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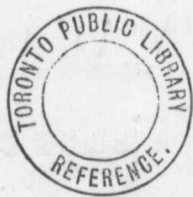

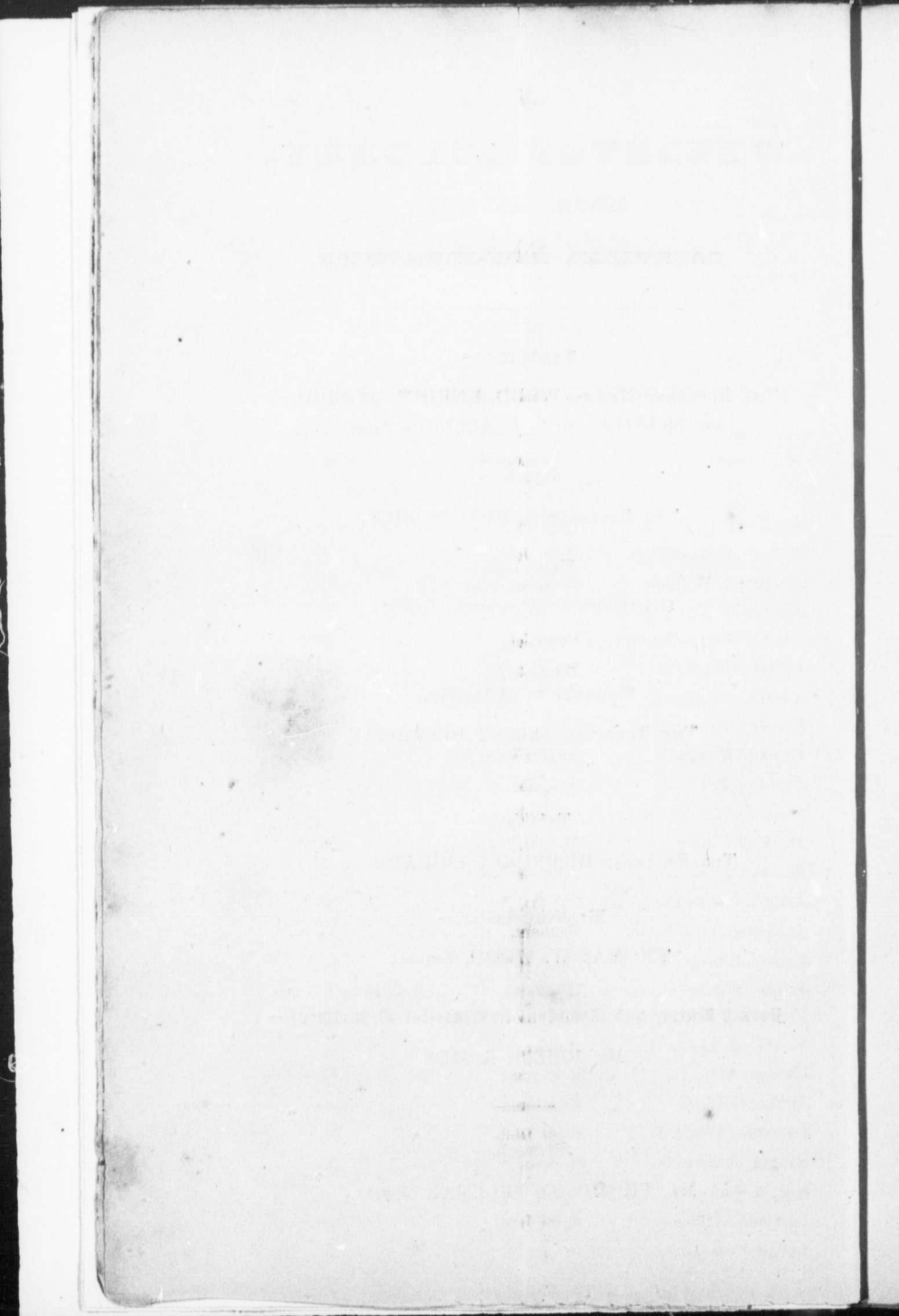

GENERAL INFORMATION.

THE COURSE OF STUDY.

This is extensive, systematic, and thorough. For the purpose of securing the advantages of method and regularity, and at the same time accommodating different Classes of Students, there are Three Courses of Instruction.

PRIMARY COURSE.

The First, or Primary Course, includes

Geography,	Parsing,
English Grammar,	History,
Arithmetic,	First Lessons in Composition and Penmanship.

LITERARY AND SCIENTIFIC COURSE.

The Studies in the Second, or Literary and Scientific Course, are arranged to occupy a period of Two Years.

FIRST YEAR.

FIRST TERM.—Algebra, Geometry, Chemistry, and French.

SECOND TERM.—Algebra, Geometry, Natural Philosophy, and French.

SECOND YEAR.

FIRST TERM.—Trigonometry, Mental Philosophy,
Mensuration, Evidences Christianity,
And French—or Mineralogy and Geology.

SECOND TERM.—Rhetoric, Moral Philosophy, and Astronomy,
Logic, Political Economy.

CLASSICAL COURSE.

The Third, or Classical Course, includes, in addition to all the Studies of the First and Second Courses,

Latin Grammar and Exercises,	Greek Lessons,
Latin Reader,	Greek Grammar and Exercises,
Cæsar, or Sallust,	Jacob's Greek Reader,
Virgil's Eneid and Bucolics,	Greek Testament,
Cicero's Select Orations,	Homer's Iliad,
Horace,	Græca Majora,
Cicero de Oratore,	Eschines and Demosthenes de Corona,
Livy, and Tacitus,	&c. &c.

Roman and Grecian Antiquities and History,
Ancient Geography, &c. &c.

TERMS.

The next Term will begin on Thursday, 30th January, 1845, and continuing Twenty-one Weeks, end the last Wednesday in June. After which the Academic Year will consist of Two Terms;—the First of Nineteen Weeks, from the Second Thursday in August to the Wednesday preceding Christmas;—the Second, of Twenty-four Weeks, from the Second Thursday after the first day of January.

VACATIONS.

Three Weeks from the Wednesday preceding Christmas, and Six Weeks preceding the second Thursday in August.

At the end of each Term, to commence on the last Monday at 9 o'clock, A. M.

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Additional Charges will be made for Tuition in the higher Departments, but the expense for Board, &c. and Tuition, will in no case exceed - - £30 per annum.

Ten Shillings per week will be charged to those who remain during the Vacations.

☞ *The amount of the ordinary expenses must be paid in advance— one half at the beginning, and the remainder at the middle of each Term.*

Each Pupil should bring with him—Not less than three suits of clothes; eight day and three night shirts; six pairs of stockings; two or three pairs of shoes; two hats or caps; also, a cloak or over coat; an umbrella, combs and brushes; and a Bible, with marginal references.

Parents are particularly requested to send every article marked with the name of the Pupil in full.

REMARKS.

All who design to become Students in this Institution should enter, if at all possible, at the commencement of a Term, as the regular Classes are then organized; pupils, however, will be received at any time.

The only pre-requisites for admission into the Primary Department are a good moral character, ability to read and spell, and age sufficient to enable the Pupil to prepare regularly for recitation.

The time which will be occupied in the first and third Courses will depend upon the capacity and industry of the Student.

Certificates will be given at the close of each Academical Year to such Students as may have passed satisfactory examinations in all the studies of either course.

Persons who may not wish to pursue either course regularly will be allowed to enter any of the classes in order for which they are qualified.

Whenever it may be requested by a sufficient number of Students, classes will be instructed in French, Book-Keeping, Land Surveying, Navigation, Analytical Geometry, Calculus, &c. &c.

The Institution is furnished with Maps, Globes, Chemical and Philosophical Apparatus, &c. &c.

Lectures will be delivered upon the different branches of Natural Science, &c.

Every effort will be made to secure cheerful diligence in application to study. The object will be not only to instruct, but to educate; not only to impart useful knowledge, but to fix good habits. No reasonable exertions will be spared in giving a thorough and symmetrical training to all the mental and moral pow-

ers, and in avoiding the too common error of cultivating the intellect at the expense of the heart. The course of training will be directed, as far as possible, to the formation of an intelligent, efficient, and manly character, suited to the duties and responsibilities of active life.

Every reasonable precaution will be used to preserve a healthy state of moral feeling. It is determined that no one shall continue in the Academy whose character and habits are found to exert an *influence unfavourable* to good morals or good order.

The government will be strictly parental. The Governor and Principal will reside in the same Building with the Students. Daily records of scholarship and conduct will be made with great care.

Parents and Guardians are *earnestly advised* that lads should be furnished *very sparingly*, if at all, with spending money. Money sufficient to meet incidental expenses may be lodged with the Governor and Chaplain of the Institution, or with some other responsible person.

SACKVILLE is a retired country village, pleasant and healthy, and easy of access from all parts of the Lower Provinces.

The Academical Building is elegant, spacious, and comfortable, and delightfully situated.
