The American War.

Nichol Council.

The Council met in Ennville on the 27th ult. A by-law for regulating houses of Public Entertainment and the issuing of Licences for the same, was brought in and passed.

JUDICIAL CHANGES.

To the judicial changes we have already announced—that Sir J. B. Robinson had resigned the Chief Justiceship of the Court of Common Pleas, and been appointed President of the Court of Error and Appeal, and that Mr. McLean had been promoted to the position of Chief Justice of the Court of Common Pleas—We have now some other changes to add.

THE BROME ELECTION.

We learn at the final result of the polling at the Brome election.—The vote stood thus:—Dunkin 1,074, Austin 544. Majority for the Ministerial candidate, 530.

THE ROMAN CATHOLIC BISHOPS OF MONTREAL AND ST. HYACINTHE ARE ABOUT TO PROCEED TO ROME, TO ASSIST AT THE CANONIZATION OF THE MARTYRS OF JAPAN.

The Roman Catholic Bishops of Montreal and St. Hyacinthe are about to proceed to Rome, to assist at the canonization of the martyrs of Japan, a privilege which has been denied to the French Bishops by the Emperor Napoleon. La Minerve notices the extraordinary fact that the Roman Catholic Church possesses more real freedom in a British Protestant colony, than in Catholic France, under the eldest son of the Church.

PORTLAND AS A WINTER HARBOR.

Great expectations were entertained of the advantages to be derived by Canada from a winter communication with Europe via Portland; and to some extent these advantages have been realized.

THE REEVE OF FERGUS HAS ISSUED A PROCLAMATION, DIRECTING ALL PERSONS OWNING DOGS WITHIN THE MUNICIPALITY TO KEEP THEM SHUT UP UNTIL THE FIRST OF MAY.

The Reeve of Fergus has issued a proclamation, directing all persons owning dogs within the Municipality to keep them shut up until the first of next May. And it also states that all dogs found running at large, unuzzled, within this Municipality, after the 20th inst., shall be shot or otherwise destroyed.

THE MILITIA.

In Lower Canada, Militia organization appears to be going on with unabated rapidity. Already, the Journal de Quebec reports that nineteen battalions have been formed.

THE DUKE OF NEWCASTLE ON THE COLONIES.

At the Anniversary banquet of the Australian Association, which was held in London on the 12th February, the Duke of Newcastle, remarked, in the course of a speech, that he was glad to see that in many places they labor under the disadvantage of not having a drill instructor.

THE SHAMROCK.

The wearing of shamrock on the 17th of March, is attributed by some to the following circumstance.—When St. Patrick first endeavored to plant the seed of Christianity in Hibernia, he found great difficulty in inculcating the doctrine of the Trinity in the minds of his auditors; and therefore had resort to a visible image to illustrate his discourse.

SENTENCED TO BE HANGED.—

The wretched young man, Edward Keenan, of Milton, was found guilty at the recent Assizes of the awful crime of murdering his own mother, and was sentenced to be hanged on the 12th day of June next.

THE PHILADELPHIA INQUIRY SAYS 215,000 BARRELS OF OIL ARE PRODUCED WEEKLY IN NORTH WESTERN PENNSYLVANIA.

The Philadelphia Inquirer says 215,000 barrels of oil are produced weekly in North Western Pennsylvania. That is equal to 520,000,000 gallons a year. If the oil all came from one well it would throw out 35,700 lbs a day. Canada will soon produce something like the same quantity, of superior quality.

BY-LAW CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF NICHOL.

By-Law to provide for destroying dogs running at large, during a limited period, in the Township of Nichol. Whereas, in consequence of mad dogs having lately been found running at large in the Municipality of Nichol, and the danger of Hydrophobia arising therefrom, also, of a requisition presented to the Reeve and Councilors, to take steps to prevent accidents being occasioned thereby—Therefore, the Corporation of the Township of Nichol, by the council thereof, in pursuance of the powers in them in that behalf vested, doth enact as follows, that is to say, that for and during the period of two calendar months from the passing of this By-law, it shall be unlawful for the owners, possessors, or harbors of dogs of any description, whatever, to permit the same to run at large within the Municipality of Nichol, and it is further enacted that if shall be lawful for all persons and they are hereby required and authorized by this By-law, to destroy or cause to be destroyed, all dogs that may be found running at large in the Municipality of Nichol, during the period above referred to.
