcastle. in the County of Northumberland, praying a return of duty paid on 95 Barrels of Flour, that were destroyed by the great Fire in 1825; which he read.

And on the question that the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee of Supply, the House divided :--

Yeas, 10.

Nays, 7.

Nays, 9.

And it was carried in the affirmative.

Mr. Wyer moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to authorize the Magistrates of the County of Charlotte, to levy an assessment to pay off the County debt.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. Brown, by leave, presented a Petition from Timothy F. Harley, of Saint Andrews, in the County of Charlotte, praying remuneration for teaching a School in that Parish, for six months in the year 1884; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee of Supply. B On On motion of Mr. Partelow,

That the House proceed to the Order of the Day, to go into Committee of the whole, on His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor's Speech at the opening of the Session.

The Order of the Day being read, the House accordingly resolved itself into said Committee.

Mr. Hayward in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that having gone into consideration of the matters referred to them, the Committee passed two Resolutions, which he read, and they being handed in at the Clerk's Table, were then again read, and are as follow :—

1st. Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that such part of His Excellency's Speech as relates to the consideration of the adoption of an improved system in the mode of application of Statute Labour on Public Roads, be referred to a Select Committee to report thereon.

2d. *Resolved*, As the opinion of this Committee, that the Paragraph in His Excellency's Speech which relates to Parish Schools, he referred to a Select Committee to report thereon by Bill or otherwise.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Resolved, That a Select Committee be appointed to take into consideration the Laws now in force, relative to the performance of Statute Labour throughout the Province, and to report thereon by Bill or otherwise.

Ordered, That Mr. Brown, Mr. Palmer and Mr. Street, be a Committee therefor.

On like motion of Mr. Partelow,

Resolved, That a Select Committee be appointed to take into consideration the Law relating to Parish Schools, and to report thereon by Bill or otherwise.

Ordered, That Mr. Crane, Mr. Johnston, Mr. M'Leod, Mr. Stewart, Mr. Hill, Mr. Rankin, Mr. Chandler and Mr. Miles, be a Committee therefor.

Mr. Wyer moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to incorporate a Company under the the title of The Chamcook Mill and Factory Company.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. Hill, by leave, presented a Petition from Elijah Ames and Ruth his wife, praying that an Act may pass to dissolve the Marriage contract between them; which he read.

And upon the question that the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table, the House divided :---

Nays, 19.

Whereupon it was decided in the negative.

Mr. Rankin, by leave, presented a Petition from William Abrams, Esquire, Conmissioner for Buoys and Beacons, James Gilmour, Leonard Hawbolt, Alexander Fraser, Junior, and George Henderson, Esquires, Port Wardens for Miramichi, praying a grant may pass, to be expended in replacing the Buoys and Moorings of that Harbour, carried away by the Ice last Fall; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Brown, by leave, presented a Petition from Jeremiah Scott, of Saint David in the County of Charlotte, praying remuneration for teaching a School in the Parish of Saint Stephen for six months, during the past year; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee of Supply.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

FRIDAY, 22d January, 1836.

Mr. Johnston, by leave, presented a Petition from Nehemiah Merritt, Esquire, and others, Merchants and residents in the City of Saint John, praying an Act may pass to incorporate sundry persons under the name of the President, Directors and Company of the City Bank; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Mr. Johnston moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to incorporate sundry persons by the name of *The President*, *Directors and Company of the City Bank*.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Read a second time the following Bills :----

A Bill to incorporate sundry persons by the name of *The President*, *Directors and* Company of the Saint Stephens Bank, in the County of Charlotte:

A Bill to incorporate The Saint Stephens Rail Road Company :

A Bill to incorporate The Saint Stephens Whale Fishing Company :

A Bill to incorporate a Company under the title of *The Chamcook Mill and Factory* Company.

And on motion of Mr. Crane,

Ordered, That the said several Bills be referred to the Select Committee upon Bills of Incorporation, appointed yesterday, to examine and report thereon.

Read a second time,

A Bill to authorize the Magistrates of the County of Charlotte, to levy an assessment to pay off the County Debt : and

A Bill to regulate the election of Church Wardens and Vestry in the Parish of Portland.

Mr. Johnston, by leave, presented a Petition from Josiah Freeze, a licenced Teacher, praying compensation for teaching a School in Queen's County, in the year 1828; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee of Supply.

On motion of Mr. Crane,

Ordered, That Mr. L. A. Wilmot be added to the Committee, appointed to take into consideration and report on the Law relating to Parish Schools.

Mr. Woodward, by leave, presented a Petition from James Foster Kelly, a licenced Teacher, praying the Provincial allowance may be granted him for teaching a School one year, ending in September, 1835; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from The President, Directors and Company of the Bank of New Brunswick, praying further increase of the Capital Stock of the said Bank and a renewal of its Charter; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Mr. Partelow moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to provide for the further increase of the Capital Stock of the Bank of New Brunswick, and to amend and continue the Act for incorporating the said Bank.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. Connell, by leave, presented a Petition from Richard Ketchum, Esquire, and others, of the County of Carleton, praying an Act may pass establishing a Road leading from Woodstock to Houlton, as one of the Great Roads of Communication in the Province; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

Mr. Robinson, by leave, presented a Petition from Robert Keltie and George Younger, of the City of Saint John, Brewers, praying a repeal of the duty on Hops, imported into the Province; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and referred to the Committee of Trade.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Ordered, That Mr. Woodward and Mr. Robinson, be added to the Committee of Trade.

Mr. Woodward moved for leave to bring in a Bill, for the incorporation of The Portland Mills and Tunnel Company.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. End from the Committee appointed to prepare an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in answer to his Speech at the opening of the Session, reported a draft thereof; which he read, and submitted the same.

It being handed in at the Clerk's Table, was there again read, and thereupon Ordered, To be accepted.

On motion of Mr. Johnston,

The House went into Committee of the whole, on the said draft Address.

Mr. Miles in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that they had gone into consideration of the Address referred to them, and agreed to the same.

Ordered, That the report be accepted.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Resolved, unanimously, That the Address be engrossed, signed by the Speaker, and presented to His Excellency by the whole House; and further

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to wait upon His Excellency to know when he will be pleased to receive the House with their Address.

Ordered, That Mr. Slason, Mr. J. M. Wilmot and Mr. M'Leod, be a Committee for that purpose.

Mr. Clinch, by leave, presented a Petition from Hugh M'Callum and Robert V. Hanson, Overseers of the Poor for the Parish of Saint George, in the County of Charlotte, praying to be remunerated certain sums advanced to transient Emigrants, during the years 1881, 1882, 1883 and 1834; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Taylor moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to alter the division line between the Parishes of Prince William and Dumfries in the County of York.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. J. M. Wilmot, by leave, presented a Petition from Charles Seymour, of Saint Martins, in the County of Saint John, praying aid to establish a Post line of communication, and for the conveyance of Passengers, between that place and the City of Saint John; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee of Supply.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

SATURDAY, 23d January, 1836.

Prayers.

Read a second time the following Bills :----

A Bill to incorporate sundry persons by the name of The President, Directors and Company of the City Bank :

A Bill to provide for the further increase of the Capital Stock of the Bank of New Brunswick, and to amend and continue the Act for incorporating the said Bank : and A Bill for the Incorporation of *The Portland Mills and Tunnel Company*.

Ordered, That the said several Bills be referred to the Select Committee on Bills of Incorporation, to examine and report thereon.

Read a second time,

A Bill to alter the division line between the Parishes of Prince William and Dumfries in the County of York.

On motion of Mr. Crane,

Resolved, That the Committee appointed to examine Bills of Incorporation, be instructed to prepare and report to this House, a Bill to regulate Banks and Banking; also, a Bill for the regulation of Incorporation Companies in this Province.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Ordered, That Mr. Hill and Mr. Woodward be added to the Committee appointed to examine and report upon the several Bills of Incorporation brought before the House.

Mr. Woodward moved for leave to bring in a Bill, for the facilitating the recovery of the Wages of Seamen in the Merchant Service and Coasting Trade of this Province.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

On motion of Mr. J. M. Wilmot,

The House went into Committee of the whole, on a Bill to regulate the election of Church Wardens and Vestry in the Parish of Portland.

Mr. Gilbert in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that they had gone into consideration of the Bill referred to them, and agreed to the same with an amendment, under the title of a Bill relating to Grace Church in the Parish of Portland.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted, and the Bill as amended engrossed, under the amended title,

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

The Honorable Mr. Secretary Odell, by command of His Excellency, delivered the following Messages :---

"Message to the House of Assembly, 25th January, 1836.

" ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL.

THE Lieutenant Governor lays before the House of Assembly a Copy of a Dispatch from the Right Honorable the Colonial Secretary of State, with a Copy of a Treasury Minute therein inclosed, relating to the erection of Light Houses at the entrance of the Gulph of Saint Lawrence, and on the Islands of Scatterie and Saint Paul's, and recommends the same to the consideration of the House, in full confidence that the views of His Majesty's Government will be cordially met upon a subject involving so many considerations of humanity as well as of Commercial advantage.

"Str., G HI IS Majesty's Government have recently had under their consideration the representations which have been at different times addressed to them by parties interested in the trade of the North American Provinces, upon the subject of the dangerous navigation of the Gull of Saint Lawrence. The numerous Shipwrecks which annually occur there, attended in some instances with considerable loss of life and property, are too notorious to require mention; and you will therefore understand the anxiety of His Majesty's Government to adopt any precautions by

nually occur there, attended in some instances with considerable loss of the and property, are not noterload to require mention; and you will therefore understand the anxiety of His Majesty's Government to adopt any precautions by which such melancholy occurrences may be prevented for the future. "With a view therefore of ascertaining the most effectual means for this purpose, the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have endeavoured to obtain the opinions of scientific persons experienced in the navigation of those Seas, and acquainted with the circumstances of the neighbouring Provinces. The result of their enquiries, as communicated in the Letter and Minute of which copies are enclosed, appears to be, that if Light Houses were erected upon the Islands of Scatterie and Saint Paul, off the coast of Cape Breton, many of the Shipwrecks which now occur might be prevented. Anxious therefore to contribute as much as possible to an object, which their Lordships consider as of national rather than of local interest, they have announced their readiness to apply to Parliament for the funds necessary to the erection of Light Houses, provided that the Colonies, whose trade is to be benefitted by the measure, will engage to defray the expenses of their future maintenance. It is the object of my present Dispatch to direct you to take an early opportunity of bringing the subject under the consideration of the House of Assembly of New Brunswick, and I cannot allow myself to doubt that that Body will be anxious to co-operate with the Home Government and with the neighbouring Colonies in promoting a measure so important to the Commercial interests of the whole of British North America.

"Adverting to the details of the arrangement by which the effectiveness of their Light Houses is to be secured, the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury have recommended that they should be placed under the management of the Board for the direction of such matters which already exists in Nova Scotia; and they also suggest, that as a preliminary to any further proceedings, that Board should be requested to report upon the measures to be adopted. To the tormer part of their Lordships suggestion, I do not apprehend any objection; from the latter I have been induced to deviate in so far as to bring the subject at once under the consideration of the respective Legislatures, because, were I to await a Report from Nova Scotia, it would be impossible to submit it to those Bodies during their approaching Sessions. No advantage sufficient to compensate for this delay could. I think, be expected from the Report in question. The expense to which each of the Provinces will become liable by their acceptance of the offer of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury cannot, under any circumstances, be otherwise than inconsiderable; and they will at the same time have at hand greater facilities for estimating its amount than I can hope to obtain. Under these circumstances, I am induced to present the matter for the consideration of the House of Assembly of New Brunswick in its present incomplete form.

"The other Colonies to which it is intended to apply for a contribution towards the erection of those Light Houses are Lower Canada, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward's Island; and I have suggested to the Earl of Gosfordithe expediency of his Lordship's communicating directly with yourself and the Lieutenant Governors of the other Colonies interested in the measure, for the purpose of maturing any arrangements which may be common to all. Among these the principal will be the apportionment of the annual expense; and it has occurred to me that this object might perhaps be conveniently effected by means of a Commission of Arbitration, of which the Members should be appointed by the respective Legislatures, with power of adopting a final award. This, however, is a point upon which I desire only to offer a suggestion. If any other arrangement should appear to the Legislatures interested in the measure to be better adapted to the circumstances of the case, I need hardly state that I shall be ready to co-operate with them for giving effect to it.

•• The EAD a Letter from Sir George Grey, referring to the Communications from the Secretary of State's Departtrance of the Gulph of Saint Lawrence, and on the Island of Scatterie on the north east Coast of Cape Breton, stating that Lord Gieneigh has received information by a Despatch from the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, that three more Vessels have recently been lost on that part of the Coast of North America, and requesting this Board will have under early consideration the suggestions that have been submitted to His Majesty's Government respecting the establishment of Lights on the most dangerous points of that Coast, and the aid that should be afforded by this Country for that purpose.

"My Lords having now before them the Report called for by their Minutes of 3d and 24th March last, from the Elder Brethren of the Trinity House and from the Commanding Officers of the Royal Engineers in Nova Scotia, respecting the nature of the Lights it would be advisable to exhibit and the means that might be found in the Province for constructing Light Houses, resume the consideration of the circumstances represented in the Address to His Majesty from the House of Assembly of Nova Scotia, and in report of the Hydographer of the Admiralty forwarded to them by direction of the Secretary of State in the Communication of 11th September, 1834, already adverted to.

"My Lords observe that the report of the Hydrographer of the Admiralty drawn up with reference to the information relating to the Light Houses on the Coasts of the British North American Colonies, which had been procured in consequence of representations from British Merchants and Ship Owners engaged in the Frade with those Colonies, represented the great importance, in addition to the Lights already established by the local Government for objects more immediately connected with the Trade and Navigation of the separate Provinces, of placing Lights on the Islands of Saint Paul and Scatterie at the northern and north eastern extremity of Cape Breton, for the guidance of all Shipping bound for the Gulph of Saint Lawrence or for other parts of British North America, and that the Board of Admiralty have expressed their concurrence in the suggestions submitted in this Report.

that the Board of Admiralty have expressed their concurrence in the suggestions submitted in this Report. "The address of the House of Assembly of Nova Scotia, dated in April 1834, likewise urges the great importance of establishing Lights at these points : it enumerates ten Vessels, comprising a tonnage 2766 Tons, and having on board 603 persons, and being with the exception of two small Cclonial Schooners, the property of British Owners, which had been wrecked in the course of the previous year, represents, that although few if any of these Vessels were bound for the Port of Nova Scotia, the heavy charge attending the relief and providing for the numerous individuals thus thrown on shore in a state of destitution, had been defrayed from the funds of the Province; and states that the local Legislature would be anxious and willing to contribute towards the expense of the proposed Lights, although their establishment much more nearly concerned the trade to and from the other British North American Provinces. My Lords further observe, that all succeeding Communications from the Secretary of State notice the receipt of intelligence of further wrecks and losses of life and property, and unequivocally evince the urgent necessity, on the score of humanity and of every consideration connected with the safety of the maritime trade with the North American American Colonies, or of His Majesty's Ships employed in those Seas, for the adoption of every practicable means of protecting Shipping from the dangers which attend their navigation between Cape Breton and Newfoundland. "That the proposed Lights on Saint Paul's and Scatterie Islands would most materially tend to effect this

"That the proposed Lights on Saint Paul's and Scatterie Islands would most materially tend to effect this desirable object, appears to be the concurrent opinion of all the parties conversant with the navigation of that part of North America, who have been consulted upon the subject. But although those Islands are within the Juris-diction of the Government of Nova Scotia, my Lords cannot but admit that the allegation on the part of the House of Assembly at Nova Scotia, that the adoption of precautions with respect to the dangers in question con-cerns the trade of the other British Provinces in North America fully as much as the trade to Nova Scotia, is well founded. My Lords are however, not prepared to approve of the suggestion of the House of Assembly in regard to the imposition by the Parliament of the United Kingdom of dues for defraying any expenditure for this purpose, to be levied either in the Ports of the Colonies concerned or on shipping clearing from British Ports for those Colonies. But it appears to my Lords that provided the Legislatures of those Colonies can be brought to concur in making provision for the future current expenses of maintaining the proposed Lights on the Islands of Saint Paul's and Scattarie, the important consideration to which they have adverted, would justify an application to Parliament for the grant of such sum as would dafray the charge of erecting Light Houses, and of fitting them in the first instauce with the requisite apparatus and machinery.

"THE Lieutenant Governor submits to the House of Assembly, a Communication which he received in the month of October last, from the Chief Justice of the Province, on the subject of the Circuit Courts. He has deferred taking the advice of the Executive Council on the new arrangement of such Courts, recommended by the Judges, until he could have an opportunity of laying the matter before the Legislature; and he earnestly recommends to the House the making of permanent provision for defraying the expences of the Judges performing these duties, which are of such acknowledged importance to every part of the Province.

"Fredericion, 21th October, 1835. "Sir," HAVE the honor to represent to Your Excellency in behalf of the Judges of the Supreme Court, that in January, 1825, an Ordinance was passed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council, establishing Circuit Sourts to be held at stated times in each year, in every County of the Province, twice in the City and County of Saint John, and once in every other County; and that Circuit Courts have accordingly been regularly held by the Judges in every County of the Province at the times specified in that and other subsequent Ordinances, from the date of the first mentioned Ordinance until the present time. "In the Session of 1826, the Lieutenant Governor recommended by Message, to the General Assembly, to make permanent provision for defraying the travelling charges of the Judges performing these duties, by enabling the Lieu-tenant Governor to make payment for the same from time to time, by Warrant on the Province Treasury. In that Session, an Act was passed, (7 G. 4, C. 18,) making such provision, by granting the Lieutenant Governor a sum not exceeding 'Two hundred and filty pounds annually, for this purpose, payable out of any monies in the Treasury, not otherwise specifically appropriated. This Act was limited to the period of five years, and was continued in 1831, 1851.

1831, for two years, by 1st W. 4, C. 27, and again in 1833, for two years, by the 3d W. 4, C. 22, and not having been further continued, expired in the month of March last. The Judges have therefore performed their Circuit

ocen further continued, expired in the month of platch fast. In a Judges have therefore performed their Circuit Duties the present year, without any provision for their expenses for so doing. "The increased business of the Country renders it even more necessary than when stated Circuits were first established in 1825, that they should be continued in every County of the Province. Three new Counties have been erected since that time, and the Circuit Courts extended to each of them, and the business of the County of Charlotte now requires, in the opinion of the Judges, that there should be two Circuit Courts in the year in that County.

"Under these circumstances, the Judges cannot but consider the stoppage of the allowance for their expenses on the Circuits to be a peculiar hardship; and they have full confidence that Your Excellency will be pleased to adopt measures to provide for them. I am sure Your Excellency will pardon me for adding that the Judges are deeply impressed with the feeling that the dignity and independence of the Judgical Office 'require, that the pecuniary provisions for all their services should be permanent. "I beg leave to suggest, that instead of an allowance of a sum in gross, it would better provide for the ser-

vices as they might vary from year to year, and would be equally satisfactory to the Judges, to allow them one Guinea per diem for their expenses in travelling and attendance on the Circuitz, allowing twenty miles for each day's travel, as is usual in similar cases. "I have further to represent to Your Excellency, that in consequence of the appointment of Nisi Prius sittings

It will be may duty at an early date to transmit to you an order in Council, specially confirming and finally enacting the Act passed by the Legistature for the Commutation of the Quit Rents. In the mean time, I beg to convey to you my approval of your conduct in having suspended their collection until the decision of His Majesty's Government upon the offer of the Legislature could be ascertained.

"Nor must I omit to express to you my satisfaction at the passing of the annual Appropriation Bill. I could not but anticipate such a result from the further deliberations of the Legislature of New Brunswick; and it was in this hope that I have hitherto refrained from answering your Despatches of the 16th and 17th March. It is very gratifying to me to be thus relieved from the necessity of adverting in terms of regret to the proceedings of the Colonial Legislature, and at the same time, to feel that the Inhabitants of the Province have been thereby saved from the inconveniences which must inevitably have attended the omission to vote the usual supplies.

Extracts of a Dispatch from the Right Honorable the Colonial Secretary of State, Lord Glenelg, dated 7th May, 1835.

66 HAVE had the honor to receive a Memorial from Lieutenant Colonel Turner, Inspecting Field Officer of Militia in the Province, under your Government, stating that the Provincial Legislature have again omitted to make any provision for his Salary. "The refusal of the Assembly of New Brunswick to provide a Salary for the Inspecting Officer of Militia is not, I regret to observe, without precedent. On two former occasions, viz: in the years 1881 and 1883, the Co-lonial Salary of this Officer was refused. In those instances you were directed by my Predecessor in Office to make a representation on the subject to the Legislature, pointing out to them the inexpediency of abolishing an Office so indispensable to the proper organization of the Provincial Militia; and your remonstrances appear to have been effectual in so far at least as to procure from them the payment of Lieutenant Colonel Turner's allowances for the current years. I am sorry that I have no power to do more than to direct you to pursue a similar course in the precurrent years. I am sorry that I have no power to do more than to direct you to pursue a similar course in the pre-sent instance. Alive as His Majesty's Government are to the importance of placing the Provincial Militia upon an efficient footing, and with every confidence, that to such an end Lieutenant Colonel Turner's services would be eminently conducive, they cannot help feeling that it would be hopeless to continue his appointment, should the dis-position which the Legislature has latterly evinced in regard to the organization of the Militia Force continue unchanged.

Extract of a Dispatch from the Right Honorable the Colonial Secretary of State, Lord Glenely, dated 18th May, 1835.

CONT HAVE the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Dispatch of the 9th March, No. 12, reporting that the House of Assembly of New Brunswick have refused to vote the usual Salary of £200 for the Inspecting Field Officer of Militia. "The Committee to whom was referred that part of His Excellency's Speech relative to Parish Schools, have given this important subject their attentive consideration, and have particularly directed their enquiries to the adoption of such measures as might have a tendency to ensure a description of School Masters superior to those hitherto employed, and beg leave to report, that although they are of opinion that the appointment of a Board of Commissioners in each County, for the purpose of Examination into the qualification of Candidates for teaching Schools, might in some cases produce this result, yet as they conceive a measure of this kind would very much increase the difficulties of persons residing in remote settlements in procuring School Masters, and thereby prevent the benefit of Education being extended to many of the poor Inhabitants of the Province; and as your Committee are also of opinion that the moral qualification of the persons to whom the instruction of the youth of this Province is entrusted, is much better attended to than formerly, they do not think the appointment of any persons other than the Trustees of Schools for the Examination of School Masters would be attended with beneficial results.

"The Act for the encouragement of Parish Schools having been for some time in operation, and the benefit arising from the said Act having been universally felt and acknowledged, and its several provisions being now well understood, your Committee beg leave to recommend that it be continued without any amendment.

"That to this evil no effectual remedy can be applied, except by a general annual assessment on all the inhabitants of the Province, and a judicious application of the money, in such places, and in such manner as the state of the Roads may require; but as the Committee are also of opinion, however beneficial the system of assessmenmight be, it would be impracticable to introduce it in the present state of this Prot vince, and that as a judicious application of grants of money, will in a great degree remedy the evils of the present Road Law, by supplying the deficiency of labour where the population is scattering, they cannot recommend such a total alteration in the present Law, as the assessment system would occasion.

"The Committee however, after a careful examination of the Law now in force, and diligent enquiry into the practical operation of the same, have discovered that several amendments and alterations therein are necessary, in order to make it more efficient; which alterations and amendments are embraced in a Bill, which the Committee have prepared for that purpose, and which is herewith respectfully submitted.

"MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY, G IN pursuance of Your Excellency's commands, which I had the honor to receive through the Honorable the Provincial Secretary, in the month of March last, I immediately commenced and proceeded with a revi-sion of the Province Laws, which I have completed to the end of the year 1880.

"The erection of a Light House in the Island of Saint Paul would more particularly benefit the Trade of Canada and New Brunswick, and the expense of such erection should be borne by them; to provide for the proportion to be contributed by this Province, the Committee recommend that an Act should pass, imposing a small Tonnage Duty on all Vessels entering the Ports of this Province and the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, and that the funds arising therefrom, should be placed under the management of persons appointed by the Government of Lower Canada and the Commissioners of Light Houses for the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, appointed by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to be by them applied towards the support of such Light Houses as may be erected upon Saint Paul's Island, and any surplus to the erection of establishments upon that Island, for the support of shipwrecked Seamen, and to the erection and support of other Light Houses in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence.

"As the erection of a Light House on the Island of Scatterie would be of little advantage to Vessels entering the Ports of this Province, compared with the advantage that would be derived from it, by Vessels entering the Ports of Nova Scotia and Cape Breton ; the Committee are of opinion, that if Canada and New Brunswick support the establishment on Saint Paul's, that the expense of an establishment on Scatterie should be provided for by Nova Scotia, assisted by such sum as may be considered proper for Prince Edward's Island, to contribute to the support of those Lights.

1st. "*Resolved*, That this House gratefully appreciates this additional proof of the paternal solicitude of His Majesty's Government for the interests of the British North American Colonies.

2nd. "*Resolved*, That it is expedient and highly desirable to assist in giving effect to the benevolent intentions of His Majesty's Government by co-operating in the proposed measure, and for that purpose it is advisable to impose a small tonnage Duty upon all Vessels entering the various Ports of this Province in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, from which fund the necessary proportion of such expenses shall be defrayed.

Srd. "Resolved, That from the Geographical position of Scatterie Island, the establishment of a Light House there would be highly beneficial to Vessels resorting to Nova Scotia and Cape Breton, and also, to a certain but very limited extent, useful to Vessels bound to New Brunswick, whereas a Light House on Saint Paul's Island would be of little or no advantage to Nova Scotia, but of great importance to the Trade of Lower Canada and New Brunswick:— Therefore it is advisable that the expense of supporting any Light or Lights that may be erected on Saint Paul's Island, should be wholly borne and defrayed by the two last mentioned Provinces, and that Nova Scotia, assisted by an equitable proportion from Prince Edward's Island, should defray the expense of supporting the Light on Scatterie Island. 4th. 4th. "Resolved, That monies collected in this Province by Act of Assembly, ought not to be placed under the exclusive management of a Body over whose proceedings the Provincial Government and Legislature can exercise no control, and it is therefore advisable that any Light House or Light Houses to be erected on Saint Paul's Island, being wholly supported by Canada and New Brunswick, ought, together with the funds necessary for their support, to be placed under the management of the Trinity Board of Quebec, or any other Body to be appointed by the Government of Lower Canada and the Commissioners of Light Houses in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence appointed by the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief of this Province.

5th. "Resolved, That if any surplus fund shall accrue from the tonnage Duty that may be imposed for the maintenance of Lights on Saint Paul's, it ought to be applied towards the support of the Establishment on that Island for the reception of Shipwrecked persons, and in assisting to erect and support other Light Houses that may be required in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence."

" Whereas, The erection of a Light House on the Island of Saint Paul, in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, has long been felt to be a matter of paramount importance to Vessels bound to and from Canada, the Eastern Coast of New Brunswick, and the Straits of Northumberland, and would in a great degree prevent the loss of lives and property which has ensued by Shipwrecks on said Island; and whereas, it appears by the Journals of this House, that at various times during the last ten years, the Legislature of New Brunswick has endeavoured through the Provincial Government, to obtain the co-operation and assistance of Lower Canada in the erection and support of such Light House, but it is to be deeply regretted that the negociations relative to this measure, which was not more desirable for the protection of the Commerce as well of Canada as of New Brunswick, than for the interests of humanity, have hitherto proved wholly ineffectual, and this grave of countless Seamen still remains without a Beacon to warn the Mariner of his approach to destruction; and whereas, this momentous subject has recently attracted the notice of His Majesty's Government, as appears by the Copies of Dispatches laid before this House by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, but as a considerable period must necessarily elapse before the arrangements to be made with the neighbouring Colonies, relative to this subject can be completed, while the danger to Seamen continues unabated, and as it is evident that the benevolent intentions of His Majesty's Government will be most readily carried into effect by the immediate erection of a Light House on Saint Paul's Island. This

This House is desirous that it should be done as soon as permission for that purpose can be obtained from the Province of Nova Scotia, to which the said Island belongs, and this House will make provision for such erection, confiding in the well known liberality of His Majesty's Government to make such order relative to the expense incurred by such erection as to them may seem just and reasonable; therefore

"The annual charges against the Province amount to upwards of £20,000, independently of the Appropriations for Roads and Bridges.

"The Committee would respectfully recommend, that the debt due to the Fire Insurance Company should be paid off, unless the said Company will consent to reduce the Interest to 5 per cent.; and that in making the Appropriations, the nature and extent of the several services should be fully considered, and provided for with due regard to economy.

"The inconveniences and losses arising from the want of means to enable the Treasurer to make ready payments, which were so long and so severely felt throughout the Province, have been completely removed by the Act for allowing Interest on unpaid Warrants, and very great benefits to individuals as well as advantages to the public service have resulted therefrom.

"As an object of the highest importance, the Committee would respectfully bring under the notice of the House, the internal improvement of the Country, and with all

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due regard to economy, would therefore recommend a liberal appropriation for opening and improving the Roads; and in closing their report, congratulate the Province on the healthy and flourishing state of the finances.

"Whereas Communications from His Majesty's Government have recently been made to the Provinces of Lower Canada, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward's Island and New Brunswick, on the subject of the erection of Light Houses on the Islands of Saint Paul and Scatterie; and whereas this House, being aware of the imperious necessity of such erection, and anxious that the benevolent intentions of the Home Government should be carried into immediate effect, has resolved to erect one or more Light Houses on Saint Paul's Island as soon as permission for that purpose can be obtained from the Government of Nova Scotia; and as this measure is of great importance to the Trade of Lower Canada, this House is desirous that the Government of that Province be requested to co-operate with New Brunswick in the erection of such Light Houses; therefore

Light Houses; therefore "Resolved, That a Communication be made to the Legislature of Lower Canada, expressive of the wishes and intentions of this House in reference to the proposed erection of the Lights on Saint Paul's Island, and requesting from the Government of that Province such information and suggestions connected with the said measure, as may by them be deemed proper and necessary.

"Resolved, As the opinion of this House, that a Tonnage Duty of One Penny per ton, should be imposed upon all Vessels entering the Ports of Lower Canada and the various Ports of this Province situated in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, and that the amount thereof should be set apart as a Fund for the sole purpose of providing for the proportion which Lower Canada and New Brunswick ought to contribute towards the expense of maintaining and supporting the Lights to be erected on the Islands of Saint Paul and Scatterie; and the surplus of such Fund (if any) should be applied towards the erection and support of a Light on Cape Ray, and such other like Establishments in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, as may be considered necessary for the protection of Vessels navigating the said Gulf.

"Resolved, That if the Legislature of Lower Canada assent to the foregoing propositions, this House will pass an Act for imposing the said Tonnage Duty upon Vessels entering the Ports of this Province in the Gult of Saint Lawrence; but in case the Canadian Legislature do not agree in such opinion, then it is the anxious desire of this House that they communicate to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of this Province, Province, upon what terms they will consent to co-operate with this House in the erection and support of Light Houses on Saint Paul's Island.

"Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to communicate to the Government of Lower Canada, for the purpose of being submitted to the Legislature of that Province, the foregoing Resolutions as well as those made and passed by this House on the same subject, on Saturday the 6th and on Monday the 8th instant."

Ordered, That Mr. Rankin, Mr. Crane and Mr. Wyer, be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

Wilmot, from the Committee appointed to enquire into the expediency of improving the Navigation of the Rivers, Harbours and Creeks in this Province. submitted a Report, which he read, and handed the same in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows :-" That the Committee have taken into consideration the Report of the Commissioners appointed to ascertain, during the recess, the practicability and expediency of connecting the Waters of the River Saint John and Gage Town Creek, by means of a Canal at or near Grimross Neck, also the Plan and estimate of the proposed Canal; and are of opinion, that a Canal at that place would be attended with great advantage to all description of Craft plying on the River, as, independently of the distance saved, they will be enabled by means of the Canal to avoid the difficulties and delays they encounter in that part of the River, called No Man's Friend, in the spring and autumn:---They therefore recommend that the sum of one thousand pounds he granted by the Province towards the accomplishment of this object, payable five hundred pounds when the contract is entered into by the Commissioners, and *five hundred pounds* when the Canal is completed:—They also submit a Bill, intituled 'A Bill to provide for making and maintaining a Canal across Grimross Neck in Queen's County.' " The Committee had also under their consideration, a Petition from sundry Inhabitants of York and Sunbury, praying Legislative aid towards improving the navigation of the Oromocto Shoals, and a Petition from sundry Persons resident in Saint John and Queen's County, praying aid for removing a Bar or Shoal at the mouth of

the Jemseg :—These applications the Committee recommend being referred to Commissioners, during the recess, to ascertain the practicability and expediency of effecting the same, and report the result to this House at the next Session. "The

"The Committee had also under consideration, the Petition of Peter Fraser and other Persons, Inhabitants of the Counties of York and Carleton, praying Legislative aid for removing Rocks and other obstructions in the River Saint John between Fredericton and the Grand Falls; for which purpose the Committee think a sum of money could be advantageously applied, and therefore recommend that a Grant be made at the present Session of three hundred and fifty pounds. They also recommend that the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds be granted for removing obstructions in the Magaguadavic and Chepenectacook Rivers in the County of Charlotte, to be divided as may be agreed upon by the Members for that County, and the sum of one hundred pounds for removing the Rocks between Indian Town and the Forks of the Miramichi River in the County of Northumberland.

"And whereas, in consequence of the numerous Saw Mills erected or about to be erected upon the banks of the navigable Rivers in the Province, it is apprehended that the navigation of many of them may be seriously injured by means of Slabs and other refuse wood being thrown into the said Rivers, the Committee are therefore of opinion, that some Legislative enactment is necessary to protect the navigation of the respective Rivers from such obstructions, and respectfully recommend the subject to the consideration of the House.

Mr. End, from the Committee appointed to ascertain what sum may be necessary to obtain Titles to the Lands occupied by the Black Refugees, submitted a Report, which he read, and handed the same in at the Clerk's Table, when it was again read, and is as follows:—

"The Committee directed to ascertain whether the Black Refugees, so called, located at Loch Lomond, in the County of Saint John, are possessed of titles to the Lands which they occupy, report,

"That on search in the Office of the Commissioner of Crown Lands, it appears that on the 12th November, 1824, seventy one of the said Black Refugees petitioned His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor for a Grant of the Lands on which they were residing; that this Petition was recommended by the Commissioner of Crown Lands, at the very low price of twenty shillings for every Lot of 50 Acres, and was approved by His Excellency; that Captain Matthews and John R. Partelow, Esquire, made a report to the Crown Land Department concerning the claims of the said Refugees, whereby it appears that the claims of 65 of the said Refugees were ascertainable, but that the claims of ten or more were doubtful.

"It has been further ascertained by Your Committee, that the sum of seventy five pounds has been paid into the hands of the Cashier of the said Crown Land Office, on behalf of the said Refugees, and in full payment of their Grants; which Grants are now in progress, in fee simple, and are only delayed by the unsettled state of said ten claims.

To His Excellecy the Lieutenant Governor, the sum of £25, to enable him to pay a Courier for conveying the Mail between Gagetown and the Nerepis Road for 1886.

To William Foshay and John Earle, the sum of £19 12 6, being expenses incurred by them as Commissioners for exploring a new line of Road from the Jemseg to the Finger Board.

To James Taylor, of Fredericton, one of the Commissioners, the sum of £17 10, to enable him to discharge the expenses incurred in the exploration of the contemplated Gagetown Canal, and for a Plan of the same.

To His Excellency the Lientenant Governor, the sum of £30, for the purpose of running out a line from near Hayward's Mill on the Great Road, Southerly to the Emigrant Settlement, with a view to ascertain the most practicable line of division between the Counties of King's and Westmorland, to be hereafter established by an Act of the Legislature.

That the sum of £50, granted to the late Solicitor General for 1834, and not drawn by him, be re-appropriated, and paid to the Honorable G. F. Street, the present Solicitor General.

To Thomas Ferguson, of Restigouche, a meritorious old Soldier, who served in the Revolutionary War, the sum of £10, to aid him in his present distressed situation.

To John Dunlop, a meritorious and very infirm old Soldier, of the late Queen's Rangers, who faithfully served his Country in the Revolutionary War, the sum of £10.

To the Clerk of the House of Assembly, the sum of \pounds , for the contingent expenses of the present Session.

And the Chairman further reported, that the Committee having finished the business referred to them, it was

Resolved, That the Committee do now rise. Ordered, That the Report be accepted; and the Resolutions as agreed to in the Committee be engrossed.

A Message from the Legislative Council.

Mr. Putnam, Master in Chancery, informed the House, that the Council had agreed to

A Bill to crect a part of the Parish of Portland in the County of Saint John, into a distinct Town or Parish; with an amendment.

To which they desire the concurrence of the House.

Mr. Weldon, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, with the Address of this House upon the subject of erecting a Bridge over the Cocagne River, reported, that they had attended to that duty, and that His Excellency was pleased to say, that the wishes of the House in that respect should be complied with.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

2d. Resolved, That for the aforegoing reasons, and with a view to facilitate the important objects of "The Saint Andrews and Quebec Rail Road Association," this House has passed a Bill, authorizing a Company to construct such Rail Road as far as the Canada Line, in the full confidence that the Legislature of Lower Canada will pass an Act with similar provisions, authorizing such Company to extend the same to Quebec.

3d. Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to transmit the above Resolutions to the Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, as the opinion of this House; and praying also, that His Excellency will be pleased to recommend the subject to the favorable consideration of His Majesty's Government.

Ordered, That Mr. Wyer, Mr. Brown and Mr. Hill, be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the said Resolutions and Address.

Mr. Street, by leave, presented a Petition from Richard S. Clarke, Esquire, High Sheriff of the County of Northumberland, on the subject of an Order of this House of the 3d February last, requiring him to account for a defalcation appearing against him in the Report on the late Attorney General Wetmore's Accounts; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received, and lie on the Table.

On motion of Mr. Street,

Whereas, Richard S. Clarke, Esquire, High Sheriff of the County of Northumberland, hath, in obedience to the Resolution of this House, given explanations regarding the alleged amount of defalcation against him, by which it appears that a part of the said amount has been secured to the Province, and the remainder accounted for in such manner, as to leave no hope that it will ever be recovered; and whereas the said Richard S. Clarke, Esquire, has rendered important services to the Province in the execution of various duties connected with his office; therefore

Resolved, That this House will take no further proceedings against him, regarding the said alleged defalcation.

Read as engrossed,

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The Resolutions of Appropriation made and passed the 4th instant.

Ordered, That Mr. Burns take the said Resolutions to the Council, and desire their concurrence thereto.

On motion of Mr. Hill,

Whereas, the opening of Roads through the best agricultural districts, in different parts of the Province, is an object of the first importance, connected, as it is, with the settlement of the Country, the advancement of its agriculture, and the general developement of its resources; and whereas the adoption of a judicious system of internal improvement requires as accurate a knowledge as can conveniently be obtained, of the different parts of the Province—the nature of the growth and soil of the different districts—the advantages of the local position—the particular inducements to settlement, and whatever else may contribute to such an application of the public money for the purpose aforesaid, as shall best promote the general prosperity, and at the same time have a due regard to all the interests concerned; therefore

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed, to consist of one Member from each County of the Province, whose duty it shall be, at the next Session of the Legislature, to report to this House such information in the premises, as they may, during the recess, be able to collect.

Ordered, That Mr. Hill, Mr. Palmer, Mr. J. M. Wilmot, Mr. Taylor, Mr. Miles, Mr. Gilbert, Mr. M'Leod, Mr. Ford, Mr. Street, Mr. Stewart, and Mr. Morehouse, be a Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. L. A. Wilmot,

The House went into Committee of the whole, in further consideration of the State of the Province.

Mr. Palmer in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that they had again gone into consideration of the business referred to them, and he was then directed to report further progress therein, and to ask leave to sit again.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted, and leave granted.

The amendments being severally read and the question put thereon,

Resolved, That the House do concur therein.

Ordered, That Mr. Street return the Bill to the Council, and acquaint them therewith.

Mr. Palmer, pursuant to leave, brought in a Bill, to provide for opening and repairing Roads and erecting Bridges throughout this Province; which was read a first time.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

The House went into Committee of the whole, in further consideration of the State of the Province.

Mr. Ford in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that they had the matters referred to them again under further consideration, and he was directed to report certain Resolutions and several amendments

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amendments proposed thereto, together with the divisions of the Committee; and having read the same, they were handed in at the Clerk's Table, where they were again read, and are as follow:—

1. **Resolved**, As the opinion of this Committee, that the interests of this Province are deeply concerned in a judicious system of management in the disposal of Crown Lands, and the granting of Licenses to cut Timber and Logs on the Crown Lands within this Province, as well as in the collection of the King's Casual and Territorial Revenues.

2. Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that agreeably to the tenor of Lord Goderich's Dispatch, laid before this House in February 1833, the House should from time to time make any suggestions, which it may deem expedient, to His Majesty's Government, relating to the said Lands and Revenues.

3. Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that to enable the House to make such suggestions in a proper manner, the most full, particular and explicit information should be laid before it, regarding the receipts and expenditures of the said Revenues, as well as every information respecting the number of acres of Land sold, the number of acres leased, the prices, the names of the purchasers and lessees, and the quantity of Land sold or leased to each, with the conditions of such sales and leases, together with the quantity of Timber and Logs licensed to be cut, and the prices thereof; and also every other particular in any way relating to the receipts and expenditures of the said Revenues.

4. Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that by the Dispatch of the 7th August, 1833, of Mr. Secretary Stanley to the Deputation from this Province, it appears "that recent instructions had been given to the Governor, to furnish the House of Assembly with detailed accounts annually, of the receipts and expenditure of the Casual Revenue," and in accordance therewith, the House during the present Session, respectfully sought for such information from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

5. Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that it is deeply to be regretted His Excellency has not felt himself authorised to direct such Accounts in detail, and other matter, to be furnished as were asked for in the Address of the House of the 25th January last, thereby rendering it impossible to make such suggestions to His Majesty's Government regarding the Crown Revenues, as might have been deemed expedient and necessary.

6. **Resolved**, As the opinion of this Committee, that in the absence of such highly necessary official information, the House should address His Majesty's Government, setting forth the complaints which have grown out of the recent systems adopted at the Crown Land Office in the disposal of Lands and the granting of Leases, and Licenses to cut Timber and Logs.

7. Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that the numerous and sudden changes made by the Provincial Government in the system of disposing of the waste Lands of the Crown during the years 1834 and 1835; but more especially during the latter year, have caused great inconvenience and dissatisfaction among His Majesty's Subjects in this Province.

An amendment was moved to the said 7th Resolution by inserting after the words, "His Majesty's Subjects in," the words "various parts of."

And upon the question, the Committee divided :----

Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that the Sales and Leases of the said waste Lands, varying in extent from Two thousand to One hundred thousand acres, to individuals, during the past year, must tend very much to retard the settlement and improvement of the Country, in as much as large tracts of Land have thereby got into the hands of those whose object is not to improve, but to sell the same, or the Timber thereon, on speculation.

An amendment was moved to the said 8th Resolution, by tesorting after the words "past year," the following :---

9. Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that the Sales by Auction, at the Crown Land Office, during the past year, of large tracts of Land, situate in remote and distant Counties, instead of selling the same in the districts where they were situate, agreeably to the Royal Instructions laid before the House in 1883, have been attended with the most serious inconvenience, and much additional expence to per-

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sons wishing to purchase for the purpose of Settlement, and have in many instances thrown the Lands, thus sold, into the hands of speculators, and will operate very much against the improvement of the Province.

10. **Resolved**, As the opinion of this Committee, that the mode of stating the upset prices, in the advertisements of the Sales of Crown Lands, for the 30th July, the 7th of September, the 5th of October, and the 7th December, of the past year, was not in conformity with the aforesaid Royal Instructions, which require the upset price to be affixed to each Lot; as, by the said several advertisements sundry Tracts were named, containing each from Five thousand to Fifteen thousand acres, with a memorandum subscribed as follows:—" Upset price from 4s. upwards," leaving the public in uncertainty as to the upset price of any particular lot or tract.

11. Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that the system of selling Timber Berths by Public Auction is impolitic, pressing with peculiar severity on the operative Lumberer, who, after incurring considerable expense in exploring the forest and discovering a grove of Timber and applying therefor, is compelled to attend at the Crown Land Office and compete, not only with the actual Lumberer, but with any speculator who may choose to bid against him.

12. Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that the system of selling at Public Auction, all Timber Berths as the Licences expire, and disposing of the same to the highest bidder, without reference to the equitable, and heretofore acknowledged right of preference acquired by occupancy, is yet more injurious than the former, as the present occupier must either purchase at any price, or relinquish his camps, roads and other improvements to the new purchaser.

13. Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that the system of granting Timber Licenses on one particular day only in each month, is the cause of much inconvenience and uncertainty to the Lumberer, and often causes great delay in commencing the operations of the season.

14. Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that the system of leasing extensive tracts of Timber Lands for a term of years, is also highly injurious to the operative Lumberers, and particularly to such of them as have made permanent settlements in the Country, and have usually been employed in the Woods with their Teams during the winter season, when Agricultural operations are suspended; as by this system, the chief part of the best Timber Lands must fall into the hands of wealthy Capitalists or Speculators, to the manifest exclusion and consequent injury of the above useful and meritorious class of His Majesty's Subjects.

15. Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that the system of requiring Bonds from Applicants for lease of Timber Grounds is injurious to the individuals concerned, peculiarly dangerous in its consequences, and calculated to destroy public confidence in the daily transactions of Trade; as it creates a secret and unrecorded incumbrance upon property, so that no man can be secure in his purchases, because the seller may have been a party to a Bond to the Crown, the conditions of which have not been fulfilled.

16. Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that the system which has for many years previous to 1835, been pursued, called the Otd system, of granting Timber Licenses immediately on being applied for, and renewing them to the same person by his making timely application therefor, before the previous License expires; and when more than one person applies at the same time for a new Berth, to have such Berth competed for by the applicants only, is preferable to that at present in force, and more advantageous to the operative Lumberer, and beneficial to the Trade of the Country.

17. *Resolved*, As the opinion of this Committee, that wilderness Land applied for by poor Settlers, with a view to immediate settlement, should be sold at a rate not exceeding the price per acre demanded previous to the year 1828.

18. Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that the powers vested in the Commissioner of Crown Lands and exercised by him, are far too great for any individual to possess, and is the cause of many of the evils now in existence, and complained of in the management of the Crown Land Department in this Province.

Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that it would be much for the interest of the Country, and add greatly to the confidence and satisfaction of all classes of His Majesty's Subjects in this Province, if the power of regulating the disposal of the waste Lands of the Crown and the Timber thereon, were vested in the Lieutenant Governor and His Majesty's Executive Council, and that the Commissioner of Crown Lands in disposing of these Lands, Timber, Saw Logs, &c. should be governed by such rules and regulations as the said Lieutenant Governor and Council shall, from time to time, make concerning the same.

20. Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that the Members of the Executive Council should be increaced to not less than nine in the whole, in order that the administration of the Government might be enabled at all times, and under every emergency, to derive the best information on every subject, affecting the general interest of the Province that may be brought under his consideration.

21. Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that by calling some Members of the House of Assembly to the Executive Council, which would not be considered as constituting a reason for vacating the seat of such Member, a channel for constant and unrestrained intercourse would be opened, from which very considerable public benefit might be derived; and that it appears from the Despatche of Mr. Secretary T. Spring Rice of October, 1834, that His Majesty's decision in dividing the Councils of this Province, was mainly influenced by the reflection, that this new arrangement might enable him to bring the Executive Government of the Province into a free communication with the House of Assembly.

22. Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that the Instructions given Sir Francis Head, the Lieutenant Governor for Upper Canada, and the extracts of those turnished Earl Gosford, as recently promulgated, relative to the views of Colonial Government entertained by the Crown, should afford entire satisfaction to the House, (except only such part of szid instructions as may be construed to affect the independence of Members of the Legislature who may hold any inferior Office or appointment under Government) if the principles upon which they are founded were carried into operation in this Province, and that a reform in the Councils of this Colony based upon the said Instructions, whereby Public Officers would be responsible and accountable to the House, in being obliged to prepare and submit their proceedings in detail, as connected with the receipts and expenditures of the King's Revenues, in the most explicit and circumstantial manner before the House of Assembly, should be humbly and dutifully asked for from His Majesty.

To which it was moved as an amendment,

To strike out all after the word "Resolved," and insert-

"That in as much as the Instructions and Despatches from His Majesty's Government to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of Upper Canada, and those furnish-

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ed to the Earl of Gosford, are not before the House; it is inexpedient for this Committee to express any opinion upon the same."

"That His Majesty's Ministers have formed a correct idea of the necessity of erecting Light Houses on Saint Paul's and Scattarie, and that they are of national rather than local interest, and should therefore in strictness be supported by those Governments deriving the greatest protection to their shipping, but as Nova Scotia has always been conspicuous for institutions founded on humane feelings, and tending to promote Commercial intercourse, the Committee recommend that on this occasion the Legislature should act liberally and contribute to the future support of those Light Houses. The Committee have ascertained that two Lights, such as are contemplated in the Letter of the Elder Brethren of Trinity House, and on the site proposed therein, cannot be supported efficiently under one thousand pounds annually, which renders the expense of erection trifling compared with that of maintaining them, and therefore think the Government of Great Britain should contribute a sum annually for the latter purpose; at the same time, rather than permit a work to be delayed, layed, which every benevolent man must anxiously wish to see accomplished; the Committee recommend to assume their support on receiving from the Canadas five hundred pounds, and from New Brunswick two hundred and fifty pounds annually, which will require this Legislature to provide the remaining two hundred and fifty pounds; and although this sum appears large, yet when it is considered that each establishment will require three attendants, and a constant supply of provisions for shipwrecked Mariners as heretofore, and that this Government has at its own expense already erected and maintained Light Houses on the East Coast of Cape Breton, at Low Point and at Canso, on the West Coast, at the entrance of the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, and from her Geographical position is coerced to support eleven Light Houses, an establishment on Sable Island, and will probably be required to contribute towards the erection of several Lights thereon, the benefits of which extend to all ships approaching the Northern Colonies, the contribution must be considered generous.

"The Committee cannot recommend the superintendence of any establishment on Saint Paul's or Scattarie being yielded to the adjoining Colonies, as they are part of Nova Scotia, and fall under the dominion of her Government, although they admit, on reference to the Record of Shipwrecks on those Islands, for several years last past, the loss has exclusively fallen on British and other vessels destined to Ports in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence and New Brunswick, which may be attributed to the circumstance that the Mariners of Cape Breton and Nova Scotia are conversant with the dangers of, and are good Pilots on those Coasts.

i i" The Committee therefore recommend that the Lieutenant Governor should be respectfully requested to correspond with the Government of the Canadas and New Brunswick on this important subject, without further delay, hoping that a definite and equitable arrangement may be made to the satisfaction of the respective Colonies, for adopting the measures of His Majesty's Government.

The Chairman reported, that they had gone through the Bill referred to them, and made two amendments thereto, which he read, and they being handed in at the Clerk's Table, were there again read, and are as follow :----

Ordered, That the Report be accepted; and further

Ordered, That the said amendments be engrossed, and the Bill as amended, read a third time to-morrow.

Mr. Wyer, from the Committee to whom was referred the Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, of the 7th instant, with the accompanying Report from the Legislature of Nova Scotia, on the subject of contemplated Light Houses to be erected on the Islands of Saint Paul's and Scattarie, submitted a report, which he read, and handed the same in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as tollows --

"Whereas by a Report of the Committee of the House of Assembly of Nova Scotia, to whom were referred the Dispatch of the Colonial Secretary, relative to the erection and maintenance of Light Houses upon the Islands of Saint Paul and Scattarie, it would appear that they do not contemplate the erection of more than one Light House on Saint Paul's Island; when, from information before this House, it is believed that not less than two Light Houses will afford due security to Vessels navigating that dangerous coast, and that one alone will be of little benefit; and also, that Bells and Guns will be indispensable at such Light Houses during the frequent fogs which pervade the Gulf of Saint Lawrence:

"And Whereas it also appears by the same Report, that the Committee do not consider it advisable to recommend that the management of any Light or Lights to be erected on Saint Paul's Island, should be surrendered to any other Body than the Board of Commission in Nova Scotia, but have proposed that the said Board shall assume the sole management and pay all expenses of supporting two Lights, viz.: one on Saint Paul's and one on Scattarie, and of a constant supply of provisions for the use of shipwrecked persons, upon condition of receiving annually from Canada the sum of £500, and from New Brunswick £250-the total annual expense being estimated at £1000; therefore

"Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee-

"1st. That measures should immediately be adopted by the said Board of Commission to ascertain the number, proper site, and description of Lights which it may be necessary to erect on Saint Paul's Island, in order to afford sufficient protection to Vessels passing that Island.

"2d. That although Light Houses in equally remote and exposed situations, which are under the care of Commissioners in this Province, are properly and efficiently maintained during the whole year for an annual sum of not more than £250 each, and the Lights on Saint Paul's Island should consequently require a much smaller sum for its support, it being unnecessary to keep up the Lights for more than eight months in Tr the the

the year; yet as this Committee are anxious that a measure of such vast importance to the interests of Commerce and of humanity should be effected without further delay, they recommend, if two good and sufficient Light Houses, with Bells and Guns, be erected in proper situations and maintained by the Board of Commission in Nova Scotia, on the Island of Saint Paul, and also one Light House on Scattarie Island; and if the establishment at present on Saint Paul's Island for the preservation and comfort of shipwrecked persons, which has hitherto been exclusively supported by this Province, be also continued and maintained by the said Board of Commission of Nova Scotiathen, this Province will pay or contribute towards the same the annual sum of £250.

"Sd. That, as it is supposed that the Government of Great Britain may hereafter be induced to contribute an annual sum towards the maintenance of the Lights to be erected on Saint Paul's and Scattarie Islands, it is just and equitable, and is fully expected, that in such case a proportionate deduction shall be made from the amount now proposed to be annually contributed by this Province."

Ordered, That the Report be accepted; and

On motion of Mr. Wyer,

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to forward the Report made this day by the Chairman of the Committee for Light Houses, to the Government of Nova Scotia.

" The Humble Address of the House of Assembly of New Brunswick.

"MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,

66 THE Assembly beg leave most humbly to represent to Your Majesty, that much inconvenience is felt by the Trade of this Province, in consequence of the Dollars and Half Dollars of the United States of America being refused at the Custom House, in payment of duties levied under Acts of the Imperial Parliament, while those of old Spain and late Spanish America are received at the established value of 4s. 4d. sterling each.

"The last mentioned Coins are always at a premium and cannot be obtained without great difficulty, on account of the constant demand that exists for them in the United States, principally for exportation, and the small amount of British Gold and Silver in circulation renders it impossible to obtain a sufficiency of it to meet such payments.

"The House of Assembly therefore humbly pray Your Majesty, that the Trade may be relieved by an order from Your Majesty's Government to the Officers of the Customs in this Province, that the Dollars and Half Dollars of the United States of America may be received in payment of such Duties, at the same value as those of old. Spain, Mexico, Chili, Columbia and Peru.

And whereas. this House entertains a confident hope that the Canadas, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island will readily furnish such other sums as will be necessary for the maintenance of such Light Houses, and that the same may in consequence be erected in the course of the ensuing summer;

And whereas, it is expedient that persons should be appointed, to whom might be communicated, during the recess, such information relative to the erection and maintenance of such Light Houses, as His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor may receive from His Majesty's Government or the Sister Colonies; therefore

Resolved, That the Honorable Joseph Cunard and Alexander Rankin and William Abrams, Esquires, be appointed a Committee to receive all such communications as His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor may think necessary to transmit to them during the recess, with a view to every facility being given to the erection of said Houses, so necessary to the protection of Commerce and the cause of humanity; and further

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to convey to His Majesty's Government, the deep sense which is entertained by this House of this additional mark of liberality on the part of His Majesty's Government, and for the anxious solicitude, which it has, as well in the present instance as upon all former occasions, evinced for the welfare and prosperity of His Majesty's North American Dominions.

Ordered, That Mr. Wyer, Mr. Brown, and Mr. Hayward, be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

On motion of Mr. Partelow.

Whereas this House, by Address on the 5th March, 1835, to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, prayed that His Excellency would communicate with the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, on the subject of certain Bonds sent by the late Attorney General Wetmore to the late Attorney General of Nova Scotia, Mr. Uniacke, for collection, in the hope that such information would be obtained as would lead to a discovery as to the proceedings had upon the same:

And whereas in pursuance of such prayer, His Excellency did make the necessary communication, and has laid the reply thereto before the House, but no satisfactory explanation is afforded thereby;

And whereas by a document on the files of the House, it is shewn that the sum of £57 14 6, one of the said Bonds, was recovered by the late Richard Uniacke, Esquire, on the 24th November, 1826, which amount does not appear to have been paid over to the late Attorney General Wetmore or his successor in office; therefore

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to direct the Attorney General to take the requisite measures for recovering the amount so received by the late Rich. ard Uniacke, Esquire, and also to obtain all the information possible regarding the other Bonds, as particularized in the Resolutions of the 5th March, 1885.

Ordered, That Mr. Partelow, Mr. Woodward and Mr. Taylor, be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

Read a third time as engrossed,

A Bill to incorporate The Portland Mills and Manufacturing Company.

Resolved, That the Bill do pass. Ordered, That Mr. Woodward take the said Bill to the Council, and desire their concurrence thereto.

On motion of Mr. Taylor,

The House went into Committee of the whole, on a Bill to incorporate The Fredericton Mill and Manufacturing Company.

Mr. Woodward in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that they had gone into consideration of the Bill referred to them, and agreed to the same.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted, and the Bill engrossed.

The Address from the House of Assembly to His Majesty, founded on the Resolutions passed in Committee on the State of the Province, and adopted by the House, was read as engrossed, and is as follows :--

"To the King's Most Brcellent Majesty.

" The Humble Address of the House of Assembly of New Brunswick.

"MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,

66 WE. Your Majesty's loyal and faithful Subjects, the House of Assembly of New Brunswick, beg leave most humbly to approach Your Majesty with every expression of attachment and devotion to Your Majesty's Person and Government.

"Deeply regretting the necessity that exists of bringing under the Royal notice the situation of certain public affairs of paramount importance to the interests of this Province, the House of Assembly confidently hope to receive that most gracious and paternal consideration from Your Majesty, which is so freely and impartially bestowed upon every class of Your Majesty's Subjects throughout Your widely extended Dominions.

"The Assembly have before humbly represented to Your Majesty, that the interests of this Colony are deeply and inseparably involved in a judicious and wholesome system of management in the disposal of Crown Lands and Forests, and in the collection and expenditures of the Revenues arising therefrom; and this opinion has been sanctioned by Your Majesty's Government, as communicated through a Dispatch of Lord Viscount Goderich, laid before the House in 1883.

"The Assembly were also given to understand by the substance of the aforesaid Dispatch, as well as by Mr. Secretary Stanley's answer to the Deputation, dated 7th August, 1833, that detailed accounts of the receipts and expenditures of the said Revenues would be annually laid before the House; and with an anxious desire to obtain information on so important a subject, they have, during every Session, since the receipt of such answer, presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor a humble address, praying for those accounts; but they regret to inform Your Majesty, that in no one instance has the said information been furnished, whereby Your Majesty's loyal Subjects in this Province have been kept in ignorance as to the true state of the said Revenues.

"The Assembly would humbly press upon Your Majesty's most gracious attention, that to enable them to make the requisite suggestions to Your Majesty on the subject of those Revenues, which they are encouraged to do by Lord Goderich's Dispatch previously referred to, the most full and circumstantial information should be afforded them, particularizing each source of Income and expenditure.

"The Assembly are at a loss to conceive upon what ground His Excellency has felt himself unauthorized to furnish the required accounts. They are indispensable to a due investigation of the proceedings of the Crown Land Office, as without them it is utterly impossible for the Assembly to know whether a due regard has been had to economy and prudence in the transactions of the said Department.

" 'Nothing is gained by concealment,' has been happily expressed by one of Your Majesty's Colonial Ministers; and, as it would tend to remove suspicion and quiet discontent, a reform of the present system, establishing the responsibility and accountability to the House of Public Officers concerned in the collection and expenditure of the said Revenues, would be hailed with great satisfaction by the loyal Inhabitants of this Province.

"If the anxiety of the Assembly to obtain the said detailed Accounts has been great on former occasions, it has been much more so during the present Session, from the great inconvenience and dissatisfaction which had been caused among the people of this Province by the numerous and sudden changes in the system of disposing of the Waste Lands of the Crown, and the Timber thereon, during the years 1834 and 1835, but the more especially during the latter year; and the Assembly feel the utmost confidence that Your Majesty will sanction such anxiety for information, when it is brought under Your Royal notice that sundry individual Sales and Leases of Crown Lands, varying in extent from 2,000 to 100,000 Acres, have been effected during the past year.

"Such disposals of the Crown Lands must very much retard the settlement and improvement provement of the Country, as large tracts have thereby got into the hands of those whose object is not to improve and cultivate, but to sell the same or the Timber thereon, on speculation.

"The Assembly feel it their duty to bring under Your Majesty's notice other re gulations adopted and practised at the Crown Land Office during the past year, which have produced great inconvenience and dissatisfaction. They advert to the selling at the Crown Land Office in Fredericton, of large tracts of Land situate in remote and distant Counties, instead of selling the same in the Districts where the Lands lie, agreeably to the Royal Instructions laid before the House of Assembly in 1838; and also to the mode of stating the upset price in the advertisements of Sales of Lands for the 30th of July, the 7th of September, the 5th of October and the 7th December of the past year, as, instead of affixing the upset price to each Lot in conformity with the aforesaid Royal Instructions, sundry large tracts were named containing each from five thousand to fifteen thousand acres, with a memorandum subscribed as follows : 'Upset price from 4s. upwards,' leaving the public in uncertainty as to the upset price of any particular tract.

"The Assembly feeling assured, that the prosperity of this Province and its present widely extended commerce, are mainly attributable to the staple Wood Trade of the Country, humbly conceive that it should ever be the policy of the Colonial Government so to foster and encourage that trade, as to render it productive of the greatest possible benefit and advantage; but the Assembly regret to inform Your Majesty, that the system of selling Timber and Logs adopted at the Crown Land Office in March 1835, and carried into practice during the past Summer and Autumn, has in very many respects already proved and must hereafter prove highly injurious to the operative Lumberers and prejudicial to the Staple trade of the Country. By the action of this system extensive monopolies of Wood Lands have been established in various parts of the Province, the Capitalist-speculator has engrossed a large proportion of the Staple resources of the Country, and the industrious and meritorious operatives or middle class of Lumberers, are shut out from that beneficial employment of their labor and supplies, of which, under the previous regulations, they had annually availed themselves; a system so prejudicial to the general interests of the Province, is viewed by Your Majesty's Subjects in this Country, with such alarm and dismay as may tend to destroy that confidence in the Government so essential to be cherished and maintained.

"Nor is it surprising that such a feeling should continue to prevail and increase, when the Assembly have been officially informed, during the present Session, that no further Instructions have been received from Your Majesty's Government relative to the disposal of Your Majesty's Lands and Forests in this Province, other than those laid before the House in 1833, and when, during the past year, besides private Sales of Crown Lands to an immense extent, upwards of 240,000 Acres have been noticed for sale by Auction in sundry advertisements, and all the vacant surveyed Crown Lands in the Province were advertised to be sold on the 7th December by the Commissioner of Crown Lands, which last sale was happily stayed by command of His Excellency, upon representations being made to him from various parts of the Province.

"Your Majesty cannot fail to perceive the magnitude of the powers with which the Commissioner of Crown Lands is vested, and the Assembly are now of the opinion heretcfore expressed to Your Majesty, that those powers are far too great for any individual subject to possess, and are the chief cause of many of the evils now complained of in the management of the Crown Land Department.

"The Assembly besought Your Majesty in 1888 to place the entire control and management of Your Royal Revenues in this Province, and the sources whence they were derived, in the Provincial Legislature, as a measure of all others that would afford entire satisfaction to Your Majesty's loyal Subjects, and prove highly beneficial to the Colony; but that concession not having been made, and it now appearing the determination of Your Majesty to retain such control, the Assembly are induced to press the matter no further in that shape upon Your gracious consideration; yet they deem it necessary humbly to suggest to Your Majesty, that next to investing the Legislature with such powers, the Assembly are firmly of opinion that it would conduce to the happiness happiness and prosperity of the Province, and add greatly to the confidence and contentment of all classes of Your Majesty's Subjects, if the management of the Crown Land Department were vested in the Administrator of the Government and Your Majesty's Executiv Council: At the same time, the House of Assembly would humbly beg leave to call to the attention of Your Majesty, that as the Executive Council at present consists of only five Members, it is highly desirable that their numbers should be materially increased, as it is of the utmost importance that the Administrator of the Government should be enabled at all times and under every circumstance, to derive the best possible information and assistance on every subject affecting the general interests of the Province.

"The Assembly do not presume to offer an opinion to Your Majesty as to the persons you may be graciously pleased to call to fill the high and dignified situation of Your Executive Councillors in this Province, yet they would humbly express their most cordial concurrence in the opinions of Mr. Secretary T. Spring Rice, expressed in his Dispatch of October, 1884, whereby it appears that His Majesty's decision, in dividing the Councils of this Province, was mainly influenced by the reflection that this new arrangement might enable him to bring the Executive Government of the Province into a free communication with the House of Assembly, by calling some members of that House to the Executive Council :--Such a channel for free and unrestrained intercourse between the House and the Government has not, however, been opened, as no Member of the Assembly has yet been called to that Council.

"The House now turn with heartfelt pleasure to the consideration of the Instructions given Sir Francis Head, Lieutenant Governor of Upper Canada, and the extracts from those furnished Lord Gosford, as recently promulgated. The views entertained by Your Majesty, of Colonial Government, as therein developed, with a liberal construction of such parts as might be supposed to affect the independence of the Members of the Legislature holding any inferior office or appointment under Government, would afford the Assembly entire satisfaction, if the principles which they involved were carried into operation in this Province.

"It becomes a matter of imperative duty for the Assembly most humbly to solicit Your Majesty's attention to the composition of the Legislative Council; some of the Members thereof being heads of Departments, with large salaries, and although the Assembly freely admit that no great public evil has yet arisen in consequence thereof, yet very unpleasant collisions might be anticipated, if the policy of Your Majesty's Government, as expressed in the aforesaid Instructions to the Canadas, should be rigidly adhered to in this Province, whereby every person so situate must support the administration or resign office.

"The Assembly humbly conceive that so important a branch of the Legislature, appointed by the Crown, should be at liberty to exercise a proper discretion upon all matters submitted for their consideration, and that, therefore, in the event of such policy being adopted in this Province, as well for the public interests as those of the officers alluded to, their places should be filled by other and more independent men, of which there is happily no deficiency in this Province.

"It will be seen by Your Majesty, that the Assembly ask for nothing irreconcileable with the principles of the Constitution, or what has not been offered by Your Majesty to be conceded to some other of your Colonies, and the House therefore feel the more satisfied that their representations will have an early and favorable hearing. That all cause for dissatisfaction with the Crown Departments in New Brunswick may be speedily removed, is the common desire of all Your Majesty's subjects in this Province.

"The Assembly are desirous that the proceeds of all Your Majesty's Revenues, whether Casual or Territorial, raised and collected within the Province, should be placed under the control of the Legislature, upon a sufficient provision being made for the Civil List, adapted to the circumstances of the Country, either for a period of ten years or permanently, as may be desired by Your Majesty; and that the proceeds of the sale of Crown Lands to the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Land Company may be expended upon works of public utility and importance within the Province.

" The House of Assembly beseech Your Majesty's attention to this Address, as well

as to that of the 15th of March last, and the Scale of Salaries thereto attached; and with a view of affording Your Majesty any additional information that might be required to promote a speedy and happy settlement of the remaining causes of discontent, they have deputed two of their body, having their entire confidence, to lay their humble representations at the foot of the Throne, with full power and authority to enter into and negociate with your Majesty's Government upon all causes of complaint now existing in this Colony."

And on motion of Mr. Partelow,

Resolved, That the Address be signed by the Speaker, and then handed over to the Deputation, together with such other Documents as they may require; and further

Resolved, That a Copy of the said Address be furnished His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, and that a Committee be appointed to wait upon His Excellency therewith.

Ordered, That Mr. Partelow, Mr. Allen and Mr. Miles, be a Committee to wait His upon Excellency with a Copy of the said Address.

Read a third time as engrossed,

A Bill to incorporate The Fredericton Mill and Manufacturing Company.

Resolved, That the Bill do pass.

Ordered, That Mr. Taylor take the said Bill to the Council, and desire their concurrence thereto.

Read a third time as engrossed,

A Bill to provide for opening and repairing Roads and erecting Bridges throughout the Province.

Resolved, That the Bill do pass.

Ordered, That Mr. M'Leod take the said Bill to the Council, and desire their concurrence thereto.

A Message from the Legislative Council.

Mr. Putnam, Master in Chancery, informed the House, that the Council had agreed to

A Bill to incorporate The Fredericton Mill and Manufacturing Company; and

A Bill to incorporate The Portland Mills and Manufacturing Company; with amendments, to which they desire the concurrence of the House.

On motion of Mr. Street,

Resolved, That this House do concur in the opinion of the Legislative Council, as expressed in their Resolution of the 12th instant, relative to the mode of providing proper accommodations for that House, by appropriating the Room at present occupied for the Sittings of the Supreme Court, as a Chamber for the Legislative Council, and therefore it is necessary to have a new Building erected for the accommodation of the Supreme Court.

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will appoint Commissioners for the purpose of having the said Building erected, and that this House will make provision to an amount, not exceeding £1200, for the purpose of defraying the expense of such Building, at the next Session of the Legislature; and further

Resolved, That the said Commissioners do also cause the Room now used for the Supreme Court to be fitted up, and to make such other arrangements in the building as may be necessary for the accommodation of the Legislative Council, for which this House will also make provision at the next sitting of the Legislature.

Ordered. That Mr. Street, Mr. Hayward and Mr. Connell, be a Committee to wait upon His Exceliency with the Address, and communicate the said Resolutions.

On motion of Mr. Allen,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to make such alterations and improvements as may be necessary in the Province Hall, for the accommodation of the House, during the recess, and that this House will make provision for the same, at its next sitting. Ordered,

Ordered, That Mr. Allen, Mr. Miles, Mr. Johnston, Mr. Robinson, Mr. Wetmore, the Clerk of this House, and Mr. Clopper, do compose the said Committee.

The House proceeded to take into consideration the amendments made by the Council to

A Bill to incorporate The Portland Mills and Manufacturing Company.

The amendments being severally read, and the question put thereon,

Resolved, That the House do concur therein.

Ordered, That Mr. Woodward return the Bill to the Council, and acquaint them therewith.

The House proceeded to take into consideration the amendments made by the Council to

A Bill to incorporate The Fredericton Mill and Manufacturing Company.

The amendments being severally read, and the question put thereon,

Resolved, That the House do concur therein.

Ordered, That Mr. Taylor return the Bill to the Council, and acquaint them therewith.

On motion of Mr. Johnston,

Whereas, There are two sums, amounting together to £600, granted by the Legislature to the late Agricultural Society of this Province, in the Years 1829 and 1830, which sums are not yet drawn from the Treasury, and it being desirable that the said sums so granted should be appropriated for the purposes originally intended; and whereas a favorable opportunity now offers, by two Members of this House about to proceed to England, of expending the said grants advantageously for the Agricultural interests of this Province; therefore

Resolved, That the said Members, viz. William Crane and L. A. Wilmot, Esquires, be authorized and requested to expend, while in England, the amount of the said Grants, say £600, in manner following, viz :--

In the purchase of a first rate Entire Horse of the most approved breed, not to exceed in price the sum of £200, and the balance, in part in the purchase of from two to four Mares of the most approved breed, in Foal, and a few Bulls and Heifers of good breed, and the remainder in the purchase of a few Rams of the Dishley and other approved Breeds; the same to be sent to different parts of the Province, according to the discretion of the said Members; and further

Resolved. That this House will, at the next Session of the Legislature, re-appropriate the said Grants of £600, for the purpose of paying for the above Stock, and the expences of importation, or by other Legislative enactment make provision for the same.

Mr. Robinson moved the following as additional Rules of the House, under the head of

STANDING ORDERS RELATIVE TO PRIVATE BILLS.

1. That all Petitions for private Bills be printed within days after the commencement of every Session.

2. That no private Bill be brought into this House but upon a Petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the parties preferring the same; and that such Petition be signed by the parties who are suitors for such Bill.

3. That before any Petition be presented to this House relating to the enclosing, improving or draining of Lands—the making of Turnpike Roads—the making of Canals, Reservoirs or Aqueducts—the improving the navigation of Rivers—the making Rail Ways or Tram Roads—the making Tunnels or Archways—the making Docks—the improving Piers, Ports or Harbours—or for building Bridges; such Maps, Plans, Elevations, Sections, and such other papers as may be necessary for explaining the same, be deposited with the Clerk of the House, and that the receipt thereof be acknowledged by the Clerk upon the Petition.

4. That a Committee be appointed at the commencement of every Session, consisting of Members, of whom three shall be a Quorum, to be denominated

The Private Bill Committee, to whom shall be referred every private Bill; and that no proceedings be had upon any such Bill until such Committee have reported thereupon to the House.

5. That as soon as the Committee have reported any Bill, such Bill, together with the amendments, if any suggested by the Committee, be printed at the expence of the parties who are suitors for such Bill, and printed Copies thereof delivered to the Members before the second reading.

6. That no Bill for the particular interest of any Person or Persons, Corporation or Corporations, or Body or Bodies of People, be read a second time until all fees be paid for the same into the hands of the Clerk of the House.

When Mr. Street moved the previous question-

That the question for adopting the same be now put,

Whereupon the House divided, and it was decided in the negative.

On motion of Mr. Crane,

Whereas the route of the new Road proposed to be made from Fredericton to Westmorland by way of the head of the Grand Lake, and which has been recently explored and surveyed by Deputy Blair, passes through several large tracts of vacant Crown Land, the value of which would be very much increased by the said Road being made:

And whereas this House are of opinion that the opening of said Road would greatly tend to benefit the Country; therefore

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, requesting that he will be pleased to cause the sum of \pounds , to be expended in opening said Road; and this House will make provision therefor at its next meeting, provided that a similar sum is expended for the like purpose from the Casual Revenue.

To which Mr. Brown moved as an amendment, after altering the preamble to meet the said proposed amendment, to add at the close of the said Resolution the following

" And also the sum of \pounds , towards opening the line of Road explored by Deputy Allan from Saint Andrews to Woodstock, provided that a similar sum be granted from the Casual Revenue."

To which amendment Mr. Partelow moved an amendment, by further altering the said preamble to meet this second amendment, and then add to the said amendment the following

" And also the sum of \pounds , towards opening a new line of Road leading from Saint John to Sussex Vale via Loch Lomond."

And upon the question for the amendment to the amendment, it was decided in the negative.

The question was then taken upon the first proposed amendment, when the House divided-

Yeas, S.

Nays, 9.

And it was decided in the negative.

Then the question being put upon the original motion, the House again divided-Yeas, 7. Nays, 10.

Whereupon it was again decided in the negative.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

On motion of Mr. Hayward,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed by this House, to examine and ascertain, during the recess of the Legislature, the best site for a Bridge across the River Oromocto, in connection with the line of Road between Fredericton and Saint John, and report the result of their exploration to this House, at the next Session.

Ordered, That Mr. Hayward, Mr. Miles and Mr. Johnston, be a Committee for that purpose.

Mr. Robinson, from the Committee, appointed by the House to join the Committee of the Legislative Council, to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the several joint Addresses of the Council and Assembly, to His Excellency, expressive of the thanks of the Council and Assembly to the Home Government, for the very valuable publications from the Record Commission, presented to the Colony: and the Document and Act of Parliament relative to the State of the Prisons in England and Wales, reported, that the Committee had attended thereto, and His Excellency was pleased to say that he would transmit the same.

Read as engrossed,

The Resolution of Appropriation passed the 4th instant, granting the sum of $\pounds 1,274$ 5 2, to the Clerk of the House of Assembly, to defray the contingent expences of this present Session.

Ordered, That Mr. Slason take the said Resolution to the Council, and desire their concurrence thereto.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Whereas, the Act regulating the Herring Fishery at the Island of Grand Manan, in the County of Charlotte, expires on the 1st April, 1887, and it being desirous for the House to be in possession of correct information regarding the operation of the said Act, at the next Session, to enable them to Legislate with the more certainty on a matter respecting which there have been annually presented conflicting statements from the said Island of Grand Manan and the City of Saint John, respectively; therefore

Resolved, That the subject be investigated, during the recess, and that Thomas Wyer, James Brown and John Allen, Esquires, Members of this House, together with Thomas Barlow, Lauchlan Donaldson and John Ward, Junior, Esquires, be appointed for the purpose, and that they report the result of such investigation at the next Sitting of the Legislature.

Mr. Street, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, with the Address of this House, relative to the appointment of Commissioners for the erection of a new Court House for the accommodation of the Supreme Court of this Province, and for the making the necessary alterations in the Province Hall, for the accommodation of the Legislative Council, reported, that the Committee had attended to that duty, and that His Excellency was pleased to say the wishes of the House, in that respect, should be complied with.

Mr. Wyer, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, with the Address of this House, on the subject of the appointment of a Committee of Correspondence for the erection of the Light Houses on the Islands of Saint Paul's and Scattarie; and also to request that His Excellency would be pleased to convey to His Majesty's Government the thanks of this House, for their liberality in the erection of the said Light Houses, have attended to that duty, and His Excellency was pleased to say, that he should have much pleasure in complying with the wishes of the House.

Mr. Wyer, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency, with the Address of this House to His Majesty, upon the subject of the Dollar and Half Dollar of the United States being received at the Custom House in payment of Duties, reported, that His Excellency was pleased to say that the wishes of the House should be complied with.

On motion of Mr. Brown,

Whereas Richard M'Farlan, of Bathurst, in the County of Gloucester, did, during the present Session, Petition this House for the passing of a Bill to authorize him to make certain erections at the Falls of the River Nepesiguit, for the improvement of the navigation of the said River; and whereas the further consideration of the said Bill was postponed for want of the necessary information; therefore

Resolved,

Mr. Speaker reported, that he had addressed His Excellency to the following effect :--

" May it please Your Excellency,

66 THE Assembly, during the present Session, have anxiously devoted their time and attention to such measures as appeared necessary to give a proper direction to the spirit of enterprize which has of late been so actively manifested in various parts of the Province.

"The enactments of this Session will, I confidently hope, lead to the introduction of wealth, to the increase of Commerce, to extensive internal improvements, and to the encouragement and prosperity of every branch of industry.

ACCOUNTS

OF THE LATE

ATTORNEY-GENERAL WETMORE.

MR. PARTELOW submitted the following Report to the House:

THE Chairman of the Committee of Public and Private Accounts, begs leave to Report that during the recess he has had under consideration the unsettled matters still remaining with the Estate of the late Attorney General WETMORE, and having visited Fredericton in September last, and obtained from the present Attorney General the information sought for in the Address of this House to His Excellency on the 26th day of January last, he is now enabled to submit a further statement for the information of the House.

By reference to the Report made last Session, it will be observed that there remained in the hands of the late Attorney General Wetmore, at the time of his death, to be accounted for—

On which costs had accrued to the amount of $\pounds 722$ 12 7, at the debit of the Province, and consequently also to be accounted for, when the monies were recovered, and the suits wound up.

The following is intended to shew the subsequent proceedings, and as many important questions will arise for the determination of the House, the Chairman has gone much into detail, in order that the fullest information may be at once before them.

The first item in the amount to be accounted for is-

Principal. Costs.

Leaving £413 : 2s. : 4d. balance against the present Attorney General, of which £387 : 1s. : 9d. are costs on suits prosecuted (nearly all of them) to final judgment by his predecessor, Mr. Wetmore, and which are charged the Province by the Exccutors on the Estate. Mr. Peters informed the Chairman that the amount of costs so recovered by him, he had carried to the credit of the late Attorney General's Estate, because fees to a much larger amount had been anticipated by his predecessor during his life time, on Grants of Land, &c., the Patents for which Grants had not been completed, nor issued, until his own accession to office; That, consequently such fees, of right, belonged to him, and that he conceived himself authorised to appropriate the costs, now under consideration, towards the liquidation of the claim he had for the same. This is submitted for the determination of the House, as the amount, £387 : 1s. : 9d., must be either paid over by the Estate of the late Attorney General, or by the present Attorney General. It may be proper to remark here also, that the present Attorney General has to account for £13 16s. 9d., fees on sundry suits commenced by Acting Attorney General Parker, the same having been brought to a final issue by Mr. Peters, and the costs, so far as they had gone, were charged the Province by Mr. Parker.

It is for the wisdom of the House to determine the measures to be pursued regarding this large deficiency on the part of the Sheriff; much of it has evidently been lost through a great laxity in the administration of the duties of his office.

The amount stated, for which the various parties mentioned are accountable, is $\pounds 0475$ 4s. $9\frac{3}{4}$ d.; add to this, Black and Woodward's Bond, $\pounds 641$, illegally taken, makes $\pounds 7114$ 4s. $9\frac{3}{4}$ d.; deduct this from $\pounds 9081$ 15s. $4\frac{1}{4}$ d., the gross amount of principal and costs as before stated, to be accounted for, leaves the *present ascertained* loss to the Province to be $\pounds 1967$ 10s. $6\frac{3}{4}$ d., besides Bonds to the amount of $\pounds 250$, which appear by the Attorney General's accounts to have been collected, when, in fact, the parties were relieved by Legislative bounty, and the Grants turned over to the Attorney General to meet the extents. Interest has, however, been secured and collected on the various suits, to the amount of $\pounds 764$ 13s. $1\frac{1}{4}$ d., which will assist in relieving the Province from the great loss to which it will in the end become subject.

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We next examined the road opened by the Land Company from Fredericton to Boies Town, and found the distance by actual measurement 472 miles: this line we consider by no means suitable for the great road, as it passes over a rocky, hilly Country, intersected by a number of streams, on which there are extensive bridges which will require large sums to keep them in repair.

We next examined the present road from Swim's ferry to Fredericton, and also the alterations recommended by Alexander Goodfellow and others; the distance from Fredericton to Boies' by the present road is 42 miles and 72 chains, as measured by the former Commissioners, and in addition to the alterations recommended by them, we would beg leave to state, that if a direct line (which we think quite practicable,) were run from the four mile brook near Day's on the Portage to M'Laggan's mills on the east side of the Nashwaak, from two to three miles below M'Leod's, at a good site for a bridge, which we there found, and also a direct line from Atherton's on the west side of the Nashwaak to Everett's ferry opposite Fredericton, the distance would thereby be shortened, and the steep hills from the four mile brook to the river Nashwaak avoided; those alterations are described by the red line on the old plan, and we think them very desirable.

The distance from Fredericton to Boies' by the line formerly recommended by Alexander Goodfellow and others, with the two additional alterations above mentioned, is about 36 miles and 66 chains, and the probable expense of making and finishing the road from Swim's ferry to Fredericton on the said line (or to continue up on the north side of the south west to big hole brook, thence across the river and join the same,) would not exceed £100 per mile, including all the bridges, with the exception of the bridge across the main south west and the river Nashwaak.

In pursuance of the Resolutions of the House of Assembly, we have confined our explorations mainly to the road opened and recommended by the Land Company, to examining the eligibility of the land for a road on the north side of the south west branch of the Miramichi from Swim's ferry up to Price's bend, about 4 miles above Boies', and to the line formerly explored and recommended by the Commissioners appointed in 1833, and are clearly and unanimously of opinion, that the line recommended by the Commissioners in 1833, with the alterations therein, which we have above suggesteed, is far preferable to the Land Company's line of road, and therefore recommend the adoption of the same with the above suggested alterations.

By this line, the distance from Boies' to Fredericton will be from ten to eleven miles shorter than by the Land Company's road, and we are unanimously of opinion, that it would cost a larger sum to finish the road, in addition to what is already done to it, than to finish the line recommended by Alexander Goodfellow and others, with the alterations we now recommend therein, besides the difference in distance and the additional expense of keeping the Land Company's line in repair, owing to the great number of bridges thereon.

Before closing our report, we would beg leave further to state that it is our opinion that without altering the general line now recommended, many advantageous alterations, though triffing in themselves, may be made therein by the Supervisor or Supersors on expending the money, especially on the Nashwaak, if a discretionary power be left with them to that effect.

R EPORT of the Commissioners appointed by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to explore the Road from Robert Doak's to Fredericton, agreeably to a Resolution of the Honorable the House of Assembly, in the Session of 1833.

Having procured men and necessaries we proceeded to Robert Doak's, and commenced by surveying the present Road from thence to Fredericton, for the purpose of examining all the obstructions on that line, as well as to get a correct Plan to enable us to make such explorations as we might find necessary.

Having arrived at Fredericton, we called at the Surveyor General's Office for such information as we required, which the acting Surveyor General, Mr. Beckwith, most readily afforded us.

We then commenced at Everitt's Ferry, opposite Fredericton, and run a line to the Nashwaak, about seven miles from the mouth, thence crossed that Stream, and continued along the Eastern side thereof to the Peniac, which we also crossed, and from thence ran a line towards the South West Branch of Miramichi River, at Betts' Brook.

The land from the Peniac, for a distance of about five miles, is level and covered with hard wood, but stoney; four miles further is much intersected by Barrens and Swamps; three miles further, and as far beyond that as we could see, it is almost one continued Swamp, part of which is a sunken Bog completely bare of timber.

Here we thought it quite unnecessary to continue any further on that line, as the ground appeared to be so unfavorable for a Road, and a very small portion fit for settlement; we therefore abandoned that route and made the best of our way to Miramichi River.

That part of the line from opposite Fredericton to the Nashwaak, is also objectionable, particularly as we approach the Nashwaak, being very much broken and almost one continued bed of rocks.

We next proceeded to ascertain how far the present line could be improved.

From Doak's to the commencement of Hunter's clearance, our line is nearly in the vicinity of the old Road which we crossed several times, thence we ran a line in a straight direction to Betts' Brook, cutting off a considerable angle, and having spent some time in examining that Stream, we fixed on the place where the Bridge is at present as the most eligible for that purpose, and also for ascending the hill on the West side, from thence to a short distance below Byron Sutter's we continued pretty near the old Road.

At Sutter's the old Road descends a long steep hill and ascends another about a mile further up, at the commencement of Lyon's clearance.

Some distance further up two Roads have been opened to Wilson's; the first is described on the Plan by the dotted red line, descends a very bad hill, thence passes along the brow of a steep ledge of rocks and ascends a hill near Price's. This route we considered quite impracticable.

The other has been opened more recently and leaves the old Road nearly at a right angle, and continues to rise pretty abruptly for about three quarters of a mile, thence in the same direction to Price's Brook, thence turns Westerly, and by a circuitous route after descending a number of steep hills joins the old Road near Wilson's.

Here we spent some time in exploring, and by running a line in the same direction, as we had done formerly, to Price's Brook, thence in a direct line towards the old road, near Brown's, we went through a fine level tract of land covered chiefly with hard wood. By this alteration the Road will be over two miles shorter, besides avoiding all the hills with the exception of the hill at Price's Brook, and the descent towards the old Road, near Brown's, both of which can be made perfectly easy at a moderate expense.

The old line from thence to Boies' is tolerably good : it however requires straightening with some other trifling alterations.

From Boies' we continued nearly the old line for one and a half miles, thence passing through a fine tract of level land we ran a direct line to Clearwater Brook.

The hill on the South side of the Clearwater, and from thence to Craig's clearance requires some alteration.

From thence our line runs pretty near the old Road for one mile beyond Craig's, where we found it necessary to spend a considerable time in exploring, as the road for some distance to the Southward is very hilly; we, however, after having run several lines succeeded in getting a level route by running a direct line a little to the Northward of the nine mile Tree, about half a mile of which is rather moist; it is not however unfavourable for a Road.

XXi.

From thence to the Nashwaak no material alteration can be made further than straightening the present Road and altering the hill at the four mile Brook, and the hills descending to the Nashwaak, which may be very much improved.

The most eligible site for a Bridge on the Nashwaak is a little above where the present line crosses. There is an Island in the middle of the River—the bottom firm. The bank on the East side is rather steep, but not sufficiently so to offer any material impediment to the Road.

Descending the Nashwaak the land is unfavorable for a Road, consisting of high mountains and deep valleys, and the upland in general is very stoney; there is, however, no doubt but a good Road can be made, and in addition to the alterations herein recommended there are a number of others necessary, which cannot be sufficiently explained, but must depend on the judgment of the Supervisor in charge of the Road.

From where the line crosses the Nashwaak we continued near the old Road to John Sutherland's, thence by an easy ascent up the hill back of Mume's house and along the bank in rear of M'Pherson's to join the Road near Thomas Fraser's, thence by the present Road to M'Nab's, thence in a straight direction to the Tay, about thirty chains from the mouth at a good site for a Bridge, and from thence to strike the present Road between James Sutherland's and James Bubairs'. By this alteration a number of steep hills will be avoided, including Young's, also a piece of low Intervale at the South end of Tay Bridge, which is overflowed by every high freshet.

For some distance below Bubair's part of the old Road is very objectionable, as the bank on the upper side slides down and fills up the road almost every season. 'I here is also a very dangerous hill near Ingraham's and in order to make it at all passable one side has been forced up with wood in a temporary manner. At the foot of the hill the Road passes over a low flat which is often overflowed by the River Nashwaak.

We avoid the above obstructions altogether by ascending the hill at the first Brook below Bubair's Mill Stream, thence over a good tract of land to Backster's house. There is one Brook in that district, but the banks are by no means an obstruction to claim any particular notice.

From Backster's we followed the Road to M'Niel's, thence in a direct line through clear level land to Edward Bradley's.

A small alteration is necessary, by keeping along the bank between the Baptist Meeting House and the Burying Ground, from thence our line follows nearly the courses of the Road to Edward Barret's, thence up the hollow at Beaver Dam Brook, and from thence in a straight direction to Everitt's Ferry, opposite the upper part of Fredericton.

Our next exploration was from Fredericton to the South West Branch of Miramichi River, by the Cardigan Settlement.

The first twelve miles follows the line laid out for the Royal Road, about five of which is made, the other seven is also cut out and partially stumped; from thence to the South Branch of the Tay is about five miles. The whole of this route is hard, stoney land and very hilly.

From the South Branch of the Tay to the Nashwaak is eleven miles, and although there is a good proportion of excellent land there is also a great deal of cedar swamp and a number of steep hills. The line crosses the Nashwaak at a place very unfavorable for Bridging, and the hill on the South side so high as to render it almost impracticable.

On the North side of the Nashwaak, thence towards Taxes River, a narrow Road has been opened for some distance which passes over a broken tract of land and a number of small Streams with steep Banks, thence to the Taxes there has heen a line blazed which crosses two very considerable Swamps.

Although the line between the Nashwaak and Taxes River is by no means favourable for a road there is a great proportion of good land covered with hard wood, of which Birch seems to predominate. The distance from the Nashwaak to the Taxes River is ten miles.

From the appearance of the country we had traversed, we did not think it necessary to spend much time in exploring from the Taxes to the South West Branch of Miramichi River, a distance of about sixteen miles; the land, however, bears a greater proportion

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proportion of swamp to that on the South side of Taxes River, and the line crosses several Streams, the largest of which are Hovey's and Stewart's Brooks.

Having examined the different routes, we have to state, that the line in a straight direction from Fredericton to the South West Branch of Miramichi River is by no means suitable for a road.

That the line by the Cardigan Settlement, in addition to the ground being uneven and otherwise unfavourable, would lengthen the distance from sixteen to eighteen miles.

We therefore respectfully recommend that the present line, with the alterations as represented on the Plan annexed, to which we beg leave to call your particular attention, may be adopted.

By the amended line, as proposed and laid down on the Plan, the distance from Robert Doak's to Fredericton will be upwards of six miles shorter, and the most of the steep hills and deep valleys avoided, in addition to which there will be a very great saving to the Province, besides the difference in the distance, as we are unanimously of opinion that a much better Road can be made upon this line, and for, at least, from eight hundred to one thousand pounds less expense.

All which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO EXPLORE FOR CANAL AT GRIMROSS NECK.

HE Committee appointed by this House in March last, to ascertain during the recess, the practicability and expediency of connecting the waters of the River Saint John and Gage Town Creek, by means of a Canal at or near Grimross Neck, also the best line for the said Canal, and the probable cost of completing the same, and to report thereon to this House at the next Session of the Legislature, report as follows :—

That they met by appointment for the above purpose at Grimross Neck on the 14th day of September last, the water at the river being at that time very low, and proceeded in the first place to examine the land and flats in the immediate vicinity thereof, in order to ascertain the nearest approach of the channel of the river to that of Gage Town Creek, which they found to be at or near the line of the public road, dividing the lands of Messrs. Gilbert and Vail; the soil through which the excavation would require to be made was next examined, and the banks found to be similar to the other intervale lands on the river, and the flats below the level of the water to consist of a blue clay, rather soft but very adhesive, mixed with a very small portion of very fine sand, highly favorable in the opinion of the Committee for the operation contemplated, and determined their opinion that the public road was the best line for the proposed Canal.

The level of the water was then taken on this line by Messrs. Harry and Kay, two scientific Engineers and Surveyors, whose services the Committee thought it very desirable to have on this occasion, and such other surveys and admeasurements were made by those gentlemen as the Committee deemed necessary; a difference of three inches was found to exist between the level of the waters of the river and creek, owing no doubt to the state of the tide in the creek at the time, and the distance across from eight feet depth of water in the river to the same depth in the creek, at the then very low state of the river was ascertained to be 1,054 feet; the particulars of the above survey with a plan and section of the proposed Canal was subsequently furnished the Committee by Mr. Harry, which they submit herewith.

The Committee had no means of ascertaining correctly at the time of their meeting the distance that would be saved in navigating the river by means of a Canal at this point; point; but by a subsequent admeasurement made on the ice under the direction of one of them, it was ascertained to be $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles and 12 chains, as will appear by the plan herewith submitted of the courses and distances by both routes.

The cost of completing the Canal, they think will not differ materially from the estimate of Mr. Harry, annexed to his plan, amounting to £1,900.

The Committee have no hesitation in coming to the conclusion that it is very praticable to unite the water of the River Saint John with that of Gage Town Creek, by means of a Canal at the place stated in this report, and that if the same can be effected at an expense not greatly exceeding the estimate of Mr. Harry above stated, that it would be highly expedient to do so, it appearing very obvious to them that it will afford great facilities to all description of craft plying on the river, for independent of the distance that will be saved, they will be enabled by means of the Canal to avoid the difficulties and delays they invariably encounter in the spring and autumn in that part of the river called "No Man's Friend."

It will also afford great facilities to a large part of the Parish of Gage Town and to Gage Town itself; its importance must be so obvious to every person acquainted with its locality as to make it unnecessary for the Committee to dwell thereon in this report. In conclusion, they beg leave to recommend the undertaking to the favorable consideration of the Legislature.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO EXPLORE A NEW LINE OF ROAD FROM JEMSEG TO THE FINGER BOARD.

To His Excellency Sir Archibald Campbell, Baronet, G. C. B., Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

W E, the undersigned, two of the Committee appointed to explore a new line of Road leading from Jemseg, in Queen's County, to the Finger Board, beg leave to state that they have attended to that duty, and submit as follows for your Excellency's consideration :—

We are of opinion that the newly contemplated route would be decidedly preferable to the old as the surface is generally level excepting on the North West side of Den Brook, and each side of a Stream called Big Brook, both which difficulties would be inconsiderable compared with the Hills on the present road.

Your Committee are also of opinion that the new Road should intersect the present Post Road near to Cochran's, by which means the Hills below Cochran's can, at a small expense, be avoided, and the road made more direct.

Your Committee beg leave to state that the difference in the distance in the two routes is very inconsiderable, and one of the prominent advantages in the opinion of your Committee to be gained by the contemplated alteration would be the avoiding the present difficult Ferry at the Washademoak, the distance across the present Ferry being a mile, when across the Narrows it would only be fifty rods.

Your Committee would beg leave to submit the annexed Plan of their Survey, which will exhibit the subject more explicitly.

REPORT OF DEPUTY BLAIR'S EXPLORATION FOR A NEW LINE OF ROAD FROM FREDERICTON TO BEND OF PETICOUDIAC.

Fredericton, 21st October, 1835.

GREEABLY to your instructions I have explored a line for a Road and Settlement, from the mouth of the River Nashwaak to the Bend of Peticoudiac River, and beg to submit the following Report :-

After leaving the mouth of the Nashwaak I proceeded on a wood road which led my course three miles, and which, Mr. Barker informed me, would take me, so far, on the best line that could be found. From the end of this road, I proceeded East. by the Magnet, for the head of the Grand Lake, and came to Newcastle River, near half a mile below Bailey's Ferry.

From the mouth of the Nashwaak, for nearly five miles, the land is broken by small though steep Hills, which, however, can be avoided by departing from the course of the line a very short distance. Twelve miles from Fredericton a deep hollow intersected my line, with a small Stream running through it; the bank on the West side being formed by high perpendicular rocks; on the East side by a hill. After exploring Northward, up this Stream more than a mile, and finding it impassable, I returned and found a suitable place for a road to cross, a quarter of a mile below my line. The Country is nearly level from this to within two miles of Little River. when it descends rapidly towards that Stream; but not sufficiently steep to prevent a good Road being obtained. Hitherto I found the land will admit settling, being principally hard wood. After ascending a hill, from Little River, I found the Country level to Newcastle River. This tract will admit of settling about four miles. From this river Westward, the land between Newcastle and Salmon Rivers is low and unfit for cultivation: it, however, will admit of a good Road being made through it. The soil is also of an inferior quality between Newcastle and Coal Creck; a good road, however, can be had between these Streams; leaving Coal Creek, for about four miles Eastward, the Country is hilly, but suitable for settling, after which it becomes level, and swampy, in various places for near seven miles: the land is then higher and mostly proper for settling to within two miles West of the West Branch of New Canaan River; from thence to New Canaan Settlement it is mostly unfit for cultivation, being chiefly sandy, and the woods destroyed by fire, but affords a good tract for Road. From Humphrey's Mill Stream to New Canaan Ferry a Road is already made through the Settlement, a distance of five and half Leaving New Canaan River I found the land suitable for Road, but princimiles. pally unfit for cultivation to three miles beyond the Eastern Branch of that Stream. The banks of that River are generally high and rugged, but will admit a Road to cross about a quarter of a mile below my line. Found a good tract for Road from East Branch of New Canaan to North River; it is also level and fitting for settle-After exploring about seven miles from the North River towards the Bend of ment. Peticoudiac, and finding the land mostly sunken and wet, I concluded the Road from North River to the Post Road, which is made and pretty passable, the best tract and the most eligible that can be obtained, and therefore returned. Being satisfied with the line from New Canaan to North River, as explored, I returned through Butternut Ridge to New Canaan Settlement on my line, or in its vicinity, to Fredericton, remarking as I passed, the necessary deviations from the line I had run. I beg to refer you, Sir, for further information to the accompanying Plan, in which I have endeavoured to lay down the most suitable courses of the line which I blazed through. I have noticed in the Margin of the Plan, for it appeared to me necessary that the line leading from one object to another on my route should be adhered to, and only by exploration and enquiry to ascertain the most proper places where the Road should depart from that line. You will observe, Sir, that by the routes I have followed, a Ferry will be required on Salmon River. That this inconvenience may be avoided it will be necessary that the Road should pass to the Northward of my D line,

line, at least seven miles, which will add to the distance not less than five miles. How far the line sketched on the Plan may be found answerable for this purpose I am not prepared to say, not having explored it. It is, however, the opinion of the people I conversed with on this subject, that Salmon River will have to be crossed by Ferry. It may be proper to observe, that a Road from the Ferry on New Canaan through Butternut Ridge is now made passable for Wheel Carriages to the Post Road, and might be used at present, by repairing, at less cost than would open the new Road to the North River, by fifty pounds per mile; but this route, I beg leave to say, is by no means so desirable as that explored, leading direct to North River, and from hence to the Post Road at A., the latter line being well adapted for Road and settlement, and the distance being shorter by 64 miles, the distances from New Canaan Ferry being 24 and 173 miles. I subjoin, Sir, for your information, the probable cost of bridging those Streams crossed by the contemplated Road, computed from the situation and breadth of those Streams. There are several other small Brooks intersecting this line, and marked on the Plan, but the cost of bridging them will be very triffing.



REPORT FROM COMMISSIONER TO EXPLORE ROAD FROM SALMON RIVER TO RICHIBUCTO.

Richibucto, 1st February, 1836.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY, N undertaking the office of Commissioner for exploring a communication between the inhabited parts of Salmon River and the highest connected settlements of the Richibucto, with so disproportionate an inadequacy of funds as the amount voted by the Legislature, and under the additional and unlooked-for disadvantage of nearly one half of even that sum not forthcoming in consequence of the omission of it in the Appropriation Bill, I was guided by circumstances which in their operation were quite imperative on my most strenuous exertions. In the first place, Your Excellency feeling a strong interest in every public measure which conduces directly or remotely to the prosperity of the country, was well known to entertain the most favorable ideas of the projected communication as affording a means for furthering in a powerful manner the best interests of the country, by opening an internal trade between two sides of the Province, which, in regard to navigation, are so physically dissevered—and in which philanthropic views several distinguished persons, near to Your Excellency, coincided. In the speculations on foot as to the most desirable mode of communication, many individuals eminent for their station and for their high scientific attainments were led to form sanguine anticipations of the benefits likely to accrue from the construction of a Canal by that route, and the mercantile public with a characteristic boldness proposed a steam communication by a rail way direct from the extremity of unimpeded navigation on the eastern shore to that in the interior of the Province. I was led then to undertake a duty so arduous at a season of the year so inclement, in obedience to Your Excellency's appointment under a Resolution of the Legislature-a duty which ought to be incumbent on all. In the second place, several distinguished individuals looked upon a Canal route with a high degree of favour; and lastly the public entertained a strong predilection for a Rail road. The union of all these objects could be promoted and maintained in respect to the exploration with but little additional expenditure, and as I had been honored by the selection of Your Excellency, I felt strongly emulous of doing justice to the appointment and of giving satisfaction to all classes of my fellow subjects, by furnishing information relative to their own particular views and interests.

My plan, imperfect as I have been compelled to make it, will demonstrate to Your Excellency the nature of the country over which any kind of communication which may be determined upon will pass; but I have to observe generally, that the River Richibucto and Salmon River flow through a level and not highly elevated tract of land, extending in a plain from the Grand Lake to the shores of the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, unbroken by a single ridge of lofty land, unobstructed by a single lake, undeformed by a single precipitous ravine. For twenty five miles from its source Salmon River flows in a placid course through this plain, over a shingly but not a rocky bed, confined by banks not exceeding in general fifteen feet from the surface of its waters; and no appearance meets the eye during its whole extent to lead a person to suppose that any part of that plain, even near the source of the river, is higher than the summit of the ridge which confines that great inland basin, the Grand Lake, on the one side, and the Tide waters of the Richibucto on the other. The Richibucto which rises on the northerly part of the same plain, and pursues its course in a parallel but contrary direction to the middle part of Salmon River, has found passage through a softer and more permeable structure, and it has consequently formed for itself a deeper channel-or valley-through which it precipitates its waters with a rapidity increased by the shortness and directness of its course. This fact is confirmed by the bed of Trout Brook, a tributary to the Richibucto at its confluence with the tide, which runs throughout the greater part of its course in a deep ravine, and derives its source from the banks of Salmon River at a part where for the distance of several miles not a brook nor rill appeared to fall into it. Preposterous as such an idea may appear, yet the appearances of the land actually warrant the supposition, that if a ditch

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ditch not exceeding three fourths of a mile in length were led from that part of Salmon River to the head of Trout Brook, the waters of the former River would flow indifferently through the Richibucto to sweep away its oyster beds and deepen the bar at its entrance, or as hitherto to swell the lazy floods which stagnate on the shores of Salmon Bay and the head of the Grand Lake. Neither of these Rivers nor any of the tributaries appear to derive a descent from the inequality of the land, but solely from the action of its waters in the course of ages, and which hypothesis necessarily implies an increasing rapidity from the impetus gained by an increasing depth of bed, and, who knows, but from an also increasing length of course and volume of water.

No lateral ridges in manifestation of a valley are seen on either branch of Salmon River above the embouchuse of the Tyne or Lake stream and Black's river on the Little Fork stream; the elevation indeed on either side even so low in its course is very inconsiderable, and in many places imperceptible to the eye; but when on the summit, at a short distance from the River, nothing occurs to break the level, which would be uniform but for the recurrence of a few isolated sandy ridges, affording growth for abundance of Pine, and elevated in perpendicular heighth scarcely more than from six to twenty feet.

Below the Tay on the lower Fork stream, the River assumes a bolder aspect, rushing with greater rapidity over its shingly and much widened bed, sweeping gracefully round more elevated projections of rocky soil, passing the mills and falling into the low submerged lands below the mouth of the Gaspereaux.

If Salmon River were converted into a Canal navigable for steam vessels, I am of opinion that the banks have tenacity and solidity to withstand the effect created by the paddles. I have before observed that the sub-soil possesses a much harder texture than the soft free stone which forms the base of the Richibucto, although even the latter I am fully persuaded is amply indurated to resist the action of *such* a power; and when I have described the banks of Salmon River as low, I mean that they are sufficiently high beyond all doubt to contain the water accumulated by dams and locks, and hard enough for the security of such erections. The Richibucto above the tide is a smaller River with higher and steeper banks, and is more rapid in its current, but no obstruction to the formation of anavigable Canal exists throughout its course to its confluence with the tide.

For a Rail way to connect the deep and navigable tide waters of the Richibucto with the unobstructed navigation for Vessels of seven feet draught on Salmon River, on a line direct from the Point opposite the Episcopal Church of Weldford to M'Donald's on Salmon River, no other obstacle occurs than the following : the ravine of Trout brook, that of a small branch of Hudson's brook, the necessity for a bridge over Hudson's brook, which however would be attended with triffing expense, the same of Salmon River at the Ox-bow, the Tyne, and a few smaller streams. An ascent varying from half a mile to two miles may be found to rise the summit of 200 to 250 feet on the Richibucto, whence to M'Donald's, except the two little ravines above mentioned, nothing occurs to break the uniform level, and where the same easy descent is presented. I do not mean, however, to assert that such an ascent may be found exactly on the line connecting these points, especially on the Richibucto, although on the Salmon River side, a little above or below M'Donald's, a very easy ascent may be found of two or three miles without perceptible deviations from the direct line. The elevation of the heights on Salmon River is about the same as those on the Richibucto.

Trifling as even these obstacles are, a route may be readily found to turn all the obstructions which the branches of the Richibucto offer, by inclining the line rather higher on the Ox-bow of Salmon River, and where a bridge or viaduct would of course be rather less expensive, passing the very source of Trout brook as well as Hudson's brook, and then following the summit level between the two great branches of the Richibucto, and fall into the south branch two miles shorter in route, and where a depth of seven feet of water at all times will be found, or to proceed to the Point of Richibucto as laid down in the plan.

A Rail way on the line first above described will be forty five miles and a half in length from deep and unimpeded navigation at either extreme. It has indeed been suggested No. 10.

suggested by many persons of sound judgment and unimpeached skill, to extend the navigation a distance of a mile or more on either of the branches of the Richibucto. and three or four miles on Salmon River. In the spring and autumn when the waters of Saint John's River are above their summer level, the superfluity of the Grand Lake finds little egress through the Jemseg. From York Point a short distance below the Gaspereaux, the right bank, more particularly of Salmon River, is lower by ten feet than the level of the ordinary floods of the Saint John, and this causes those lands to remain submerged for three weeks or a longer time during the prevalence of the freshets. No current is perceptible in this large estuary, and no impediment to navigation exists except in the inequalities of the channel of the River. A shoal a short distance above M'Donald's obstructs the passage for vessels of a greater draught than five feet at the lowest level of the waters of the Grand Lake, and another which forms a continuation of the lower point of The Mistake across the whole bed of the River, affords even a less depth. At the spring and autumn floods, vessels of a large draught may proceed up the River nearly four miles above M'Donald's, and may olten during even the summer as far as the red bank; but to form a channel through these shoals would, I am of opinion, call for a greater expenditure than a few additional miles of Rail road. By the adoption however of craft of a peculiar construction, the Rivers at both extremities may be without danger ascended higher than the Points above mentioned, and a saving in expenditure equal to the cost of at least six miles of Rail way would be thereby gained. It is my firm opinion, nevertheless, that the most advisable course to pursue would be to take advantage of certain and ordinary navigation, and to continue the land passage from M'Donald's on the one side to the Point of Richibucto on the other, at either of which places bold water is to be found close to the landing place.

With respect to fuel for the use of steam vessels or carriages, I have great pleasure in stating that Coal abundant in quantity and valuable in quality crops out of the banks of the south branch of the Richibucto contiguous to the proposed line of Rail road, and on Salmon River at Cast-away Island strong indications of that valuable fossil exist, and in the Gaspereaux it is found in lumps in the channel of the River. At Long creek, only four miles from M'Donald's, a mine has been for some time past in efficient operation, furnishing abundance of that mineral of a quality superior to any in the Province, and is in great requisition among the Steamers at Saint John.

Hepatic springs, quite as efficacious I have no doubt as any of the Spa waters of the new world, and which attract to their fountains so many visitors as firm in their belief of their revivifying qualities as the devotees of Buddh or Hindoo worship, are to be found in both Rivers for the advantage of future speculators.

It becomes my duty also to state, that in regard to the navigation of the Rivers forming the subject of this Report at those times when it may be expected to close in the autuann and re-open in the spring, nothing unusual occurs to call for parti-The Richibucto is open for navigation quite as early as it is safe for cular remark. vessels to appear in the Gulf, and on Salmon River the ice yields at the same time as that on Saint John's River. It will often happen that the surface of the latter River will congeal a week or a fortnight earlier than the tide waters of the Richibucto, but before the middle of November no danger is likely to accrue from the severity of the weather by closing Vessels in, and that event in the ordinary course of the seasons may be looked for only about the 20th of that month. The Richibucto seldom freezes until the first week in December, at which time all navigation in the Gulf with any prospect of safety entirely ceases. So early as the middle of April I have very frequently seen an entirely open channel throughout the whole course of the tide-a period much too early for Vessels to navigate the Gulf without extreme danger.

With regard to the construction of a common road, unconnected with any speculative views—with reference alone to the objects of communication by the ordinary modes of travelling, and for rural purposes, I have the honor to observe, that as the funds at my disposal were it will doubtless be readily admitted too small to enable me to lay out such a communication, my duty is confined solely to a recommendation.

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From the thorough exploration which the neighbourhood of Salmon River on either banks as well as the Richibucto has undergone, I have no hesitation in stating to Your Excellency my opinion, that such a road should be formed on the south side of the former River in the manner designated on my plan; to which conclusion I have been led by the following circumstances: Beyond all doubt the land on the left bank is better adapted for cultivation, the level is more uniform, the soil is not so inclinable to rock, miry swamps, barren tracts and mossy plains are less frequent, the rivers and brooks to be crossed are less difficult, much fewer bridges will be requisite, the route is more direct, and it will form a continuation of the practicable highways on the Grand Lake and the inhabited parts of Salmon River.

I consider it my duty in conclusion to state, that by repeated observations during the survey by equal altitudes of the Sun, I ascertained the variation of the Needle to be 18 degrees west, without any perceptible increase or diminution.

To the Honorable Thomas Baillie, Commissioner of Crown Lands and Surveyor General.

HE Report of a line of route actually run and measured from the head of Oak Bay in the County of Charlotte, to the mouth of Eel River on the Saint John, most respectfully sets forth, that in obedience to your Honor's orders, I proceeded on the said line of route for a road leading through that section of the Country to the Parish of Woodstock, with a party of seven men, as follows :---

Two Chainmen, two Axemen, three Luggagemen, seven in number.

I started from the head of Oak Bay on the road leading through the Parish of Saint David's and continued on the said road to Valentine Sherman's, that distance being already made. I took my departure through the woods, bearing north west, to avoid a large tract of burnt and heathy ground, and thence continued north until I struck the waters of the main Digdeguash, through that distance, being nearly twenty miles. The Country is remarkably level, crossing the west branch of the Digdeguash at an excellent site for a bridge; I then continued north and hit the river, not being aware that it bore so much to the west; I thought proper to make an actual Survey to the head of the river which gave the position, the land on the west side still continuing level, except one moderate ridge.

North of the head of the Digdeguash there is a very extensive tract of hard wood which connects with the 2d Little Digdeguash Lake; the greatest difficulty would be to avoid the 2d Lake, 4th Lake and pleasant Lake, which is only to be done by bearing to the eastward, as per yellow line on the plan; thence to the east of Pleasant Mountain, and west of Cranbery Mountain, east of the 4th east Digdeguash Lake; thence following east and west of the Palphrey Highlands; thence north to the Howard settlement, and through it to within a mile and a half of Eel River; thence bear to the eastward, bringing the road between two high Hills, down to the mouth of Eel River;

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River, where there is a most favorable site for a Bridge, being only 112 feet across from bank to bank; for some distance south of the Howard settlement, and on to Eel River, I consider the land most favorable for a road—indeed all the way through being an exact distance of 56 miles, there is no difficulty worth mentioning, and I think there is not a more judicious line of route for a road than this; but I should most highly recommend that at a more favorable season of the year the same should be reexamined, and the greatest care taken to establish the best ground for a road.

Many people have an idea that this contemplated road should pass to the west side of Mount Henry, which is very high and conspicuous, and so continue up east of the Palphrey Brook; but I am so well acquainted with the land adjoining the Palphrey Stream, that I consider it would be almost impossible to make a road there, owing to the immense rocks and rocky land; but individuals are inclined to study their private interests instead of the public good, which obliges me to mention this disposition on their part.

I beg leave to state to your Honor, that owing to the extensive surveys I had to make this fall and winter, it became late before I could commence. I humbly trust your Honor will excuse my not being able to accomplish this before, and that the accompanying plan as well as the report may meet the approbation of His Excellency and your Honor.

The balance charged as due in 1884, was chiefly for a charge made for weighing or returning packages of Dried Fruit at 2d. per cask and package, and a similar charge is made in the account for Weighing, &c. the same article in 1835. Your Committee are of opinion that the claim made by Mr. Chaloner for this service is greater than can be sustained, as in some instances it amounts to half the duty, and they therefore recommend that some specific amount be annually allowed him for weighing and returning Fruit, and that at the same time it be extended to Loaf and Brown Sugar, and Coffee, and any other articles that may now or hereafter be subject to duty, and which may require such weighing and returning, and he will then be confined to his annual charge against the Province for gauging only.
