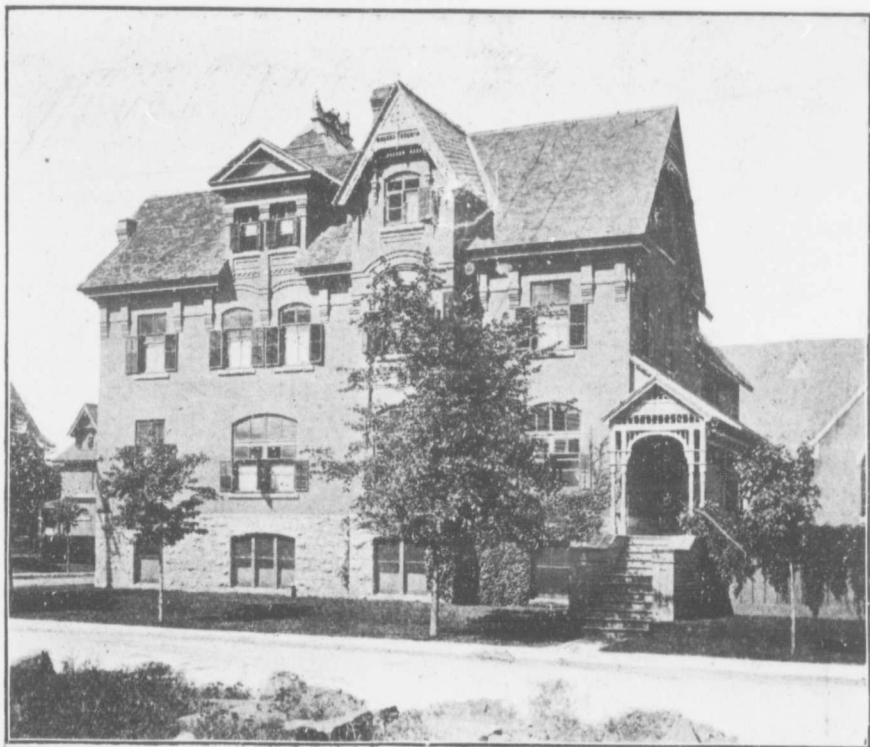

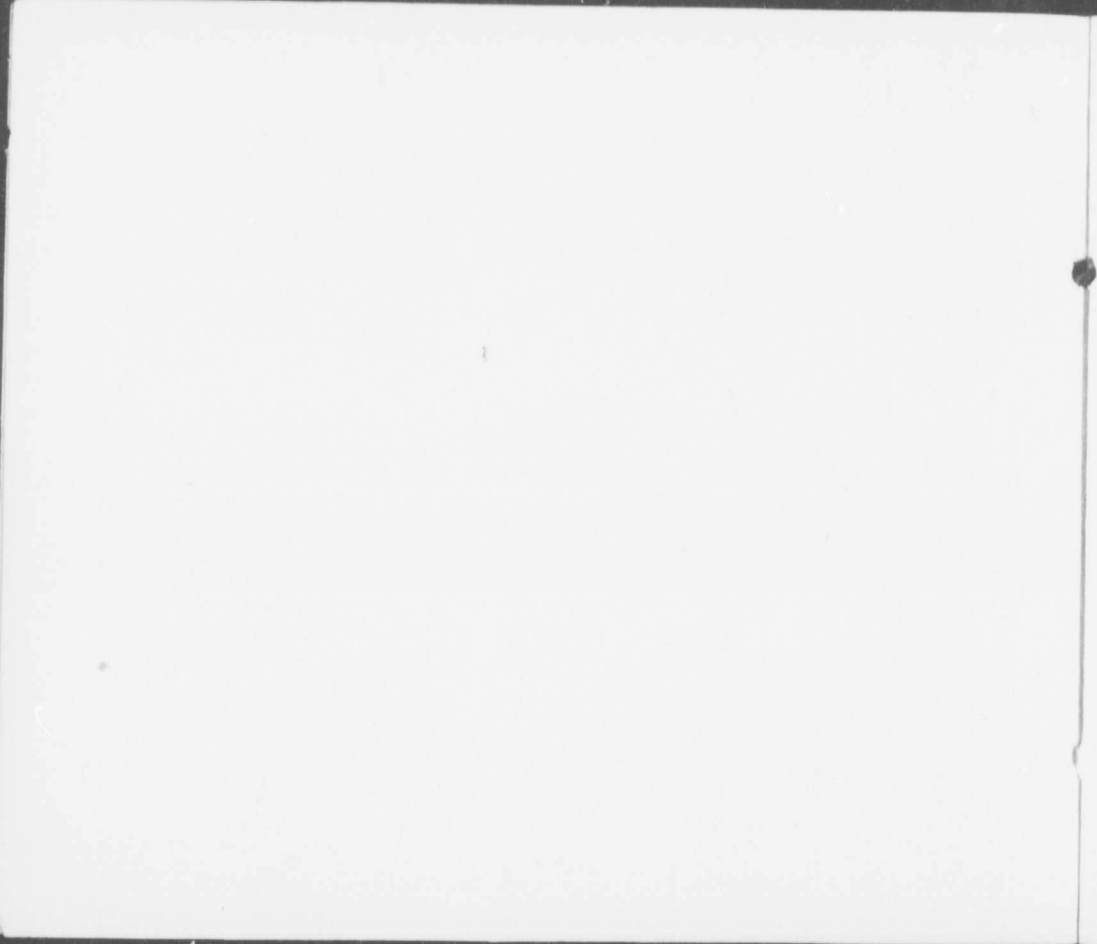

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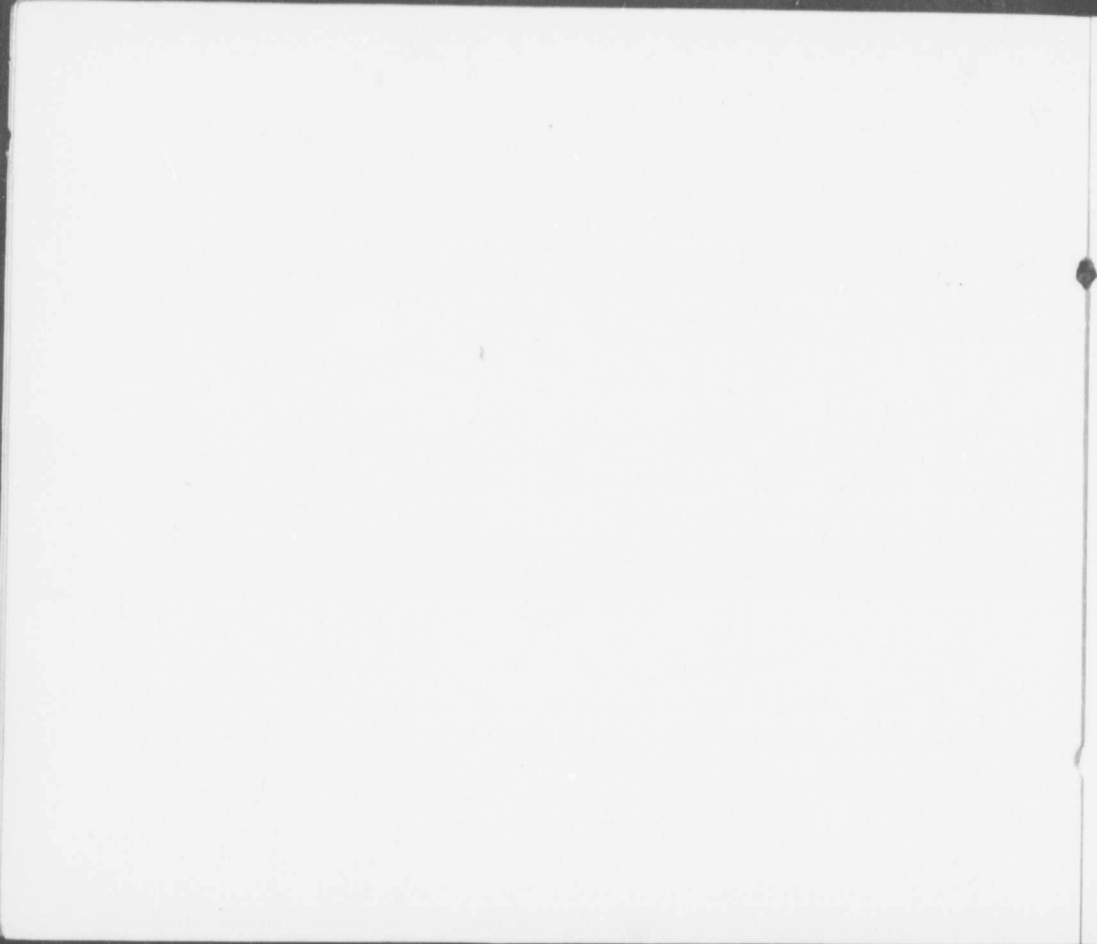

The staff is composed of women of experience and refinement, who will endeavour to fit their pupils for meeting the demands of after-life by imparting a desire for thoroughness of scholastic work, cultivating a pleasing and dignified manner, and inculcating a high sense of duty and responsibility.



The sanitary condition of the school is perfect ; the heating is by steam, the lighting by electricity.

The health and physical comfort of each pupil will be specially considered. Every effort will be made to render the school pleasant and homelike. As far as possible the methods of instruction will be such as to make the acquisition of knowledge interesting and attractive.

In each class a due portion of the time will be set apart for the reverent study of the Bible ; and throughout the work emphasis will be laid upon the necessity for uprightness of thought and action.

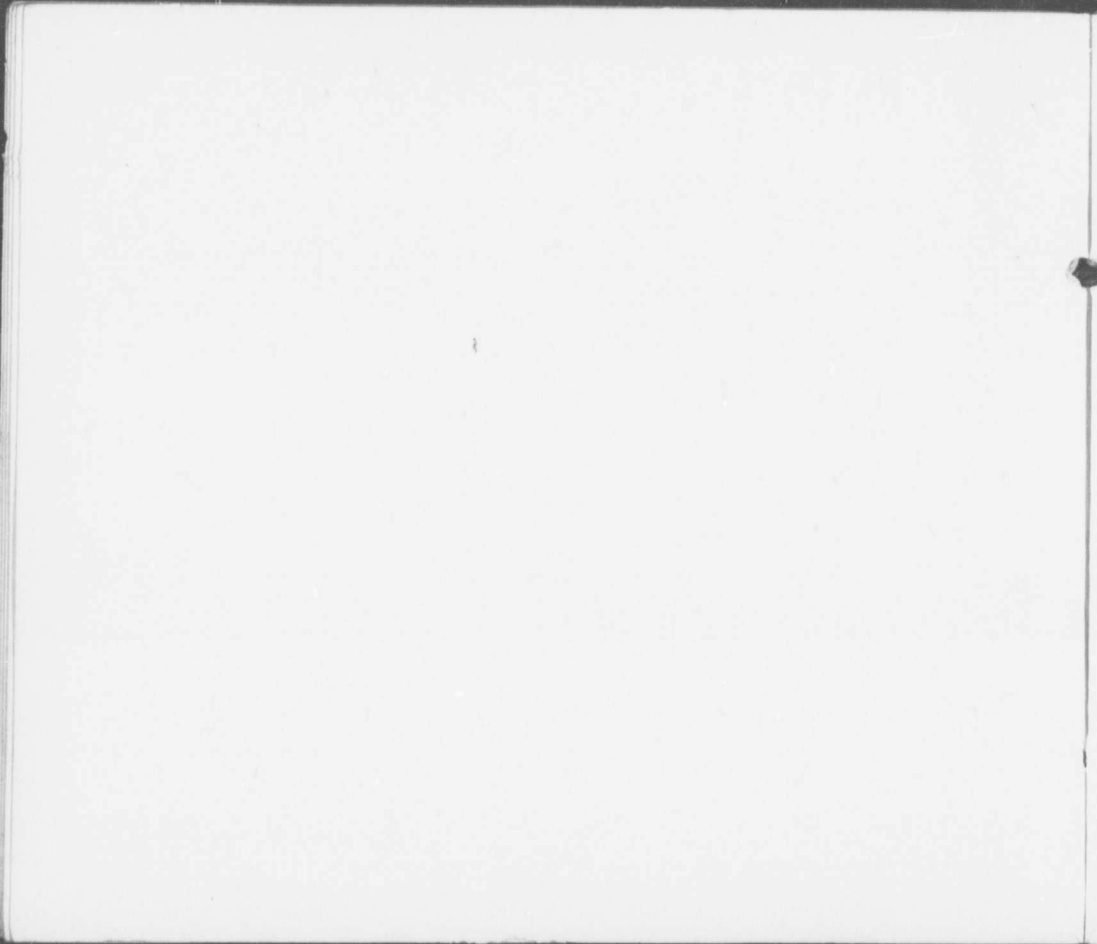

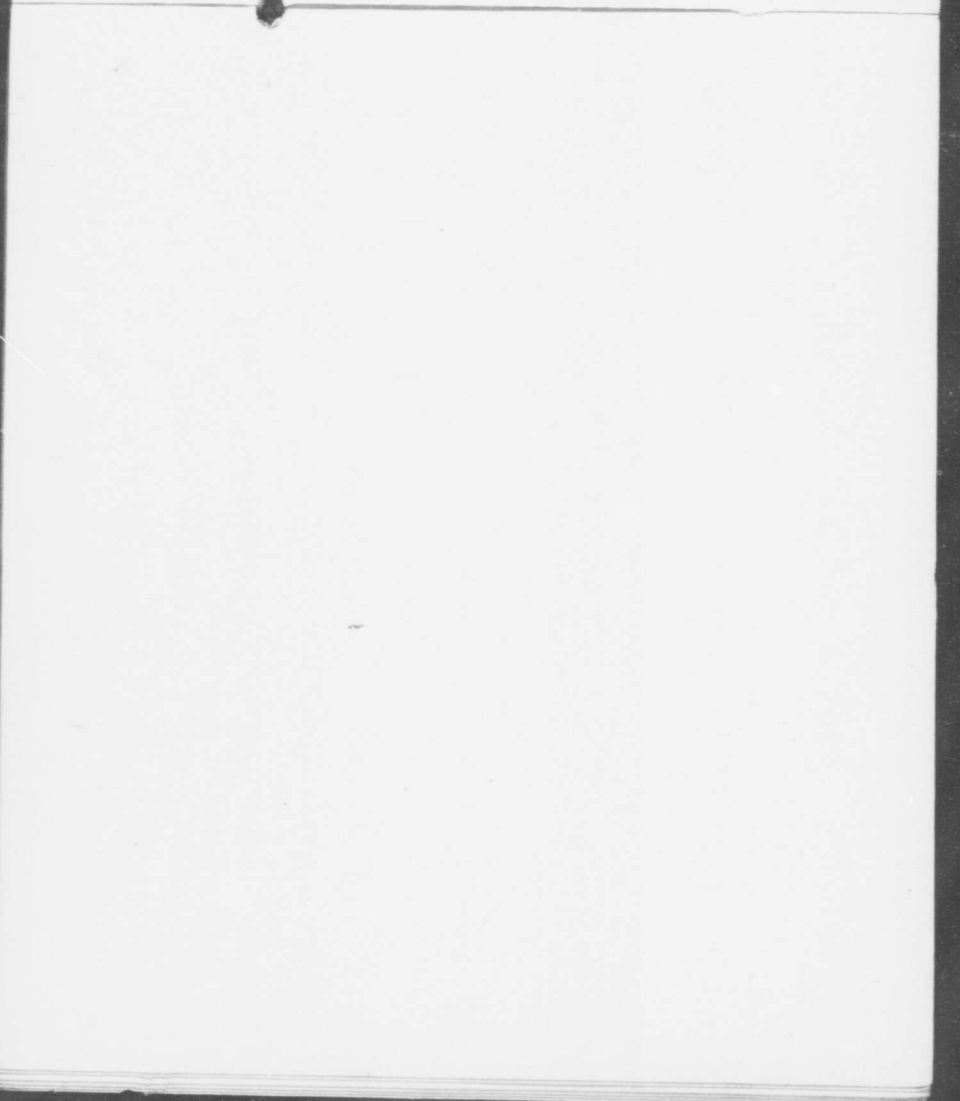
GENERAL COURSE IN ENGLISH, MATHEMATICS AND LATIN.

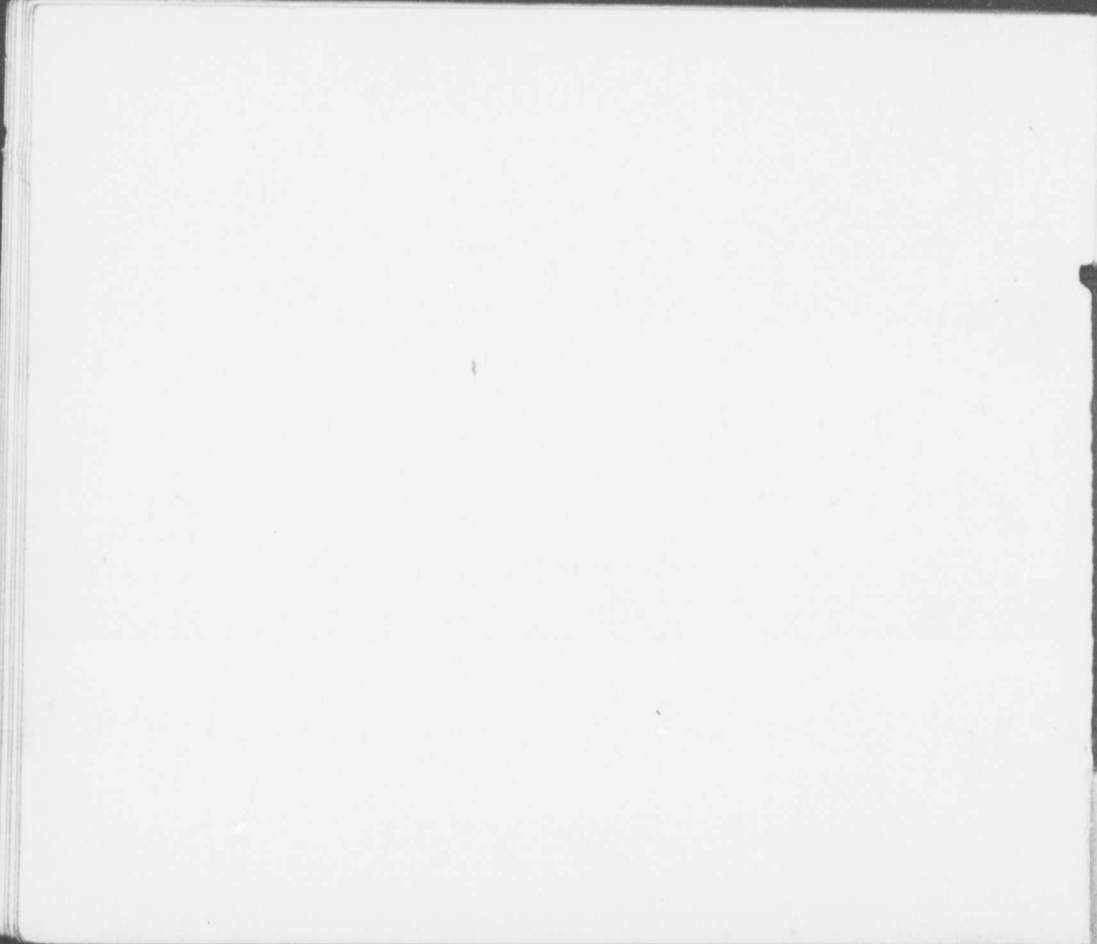

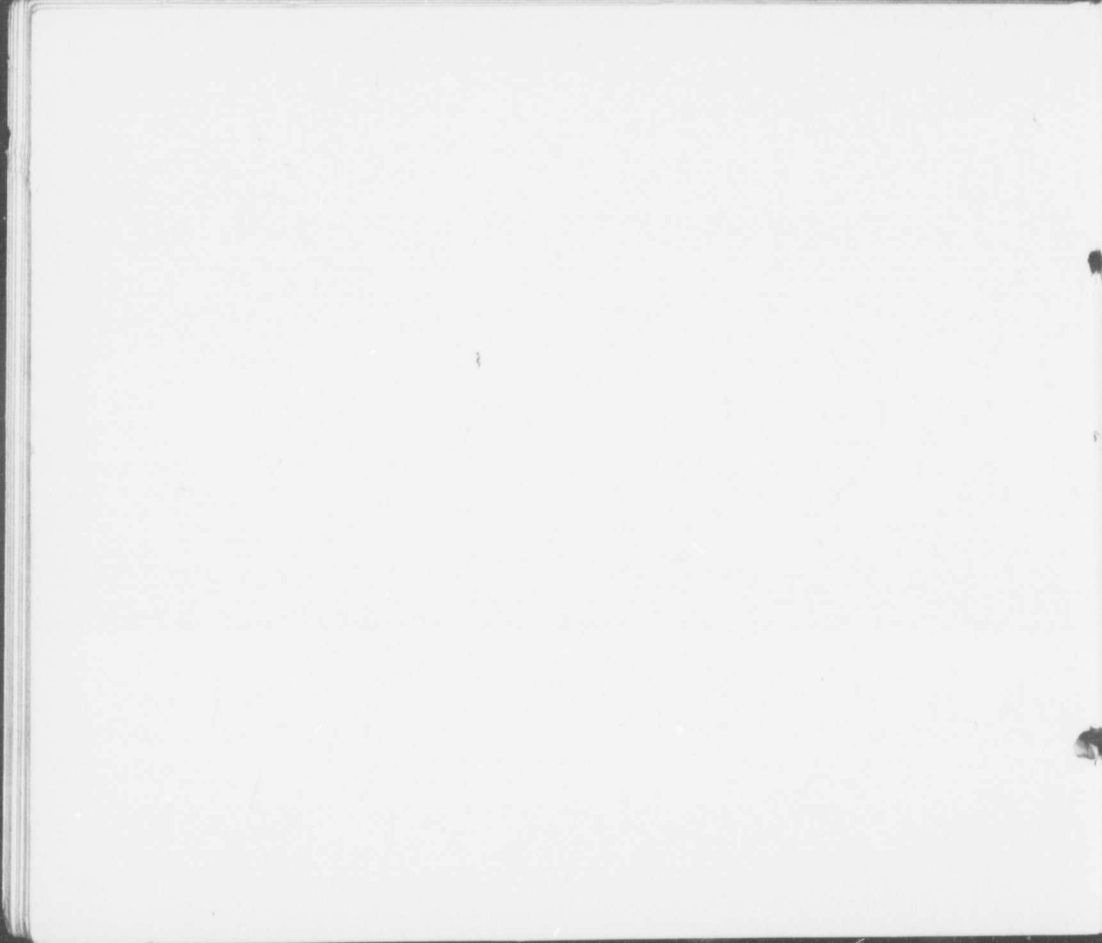

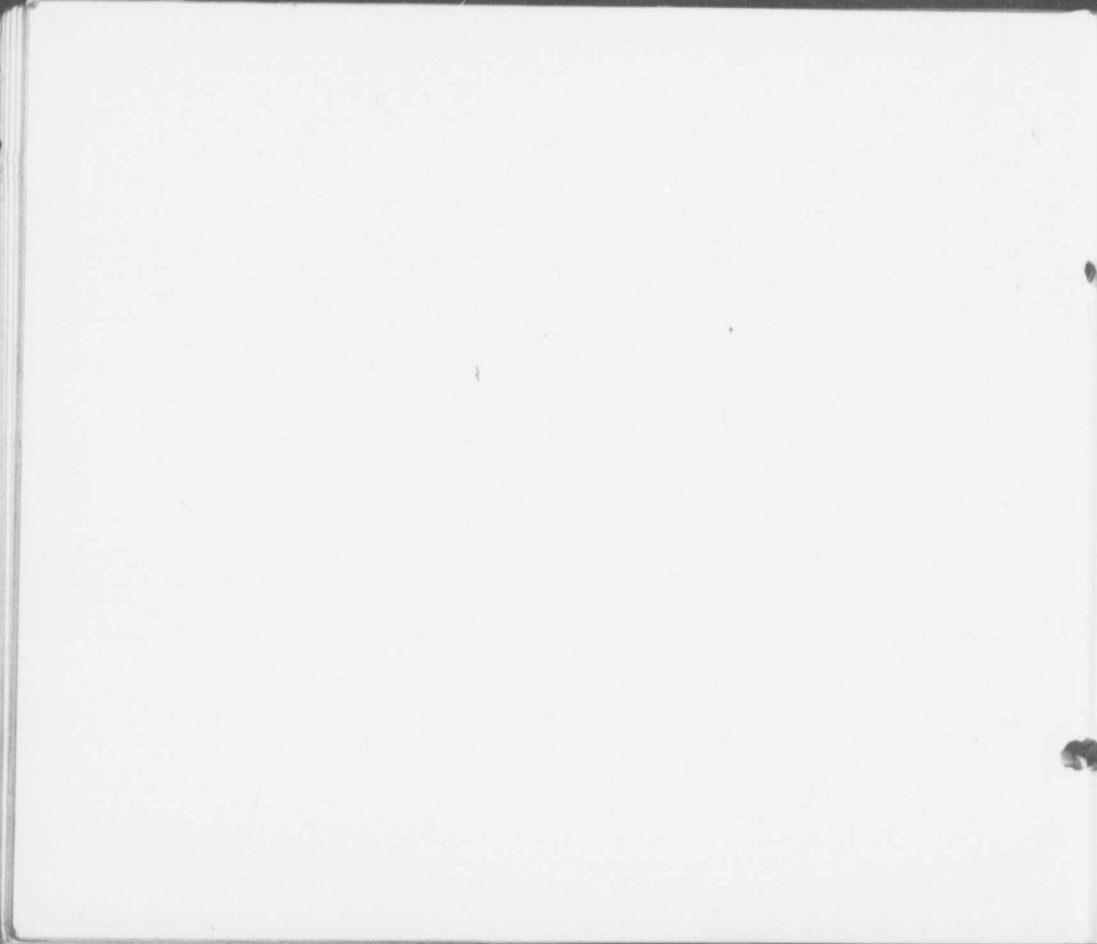

All fees are to be paid in advance.

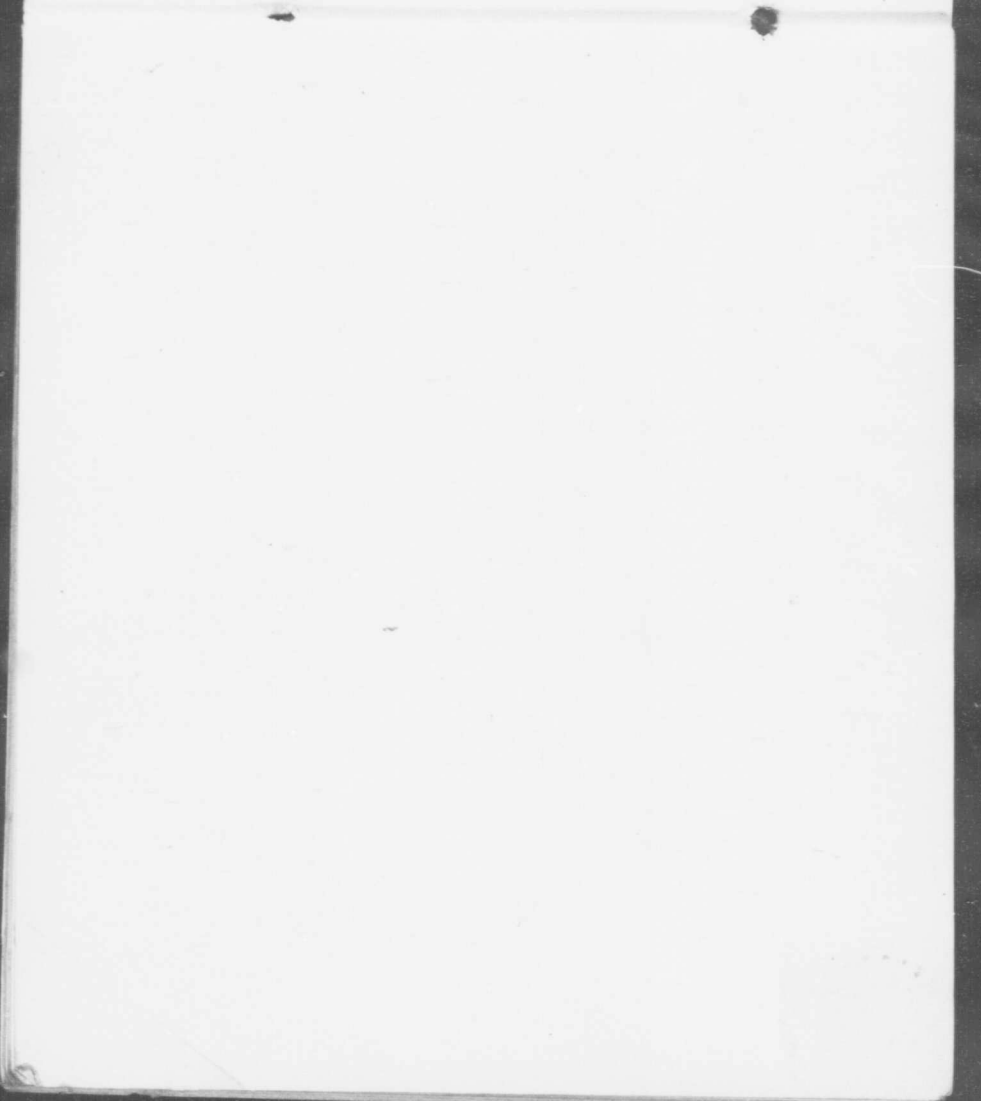
No reduction is made for absence except on account of prolonged illness.
