The result of such a course, which did not emanate from me as an individual, but from the high office and position I held, far exceeded my expectations. It soon got wind that I had become a testotaller. "Oh." said some, "the rector has gone entirely wrong; he has sunk the dignity of his position." But what was the result in the town? I do not say that the results are to-day in full force. The mayor became a teetotaller; the ex-mayor became a tectotaller; the superintendent of police became a teetotaller : I believe that every member of the force became teetotallers; eight hundred persons registered their names in the pledge book, seven hundred young people became members of our Band of Hope. The whole moral aspect of the town became changed. Sobriety was soon in the ascendency. Frequenting public houses ceased to be considered respectable : the stumbling-blocks and hindrances were lessened, and the work of philanthropy and reliproved attendance, and teetotalism was generally pronounced to be a good thing.

Some among us say that teetotalism has done nothing. I hesitate not to say that it has done a great deal for the principality, and will do much more if we be only faithful to our opportunities. 
