

Schulz, author of "Peanuts", we learn that happiness is a warm puppy and security is a thumb and a blanket. From James G. Donlevy, Golden Bears' head coach, we learn that satisfaction is beating Simon Fraser University Clansmen in a football game.

Donlevy described U of A's 30-18 victory last Saturday at Varsity Stadium as "The next best thing to winning the college bowl

Although it was an exhibition game there was as much riding on it as any league contest. Simon Fraser was defer ling its choice to stay out of the Western Intercollegiate Football League and compete instead as an independent entry in U.S. small college ranks. With their athletic scholarships, Clansmen have been touted by some sports writers as the best Canadian intercollegiate football team.

Fryer streaking down the middle and the halfback outran everyone to the end zone.

Alberta's 9-1 lead was cut to 9-8 at the end of the first quarter on a four yard pass from quarterback Nelson Ryan to Sean Sullivan and Passaglia's convert.

Bears came back with Brian Adam's four yard pass reception and Schwartzberg's convert and 29-yard field goal to lead 19-8 at halftime

In the third quarter U of A seemed to let down and SFU was quick to take advantage. Clansmen's defence hemmed Bears deep in their own end by intercepting three passes. Kunyk was forced to concede two safety touches, once when a third down snap flew over his head into the end zone.

another single to increase Bears' lead to 20-18. Widynowski had an outstanding game, partially blocking another punt and intercepting two passes.

Fryer put the game out of reach on another streak out of the backfield for a 91 yard touchdown pass play at 12:30. Schwartzberg conpleted the scoring with another single and a 26 yard field goal.

Bears won by virtue of their all-around team effort. Despite an injury list that goes into double figures they found a way to do the job. Missing from the line-up were the regulars on crutches: Larry Tibble, Terry Cairns and Ewachniuk. Middle Mike linebacker Bill Evans was out with a knee injury so Tom Towns was converted from fullback to take his place. Towns, who had never played linebacker before, went both ways for much of the game because Smarsh limped off several times on a bruised leg. Corner linebacker, Mike MacLeod, who desperately wants to play, was still sidelined with his charley horse. Flanker Roy Beechey missed his second consecutive game with an ankle injury

Two other Bears, cornerback Gary Wilson and linebacker Jamie Steer, hadn't practiced all week but came up strong on Saturday. Wilson, who

intercepted two passes against SFU, is still suffering from a head injury he sustained in the Saskatchewan game and Steer has a neck injury. Earlier in the week doctors suspected Steer had a fractured vertebra but when x-rays showed no sign of breakage he was allowed to play.

After the game Clansmen co-head Bob De Julius said his

west coast football players to choose UBC over SFU without the benefits of scholarships.

Meanwhile in Bears' dressing room the players were taking pride in their victory and complimenting their teammates' efforts. The atmosphere was one of complete satisfaction.

In upcoming WIFL action this weekend, U of A will host Calgary at 2 p.m. in Varsity Stadium and UBC Thunderbirds will visit Winnipeg to take on Manitoba.

Bears wanted to prove that the WIFL was competitive with any school in Canada. The result was a hard-hitting game that several times almost broke into a fight.

SFU opened the scoring with Lui Passaglia's single off a wide field goal at 3'14 of the first quarter. Bears replied with Jack Schwartzberg's 19 yard field goal and halfback Brian Fryer's 74 yard touchdown pass-and-run.

Fryer's big play was the result of an audible by quarterback Gerald Kunyk. Kunyk sent Dalton Smarsh and Fryer out of the backfield on a pattern that had netted Smarsh a 69 yard gain on Bears' first play. When Clansmen's defence converged on Smarsh, Kunyk hit Following an interception by Steve Gelley and his return to Alberta's 18 yard line, Ryan: hit split end Dave Kaduhr in the endzone for a touchdown that made the score 19-18 after three quarters.

A series of plays early in the fourth period indicated Bears' determination to keep their lead. On third down at his own 24-yard line Kunyk kicked a 48 yard punt to get Alberta out of tough field position. However, the play was called back on an offisde penalty and Kunyk had to punt again, this time from his 19.

He responded with a 52-yarder and U of A's tacklers hustled downfield again to drop Passaglia at SFU's 35 yard line. But a holding penalty wiped out that punt as well.

On third-and-26 from his 9, Kunyk boomed a 58-yarder and the coverage pinned Passaglia at his 48. With efforts like that there was no way Alberta was going to be beaten.

Shortly afterward Gary Widynowski blocked a Clansmen punt and Schwartzberg kicked

Defensive end Brian Jones rested his twisted ankle and was replaced by Leon Lyszkiewicz, playing his first game.

Safety Dave Kates almost made it to game-time but he suffered muscle spasms during the pre-game warmup and had to be helped into the dressing room.

team did not play as well as it can. He felt that his defensive linemen were hampered by the Canadian rules and that Ryan had a sub-par passing performance.

De Julius realized his team's loss of prestige due to Alberta's victory. There was a lot of pressure on SFU to maintain its undefeated record against Canadian Universities. "We had everything to lose and nothing to gain," as De Julius put it.

When asked if Bears' win would cause SFU to consider joining the WIFL De Julius replied that it was unlikely. He felt that if Clansmen had to give up their athletic scholarships as WIFL rules require "...football would not survive at Simon Fraser."

According to De Julius the school's small population (about 6,000 students) and limited academic offerings would cause

Returning for their third year are Kathy Moore and Wendy Martin - Panda's top scorer last year. Yvonne Shea, Diane Chisholm, Deena Mitchell and Yetta Scheunhage are second year pacers.

Of particular interest is the remarkable return of Scheunhage who received severe head injuries inflicting partial paralysis from a traffic accident early last season. It was thought that she would never walk, let alone participate in sports!

Last year, Pandas placed fifth with four wins, 16 losses behind the Universities of British Columbia, Saskatchewan, Lethbridge and Victoria.

Calgary pitted for sixth in the final standings of the Canada West University Athletic Association.

"Undoubtedly, U.B.C. will provide the stiffest competition again," commented Broderick, "but with the addition of consistent strength, taller players, a better planned schedule, and a high team spirit. we should fare a good chance against them."

Pandas face six games before Christmas, the remaining 14 after. "The schedule allows two weeks for practice after the mid-session break, which is just great," added Broderick.

Pandas first exhibition series will go in Calgary, November 2nd and 3rd at the Women's Invitational Tournament. Featured cagers will be from the Universities of Simon Fraser, Brandon, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Calgary as well as Edmonton.

First home game will be against the University of Lethbridge Pronghorns - Nov. 30 - Dec. 1st, 6:30 p.m., Main Gym.

The "oldie," Barry Mitchelson has returned to his familiar habitat as coach of the Bear squad after a year's sabitical at the University of Iowa where he obtained his doctorate in administration.

Bob Bain, a former Bear under Mitchelson, took over the reins and carried the Alberta hoopsters to the Canada West University Athletic Association title.

Despite the absence, Mitchelson's basic philosophy of coaching remains constant - that is the system is adapted to the personnel. "The first prerequisite is the

player must accept the constraints of that team," added Mitchelson. Further, "the faster the club, the more open the game; therefore, we adjust according to the situation."

Of the ten rookies, six have graduated directly from high school competition whilst four have previous varsity-college experience.

Mitchelson is extremely pleased with their performance so far - "We have a good crop of players from high school. Let's fact it - anyone who has been selected to the team has the potential to play or else he would not have placed." Returning from last year's

Returning from last year's C.W.U.A.A. champions are Mike Frisby, Steve Panteluk, Tom Solyom, Wally Tollestrup, Dave Holland and Terry Valeriote. Panteluk and Valeriote are second year pacers with Holland a third (one year Junior Varsity), and the remainder fourth.

Frisby and Panteluk are here on scholarships.

Bears have been put through a rigorous training session the past few weeks in preparation for the regular 20 game schedule in addition to several exhibition series including the annual Klondike Classic during the Christmas repast.

Commented Mitchelson, "Everyone has worked extremely hard and well in camp - I could not have asked for better co-operation from the individuals concerned. And Wally (Tollestrup) has had just a fantastic camp."

fantastic camp." "The most promising prospects appear to be Leonard Daviduk (M.E. Lazerte) and Bob Nodwell (Scona). Both appear to be excellent on the pivot."

The remaining troopers include John Balderson (McGrath), James Cornish (McNally-Mount Royal), Rick Johnson (Bears' Junior Varsity), Gerald Mancini (Ross Shepherd), Scott Lawrie and Rick Nilson both from Scona.

William Hamilton and Steve Ignatavicius are three year vets from Waterloo Warriors.

Another former Golden Bear great, Marty Lyons who coached Junior Varsity last season, will be assisting Mitchelson.

Currently, Bears are preparing for the Tri-University Classic at Calgary, November 2nd and 3rd.


In later action, Debbie Crawford, Seaborn and Martin potted singles to sink Victoria 2-1 and tie U.B.C. 1-1. The Round Robin



Halfback Brian Fryer sparked Golden Bears' offence against Simon Fraser with two touchdowns on passes covering 74 and 91 yards. For the afternoon Fryer caught three passes for 165 yards and carried 12 times for 47 yards. The second year physical education student had a simple explanation for Bear's victory. Clansmen never had a chance because "We were so up for the game." Offensive tackle Jim Drummond is impressed with the way Fryer is developing as a football player. "Give him another year and he's going to tear up the league." As one of the leading ground-gainers in the WIFL he's not doing too badly this year. His speed makes him a threat to break any game open in one play.


