FOURTH SESSION OF THE TWENTY-SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

Monday, April 9, 1866.

THE House having, by several Proclamations hereto annexed, been prorogued until this day, then to meet for the dispatch of business;

And being met—

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Robert Hyndman, Esquire, Usher of the Black Rod :

Mr. Speaker ;

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the attendance of this Honorable House at the Bar of the Council Chamber, instanter.

And then he withdrew.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker and the House went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber ;

And being returned—

Mr. Speaker reported that when the House did attend His Excellency this day in the

Council Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of the Legislature, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, for greater accuracy, obtained a copy, which he read to the House, and is as follows :—

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council ;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly ;

I am happy again to meet you, and to have recourse to your assistance and advice.

In accordance with the notice given by the Government of the United States, the Reciprocity Treaty between that Power and Great Britain has terminated. It will be for you to consider what measures should be adopted in regard to such commercial interests as are affected by the abrogation of this Treaty.

At the suggestion of Her Majesty's principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a Council was summoned by the Governor General for the purpose of furnishing an opinion to the Imperial Government in the negotiation of commercial treaties. A Delegate was sent to represent the interests of this Island at this Council. The report of its proceedings will be laid before you.

It was also deemed expedient that this Island should be represented on the mission which has been sent to the West Indies, Brazil and Mexico. The object of this mission is to ascertain in what manner the trade of the British North American Provinces with these countries can be extended. I have not yet learned the result of this mission.

The general prosperity of the past year has been marred by the civil disturbances which took place in several parts of this Colony. Misled by ignorant or designing men, tenants were induced to form themselves into an association with the avowed intention of withholding payment of their rents, unless their landlords consented to sell their lands on such terms as this association chose to dictate.

The law was openly and systematically set at defiance, and it became necessary to use extraordinary measures to enforce it. A requisition was, therefore, made for a detachment of Her Majesty's troops, to aid the civil power, and the authority of the law has been firmly and impartially maintained.

Papers on these subjects will be laid before you.

In the Preamble of the Act under which the Barracks in this City were sold, you pledged the Colony to provide suitable accommodation for any troops that might be stationed here. New Barracks have, therefore, been erected, and you will be asked to concur in a measure for appropriating the money arising from the sale of the old barracks towards the expenditure incurred in building those at present occupied by the troops.

I have recently concluded the purchase of another Estate from one of the proprietors. It is my intention to continue to buy out the rights of the landowners, whenever I am enabled to do so on reasonable terms.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

I have given directions that the Public Accounts for the past year be laid before you.

The Revenue is the largest which has ever been collected in this Island, and would have been more than sufficient to meet the expenditure, had it not been for the extraordinary outlay which was caused by the measures necessary for the suppression of the disturbances occasioned by the lawless association to which I have alluded.

The Estimates for the present year will also be laid before you. They have been framed with due regard to economy.

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

You will, I am sure, have observed, with just pride, the loyalty and the spirit which your fellow subjects in the neigh-

bouring Provinces have displayed, when threatened by piratical attacks at the hands of lawless men. I know that, should an emergency ever unfortunately occur in this Island, I could rely with confidence on a like spirit in its inhabitants of every creed and station. But I must seriously urge upon you the necessity of doing all in your power towards making due preparation for such an emergency by giving your earnest consideration to the laws which at present regulate the Militia and the Volunteer force.

I am glad to inform you that the Stock, purchased in England for the Model Farm, arrived in a very satisfactory condition. I am confident that you will cheerfully give your concurrence to such a grant as may be deemed necessary for the support of an institution so well calculated to advance the agricultural interests of the Colony.

I now commit to you the business of the Session, with the fervent prayer that your deliberations may, under the Divine blessing, conduce to the welfare and prosperity of this Island.

The Hon. J. C. Pope, a Member of Her Majesty's Executive Council, laid on the table the Sheriff's Return to the Writ of Election issued for the election of a Member for the First Electoral District of King's County, in room of the Hon. Donald Beaton, deceased; and thereupon,

The Hon. Emanuel Maceachen, returned a Member for the said First Electoral District of King's County, in room of the Hon. Donald Beaton, deceased, appeared at the Bar, and having been led into the body of the House, and introduced to Mr. Speaker by the Hon. J. Hensley and F. Brecken, Esquire, two of the Members, took the oaths and his seat.

On motion of Mr. Brecken, seconded by Mr. John Yeo,

Resolved, That a Committee of seven Members be appointed to prepare and report with all convenient speed the draft of an Address in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, delivered this day to both Houses of the Legislature.

Ordered, That Mr. Brecken, Mr. John Yeo, Mr. Haslam, Hon. E. Maceachen, Mr. Duncan, Mr. MacLennan and Mr. Howat do compose the said Committee.

On motion of the Hon. J. C. Pope, seconded by Mr. Haslam,

Ordered, That the Thirteenth Rule of the House be suspended, to enable a Member to introduce a Bill; and thereupon,

The Hon. J. C. Pope presented to the House a Bill for the purpose of transferring the funds raised by the sale of the Military Barracks in Charlottetown, to the purposes therein mentioned; and moved, seconded by Mr. Haslam, that the same be received and read for the first time.

On motion of the Hon. J. C. Pope, seconded by the Hon. J. Longworth,

Resolved, That Mr. Archibald Macneill be appointed Summary Reporter to this House, and that it be his duty, as such Reporter, to furnish each Member of the House, daily, with a copy of a printed report of each day's proceedings.

Then, on motion of the Hon. J. C. Pope, seconded by Mr. Maclellan,

The House adjourned until to-morrow at Ten o'clock.

Tuesday, April 10, 1866.

PRAYERS.

THE Hon. J. C. Pope moved, seconded by the Hon. J. H. Gray,—That Mr. Robert Blake Irving be appointed Reporter to this House.

The Hon. J. Hensley moved, seconded by the Hon. J. Warburton, to amend the said motion by adding at the end of the question, “and that the Reporter be required to furnish to the Printer of the Debates of this House, a copy of each debate, within one week after the same has taken place.”

The Hon. the Solicitor General moved, seconded by the Hon. J. H. Gray, that the Hon. J. Hensley have leave to withdraw his motion of amendment:

And the question being put thereon, it was carried in the affirmative, and

Resolved, accordingly.

The question being then put on the main motion, it was agreed to by the House, and

Ordered, accordingly.

Mr. Brecken from the Committee appointed to prepare and report the draft of an Address in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to both Houses, at the opening of the present Session, presented to the House the draft of an Address as prepared by the Committee, and he read the same in his place, and delivered it in at the Clerk's table, where it was again read.

Then, on motion of Mr. Brecken, seconded by Mr. Haslam,

Resolved, That this House will, to-morrow, resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House to take into consideration the said draft Address.

The Hon. D. Davies, from the Committee appointed to receive tenders for printing the

Journals of the House, for the present Session, and to report thereon to the House, presented to the House the report of the said Committee; which report was again read at the Clerk's table, and is as followeth:—

The Committee appointed to receive Tenders for printing the Journals of the House for the present Session, have to report that they have received six tenders, viz:—

First—From H. & J. Cooper offering to print the Journals at the rate of twenty-two shillings and six pence per sheet of four pages; to half bind the same for three shillings and seven pence per copy; for stitched copies, one shilling and two pence.

Second—From David Laird agreeing to print the requisite number of copies at thirty-two shillings and six pence per sheet of four pages; for binding, five shillings and six pence per copy; for stitched copies, two shillings.

Third—From E. Reilly undertaking to print the Journals for twenty-five shillings per sheet of four pages; to bind the same for three shillings and nine pence per copy; stitched copies, one shilling and three pence each.

Fourth—From F. W. Hughes agreeing to print the Journals on superior English paper, same as specimen marked No. 1, for seventeen shillings per sheet of four pages; ditto on paper same as specimen No. 2, fifteen shillings and six pence; for binding, three shillings and nine pence per copy; for stitched copies, one shilling and three pence each.

Fifth—From John Ross agreeing to print the Journals on paper similar to sample furnished; for eighteen shillings and six pence per sheet of four pages; for binding, three shillings and eight pence per copy; for stitched copies, one shilling and two pence.

Sixth—From John Ings undertaking to print the Journals on paper the same as specimen submitted, for twenty-nine shillings per sheet of four pages; for binding, four shillings and six pence per copy; stitching, one shilling and six pence per copy.

Upon comparing the specimens of paper submitted with the tenders of F. W. Hughes and John Ross—being the two lowest tenders—your Committee recommend the tender of F. W. Hughes to print the Journals on superior English paper, the same as specimen submitted, at seventeen shillings per sheet, to be accepted.

Then, on motion of the Hon. D. Davies, seconded by the Hon. the Solicitor General,

Resolved, That the said Report be adopted.

To His Excellency George Dundas, Esquire, Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories thereunto belonging, Chancellor, Vice Admiral and Ordinary of the same, &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:—

1. We, Her Majesty's loyal subjects, the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, respectfully offer to your Excellency our thanks for the Speech delivered at the opening of the present Session.

2. In consequence of the abrogation of the Reciprocity Treaty between the United States and Great Britain, we shall adopt such measures as may be required to advance and protect the commercial interests thereby affected.

3. We shall be glad to receive the report of the proceedings of the Council summoned by the Governor General for the purpose of furnishing an opinion to the Imperial Government on the negotiation of Commercial Treaties. In a matter of such importance, we are pleased to hear that the interests of this Island were represented by a Delegate sent for that purpose.

4. We trust that the Mission to the West Indies, Brazil and Mexico, in which this Island is represented, will result in the extension of the Trade of the British North American Provinces with those countries.

5. It is with deep regret that we learn that the general prosperity of the past year has been marred by the civil disturbances which have taken place in this Colony, and we cannot too strongly deprecate the conduct of the parties by whom the Tenantry were misled, and by whom they were induced to form themselves into an association so illegal, and so subversive of the rights of property as that to which your Excellency has adverted; and when the law was so openly set at defiance, we conceive that the course taken by the Government of the Colony, in calling in the aid of Her Majesty's troops, was the

safest and most effective that could have been adopted under the unfortunate circumstances of the case. We shall be glad to have the papers on these subjects laid before us.

6. Any measure for applying the money arising from the sale of the old Barracks towards the expenditure incurred in building the new Barracks at present occupied by Her Majesty's troops, shall receive our best attention.

7. We are gratified to learn that you have recently concluded the purchase of another Estate from one of the Proprietors, and that it is your intention to continue to buy out the rights of the Landowners whenever you are enabled to do so, on reasonable terms.

8. We thank your Excellency for having directed the Public Accounts for the past year and the Estimates for the present, to be laid before us. We are pleased to be informed that the Revenue of the past year exceeds in amount that of any previous one; but we regret that the extraordinary outlay which was caused by the measures requisite for the suppression of the disturbances occasioned by the lawless association alluded to by your Excellency, has caused the expenditure to be greater than the Revenue.

9. It is with feelings of just pride that we have observed the loyalty and spirit evinced by our fellow-subjects in the neighbouring Provinces when threatened by piratical attacks at the hands of lawless men; and we beg to assure your Excellency that should a similar emergency ever unfortunately occur in this Island, your Excellency could rely with confidence on a like spirit in its inhabitants of every creed and station; and we admit the necessity of doing all in our power towards making due preparation for such an emergency by earnestly considering the Laws by which the Militia and Volunteer Forces are at present regulated.

10. It is satisfactory to be informed that the Stock for the Model or Stock Farm, purchased in England, arrived in good condition; and we shall cheerfully vote a sufficient sum for the support of an institution so well calculated to advance the agricultural interests of the Colony.

11. We join with your Excellency in the fervent prayer that our deliberations may, under the Divine Blessing, conduce to the welfare and prosperity of this Island.

And the said Address being again read,

The Hon. G. Coles moved, seconded by the Hon. J. Hensley, to amend the same by striking out the whole of the Fifth paragraph thereof, and inserting the following in lieu of the same:

“The House of Assembly regret that Civil disturbances took place in this Colony during

the past year; but the House of Assembly respectfully submit that the alleged open and systematic defiance of the law might have been averted by a more prompt and energetic use of the Civil authority, when the disturbances first made their appearance, and thus the recourse to extraordinary measures, as referred to in Your Excellency's Speech, might have been avoided.”

That there is a public road leading down to the Gulf Shore, and that cattle and sheep are allowed free liberty on the sands to eat and destroy every green plant or herb that may appear, thus leaving the sand bare and exposed to the next north or north-westerly storm that may come, by which it gets blown still further inland.

That years since, Little Harbor and Cove Head Harbor were each navigable for schooners, and of great importance and value to the resident inhabitants, but from the encroachment of the sand these Harbors are now rendered useless; and praying the House to redress the grievances complained of, by authorizing a gate to be placed across the Road leading to the shore, (at the marsh) or by preventing cattle and sheep from running at large on the sand-hills or otherwise; and further praying the Government to procure, at their earliest convenience, a Dredging Machine to be used in dredging out and keeping open the various Harbors on the coasts of this Island.

"RESOLVED, As the deliberate opinion of this House, that any Union of the British North American Colonies which would embrace Prince Edward Island, upon the terms and principles set forth in the Resolutions of the Conference of Quebec, held on the 10th October, 1864, would not only be unjust to the inhabitants of this Colony, but prove disastrous to their dearest and most cherished rights and interests as a free people, enjoying the blessings of a priceless constitution guaranteed to them by the Imperial Government of Great Britain.

"That, considering the isolated, peculiar and exceptional position of Prince Edward Island, as contrasted with the other British North American Provinces and Colonies, this House deems it to be its duty, as the Constitutional Representative of the people of Prince Edward Island, to re-affirm the decision so clearly and unequivocally declared by this House in the Resolutions passed by it, in its last Session, upon the subject of a Union of the British North American Colonies, and afterwards communicated by the joint Address of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of this Colony to Her Majesty's Imperial Government.

"RESOLVED FURTHER, That even if a Union of the Continental Provinces of British North America should have the effect of strengthening and binding more closely together those Provinces, or advancing their material and commercial interests, this House

cannot admit that a Federal Union of the North American Provinces and Colonies, which would include Prince Edward Island, could ever be accomplished upon terms that would prove advantageous to the interests and well-being of the people of this Island, cut off and separated as it is, and must ever remain, from the neighboring Provinces, by an immovable barrier of ice for many months in the year; and this House deems it to be its sacred and imperative duty to declare and record its conviction, as it now does, that any Federal Union of the North American Colonies, that would embrace this Island, would be as hostile to the feelings and wishes, as it would be opposed to the best and most vital interests, of its people.

"RESOLVED FURTHER, That while this House cannot assent to a Federal Union of this Island with the other Colonies, they recognize it to be the duty of this Colony to contribute, from its local revenues, towards its defence, in fair and just proportion to its means."

The Hon. J. C. Pope moved, seconded by Mr. Duncan, and the question being proposed, that the Resolutions, as reported from Committee, be agreed to.

The Hon. E. Whelan moved in amendment, to the same, seconded by the Hon. the Solicitor General, that after the word "Resolved," all be struck out of the said Resolutions, and the following substituted:—

"As the opinion of this House, that the Confederation of Her Majesty's American Colonial Possessions would be,—while in conformity with Her Majesty's frequently expressed desire—conducive to their welfare, separately and collectively. And this House believes that a plan of Confederation might be so framed as not to involve the sacrifice of any material interests on the part of any Province; but inasmuch as the people of Prince Edward Island do not appear to be prepared to regard with any favor the project of Confederation, it is unwise to press it upon public attention, as its discussion is only calculated to produce excitement and apprehension, without reasonable cause.

"AND FURTHER RESOLVED, as the opinion of this House, that there should be no vote passed by the Legislature of this country in favor of a Confederation of the Provinces until the people shall first be afforded an opportunity of pronouncing their judgment on the question at a general Election."

Your Committee to whom was referred the petition of sundry inhabitants of Queen's County, complaining of certain irregularities on the part of the contractor for the Hillsborough Ferry, have to report that they have heard the petitioners as well as the contractor, and witnesses produced by him, and after maturely weighing and considering the facts as detailed before them, are of opinion that the contractor should be called upon to use more caution and diligence in conforming strictly to the requirements of his contract, by night as well as by day.

Your Committee also recommend that the Executive endeavor to make such arrangements with the contractor as will cause the steamer to run more frequently across the ferry on market days, being of opinion this is imperatively required by the rapidly increasing amount of traffic on such days.

Also, your Committee would recommend that steps be taken to procure the services of a Dredging Machine to deepen the docks and the water on the middle-ground.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair;

And Mr. Sinclair reported that the Committee had gone through the report of the Special Committee, paragraph by paragraph, without making any amendment thereto, and the report

was again read at the Clerk's table, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee appointed to examine and report upon the Public Accounts for the past year, having examined the same, beg to report as follows:

The Expenditure for the Financial Year, ending 31st of January, 1866, amounts to £75,950 8s. 3d., leaving a balance against the Colony of £7 909 4s. 4d., which amount added to the balance standing against the Colony on the 31st January, 1865, shews the Public Debt to be £74,640 14d. on the 31st January, 1866. This balance includes all Treasury Notes, Warrants and Debentures issued up to that date, as will appear by referring to the annexed tabular statement, marked (A).

Your Committee, in this statement, do not give credit to the Colony for any balances due from the sale of Public Lands, nor for any estimated value of lands remaining unsold.

Giving the Colony, however, credit for the balance due on Public Lands sold—£32,425 9s. 9d., and for the sum realized from the sale of the old Barrack land—£5,600, the balance as shewn against the Colony would be £36,614 12s. 3d., instead of £74,640, as above stated.

The Revenue for the past year shews an increase over the previous one of £1,717 12s. 1d.

The usual Tables have been prepared by your Committee, and are appended from (A) to (E) inclusive, and contain particulars of the Revenue and Expenditure of past years, and other information.

The Receipts for and on account of Public and Crown Lands, during the past year, amount to £6,434 15s. The Expenditure for the same period, including estimated loss of land tax and interest, is £2,550 10s. 2d., leaving a balance in favor of Public and Crown Lands of £3,884 4s. 10d.

Besides the balance due on Public Lands, Bonds, Deeds, &c., amounting to £32,425 9s. 0d., as above stated, there are 29,933½ acres of land unsold, being a decrease in the quantity on hand last year, of 4,033 acres.

During the past year the Government have purchased 4,151½ acres of land, and have sold 8,184½ acres within the same period.

Your Committee have to report that the Expenditure for the year has been increased to the extent of £13,189 2s. 6d. over what may be considered the ordinary expenditure of the year for the following services, viz:—

Kelly, from the Special Committee, to whom was referred the papers, accounts and report of Commissioners laid before the House relative to an investigation against James Macwade, a Justice of the Peace, to examine the same and report thereon, presented to the House the report of the said Committee, which report was again read at the Clerk's table, and is as followeth :

Your Committee who were appointed to examine and report on certain papers and documents which were laid before the Government last year, by Edward Lavery and others, praying the removal of James Macquaid from the Commission of the Peace, for certain charges therein set forth against the said James Macquaid, together with the report of the Commissioners appointed by the Government to investigate the same, and their costs and charges allowed thereon. Your Committee have to report that having examined the same, they find that the sum of £40 13s. 2d. has been charged the Government for the said investigation, as will be seen in the Bill of costs hereto attached.

That your Committee felt assured that such costs and charges ought to have been borne by the parties themselves, and not to have been taken out of the public moneys of the country—communicated with Her Majesty's Attorney General on the subject, and have much pleasure in attaching his report and opinion thereon, with the report of the Clerk of the Crown on the same subject.

The Hon. J. C. Pope, from the Committee appointed to prepare an Address to Her Majesty the Queen, founded upon the Resolutions of this House in its present Session, on the subject of a Confederation of the British North

American Provinces, presented to the House the draft of an Address, as prepared by the Committee; which Address was again read at the Clerk's table, and is as followeth:—

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY:

We, Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, having had under consideration the Message of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, communicating a Despatch dated the 24th day of June last, from the Right Honorable Edward Cardwell, Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, upon the subject of a Federation of the British North American Provinces—beg leave to approach Your Majesty for the purpose of expressing our respectful but deliberate opinion that any Union of the British North American Colonies, which would embrace Prince Edward Island, upon the terms and principles set forth in the Resolutions of the Conference of Quebec, held on the 10th October, 1864, would not only be unjust to the inhabitants of this Colony, but prove disastrous to their dearest and most cherished rights and interests as a free people, enjoying the blessings of a priceless constitution, guaranteed to them by the Imperial Government of Great Britain.

That, considering the isolated, peculiar and exceptional position of Prince Edward Island, as contrasted with the other British North American Provinces and Colonies, this House deems it to be its duty, as the Constitutional Representative of the people of Prince Edward Island, to re-affirm the decision so clearly and unequivocally declared by this House in the Resolutions passed by it, in its last Session, upon the subject of a Union of the British North American Colonies, and afterwards communicated by the joint Address of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of this Colony to Her Majesty's Imperial Government; and further, that even if a Union of the Continental Provinces of British North America would have the effect of strengthening and binding more closely together these Provinces, and advancing their material and commercial interests, this House cannot admit that a Federal Union of the North American Provinces and Colonies, which would include Prince Edward Island, could ever be accomplished upon terms that would prove advantageous to the interests and well being of the people of this Island, cut off and separated as it is, and must ever remain, from the neighbouring Provinces, by an immovable barrier of ice for many months in the year; and this House deems it to be its sacred and imperative duty to declare its conviction that any Federal Union of the North American Colonies that would embrace this Island would be as hostile to the feelings and wishes, as it would be opposed to the best and most vital interests, of its people.

We beg further respectfully to state, that while this House cannot assent to a Federal Union of this Island with the other Colonies, they recognize it to be the duty of this Colony to contribute from its local Revenues, towards its defence, in fair and just proportion to its means.

We do, therefore, most humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased not to give Your Royal Sanction to any Act or Measure founded upon the basis of the Report of the Quebec Conference, or otherwise, that would have the effect of uniting Prince Edward Island in a Federal Union with Canada or any other of Your Majesty's Provinces in America.

And the said reported Address being again read, and the question of concurrence being put thereon, it was carried in the affirmative, and

Resolved, accordingly.

Ordered, That the said Address be engrossed.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to prepare an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to forward the preceding Address to be laid at the foot of the Throne.

Ordered, That the same Committee who prepared the Address to Her Majesty, be a Committee to prepare the said Address to His Excellency.

The Hon. J. C. Pope, from the last preceding Committee appointed, presented to the House the draft of an Address, as prepared by the Committee, which Address being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

To His Excellency George Dundas, Esquire, Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories thereunto belonging, Chancellor, Vice Admiral and Ordinary of the same, &c &c &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:—

We, the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, in Colonial Parliament convened, respectfully request Your Excellency will be pleased to forward the accompanying Address to Her Majesty the Queen, expressive of the views of the House of Assembly, upon the subject of a Confederation of the British Provinces in North America, to be laid at the foot of the Throne.

Ordered, That the said Address be engrossed.

Ordered, That the same Committee who prepared the Address, be a Committee to wait on His Excellency with the same.

Resolved, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into further consideration the Message of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, of the 16th day of April last, transmitting to the House various despatches and papers.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. MacLennan took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Your Committee, to whom were referred an account of the Executors of the Estate of the late Paul Mabey, Esq., and certain documents connected therewith, and claiming to be reimbursed by the Government of this Island, certain moneys paid by the late Mr. Mabey in his lifetime, and by his representatives since his decease, for land assessment upon six pasture lots in the Royalty of Charlottetown, over which, it appears the public have a right to the use of a race course, at a certain period of the year, annually, by virtue of a Deed dated the 8th October, 1829, executed by Mr. Mabey to certain public officers of this Colony as Trustees for the use and benefit of the public, have to report that inasmuch as the late Mr. Mabey, at all times, from the time of the execution of said Deed, up to the period of his death, voluntarily paid said assessment without ever making a demand upon said Trustees, or any of them, for reimbursement, and without, in the opinion of this Committee, ever intending to seek repayment of the moneys so voluntarily paid by him, they conceive that said claim cannot be recognized by this House, at any rate for a longer period of time than six years immediately preceding his death, especially as it appears to your Committee, that the covenants on the part of the Grantee in said Deed as to the manner in which the lands over which said race course runs, were to be kept and maintained by the Grantee and his Heirs, have not been fully adhered to. Under all the circumstances, your Committee recommend the payment of six years arrears of assessment prior to the death of Mr. Mabey, being £7 4s.; and the annual assessment which has, since that time become due, be repaid to the personal representatives of said Estate.

Sixteenth Annual Report of the Medical Superintendent of the Lunatic Asylum.

CHARLOTTETOWN,
January 31, 1866.

GENTLEMEN,

In compliance with the requirements of my annual duties, I have the honor to furnish your Board with this my Sixteenth annual Report, exhibiting a statistical view of our operations in the Asylum for the insane, for the year ending January 31st, 1866.

By directing your attention to the accompanying chart, you will observe that the number of patients remaining in hospital amounts to 30, viz: 21 males and 9 females.

There have been admitted, during the past year, 16 new patients, viz: 9 males and 7 females.

The number discharged has been 11, viz: 6 males and 5 females.

During the year, one death only has occurred, in a female, aged 66, who was cut off by scirrhus or cancer of the stomach.

The unimproved chronic cases amount to 7; 12 have improved; 13 much improved; and 8 have recovered their reason, while 30 yet remain under treatment. I may here remark, that of the total number admitted during the last 12 months, one-half have already recovered, making a per centage of 50 per cent within the year!

Two others, in a state of improvement, were removed by friends after 2 months and 3 months respectively, thus curtailing our efforts by these limited periods, and risking the chance of a fatal permanency of the disease.

The paupers amount only to 4; they are all infirm old men, whose united ages amount to 305 years.

Among the recent additions to the comfort of the patients, the new yard for the females (newly finished) will be found a most desirable accommodation for their quiet exercise, being situated at a distance from that of the men.

The applications for admission are steadily on the increase, and the new cases presenting are more of a recent standing than formerly, which may in some measure account for the greater success in their treatment.

The severity of the present winter has been but slightly felt in the Institution, owing to the ample supply of heat furnished by the new hot-air stoves; throughout the whole building, halls and dormitories, an equable and agreeable temperature can be maintained both night and day.

As the institution continues to progress, as a natural consequence, the number of chronic incurable cases must accumulate as in similar hospitals, for the number admitted is always greater than the cases discharged, particularly of pauper lunatics.

On no previous occasion have I had to report so great a number of patients admitted and cured in one year, and two apparent causes may account for the circumstance, viz: the amount of success in our treatment of the insane, and the belief gaining ground that the prompt admission of patients is the most likely means of ensuring a speedy recovery.

Of the disadvantages of treating the insane in this Province, not the least is the long and severe winter, which obliges us to confine the greater proportion of the patients, for half the year in their respective halls, without adequate amusement, exercise, or means of abstracting their minds from their morbid propensities and

illusions, a difficulty we have not as yet been enabled to overcome.

The absence of bodily labor is a great evil, for one of the most powerful means in the treatment of the insane is daily occupation. This not only tends to prevent the mind from dwelling on its delusions, and thereby to lessen their intensity, but frequently puts an end to that restlessness both of mind and body which attends many forms of the disease.

Of all modes of employing patients so affected, bodily labor is the most advantageous, inasmuch as it not only produces the beneficial effects now adverted to, but contributes to bring the system into that state of health which is necessary for the due performance of all mental operations.

In other respects, since the recent improvements, and enlarged accommodation in the building have been brought to bear on the comfort of the patients, they have greatly facilitated their medical treatment, the test of which is best evinced by the number of recoveries.

With these brief remarks, I herewith submit to the consideration of your Honorable Board, this my Sixteenth Annual Report.

Reports of the Visitors of Schools for the Eastern and Western Sections of Prince Edward Island, for the past year :

EASTERN SECTION :

John McNeill, Esquire,
Secretary Board of Education :

DEAR SIR,—

I have submitted Special Reports, detailing concisely the results of enquiries, in compliance with the orders of the Board, to investigate the disputes in the West River, and the Goose River Districts ; and I now supplement my statistical sheets, with a few general remarks.

As usual, there is much of an encouraging, as well as of a discouraging nature, to communicate on school matters. I have pleasure in being able to report that, in New Perth, Hemlock Grove, and a few other Districts, commodious, comfortable school-houses have lately been built. A Grammar School has been established in Pinette, Belfast. There is decided improvement in the reading and writing departments of many schools, so that, upon the whole, the prospects of progressive prosperity are encouraging.

The Government have sanctioned the organization of new Districts ; given aid to build suitable school-houses, and in several localities, previously destitute of the means of educating youth, due encouragement has been given.

I believe our School Act was enacted as a tentative expedient ; but, as the income of teachers is more precarious than under the former code, some teachers relinquished not only their schools, but their profession. Notwithstanding, if the attendance of students in the Normal School, or the candidature "for license," by the Board of Education, be a cor-

rect criterion, the profession of teacher is not now, less attractive than it formerly was. I regret to say, that in my opinion, salaries have fallen, owing to the number of young men in the field as candidates : there being for every vacancy, generally half a dozen applicants.

To the Board of Education :

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,—

I respectfully submit my Annual Report of the District Schools in the Eastern Section.—The synopsis of statistics appended was prepared on a plan assimilated to the School Registers. As no material alterations had occurred, after due consideration, I decided to describe the condition of the schools in the aggregate, which is now the custom in other colonies.

In reference to the City Schools, as no important change of system or method has been introduced within the period embraced by this report, I have only to reiterate on this occasion what I have repeatedly submitted for your consideration:

Mr. Archibald McNeill resigned the mastership of the Hillsborough School, which he successfully conducted for many years under embarrassments caused by inadequate accom-

modations. He was succeeded by Mr. Morrow, who is pains-taking and energetic.

The Rochford School was closed for several weeks. Mr. George Corbett succeeded Mr. Gunn, who was appointed master of the Grammar School in Georgetown, and from the frequent changes and interruptions in the management of the school, some of the scholars removed to other schools, and a few entered the Grammar School, so that Mr. C. had not, during his first quarter, a large attendance; but, by diligence and punctuality, his prospects have since assumed a more encouraging aspect. His evening classes for apprentices and others, have been well attended.

Bad health obliged Miss Davis, a superior teacher, to resign her charge. Miss Lawson, her successor, is attentive and ambitious to sustain the reputation of the Kent Female School.

Commodious and comfortable accommodations, with suitable appurtenances, are "essential to a good school." The deficiencies in indispensable requisites, especially in the Rochford and Hillsborough Districts, have been, for years, too glaring and grievous. Although, in the Pownal District, both departments are furnished with large rooms, supplied with furniture, and besides, having other conveniences, yet, improvements are much needed.

No arguments are necessary to induce the conviction that the places in which children are forming their characters, and preparing for the after requirements of life, should be refining in their associations. Many who have attained distinction and elevated positions in this Island, as well as in other countries, have received all their education in dingy, log school houses; but, from this fact, it should not be inferred that good school-houses, with appropriate furniture and equipments, are not desirable auxiliaries in eliciting the talents and ingenuity of youth. Reason and observation conspire to inculcate the propriety of providing neat school-houses, attractively adorned, within and without, which, with approved books and teachers, will certainly be a creditable and profitable investment to communities that make laudable efforts to procure them.

Another of the greatest wants of our city schools, is a systematic gradation. In former reports I urged the advantages of such a classi-

fication, wherever practicable. In our schools as at present organized, there are pupils of every diversity of age and attainments; the classes are necessarily so numerous that one teacher cannot give thorough instruction in every branch.

If this important improvement would be introduced, a specified plan of instruction adapted to the several grades should be prescribed; and it could be successfully pursued. The charge of the schools should be entrusted to one set of officers; such an arrangement would promote harmony and economy in their management.

I regret to report that the dispute between the Trustees of the Western Royalty school and some parties assessed to defray a portion of the expense of erecting a new school-house, has injuriously affected the interests of the teacher and scholars. The condition of the school is as satisfactory as it could be under the pressure of embarrassments.

The inhabitants of the Central Royalty school maintain it with creditable liberality. The house is neat and comfortable, furnished with fixtures conveniently arranged. The method of management is efficient, and the attendance regular. But the establishment of this school has been seriously detrimental to that in the Eastern Section. As several children who formerly attended the latter, are now enrolled in the new school, the average in the old is much lower than usual. The Trustees say that the Commissioners who recommended the alterations assured them "that as the change would, of course, reduce the attendance, a corresponding average would secure the Government allowance." In other respects this school is in a "fair condition."

I deem it proper in this connection to remind you of my suggestions submitted in January last, recommending a revision of the course of studies, and methods of instruction in the Normal School; anticipating that exercises in practical skill would be in future, in this, as in other countries, "an element" in the examinations by the Board, I was gratified that the proposal was favorably received.

I submitted that, when the Normal School was inaugurated, the literary acquirements of candidates for admission were very moderate. They required to be instructed in the elementary branches, consequently the examinations

for matriculation pertained more to mental attainments than to the possession of the qualifications indispensable to become useful teachers.

But now, as our district schools are chiefly taught by Graduates of the Normal School, their scholars should be qualified to commence training in the teaching art, which is the real object of that institution. And in addition to daily practice in teaching the alphabet, spelling, reading, and writing, the analysis of arithmetic, the principles of book-keeping, and elementary exercises in English composition, should be embraced in the course.

It is one thing to be possessed of knowledge, and quite another thing to be possessed of the skill and ability of imparting knowledge to others. Our best teachers are "self-made," they had a natural aptitude, and an ardent ambition to attain distinction in the profession.

Several teachers have urged me to ascertain if the Board would patronize Teachers' Associations, organized for mutual improvement and encouragement.

Such societies are not only beneficial to teachers, whether experienced or inexperienced, but have been in other countries, important means of influencing public sentiment in favor of educational interests. The powers of the Board of Education are definite and limited; but it is reasonable to expect that it will initiate such improvements as may be deemed expedient. The patronage asked, implied a recommendation of a legislative grant in aid of Teachers' Institutes.

In my opinion, occasional meetings in central localities for the familiar discussion of educational subjects, and the exposition, by experienced veterans in the profession, of their method and discipline, would afford important means of improvement to young teachers.

How the district schools are to be maintained, and adequate salaries provided for the teachers, are questions that have been for some time generally discussed. The change in the Act, of which teachers complain, was an experiment adopted as the most feasible scheme by which a generous public spirit could be aroused, that would elevate the condition of the schools, and also ameliorate the circumstances of the teachers. Assuredly the Government duly appreciated the wants and inter-

ests of the whole country, in the preparation of the measure. Innovations commonly raise agitation and discontent. Education cannot be advanced by legislative provisions alone; the voluntary agency of the community is absolutely necessary. We cannot have good schools without competent teachers, who must be adequately compensated. Children must be educated. Must the expenses of their education be entirely defrayed by Government?—The pressure for admission to the Normal School, and the competition for vacant schools are notorious!

It is to be regretted that some licensed to teach, have assumed the profession for some ulterior purpose, and that the people, often supposing the licentiates to be equally qualified, engage the "lowest bidder" for employment.

It has been truthfully said: "*A good system of public instruction is one which secures and retains the services of the best teachers.*" The condition of our schools cannot be effectually improved without a corps of earnest, skilful teachers, who make teaching a business.

New school-houses have been erected in several districts that were represented in my last report "without suitable accommodations." The inhabitants of Hemlock Grove, New Perth, and Brackley, have built commodious houses which are to be finished and furnished in a creditable manner.

The West River school, Lot 47, was closed by the order of the Board, until a good school-house would be provided, and I have reason to expect from the preparation already made, that they will erect a "Model School-house."

The Belfast Grammar School is in a rented building. This seminary, which enjoys the fostering care of the Rev. A. McLean, will prove a blessing to the youth in the adjacent districts.

The Georgetown Grammar School is neither finished nor furnished as it should be. Being the County Principal School, the Trustees have not power to raise, by assessment, the means required to complete the rooms intended for the male or female departments.

Grammar Schools are needed in Souris and Valleyfield; and an English High School could be well maintained in Orwell, Mount

Stewart and Fort Augustus, if the adjacent districts would unite for that purpose.

I have received applications to recommend the establishment of a minor school in Corodale, Lot 46, Middleton, Lot 58, and near Ferguson's mills, Lot 48.

The formation or alteration of school districts is a serious matter. The multiplication of districts will increase the expenditure of the revenue, and create small schools, that cannot be efficiently maintained by the inhabitants. Several new settlements petitioned the Executive for aid to build their school-houses, and the sum allowed by law was granted to each of them.

In reference to the progress of education, I may safely affirm, there is a sure and steady advance, year by year. The more intelligent

the parents are, the more rapid is the progress in each district. As the general intelligence advances, education will be more and more prized and fostered; better school-houses will adorn our country; the teachers will be respected, and their valuable services better remunerated. It will be found no difficult matter to raise the necessary supplement where an intelligent people meet with a competent teacher.

Herewith I append full statistics of all the schools in my section, together with a general summary of the whole number receiving education, and also the numbers acquiring each particular branch.

WESTERN SECTION:

To the Board of Education for the Island of Prince Edward:

GENTLEMEN,—

The past quarter affords but little on which I can report. The roads in the Northern and Western part of the Island were unfit for travelling, owing to the wet season, in the early part of the Spring; and the same cause delaying the operations of the farmers, has led to a thin attendance at many of the schools. I have made twenty-one visits, the details of which will be found in the subjoined Schedule.

New school-houses have been built at De Sable, Nail Pond West, and the new District of Howell's Brook, of all of which I can speak very favorably. There are many in my Section of the Island still very defective; and some stringent regulation on this subject, is urgently necessary.

The provision, as to repairs, or new buildings, where necessary, should, I suggest, be embodied with the other regulations of the Board; and, as I have before proposed, a printed copy should be transmitted to each School District.

The preliminary steps for building a school-house have been taken in the new District of Alberton, as near as possible to the site recommended by the Commissioners.

Ch'town, July 4, 1865.

During the past quarter I have made 117 visits to the several schools in my district, a full report of which will be found in the annexed Schedule.

I regret that most of the school-houses in Lot 15 are unoccupied. The population in this Township is almost entirely of French origin, and there appears to be among them a greater apathy, with regard to education, than in any other of the French Districts. There are six or seven vacant schools in this neighborhood, and in only one instance, did I hear any desire expressed for a teacher. On the other hand, the Trustees in the Franco-Rustico District, Lot 24, are anxious to procure one, if they have not already done so; and the French inhabitants of Wheatly, Lot 24, are

building a school-house which will form a striking contrast to the wretched hovel at present tenanted by the English School.

There are new school-houses at Webster's Creek and Franco-Rustico, besides which, those at DeSable, and St. Ignatius, Cavendish Road, are now completed; but there is still too little attention paid to those buildings throughout the country; many of them are too low and much too small for the number of children now attending them. That at St. Ann's, Lot 21, is very unfit for use in the winter, but I was told that a frame for a new one is prepared, though the building will not be fit for use during the present summer.

The inhabitants of the Cavendish District are desirous of forming a union with the English school in the Cavendish Road, and thus entitling themselves to a Grammar School.

I think this might be done without material inconvenience to either of the parties. The Cavendish Road school is but a small one, and there is a very good French school close to it, and, I believe, central as regards the District.

Some of the families, at its southern extremity, might well be transferred to the New Glasgow school, and the present master, Mr. Miller, is well qualified to instruct a superior class of scholars.

27th September, 1865.

The autumnal quarter affords but little to report with regard to the progress of the schools. The harvest and the potatoe digging necessarily occupy so many of the children, that the attendance is in some cases little more than nominal. I have visited thirteen schools, nearly completing my first half-yearly inspection, and making one hundred and fifty-one visits since my last yearly report, and four only on my second or winter circuit.

The continual changes in the children attending the schools, prevent me from forming any actual estimate of the progress made in any particular school; but, on the whole, the education of the rising generation is going on favorably in the Western Section of the Island. That it is capable of improvement, cannot be

doubted, but the teachers are generally willing and zealous, and many individual instances of diligence and aptitude for learning among the scholars, have come under my notice. The greatest drawback to improvement, is the irregular attendance of the pupils, and this is occasioned, in a great measure, by the apathy and indifference of the parents—an indifference which cannot be too strongly reprobated. It is true, that, at certain seasons of the year, the labor of the children is indispensable; but it too often happens that, at other times, some slight excuse, or the avoiding some trifling inconvenience, is considered sufficient to justify an absence from school; and this temporary absence not only throws back the individual child, but retards the progress of the class to which he belongs, and embarrasses the teacher. I regret that, in very many districts, the Trustees are negligent in performing their duty, and this, in time, causes an indifference on the part of the parents, and may induce an apathy on that of the teacher. I believe that many of the teachers have great reason to complain of the way in which the portion of their stipend, to be paid by the inhabitants, is collected by the Trustees; in many districts it is left to the teacher to collect, or perhaps not collected at all. This is too often the case, but I am happy to say that there are some exceptions in which the Trustees have co-operated with the teacher and the Visitor.

I have before mentioned the want of a sufficient supply of books; in some districts this exists to such a degree as to paralyze the exertions of the most active and diligent teacher.

The clauses in the Act of Assembly, requiring the action of two thirds of the resident house-holders, is found very inconvenient. This has retarded the erection of school-houses in three or four new districts, not so much from unwillingness, as from neglect in attending the meetings. It would surely be sufficient to require the co-operation of a majority attending a meeting duly called.

The early age at which the children are taken from school, especially the boys, often causes the instruction they have received to be forgotten, and therefore of little use in after life. This might be obviated, and, at the same time, instruction given to many young persons, who, from want of opportunity, have received

little education, by the establishment of evening schools for boys. In this country there are few youths, of 14 years of age and upwards, who could not afford a small weekly payment to any teacher who might be willing to receive them, for three or four evenings in a week. Should the Board approve of this suggestion, it will be for them to devise the best mode of carrying it into effect.

Wherever female teachers are employed, it would be beneficial if they were permitted, if not enjoined, to instruct the girls in plain needle-work on one or two afternoons in the week.

I submit for the consideration of the Board, that the formation of the Model Farm, near Charlottetown, affords an opportunity of giving instruction in scientific agriculture to a few of the young men of the Island, by establishing three Scholarships (one for each County) in that institution. The expense to the Government would be trifling, as, of course, the youths would be employed in carrying on the farming operations, and the benefit, especially to the remoter districts, would be obvious.

The new school-house at Alberton is nearly completed, Sir Edward Cunard having very liberally given the fee simple, and one of the Members for the District, G. W. Howlan, Esq., having relinquished his claim to a lease of an acre of land on the spot recommended by the Commissioners. I ought also to notice a new school-house in Franco-Rustico District, and another nearly completed, in that of Wheatly, also in Rustico; which last affords a striking contrast to the miserable dilapidated log building used as a school-house by the English and Scotch inhabitants of that District.

There are many school-houses still requiring improvement or rebuilding, partly from their being out of repair, and partly from their being too small and confined for the present number of scholars.

The statistical details of one hundred and two schools, visited in the past quarter, will be found in the annexed Schedule, which, with one hundred and fifty-eight, in the previous quarter, will make two hundred and sixty

visits paid since my last Annual Report, to which should be added twelve, in a Supplementary Report of April last, forwarded too late to be laid before the Legislature.

Four new Districts have been laid out on the Western Road, during the past summer, but I regret to say that but little progress has been made with the several school-houses. I have not been able to visit these localities to ascertain the causes of delay; but it is mainly attributable to the difficulties alluded to in my last report, under the 58th Sec. of the Act 24th Vic., Chap. 36.

The state of education at Summerside, has called for the special attention of the Board; and, in obedience to your instructions, I have paid four several visits to that place. During the summer, the district school was closed, owing to the unwillingness of the inhabitants to make any payment to the teacher; but Mr. McKay has lately re-opened it, and has now forty-four scholars on his Journal. The Grammar School has twenty-two pupils, and I shall transmit a special report on their progress, which has been quite satisfactory. There are two private schools, numbering respectively, forty-five, and thirty-two; but, as the children in the town, between the ages of five and sixteen, are estimated at three hundred, it will be evident that the provision is very inadequate. The only remedy appears to be the formation of a second school district; but, from a large portion of the population being of a transitory nature, some special legislative provision seems to be required. Of this, a large portion of the inhabitants are fully aware; and a petition, praying for a special enactment, is now in course of signature. The existing school-house requires considerable repair, and its position is objectionable. An active, energetic set of Trustees might effect a great improvement in many respects; but I have to regret that here, as in many other places, no little apathy prevails in educational matters.

The school-house at Alberton is so far completed that the school will shortly be opened. The new school, at Pleasant Valley, Lot 67, is in operation; and the school-houses at St. Ann's, and the South Wiltshire Road, are both in progress, and will probably be completed in the summer.

Should any Bill be introduced into the House

of Assembly, relative to Summerside, it may afford an opportunity of making some few general and experimental alterations. I should recommend the dispensing with the average for the autumnal or the harvest quarter, if it were kept up during the other three quarters. I suggest also, that it would be advisable to increase the Government allowance, by an addition of five pounds to second class teachers, and to those of the first class, who have taught without interruption for five years—making a proportionate increase, also, to females.

I shall endeavor to present, at the foot of the Schedule, a summary shewing, as near as may be, the number of children receiving education in the Western Section of the Island, and comprising those schools which I have been unable to visit during my winter circuit.

Alberton, 24th March, 1866.

The Grammar School, for Prince County, located at Summerside, have increased its numbers; from seventeen to twenty-two; and I have twice examined its scholars since the date of my last report, in March, 1865.

On the first occasion, I was assisted by the Rev. Mr. Forsythe, and the examination principally embraced the mathematical studies of the pupils. The senior classes acquitted themselves very satisfactorily, and the juniors were respectively well advanced in the more elementary branches.

On the 12th ultimo, I again visited the school, and had the pleasure of finding considerable improvement in all the pupils. One of them, Albert McLennan, construed and parsed an ode of Horace, and some passages from "Greek Extracts" very correctly. Five others were examined in Cæsar's Commentaries, and the Latin Grammar, and shewed themselves fairly grounded in that language. The workings in Arithmetic were very correctly done. The mental calculations, and the examinations in Geography, were equally satisfactory. In French, four pupils translated passages from Voltaire's Charles the XII, with great ease and fluency.

I was, however, somewhat surprised at finding the school quite destitute of maps. In addition to those of the World, and of Prince Edward Island, (which are expected to be supplied by the Trustees of every district school),

it would not be too much for a Grammar School to possess maps of the several continents, Great Britain and Ireland, the British N. A. Provinces, and the United States.

I think too, that a junior class, not instructed in the classics, might be introduced into this school, at a lower charge; and this would assist in providing the means of education at

Summerside, the destitution of which, in this respect, is already under the consideration of the Board.

I have been requested by the Legislative Council and the House of Assembly to forward the enclosed Address to Her Majesty the Queen, respecting the proposed Confederation of the British North American Provinces, upon the terms adopted at the Quebec Conference.

The prayer of this Address is, that "Her Majesty will be graciously pleased not to give Her Royal Assent or sanction to any Act or Measure founded upon the Resolution or Report of the said Conference or otherwise, that would have the effect of uniting Prince Edward Island in a Federal Union with Canada, or any other of Her Majesty's Provinces in America."

In accordance with the instructions conveyed to me in your Despatch, No. 29, of 8th December, 1864, I submitted to the local Legislature, during the late Session, the project of the Quebec Conference.

The Legislative Council, without a division, passed Resolutions disagreeing to the proposed

Union; Copy of these Resolutions is herein enclosed.

In the House of Assembly, Mr. William Henry Pope, the Colonial Secretary, moved Resolutions in favor of Union; Mr. James C. Pope, the President of the Executive Council, moved an amendment condemnatory of the proposed scheme.

The amendment was carried by the majority of eighteen; the numbers being:—

SIR ;

I have the honor to transmit to you the Copy of a Correspondence between Viscount Monck and myself on the affairs of British North America, which have lately formed the subject of conferences between Her Majesty's Government and a Deputation from the Canadian Government.

This Correspondence having been presented to both Houses of the Imperial Parliament by command of Her Majesty, I have to direct you to communicate it also to the Legislature of Prince Edward Island at its next meeting.

You will, at the same time, express the strong and deliberate opinion of Her Majesty's Government, that it is an object much to be desired that all the British North American Colonies should agree to unite in one Government. In the territorial extent of Canada,

and in the maritime and commercial enterprise of the Lower Provinces, Her Majesty's Government see the elements of power, which only require to be combined in order to secure for the Province, which shall possess them all, a place among the most considerable communities of the world. In the spirit of loyalty to the British Crown, of attachment to British connection, and of love for British Institutions, by which all the Provinces are animated alike, Her Majesty's Government recognize the bond by which all may be combined under one Government. Such an Union seems to Her Majesty's Government to recommend itself to the Provinces on many grounds of moral and material advantage, as giving a well founded prospect of improved administration and increased prosperity. But there is one consideration which Her Majesty's Government feel it more especially their duty to press upon the Legislature of Prince Edward Island. Looking to the determination which this country has ever exhibited to regard the defence of the Colonies as a matter of Imperial concern. The Colonies must recognize a right, and even acknowledge an obligation incumbent on the Home Government to urge, with earnestness and just authority, the measures which they consider to be most expedient on the part of the Colonies with a view to their own defence. Nor can it be doubtful that the Provinces of British North America are incapable, when separate and divided from each other, of making those just and sufficient preparations for national defence, which would be easily undertaken by a Province uniting in itself all the population and all the resources of the whole.

I am aware that this project, so novel as well as so important, has not been at once accepted in Prince Edward Island with that cordiality which has marked its acceptance by the Legislature of Canada, but Her Majesty's Government trust, that after a full and careful examination of the subject in all its bearings, the Maritime Provinces will perceive the great advantages which, in the opinion of Her Majesty's Government, the proposed Union is calculated to confer upon them all.

Copy of a Despatch from the Right Honorable Edward Cardwell, M. P., to Governor General Viscount Monck.

DOWNING STREET,

No. 95. 17th June, 1865.

MY LORD ;

I have the honor to inform your Lordship that several conferences have been held between the four Canadian Ministers who were deputed, under the Minute of your Executive Council of March 24th, to proceed to England to confer with Her Majesty's Government, on the part of Canada, and the Duke of Somerset, the Earl De Grey, Mr. Gladstone, and myself, on the part of Her Majesty's Government.

On the first subject referred to in the Minute, that of the Confederation of the British North American Provinces, we repeated on the part of the Cabinet the assurances which had already been given of the determination of Her Majesty's Government to use every proper means of influence to carry into effect without delay the proposed Confederation.

On the second point, we entered into a full consideration of the important subject of the

defence of Canada, not with any apprehension on either side that the friendly relations now happily subsisting between this country and the United States are likely to be disturbed, but impressed with the conviction that the safety of the Empire from possible attack ought to depend upon its own strength and the due application of its own resources. We reminded the Canadian Ministers that on the part of the Imperial Government we had obtained a vote of money for improving the fortifications of Quebec. We assured them that so soon as that vote had been obtained the necessary instructions had been sent out for the immediate execution of the works, which would be prosecuted with despatch; and we reminded them of the suggestion Her Majesty's Government had made to them to proceed with the fortifications of Montreal.

The Canadian Ministers, in reply, expressed unreservedly the desire of Canada to devote her whole resources, both in men and money, for the maintenance of her connection with the Mother Country; and their full belief in the readiness of the Canadian Parliament to make known that determination in the most authentic manner. They said they had increased the expenditure for their Militia from 300,000 to 1,000,000 dollars, and would agree to train that force to the satisfaction of the Secretary of State for War, provided the cost did not exceed the last mentioned sum annually, while the question of consideration is pending. They said they were unwilling to separate the question of the works at Montreal from the question of the works west of that place, and from the question of a naval armament on Lake Ontario. That the execution of the whole of these works would render it necessary for them to have recourse to a loan, which could only be raised with the guarantee of the Imperial Parliament. They were ready to propose to their Legislature on their return a measure for this purpose provided that the guarantee of the Imperial Parliament were given now, and that they were authorized to communicate to the Parliament of Canada the assurance that, the occasion arising, England will have prepared an adequate naval force for Lake Ontario. They thought that if the guarantee were not obtained now it was probable that the Canadian Government and Parliament would think it desirable that the question of defensive works should

await the decision of the Government and Legislature of the United Provinces.

On the part of Her Majesty's Government we assented to the reasonableness of the proposal that if the Province undertook the primary liability for the works of defence mentioned in the letter of Lieutenant Colonel Jervois, and showed a sufficient security, Her Majesty's Government should apply to Parliament for a guarantee for the amount required; and we said that Her Majesty's Government would furnish the armaments for the works. But we said that the desire and decision of the Provincial Legislature ought to be pronounced before any application was made to the Imperial Parliament. On the subject of a Naval Force for Lake Ontario, we said that, apart from any question of expediency, the convention subsisting between this country and the United States rendered it impossible for either nation to place more than the specified number of armed vessels on the lakes in times of peace. In case of war it would, as a matter of course, be the duty of any Government in this country to apply its means of naval defence according to the judgment it might form upon the exigencies of each particular time, and the Canadian Ministers might be assured that Her Majesty's Government would not permit itself to be found in such a position as to be unable to discharge its duty in this respect. This was the only assurance the Canadian Ministers could expect, or we could give.

Upon a review of the whole matter, the Canadian Ministers reverted to the proposal which has been mentioned above, that priority in point of time should be given to the Confederation of the Provinces. To this, we, on the part of Her Majesty's Government, assented. In conformity, however, with a wish strongly expressed by the Canadian Ministers, we further said, that if, upon future consideration, the Canadian Government should desire to anticipate the Confederation, and to propose that Canada should execute the works, they would doubtless communicate to Her Majesty's Government that decision; and we trusted that after what had passed in these conferences they would feel assured that any such communication would be received by us in the most friendly spirit.

On the third point, the Reciprocity Treaty, the Canadian Ministers represented the great

importance to Canada of the renewal of that treaty, and requested that Sir F. Bruce might be put in communication with the Government of Lord Monck upon the subject. We replied that Sir F. Bruce had already received instructions to negotiate for a renewal of the treaty, and to act in concert with the Government of Canada.

On the fourth point, the subject of the North-western Territory, the Canadian Ministers desired that that territory should be made over to Canada, and undertook to negotiate with the Hudson's Bay Company for the termination of their rights, on condition that the indemnity, if any, should be paid by a loan to be raised by Canada under the Imperial guarantees. With the sanction of the Cabinet, we assented to this proposal, undertaking that if the negotiation should be successful we on the part of the Crown being satisfied that the amount of the indemnity was reasonable, and the security sufficient, would apply to the Imperial Parliament to sanction the arrangement and to guarantee the amount.

On the last point, it seemed sufficient that Her Majesty's Government should accept the

assurances given by the Canadian Ministers on the part of Canada, that that Province is ready to devote all her resources both in men and money to the maintenance of her connexion with the Mother Country, and should assure them in return that the Imperial Government fully acknowledged the reciprocal obligation of defending every portion of the Empire with all the resources at its command.

The Canadian Ministers in conclusion said, that they hoped it would be understood that the present communications did not in any way affect or alter the correspondence which had already passed between the Imperial Government and the Governments of the British North American Provinces on the subject of the Intercolonial Railway. To this we entirely agreed.

SIR;

1. I deem it right to direct your attention to an expression in the concluding paragraph of your Predecessor's Despatch, No. 45, of 2d January, 1861. On the subject of the Commission appointed to settle the Land Question the Secretary of State remarked:—

“I trust you will impress upon the Commissioners, if requisite, the necessity of avoiding as far as possible any steps calculated to excite unreasonable expectations, or to stimulate agitation; on the other hand, while assuring the proprietors that the award of the Commissioners will not be enforced by Her Majesty's Government against any persons who have not, either personally or by their representatives, consented to refer their claims to arbitration, I should wish you also to observe to them, that their refusal to concur frankly in a measure which was intended to compose existing differences, and which, so far as it has yet proceeded, has been assented to by a large portion of their body, may materially influence the conduct of Her Majesty's Government, if called upon hereafter to support them in any future disputes with their tenants.”

2. In several parts of this Island persons have formed themselves into a league with the avowed intention of withholding payment of rents until the proprietors consent to sell their Estates on such terms as this league may deem just; and during last week a Constable who attempted to take a man from a procession of this league was prevented from executing his duty.

3. I am given to understand that the paragraph I have quoted is used on the estates of the proprietors who did not consent to the Commission of 1860, in order to induce the tenants to believe that if they combine in sufficient force they may take the law into their own hands, because (it is argued) intimation is plainly given in that paragraph that external assistance will not be brought in, if required to maintain that law.

4. From my experience of the people of this Island, I have formed too high an opinion of their good sense to lead me to suppose that I shall have any serious difficulty in maintaining the law; but you will, I am sure, concur with me in the opinion that any idea of the uncertainty of its supremacy should be at once removed.

5. I have, with the advice of my Council, issued a Proclamation, copy of which is enclosed, and I now bring the paragraph to which I have referred under your notice, in order that, if you think fit, any chance of misconstruction to which its meaning is perhaps open, may be removed by the authority from which the paragraph emanated.

A Proclamation by His Excellency George Dundas, Esquire, Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories thereunto belonging, Chancellor, Vice Admiral and Ordinary

Whereas it appears that divers persons in certain parts of this Island have associated, or leagued together, for the purpose of counselling, aiding and assisting one another in resisting the payment of certain rents, which they became legally bound to pay, as tenants, on certain Townships in this Island.

And whereas it has been brought to my notice that an Officer of the Law has recently been violently obstructed and prevented from discharging his duty by persons who have so combined as aforesaid. Now I have thought fit to issue this my Proclamation, warning all parties concerned in such unlawful combination that, in attempting to carry out such purposes, they do oppose themselves to Her Majesty and the Laws.

And I do command and enjoin all such persons immediately to abstain from all such unlawful associations.

And I do further command and enjoin all Magistrates, Sheriffs and other Ministers of the Law, and all Constables and Peace Officers, and all other loyal subjects of Her Majesty, to discourage, by every means in their power, such unlawful combination, and to give their prompt aid and assistance, when lawfully required, in opposing, preventing and resisting all persons, whomsoever, who shall take part in any such unlawful combination, and in arresting and bringing to justice any such persons offending, or having offended as aforesaid.

And I do further solemnly warn all persons that it is my duty to see that the Law shall take its course, and that I shall cause it to be obeyed and respected throughout the Island.

SIR;

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch, No. 23, of the 23d of March, in which you request to be informed of the construction which should be given to a paragraph in the Duke of Newcastle's Despatch, No. 45, of the 2d of January, 1861, on the subject of the enquiry into the Land Question in Prince Edward Island.

The duty of enforcing the law in the Island against those who defy it rests with the Local Government, and for that reason, if for no other, it is impossible to suppose that the Duke of Newcastle could have intended to imply, by the passage to which you refer, that the pro-

prietors who refused to compromise their rights would be left without the protection of the law.

The meaning of His Grace evidently was that the Home Government would not advise the Queen to exert her Majesty's Prerogative by disallowing Acts of the Legislature of Prince Edward Island in defence of those who refused reasonable terms of accommodation when offered to them.

SIR;

Lieutenant Governor Dundas, in a Despatch dated 23d March last, informed you that in several parts of this Island persons had formed themselves into a league with the avowed intention of withholding payment of rents until the proprietors consent to sell their estates on such terms as the league may deem just, and that he had issued a Proclamation warning all parties concerned in such unlawful combination that, in attempting to carry out such purposes, they oppose themselves to Her Majesty and the Laws.

Lieutenant Governor Dundas, in the same Despatch, expressed his opinion that he could not suppose there would be any serious difficulty in maintaining the Law.

I regret that this opinion has proved erroneous.

Three days before Lieut. Governor Dundas left the Colony an assemblage of people, chiefly, it is believed, inhabitants of Township No. 23 and 24, situate within 17 miles of Charlottetown, intercepted the Deputy Sheriff of Queen's County within six miles of the capital: with carriages and horses barricaded the highway and violently assaulted him and his Bailiffs, and rescued from them property which

the Deputy Sheriff had taken under an execution issued from the Supreme Court.

One of the most violent of this assemblage, a tenant named Charles Dickieson, was secured by the Sheriff's party, brought to Charlottetown, and committed to the Jail of Queen's County.

The Sheriff promptly caused the Government to be made acquainted with the circumstances of the riot, assault and rescue, laid before it affidavits of the Deputy Sheriff and one of his assistants, and represented the state of the country to be such as rendered it impossible for them to execute Her Majesty's Writs.

Copies of these affidavits, together with a copy of the communication addressed by the Sheriff to the Colonial Secretary, I have the honor to enclose; I have also the honor to enclose copy of a communication addressed to the President of the Council by Theophilus DesBrisay, Esq., the Justice of the Peace who had issued Warrants for the apprehension of persons concerned in the riot, assault and rescue, stating his inability to procure the execution of these Warrants unless provided with a special force for the purpose.

One of my first acts on assuming the Administration of the Government, was to bring under the notice of the Executive Council the disturbed state of the Colony. After mature consideration of the communications received from Mr. Dodd, the Sheriff, and from Mr. DesBrisay, the Magistrate, it was resolved that these officers should be authorized to employ special constables at the expense of the Government. I have the honor to enclose copies of the replies sent to those gentlemen respectively.

On or about the 22nd day of July a constabulary force proceeded to the dwelling house or the persons for whose apprehension Warrants had been issued, they there ascertained that the persons of whom they were in search were absent. On its becoming known that the constables were in the settlement, numbers of persons, carrying with them tin trumpets, assembled and surrounded them, blew their trumpets and followed the constables within a few miles of the city.

On the 26th July, Dickieson was in course of law to be brought for examination before the

Justice of the Peace, Mr. DesBrisay. This, it would appear, was known some days previously throughout the country, and at an early hour numbers of persons known to be connected with the Tenant League were observed to enter the city. As the day advanced, a large number had assembled in the vicinity of the Jail, and in the streets leading thence to the City Hall, apparently waiting the bringing up of the prisoner.

The Sheriff seeing so large an assemblage became apprehensive that they had congregated for the purpose of rescuing Dickieson; he had the day previously been informed that it was probable that a rescue would be attempted. The Sheriff therefore addressed to the Colonial Secretary a requisition for Arms to be supplied to a force of Special Constables, which he intended to organize. A copy of the Sheriff's communication I have the honor to enclose.

It was absolutely necessary, in order to prevent Dickieson from being brought up by Writ of Habeas Corpus and immediately discharged, that he should be taken before the Magistrate on the 26th July. I considered it my duty, under these circumstances, to order compliance with the Sheriff's request. At the same time I directed the Colonial Secretary to counsel the exercise of the utmost forbearance on the Sheriff and the Special Constables. I have the honor to enclose a copy of the letter addressed by the Colonial Secretary to the Sheriff in answer to his requisition.

The prisoner Dickieson was safely conducted from the Jail to the City Hall, escorted by the Sheriff and about 25 Special Constables, each armed with a cavalry pistol loaded with ball cartridge. The charge against Dickieson was duly investigated, and he gave bail for his appearance at the next term of the Supreme Court. On perfecting bail, Dickieson was, as a matter of course, discharged by the Magistrate; he was, however, detained by the Sheriff, having previously been charged in execution under a Judge's order for debt at the Suit of his Landlord. The Sheriff, aided by the constabulary force, proceeded from the City Hall with Dickieson in order to recommit him to Jail. On leaving the City Hall the Sheriff and his assistants were immediately surrounded and pressed upon by an excited mob of upwards of 1,000 persons apparently

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determined to rescue the prisoner. Stones were thrown, and several of the Constables were struck by them.

To the circumstances of the Constables being armed, and to their firmness, is attributable the safe keeping of Dickieson and his re-committal to Jail. The courage and great forbearance exhibited by the Sheriff and Special Constables, under very trying circumstances, cannot be too highly praised.

On the night of the 26th July I caused guards to be placed on the building containing the rifles and arms loaned by Her Majesty's Government to the Colony, and in charge of the Magazine which is situate at a distance of a half-mile from the City. I also caused a guard to be stationed in the Jail for its better security.

The guard has been withdrawn from the Jail. The Armory and Magazine still remain guarded.

The number of persons associated for the purpose of resisting payment of rent, I have no means of ascertaining. The Tenant Union is supposed to comprise several thousands, and there is too much reason to fear that those of the population who sympathise with them are still more numerous.

In Queen's County the Sheriff has declared his inability to execute the process of the Supreme Court in consequence of the opposition of the tenant organization.

It has been reported to me that immediately a Sheriff's officer is observed to enter a settlement, tin trumpets are blown in all directions, many of the inhabitants assemble, surround the officers, blow trumpets in their faces and insult and defy them. In March last the Deputy Sheriff was waylaid and prevented from entering a settlement some 10 or 12 miles from Charlottetown. It was known that the object of his visit was the service of Writs upon defaulting tenants. In the same month the streets of the capital were paraded by several hundreds of persons, headed by a band of music, and carrying colors, on which were painted various mottos, such as "Free Lands," "Tenant Rights," &c., &c. A man in the procession was arrested by the Deputy Sheriff—the officer was knocked down and the prisoner rescued from him within a few yards of the police

station. The rescue is mentioned in Lieutenant Governor Dundas's Despatch to you dated 23d March, 1865. On or about the 27th of May last one of the Proprietors of Township No. 36, succeeded in serving several Writs upon his Tenants; a few days after, his barns were destroyed by fire. The affidavits placed before the Executive Government, on which a Proclamation was issued offering a reward of £500 for the discovery of the incendiaries, ascribed the destroying of the barns to the serving of the Writs.

Taking into consideration these and the more recent occurrences of which I have informed you, I am constrained to admit that, in Queen's County, the Sheriff, unless attended by an armed force, cannot, with safety to himself and his officers, attempt to discharge the duties of his office.

There is, as you are aware, no regular military force in this Island. The act by which the Volunteer Force of the Colony is regulated, will not justify the employment of volunteers for the purpose of repressing civil commotion. The objection to calling out the militia in aid of the civil power under circumstances such as exist in this Colony will readily present themselves to you. To arm one portion of a community against another, is at all times, in my humble opinion, a procedure of questionable propriety.

To uphold the authority of Her Majesty in this Island by vindicating the supremacy of Her Laws, and maintaining in the enjoyment of their legal rights all Her subjects I consider my paramount duty. The authority of the Law being openly and systematically set at defiance by a large number of the inhabitants, there being no regular military force at my command, and the militia of the Colony not being, in my opinion, available, I consider it my duty to submit to the Members of the Executive Council the necessity which I believed to exist of giving notice to the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia of the disturbed state of the Island, and to request a Detachment of Troops from the garrison at Halifax.

At a full meeting of the Executive Council convened yesterday the subject matter of this Despatch was fully discussed, and I have the honor to acquaint you that, with the unani-

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mous consent and approval of the Members of the Government, I have forwarded to Sir Richard G. McDonnell a requisition for two Companies of Troops to be without delay despatched to this Island. I have the honor to enclose a copy of the requisition addressed to Sir R. G. McDonnell.

I need hardly assure you that, in taking this extreme course, I have acted with much hesitation and reluctance, and under the conviction that I should be wanting in my duty to my Sovereign and the people of this Island did I hesitate to do so.

The Despatch of one of your predecessors, Earl Grey, dated Downing Street, 12th February, 1851, and addressed to Sir Alexander Bannerman, then Lieutenant Governor of this Island, indicated the course which Her Majesty's Imperial Government desired should be pursued by the Administrator of the Government of this Island in the event of any attempts being made to resist the laws which secure the landed proprietors of the Island in their rights. In the Despatch to which I have referred, after alluding to the subject of the landed tenures of this Island, Earl Grey states: "The subsisting rights of parties cannot therefore be altered in any other manner than by that of equitable adjustment, and while the law continues as at present, it is your duty to enforce obedience to it by the firm exercise of the authority entrusted to you, and by the employment, if necessary, of the military force at your command. Should any extreme cause occur, you may even apply to Sir John Hervey for an additional force to put down any attempt at resistance by the tenantry to the law."

In the year 1851 a company of troops was stationed in Charlottetown; in 1854 the troops were permanently withdrawn from the Colony. Subsequently to Earl Grey's Despatch of 12th February, 1851, the Right Honorable Henry Labouchere addressed to Sir Dominick Daly, Lieutenant Governor of this Island, a Despatch dated 6th December, 1855, in reply to communication having reference to the unprotected state of the Colony, and the probability of resistance to the Laws.

This Despatch is marked "Confidential," and contains the following:—

"I am not aware of any sufficient grounds for anticipating a disturbance of public tran-

quility, but if I am to understand your language as expressive of any such apprehension on your part, I wish to remind you that it is in your power at any time to give notice to the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, and to request the presence of a detachment of soldiers from the Garrison of Halifax."

I am happy to be able to inform you that, in my opinion, the presence of a regular military force in this Island will, in itself, have the effect of preventing further resistance to the Laws, and that I have no reason to apprehend that there will be any necessity for bringing the troops into conflict with the people.

I trust that the course pursued by me, under the trying circumstances in which I have been placed, will meet your approval.

I beg leave to lay before you and the other members of the Government and ask your attention to the following:—

Having received two executions issued out of the Supreme Court at the suit of Robert Rennie, Esquire, against two men, Proctor and Dickieson, I placed them in the hands of my Deputy (James Curtis) for execution. He, after having levied on Proctor's goods and brought them within a few miles of town, was attacked and badly beaten by overpowering numbers, and the goods levied upon by him rescued; I am, therefore, completely powerless to execute any Writs placed in my hands. This case is one of such a serious nature that no time ought to be lost in taking the matter into your serious consideration.

Affidavit of James Curtis.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

QUEEN'S COUNTY to wit: James Curtis, of Charlottetown, in the said County and Island, Under or Deputy Sheriff of the said County, maketh oath and saith that this Deponent received *Fi. Fa.* and *Ca. Sa.* executions against Charles Dickieson and James Proctor, of New Glasgow, at the Suit of Robert Rennie, Administrator of David Stewart Rennie, deceased, on Monday the 17th day of July instant, that this Deponent employed Jonathan Collins, Henry Chowan and Henry Swan, Bailiffs, to assist him in the execution of his duty. That Deponent left his dwelling house on Tuesday morning between the hours of eight and nine o'clock, accompanied by his said Bailiffs, and went towards James Proctor's, upon whose goods and chattels he intended levying. That when between Bagnall's and the said Proctor's house, they were met by one John McLean who recognized this Deponent. When McLean had passed them for a short distance he turned and followed them and commenced blowing a tin trumpet. That Deponent knowing that an association had been formed by the people in and about New Glasgow to oppose and resist any attempt to enforce the Law, at once suspected that McLean was giving some signal, and this suspicion was confirmed by hearing the signal answered from farm to farm. That deponent and his Bailiffs passed on quietly to Proctor's house, and when a short distance therefrom, this Deponent and the said Henry Swan went up to Proctor's house, leaving the said Collins and Chowan behind. That this Deponent found that Proctor was from home, but that upon his wife promising to send for him, he waited for a length of time. That finding Proctor did not make his appearance, Deponent, under and by virtue of the *Fi. Fa.* he held against him, levied upon a horse, waggon, harness and saddle, and drove off, accompanied by his said Bailiffs. That as soon as they reached New Glasgow Bridge about twenty men were collected on horseback, and in waggons, blowing tin trumpets—fresh arrivals were coming in and joining them every moment. That the most violent of all and the ring-leader, who seemed to be issuing instructions to them, was one Charles Dickieson,

against whom this Deponent held a *Ca. Sa.* at the Suit of the said Robert Rennie. That as soon as Dickieson recognized the said Jonathan Collins, he began to swear at and abuse the said Collings; but that Deponent at once charged the said Collings to make no answer or reply as he was most anxious to avoid any altercation. But the said Charles Dickieson and his companions followed this Deponent and his Bailiffs as they proceeded on their way to Wheatly River Bridge, the said Dickieson cursing and swearing at Deponent, and encouraging the people who followed him to rescue the property of Proctor; and this Deponent further saith that the said James Proctor, whom Deponent had not seen before, came up to him and asked Deponent to release the said property, which Deponent expressed his willingness to do, and would have done had sufficient security been given. That the said James Proctor offered the said Charles Dickieson as his security; but that Deponent not conceiving him a sufficient security refused to accept him. That the said James Proctor then offered one McMillan, whom Deponent agreed to accept, and it was arranged that the said James Proctor should come to Deponent's house the next day with McMillan, and upon a Bond being executed, the property would be given up. With this the said James Proctor seemed perfectly satisfied and asked Deponent to give him up the saddle, which Deponent did, and as soon as he received it he turned his horse and rode off in the opposite direction. And this Deponent further saith, that as soon as the said Charles Dickieson saw that Deponent appeared unwilling to act harshly, and had promised to give up Proctor's property, that he became more abusive and excited, and repeatedly urged upon the people to rescue the horse and waggon. And Deponent further saith, that at the old Rustico Road, the said Charles Dickieson and his companions left from following Deponent; but as soon as Deponent reached Milton, he found that they had gone round another way and had stationed themselves on the bridge a short distance below Milton Church. That they placed a horse and cart across the said bridge, and another in the water at the side of the bridge, and ranged their horses in such a manner as made it utterly impossible for even a foot passenger to pass. That when they had arrived at the bridge, De-

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ponent said, "Gentlemen, allow me to pass," but that no attempt was made to permit Deponent to pass. That Deponent then got out of the waggon, when a rush was immediately made upon Deponent, and Deponent was struck several times upon the head and body with large sticks or longers, which had been pulled from the fences by the said Charles Dickieson and his companions. That Deponent was half stunned by the blows he received; but that Deponent, owing to the confusion, is unable to state positively who struck Deponent; but Deponent most positively swears that he clearly and distinctly saw the said Charles Dickieson throw a stone at Deponent, which struck Deponent on the head, and immediately Deponent's face was covered with blood from the wound caused by the blow from the stone. That Deponent was partially stunned and blinded with the blood, and unable to offer much resistance. That a rush was made, and the horse and waggon were carried off by the people. That Deponent saw Dickieson in Collings' custody, and heard Collings say if they attacked him again he would shoot the first man came near him. That this Deponent further saith, that he came to town, and committed the said Charles Dickieson to Queen's County Jail.

QUEEN'S COUNTY to wit: Jonathan Collings, of Charlottetown, in the said County and Island, Bailiff, maketh oath and saith that Deponent has been a Bailiff and Constable for a number of years past, and has frequently, in such capacity, assisted the Sheriffs of the said Counties and their Deputies to execute Writs issued from the Supreme Court of Judicature; and this Deponent further saith, that on Monday, the 17th day of July instant, Deponent was requested by James Curtis, the Under or Deputy Sheriff of Thomas Walker Dodd, Esq., High Sheriff of Queen's County, to assist him in the execution of certain Writs placed in his

hands, which Deponent consented to do. That Deponent left Charlottetown, aforesaid, yesterday morning, at six o'clock, to join the said James Curtis at his the said Curtis's dwelling house, which is about four miles from town. That Deponent left the dwelling house of the said James Curtis in company with the said Deputy Sheriff, one Henry Chowan, and also another Bailiff whose name Deponent is unacquainted with, That they proceeded to New Glasgow to the dwelling house of one James Proctor, against whom or whose chattels Deponent understood that the said James Curtis held an execution. That Deponent knowing of the organization which existed to prevent the execution of Her Majesty's Writs was particularly careful to observe any notice or intimation which might be given of their approach. That when between Bagnall's and the said James Proctor's, Deponent observed that they were met by a man on horseback who closely scrutinized them, and after he seemed to recognize them, drew back some distance behind them and blew a horn or tin trumpet, which was answered from farm to farm. That the said James Curtis, accompanied by the said Bailiff, went up to the said James Proctor's house, leaving this Deponent and the said Henry Chowan outside. That observing that neither the said James Curtis nor the said Bailiff came out of Proctor's house, Deponent left the said Henry Chowan in charge of the horses and went after the said James Curtis whom this Deponent found waiting for the said James Proctor. That after remaining for some time, and the said James Proctor not having made his appearance, the said James Curtis levied upon a horse, waggon and harness and saddle, belonging to the said James Proctor. That the said James Curtis, together with this Deponent, the said Henry Chowan and the said Bailiff, left Proctor's house, the said James Curtis driving the said horse and waggon that had been levied upon. That so soon as they reached New Glasgow Bridge, about twenty men were collected there on horseback, blowing tin trumpets, and were joined by fresh numbers. That the most violent amongst them all was one Charles Dickieson, who seemed to be the ringleader. That the said Charles Dickieson, as soon as he recognized Deponent, commenced to swear at

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and abuse Deponent. But that the said James Curtis charged this Deponent to make no reply, as he was most anxious to avoid anything which might in any manner tend to excite the people. That they then proceeded on their way towards Wheatly River Bridge, still followed by the people who hooted and yelled after them, the number increasing as they proceeded. That the said James Proctor, whom Deponent had not previously seen, overtook them, and asked the said James Curtis if he would take security for the forthcoming of the property which had been levied upon. That the said James Curtis expressed his willingness to release the property if sufficient security was given, provided the said James Proctor came to the said James Curtis's house for that purpose the next day. That the said James Proctor offered the said Charles Dickieson as his security; but that the said James Curtis replied that he would not accept him as such security. That the said James Proctor then offered one McMillan, of Wheatly River Bridge, but as McMillan was not present it was agreed that the said James Proctor should come to Ch'town the next day with McMillan, and that a Bond being thereupon executed, his property should be restored to him; with this Proctor seemed perfectly satisfied, and turning his horse, rode off in an opposite Direction. And this Deponent further saith, that as soon as the said Charles Dickieson heard that the property of the said James Proctor was to be released as soon as sufficient security was given for its forthcoming, and when he saw that the said James Curtis appeared willing to act as willingly and leniently as he could, the more abusive and excited he became, swearing at the said James Curtis and this Deponent. And this Deponent further saith, that at the old Rustico Road, the people left from following Deponent, turning off to the New Glasgow Road. That the said James Curtis, accompanied by this Deponent, the said Henry Chowan and the said Bailiff, proceeded on until they came to Milton Church, where they were again met by the said Charles Dickieson, accompanied by the same people. That the said Charles Dickieson and his said companions halted upon the bridge immediately below the residence of Owen Curtis, Esquire, and completely obstructed the way by placing

a horse and cart across the said bridge and another in the stream, and ranging their horses across the said bridge in such a manner as made it utterly impossible for even a foot passenger to pass. That as soon as the said Jas. Curtis reached the said bridge, he requested them to allow him to pass, saying, "Gentlemen, please allow me to pass" As they made no attempt to move, he got out of his waggon, when a murderous attack was made upon him; Deponent saw the said James Curtis struck on the head and body three or four times with large sticks or longers which they had pulled from the fence by the road side; but Deponent, owing to the confusion, is unable positively to swear who struck the blows; but Deponent most positively swears that he distinctly saw the said Charles Dickieson throw a large stone, which he held in his hand, with all his force at the said James Curtis; that the stone struck Curtis on the head, and his face was immediately covered with blood; that Deponent ran at Dickieson and seized him by the hair of his head and held him; at the same time Deponent drew a pocket pistol and said he would fire; that some one of them (but whom, Deponent does not know) came forward, evidently with the intention of rescuing Dickieson; that Deponent told him to keep back; that he paid no attention and prepared to attack Deponent, whereupon, as soon as he came within striking distance, Deponent struck him in the face with the pistol, and laid open one side of his cheek; and Deponent saith further, that after the said James Curtis had been struck on the head by the stone thrown by Dickieson, a rush was made, and Proctor's horse and waggon, which had been levied upon, was carried off in the direction of New Glasgow—the people yelling and howling; that this Deponent still held hold of Dickieson, and with the assistance of Chowan, placed him in Curtis's waggon; that as soon as the people perceived that Dickieson had been arrested, they drew back a short distance, and prepared to make a rush for the purpose of rescuing him; but that Deponent stood on the bridge, and cocking his pistol, told him he would shoot the first man who came near him; that this seemed to frighten them, and in a short time they withdrew; that Deponent then bound up Curtis's arm which hung helpless at his side, and then proceeded to town, and

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deposited Dickieson in the County Jail.

I regret to inform you of the existence in

the Island of an extensive organization of the inhabitants known as the Tenant League.

The avowed purpose of this organization is to resist all attempts of the landed proprietors to enforce payment of rent from their tenants. This illegal union has extended its influence throughout the greater portion of Queen's County, and the Sheriff has reported to me his utter inability to execute the process of the Supreme Court. I, this day, brought the subject of the disturbed state of the Island before my Executive Council, and with their unanimous consent and approval, I have to request that you will be pleased to forward to the Island, as soon as possible, two companies of soldiers from the Garrison of Halifax.

I beg to inform you, that owing to this Colony having been unused to military occupation for several years, no Quarter-masters' or Ordnance Stores are available. That in consequence of there not being at present any building which can be appropriated as temporary barracks, all camp equipage must be brought with the detachment. Should the occupation be protracted beyond the fair weather season, means for securing winter quarters can be adopted.

The necessity for troops in this Island arises out of the disputes between the landed proprietors and their tenants. In the year 1851, Earl Grey, in a Despatch dated 12th February, and addressed to Sir Alexander Bannerman, in referring to the subject of these disputes, observed, "The subsisting rights of parties cannot therefore be altered in any other manner than by that of equitable adjustment, and while the Law continues as at present, it is your duty to enforce obedience to it by the firm exercise of the authority entrusted to you, and by the employment, if necessary, of the military force at your command. Should any extensive case occur, you may even apply to Sir John Hervey for an additional force to put down any attempt at resistance to the Law."

Subsequently, the Right Honorable Henry Labouchere, in a Despatch to Sir D. Daly, then Lieutenant Governor of this Island, dated 6th December, 1853, addressed His Excellency on the same subject in the following terms: "I am not aware of any sufficient ground for anticipating a disturbance of public tranquility, but if I am to understand your language as expressive of any such apprehension on your part,

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I wish to remind you that it is in your power, at any time, to give notice to the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, and to request the presence of a detachment of soldiers from the Garrison of Halifax."

I presume Your Excellency will consider the Despatches from which these extracts are taken as authority for complying with the request.

This Despatch will be handed to you by the Colonial Secretary, the Hon. W. H. Pope, who is fully acquainted with the views of the Government and authorized to further, by his assistance, the immediate transmission of the troops.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch, No. 62, of the 2nd of August, in which you report the occurrence of disturbances in several parts of Prince Edward Island, and the measures which, with the advice of your Executive, you had taken for their suppression.

I consider that, before all things, it is necessary for the local Government to maintain the supremacy of the Law, and I have to express my approval of your conduct and proceedings under the circumstances explained in your Despatch.

It is my intention to address you further on this subject by an early opportunity.

SIR;

With reference to my Despatch, No. 38, of

the 18th of August, conveying to you a general approval of your conduct and proceedings on the occasion of the recent disturbances in Prince Edward Island, I desire to place you in possession of the views of Her Majesty's Government on one important point.

I refer to the requisition which, on the advice of your Council, you made to the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia for two companies from the Garrison of Halifax.

I have already expressed my opinion, that to maintain the supremacy of the law, is the first duty of the local Government, and I readily admit, that in the present emergency, and in the absence of any regular military force, no other course was open to you than the one you adopted. But Her Majesty's Government must adhere in this instance to the principle on which they have elsewhere hitherto acted, and I therefore wish to impress upon you that civil disturbances should be met by an effective civil force, and that Her Majesty's troops cannot be placed at the disposal of the Colonial Government, at the expense of this country, for the purpose of supplying the want of a Colonial Police.

Whether the presence of a military force is required for the suppression of riots between different factions of the population, or to aid the civil power in the due execution of the law, the same principle applies, and the expense of the transport of such force from a neighboring Garrison, and also the cost of their maintenance in the Colony in which their presence is required, must be defrayed by that Colony, and cannot become a charge on the Imperial Exchequer.

Extract from Minutes of Executive Council.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE,
17th October, 1865.

The Executive Council in Committee, having had under their consideration the Despatches of the Right Honorable Edward Cardwell, Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, to His Honor the Administrator of the Government of this Colony, of the respective dates of August 23 and September 16, 1865, with regard to the expense of the transport from Halifax of the troops now stationed in this Island, and also the cost of their maintenance whilst in the Colony, beg to submit:

That they acquiesce in the propriety of the intimation conveyed by the Colonial Minister in the Despatches referred to: That the Colony should be liable for all expenses incurred directly or indirectly for the movement of these troops; but when they look at the fact, that Her Majesty's troops, stationed respectively in Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick, are rationed and maintained at the cost of the Imperial Government, they cannot concur in the justice of the rule that would place Prince Edward Island under a different system in regard to the maintenance of the troops stationed within it:

That whilst the undersigned sincerely deprecate the existence of such an illegal organization as that known as the Tenant League or Union in this Island, and are aware that the development of that organization has been the immediate cause of troops being now placed in the Colony, they cannot shut their eyes to the fact, that the feeling of discontent on the part of the tenantry, owes its origin to the Imperial error originally committed in granting the whole soil of the Colony in large tracts to individuals; an error which necessarily gave rise to an extensive leasehold system, and engendered that strife and ill feeling between landlord and tenant, which, from the earliest settlement of the Colony, have continued without interruption down to the present time.

The local Government have, at a cost of a large sum of money, over and above that realized from the sale of the old Barrack ground, erected and provided commodious and permanent Barracks, and accommodation for an adequate military force, and have used every means in their power to prevent desertion by

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the soldiers, and are still willing to fulfil every obligation that Her Majesty's Government can reasonably demand at the hands of the Colony. But that whilst they will most willingly pay for the transport of the troops from Halifax, and all expenses incurred, whether for maintenance or otherwise, when they are sent into the country districts, to assist the Sheriff and his Officers in maintaining the supremacy of the Law. They must for the reasons stated, most respectfully remonstrate with Her Majesty's Government against the hardship of paying the expense of the maintenance of the troops whilst stationed in the Colony.

SIR ;

I have the honor to acquaint you that, in compliance with the requisition to His Excellency Sir Richard Graves McDonnell, Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, a copy of which accompanied my Despatch to you, No. 62, 2d August, 1865, two companies of the 16th Regt., consisting of 8 Officers and 130 men, under a Field Officer, were landed in Charlottetown, from the Steamer *Merlin*, on the morning of the 6th August instant.

2. The military barracks, wooden buildings, erected in Charlottetown upwards of a half century ago, and occupied by Her Majesty's troops until 1854, have been sold, together with the site they occupied, under the authority of the Local Act, 26 Vic., Cap. 8. No buildings suitable for the accommodation of troops being available, the detachment pitched their tents in a field in the vicinity of Charlottetown.

3. The embarkation of this detachment, from the Garrison of Halifax, was signified to

me by Col. Francklyn, commanding the troops in Nova Scotia, in a Despatch dated Halifax, 4th August, 1865, a copy of which, I have the honor to enclose.

4. You will observe that Colonel Francklyn alleges that the requisition for military aid, and directed by me to the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, should have been addressed to the Officer Commanding Her Majesty's Forces in that Province; and also, that Colonel Francklyn requests me to address to him direct a requisition similar to that forwarded to Sir Richard Graves McDonnell.

5. In compliance with Colonel Francklyn's request, I forwarded to that Officer direct a requisition addressed to Colonel Francklyn, Commanding Troops, Halifax, N. S., but, in every other respect similar to the requisition which I had previously addressed to Sir Richard Graves McDonnell, and I have the honor to enclose a copy of my Despatch to Colonel Francklyn in reply to that Officer's communication of the 4th August, instant.

6. The presence in the Island of a regular military force will, in my opinion, secure the supremacy of the Law. The bringing that force into the Colony has, however, deeply irritated those who, but for its presence, would, with comparative impunity, array themselves against the authority of the Law.

7. To withdraw the regular troops from the Colony, so long as the existing agrarian agitation shall continue in anything approaching its present proportion, would afford the members of the Tenant Union ample opportunity to carry out the pledge of their organization, and to subvert the laws.

8. The agitation which now so unhappily disturbs the peace of Prince Edward Island, arises out of the Leasehold System, and is almost coeval with the settlement of the Colony. From its character it is impossible to form even an opinion as to when it will so far subside as to permit the withdrawal of the troops.

9. Several thousands of tenants, a large proportion of them inhabiting the wealthier settlements of the Colony, have associated for the purpose of resisting all attempts of their landlord to enforce payment of rent, until the landlord shall agree to sell to the tenants the fee simple of their farms, at prices which the latter may consider fair and reasonable.

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10. The Tenant Union originated about the commencement of the year 1864. In April of that year the following notice appeared in a newspaper published in Charlottetown, and reputed the organ of the Union :—

“ DELEGATION MEETING.

“ The undersigned nominated and deputed Delegates on behalf of the oppressed and suffering tenantry on Townships Nos. 48, 49, 50, 35 and 36, and that of the Island generally, most respectfully request that all Tenant Organizations who have unfurled the Banner of Freedom, and emphatically repudiate the arbitrary, intolerable and tyrannic propositions of resident and absentee Proprietors, and consequently intend withholding the further liquidation of rent and arrears of rent, until a compromise being effected upon compatible, honorable, equitable and satisfactory principles, to appoint and depute three discreet Delegates for the representation of each Township throughout this disaffected rent-ridden and slave-holding Colony, to meet at the North American Hotel, in Charlottetown, on Thursday the 19th day of May next, at 11 o'clock, a.m., precisely, for the purpose of taking into consideration and deliberating upon ominously important and efficient measures in connection with the respective Tenant Organizations in progress in this Island. Therefore, the object in contemplation being the formation of one concentrated Federal Tenant Organization, the basis being unflinching fidelity, loyalty, union, sympathy and action, which inevitably must ultimately contribute to the tranquility, harmony, contentment and prosperity of this much neglected Colony.

11. About the month of May, 1864, the following Tenants' pledge was published, as I believe, with the sanction of the Leaders of the Tenant Union :—

“ Resolved, That we the tenantry of— individually and collectively, virtually and solemnly, pledge our honor and fidelity to each other, to withhold the further liquidation

of rent and arrears of rent ; and thus voluntarily enroll our respective names as a tenant organization to resist the distraint, coercion, ejection, seizure and sale for rent and arrears of rent, until a compromise be effected in conformity with resolutions proposed and carried by the meetings in Lots 48, 49 and 50, and further understood that each signature hereto annexed bear a proportional share of expenses in connection with this organization.”

12. A Central Committee, I have understood, meets regularly in Charlottetown, and receives the reports from Branch Societies which, from time to time, are organized in different parts of the Island.

13. The following report of a Tenant Union meeting, held on Township No. 31, a valuable property within seven miles of Charlottetown, will make you acquainted with the mode of action prescribed by the members of the Tenant League :—

“ TENANT UNION MEETING.

“ A meeting was held on Wednesday the 7th inst., near Mr. Fowle's sawmill, Lot 31, for the purpose of forming a branch of the Tenant Union in that locality. Mr. John McKaig was unanimously elected chairman. The meeting was addressed by several members of the Central Committee from Lot 49, and also by other persons. The Constitution and Tenants' Pledge were read, after which the following resolutions were submitted and passed almost unanimously, the only exception being the objection of one individual to one of the resolutions :

Moved by Mr. George Clow, seconded by Mr. Wm. Cruwys,

1. *Resolved*, That the repeated failure of the different Governments to settle the Land Question, prove that they are either unable or unwilling to do so, and that it now becomes the duty of the people to do for themselves what their representatives in Parliament have failed to effect.

Moved by Mr. Wm. Clarke, seconded by Mr. Richard Bowman,

2. *Resolved*, That it is our duty to unite as tenants for mutual protection and sympathy, in order to put an end to the leasehold system, by offering to purchase in accordance with the report of the Land Commission and the action of our own Legislature.

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Moved by Mr. Charles Kitson, seconded by Mr. Thomas Godfrey,

3. *Resolved*, That this meeting cordially approve of the principles of the Tenant Union, and that we form a branch of the same in this locality.

Moved by Mr. Wm. Large, seconded by Mr. John Deacon,

4. *Resolved*, That we will not traffic with any person who does not cordially sympathise with the Tenant Union, even though we should suffer loss thereby, except in cases where it is absolutely unavoidable.

Moved by Mr. John Molyneaux, seconded by Mr. John Scott,

5. *Resolved*, That every member of the Union take *Ross's Weekly* in preference to any other paper, as it is the only medium through which we can get correct information with regard to the working of the Union in other places.

Moved by Mr. John Cumming, seconded by Mr. Martin Devereux,

Resolved, That every member provide himself with a bugle to sound the note of alarm on the approach of *rent-leeches*.

A large number of both tenants and freeholders then came forward to sign the pledge and subscribe to the funds. The subscriptions ranged as high as five pounds, and the people are willing to pay the same amount ten times over if required, rather than let the Tenant Union fail for want of funds. Rent-paying has ceased in Lot 31, and I would take this opportunity of letting any person know, who might be disposed to come after any, that they need not take the trouble, *for they will not get any rent.*

14. Any organization comprising thousands of persons, associated for the purpose of carrying out the principles enumerated in the tenant pledge, and in the foregoing resolutions, in my opinion, cannot, in the absence of a military force, be successfully opposed by the civil authorities of the Colony.

15. To withdraw the troops on the approach of winter would leave the Island for a period of five months at the mercy of the Tenant Union, and practically divest the Supreme Court of the power to enforce its authority, for, as you are aware, from December until

May, this Colony, separated as it is from the continents by the Straits of Northumberland, cannot be approached by vessels in consequence of ice, and the introduction of troops during these five months, would therefore be all but impossible.

16. I have the honor to inform you of the capture, by the Sheriff of Queen's County, of one of the persons engaged in the riot, assault and rescue, mentioned in my Despatch, No. 62, 2nd August, instant, under the circumstances detailed in the letter of the Sheriff dated 16th August, instant, a copy of which I enclose.

17. Believing that Her Majesty's Imperial Government will maintain a military force in this Colony so long as the presence of such a force is indispensable to the maintenance of law and order, and that the period when the occasion for the presence of troops in this Island will cease is uncertain, and in all probability distant, and knowing that the duty of providing barrack accommodation for soldiers sent to the Island devolves upon the Local Government, and that the detachment now here should not remain under canvas after the middle of October. On Monday last I submitted the subject of barrack accommodation for the consideration of my Executive Council, and I have now the honor to report that my Government have unanimously resolved, at once to purchase a few acres of land, in a healthy position, near the capital, and thereon erect barracks capable of accommodating 150 men, and the requisite proportion of officers.

18. The Executive Government propose to submit to the Legislature, at its next Session, an act authorizing the appropriation of so much of the principal moneys, arising from the sale of the site of the old military barracks, as may be necessary to defray the expense about to be incurred in providing new barracks.

19. The Local Government would most gladly have represented to you the absence of barracks in this Island, and received your commands as to the accommodation necessary to be provided for the troops now in the Colony, before commencing the erection of barracks, but the nature of the climate is such as would not admit of any delay. Your reply to a Despatch from this Island could not reasonably be expected in less time than six weeks from the date of the departure of the next mail from

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Halifax, and at the expiration of that time it would be impracticable to erect buildings available for the accommodation of men during the coming winter; under these circumstances, and influenced by the consideration that a due regard for the health and comfort of the troops, will require their removal from tents by the middle of October, my advisers unanimously agreed with me in the opinion that it was incumbent upon the Colony, without delay, to commence the erection of barracks.

20. The proceedings of the Government, in this particular, will, I trust, meet your approval.

21. With a view to the prevention of desertion, the Executive Government have resolved to offer £8 stg., to be paid from the Public Treasury of the Colony, as a reward for the apprehension of any deserter, and also to cause the exercise of the utmost vigilance on the part of Magistrates and Constables, in order to check, and if possible, entirely prevent the loss which detachments have so often suffered in this Colony from desertion.

SIR;

His Excellency Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, having forwarded to me your Despatch addressed to him, and dated 1st instant, requesting that he "would be pleased to forward to this Island, as soon as possible, two companies of soldiers from the Garrison of Halifax," I have the honor to acquaint you that I have this day embarked a detachment of the 16th Regt. of 8 officers and 130 men, under a Field Officer, in accordance with your requisition.

I take, however, the opportunity of explaining to your Honor that the requisition in ques-

tion should have been addressed to the Officer Commanding Her Majesty's Forces in these Provinces; the Lieutenant Governor has no power to order detachments out of his own Province; nor am I empowered to act upon any requisition for military aid other than one proceeding to me direct from the Officer Administering the Government of the Colony where their presence is required. In this case, as expedition was essential, I gave way on points of form; but I have to request that a communication, similar to that addressed to Sir Richard McDonnell, may be sent to me direct, as my authority for making the detachment in my Official Report to the Home Authorities. I have further to request that, as by my instructions from the Imperial Government, (which I have reason to believe you will also find recorded in the Government correspondence of Prince Edward Island, in the 3rd quarter of 1855), troops are not to be detained "a moment after the occasion for their services have ceased." You will be pleased to inform me by telegraph of the earliest period at which you can dispense with them.

SIR;

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch, dated 4th August, instant, wherein you acquaint me that, on that day, you embarked a detachment of the 16th Regt. of 8 officers and 130 men, under a Field Officer, in compliance with the requisition contained in a Despatch addressed by me to His Excellency Sir Richard Graves McDonnell, Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, dated the 1st August, instant, and by His Excellency forwarded to you.

In your Despatch you further acquaint me that the requisition in question should have

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been addressed to the Officer Commanding Her Majesty's Forces in the Province.

That the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia has no power to order detachments out of his Province, and that you are not empowered to act upon any requisition for military aid, other than one proceeding to you direct from the Officer Administering the Government of the Colony where there presence is required.

You further inform me, that in this case, as expedition was essential, you gave way in point of form, and request that a communication, similar to that addressed to Sir R. G. McDonnell, may be sent to you direct, as your authority for making the detachment in your official report to the Home Authorities.

I have the honor to acquaint you that, in addressing the requisition for military aid to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, I was influenced by the instructions conveyed by the Right Honorable Henry Labouchere, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, to Sir Dominick Daly, dated 6th December, 1855. In the Despatch referred to, the Secretary of State wrote to Sir Dominick as follows:—"I am not aware of any sufficient grounds for anticipating a disturbance of public tranquility; but if I am to understand your language as expressive of any such apprehension on your part, I wish to remind you, that it is in your power at any time to give notice to the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, and to request the presence of a detachment of soldiers from the Garrison of Halifax."

The course adopted by me, I considered, was that indicated to Sir Dominick Daly by the Secretary of State for the Colonies as proper to be pursued, under circumstances similar to those in which I was placed. In order that you may be in possession of what you consider an authority for making the Detachment, and in compliance with your request, I now beg to forward to you a communication similar to that addressed to Sir Richard Graves McDonnell.

In reply to your observation, relative to the withdrawal of the troops, and your request to be informed of the earliest period at which I can dispense with them, I beg to remark that the nature of the circumstances which induced me to apply for a detachment from the Garrison of Halifax are, in their nature, such as preclude me from forming even an opinion as

to the period when the occasion for the services of the troops will have ceased.

The disturbance of public tranquility, which has already occurred here, had its origin in an attempt of the Sheriff to enforce the judgment of the Supreme Court against a tenant at the Suit of his Landlord.

The members of the organization of tenants, pledged to resist the enforcement of payment of rent, are numerous; they are found in many parts of the Island, and are sufficiently powerful to set the Officers of the Law at defiance, and I have every reason to believe that the presence of regular troops in this Island, will be necessary for some time to come, in order to prevent open and systematic defiance of the Laws. The removal of the troops would invite resistance to the Queen's authority in the administration of her laws, the disaffected being aware that, in the absence of troops, there exists in this Colony no force competent to compel obedience to those laws.

SIR ;

I have to report to you, for the information of His Honor the Administrator of the Government, that I succeeded this morning in arresting one of the principal rioters, who took a leading part in the affray on the 18th ultimo, when several of the Tenant League rescued the property which my Deputy had levied upon.

On Monday, the 14th instant, I received a communication from Theophilus DesBrisay, Esquire, enclosing me a Warrant which he had issued in his capacity as a Justice of the Peace against F. Doucette for a riot, assault and rescue. As Doucette resides upon Lot 24, a distance of fourteen miles from the Capital, and knowing that in case of resistance, I could not depend upon any assistance from those who

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lived near him, I took with me nine men well armed, under the hope that by leaving Charlottetown during the night, and arriving at Doucette's house very early in the morning, I might be able to take him before a large number of people could assemble to rescue him.

We arrived at Doucette's shortly after daylight this morning, and proceeded cautiously to his house.

Although men had been stationed by Doucette in his out-houses to watch for and give notice of the approach of any force which might be sent to take him, it seems upon this occasion that they had gone to sleep at their post, and we were thus enabled to surround the house before we were discovered.

The moment we were discovered, the men in the out-houses at once began to blow their trumpets, and although we silenced them as soon as we possibly could, but it was not before this signal had been heard and answered from farm to farm.

We at once turned our attention to the dwelling house, through the window of which we saw the man against whom I held the Warrant. As they refused us admittance, I ordered the door to be broken open, and when we entered we found that Doucette had retreated up stairs, and with a number of men armed with large sticks prevented our getting after him. Several times the attempt was made by my men, but the opening of the stairs was so narrow that they were unable to defend themselves, and from the heavy and repeated blows showered upon them, were knocked down several times and received severe bruises.

I then ordered an entrance to be made through an end window; but as soon as it had been forced open, and one of my men was in the act of entering, he received a severe blow on the head which felled him to the ground.

During all this time trumpets were blown by some of Doucette's accomplices, and were answered from farm to farm; and I found that such a number of men would soon collect, as could rescue Doucette, even if we succeeded in taking him.

We at last succeeded in forcing our way partly upstairs, but not before all my men had

been struck, and some of them seriously bruised; one of them seized Doucette by the hair of his head and dragged him down, and we secured him.

Owing to the number of men we saw collecting, I did not think it judicious to endeavor to make any other prisoners, and the information I subsequently received confirms the opinion I then formed, for we had not left the place more than a few minutes before (I have been since informed) a hundred men had collected for the purpose of rescuing any prisoners we arrested or property we had levied upon.

I would say in conclusion, that the great difficulty I experience in executing the Writs placed in my hands, arises from the active sympathy shewn by all the tenants for each other; their ingenious device of giving warning to each other by means of blowing their trumpets upon the approach of any of my officers, effectually prevents a levy being made before a large number of men are collected, while their system of terrorism, by which they intimidate the well disposed under threats of burning their premises and taking their lives, is so complete, that it is utterly impossible to look for any assistance outside of the town, and I attribute the capture of Doucette wholly to the fact that he and his accomplices saw the fire arms which I had placed in the hands of my Constables.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch of the 22nd August, instant, in which you transmit to me a paragraph from the Charlottetown *Examiner*, and express the desire that I will inform you whether the statements contained in this extract from the *Examiner* are correct, viz.: that the troops sent from this station (Halifax) have not yet been employed in any way in aid of the Civil Power

You further desire to be informed whether it is my intention to attempt to enforce the law in those cases for which, as you seem to consider, the service of the troops were required, and conclude by informing me that if such be not the case, in consequence of the numerous desertions which have already taken place from the ranks, and which you state are well known to be aided by the people themselves, you will have no alternative left but to recall the detachment from Prince Edward Island, your orders on that head being imperative.

To the query, whether the statements contained in the paragraph from the Charlottetown *Examiner* is correct, viz.: that the troops sent from Halifax have not yet been employed in aid of the Civil Power, I beg to reply, that the troops sent hither from Halifax, have not yet been actively employed in any way in aid of the Civil Power.

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In reference to your second query, whether it is my intention to attempt to enforce the Law in those cases for which the services of the troops were, as you appear to consider, required, I would desire to direct your attention to my communication of the 1st of August, instant, addressed to Colonel Francklyn, requesting that a detachment of troops from the Garrison of Halifax might be sent to this Island. In this communication you will observe that I did not require the presence of troops to enforce the Law in any specific cases, but rather because I had reason to apprehend that should the Colony be longer kept without a military force, the supremacy of the law would be entirely subverted by the members of an extensive organization, having for its object resistance to the laws. The presence in the Colony of the military force, which is now here, evidences the power of Her Majesty to cause her laws to be respected, and prevent those serious disturbances of public tranquility which would inevitably follow the withdrawal of the troops.

To initiate legal proceedings, or to prosecute them to a final issue, is the province of the Suitors in Her Majesty's Courts of Justice. The duty of the Administrator of the Government, in the event of his having reason to apprehend resistance to the execution of the law, and disturbance of the public tranquility, is, in my opinion, to see that the law shall take its course, and be respected and obeyed,—the means for doing which, he has the assurance of the Imperial Government, shall never be wanting.

It is not, I presume, my province to employ a military force to seek after an absconding tenant, or to follow goods and chattels which a tenant may have removed beyond the reach of the Officers of the Court. Should any attempt be made to rescue the person or property of any tenant or other person from the custody of the proper officer, or should it be attempted by force to prevent the law taking its course, I should then deem it my duty to summon the military to their aid.

I was not aware that it is well known that desertions which have already taken place here, were aided by the people: That among those of the inhabitants who have associated with the avowed intention to resist the execution of the laws there should be found many

persons disposed to aid desertion from a military force brought hither to maintain the supremacy of the laws cannot, however, be a matter of surprise. The members of the Tenant Union of this Island, and those who sympathise with them, may have conceived that by inducing the soldiers to desert they would procure the withdrawal of the detachment, and consequently they may possibly have aided in the desertions which have already taken place. The state of the Colony, in my opinion, imperatively imposed upon me the duty of requiring the presence of a detachment of troops. The consideration which rendered their presence necessary, equally necessitate their continuance in the Colony. That desertions from the ranks should have taken place, and that any portion of the inhabitants should have aided these desertions are much to be regretted. As, however, the maintenance of public tranquility demands the presence of a military force, I may be permitted to observe, that, in my opinion, neither the circumstances of evil disposed persons aiding and assisting the soldiers to desert, nor the loss thereby occasioned to Her Majesty's service, would justify the withdrawal of such force.

I have now the honor to inform you that, in pursuance of this intention, a contract was yesterday entered into for the erection of suitable barracks adapted for the accommodation of two companies.

APPENDIX (G).

The cost of the buildings already contracted for will exceed £3,500 currency. To this sum must be added £400 paid for the land on which they are being built. The site is healthy, and comprises an area of upwards of three acres and three quarters of an acre. Several hundred pounds in addition will be required to erect fences, offices, &c. The entire cost about to be incurred by the Colony, in providing accommodation for troops, will be little short of £4,000 sterling.

The barracks, by the terms of the contract, are to be ready for occupation on or before the 15th October next.

I have the honor to enclose a copy of a communication received by me from Major Tydd, Commanding the detachment now here, in which you will perceive, that by order of the Major General Commanding, Major Tydd requested that the arrangement for the erection of the barracks might be suspended.

The reasons stated in my Despatch, No. 67, of the 16th August, instant, as having influenced the Local Government to undertake the erection of buildings suitable for the accommodation of the troops now here, without first submitting to you the expediency of erecting them, prevented me from complying with the request of Major Tydd, I therefore simply acknowledged the receipt of his communication.

I have the honor to enclose for your information a copy of a communication received by me from the High Sheriff of Queen's County, in which are contained the particulars of a riot, and resistance to the Sheriff's Officers, which occurred on Township No. 22, a portion of the Estate of Mr. Sullivan, in this Island, on the 3d October, instant.

Mr. Justice Peters, who, while on his way from Charlottetown to hold the Supreme Court at St. Eleanor's, was a spectator of the riotous conduct of the people referred to in the Sheriff's letter, addressed to me a communication upon the subject.

I have the honor to enclose extracts from the letter received by me from Judge Peters.

On the information of the Sheriff's Officers, Warrants were issued for the apprehension of such of the rioters as could be identified, and accompanied by a detachment of 2 Officers and 25 men, the Sheriff of the County, Mr. William Swabey, a Justice of the Peace, and a number of Constables, proceeded on Saturday last to Township No. 22, where suitable quarters had been provided for the soldiers.

This military force is now employed in attending the Civil Officers, and protecting them while engaged in the discharge of their duty.

Several rioters have been arrested, and others have surrendered and been held to bail for their appearance at the Supreme Court.

I do not fear any forcible opposition to the troops, or to the Sheriff's Officers, while supported by them, and confidently hope that the employment of a military force will have the effect of causing the misguided tenantry to believe and to know that there exists a determination to enforce the laws, and lead to the restoration of peace and good order in the Colony.

The informations against the tenantry, on Lot 65, whose conduct formed the subject of my Despatch, No. 77, of the 27th September, have not yet been completed owing to the absence of the Attorney General at the Supreme Court at St. Eleanor's.

In the course of a few days troops will most probably accompany the Sheriff and his Officers to Lot 65.

It is with regret that I feel obliged again to address your Honor on the subject of the resistance offered to my Deputy and his Bailiffs in their endeavors to execute and serve Writs issued out of the Supreme Court of this Island.

On Monday the 3rd instant, Deputy Sheriff Curtis, accompanied by three Bailiffs, proceeded to Township No. 22 for the purpose of executing and serving Writs issued against several parties resident in said Township. On their arrival in the neighborhood, an alarm was given, and in a short time a large assemblage of persons collected armed with sticks and other offensive weapons; they soon increased

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to the number of two hundred and upwards; their conduct towards Mr. Curtis and his party was of such a violent and riotous character that that officer, with his assistants, was obliged to retreat without effecting service of any of the documents entrusted to them. This case, together with others of an equally turbulent and threatening character which have recently occurred, coupled with my inability to procure such a civil force as will enable me to have the duties of my responsible office properly discharged, compels me to state that it is my decided opinion that unless I receive the aid of the military force, now stationed in this Colony, writs and process issued against tenants for the recovery of rents will remain unexecuted.

Extracts from letter of Mr. Justice Peters to Administrator of Government.

ST. ELEANOR'S,

3rd October, 1865.

I think it my duty to call your attention to a great disturbance of the public peace which I witnessed yesterday on my way to hold the Court at this place. On descending the hill at Bagnall's, I found some two hundred persons assembled on foot and horseback; the road was completely occupied by them. As I drove up I heard one of them call out to "clear the way and let the man pass in peace as this was not Curtis." The way was cleared at once, but they lined the roadside, and commenced blowing tin trumpets, (which each appeared to have), making such a noise that any traveller, whose horses were not very steady, would have been much endangered. I drew up and told them that their conduct was most illegal, that they had no right to make such a disturbance and conduct themselves in that disorderly manner in the highway. Curtis the Deputy Sheriff then came up to my carriage and said he had taken their names. I told him to do so, and to take care that he did it so that he could

identify them. They became perfectly quiet while I was speaking to them, but I had not proceeded twenty yards, when a tremendous noise of trumpets took place, and for a mile along the road, I met parties on horseback blowing trumpets and riding furiously towards Bagnall's, which appeared to be the rendezvous. I understood the object of this tumultuous assembly was to prevent the Sheriff serving writs from the Supreme Court.

I must remark that if such riotous proceedings are permitted, no one can feel secure in travelling through the country, and from what I saw, I am satisfied that it is impossible for the Sheriff, by ordinary means, to do his duty. You have the means of enforcing the law. If the Sheriff is not supported by a sufficient force, while in the execution of his duty, each successful resistance will encourage others, and the lawless spirit which appears at present confined to certain districts will soon extend through the whole country, then only to be suppressed by a loss of life, which makes me shudder to contemplate. Mercy, therefore, to these misguided men, and others who may by their success be encouraged to follow their example, should induce your Government to use the means at their command with the energy and promptness which the case requires.

I feel it would have been a dereliction of duty had I witnessed such serious disturbance of the public peace without reporting to you, and I think I need make no apology for the suggestions with which I have accompanied it, as from what I observed of the attitude of the people, I am certain they are worthy of your most serious consideration.

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panied him having returned from Township No. 22, I subsequently sent him with a Magistrate and 25 men and 2 officers of the 16th Regiment to Township No. 65, where resistance had previously been opposed to the Sheriff's officers in the execution of their duty, as mentioned in my Despatches Nos. 77 and 82, of the respective dates of the 27th September and 11th October. This party has also returned to town; no resistance in either case was opposed to the Sheriff so supported. At Township No. 22 he was enabled to serve many Writs on refractory tenants, and to arrest some of those who had previously violently opposed his officers.

At Township No. 65 also the result has been the same.

From there, as a centre, the Sheriff proceeded to Townships Nos. 29 and 30, and on them executed process on Tenant Leaguers.

Although displaying a very angry and hostile spirit, there was no attempt to resist the Sheriff, supported as he was by the military.

I have the honor to inform you, that on the requisition of the High Sheriff of Queen's County, I recently despatched a military force, consisting of one captain, two subalterns, and forty men of the 15th Regiment, to protect him and his officers in the service of process on Tenants on Townships Nos. 35, 36, 48, 49, and 50.

2. The troops were placed under the direction of William Swabey, Esquire, a Justice of the Peace for the County, the same gentleman who had the charge of them on two like occasions,

3. They were absent ten days, during which period, the Sheriff informs me, he succeeded in serving a large portion of the Writs in his hands.

4. Nothing beyond a passible resistance was offered, save the destruction of three wooden small bridges, which the Sheriff's party had twice to replace.

5. I am inclined to believe that this and the previous demonstration have had a good effect; and that although the animosity of the tenantry on the rent question has not subsided, the dread of incurring heavy costs has induced many to come forward and endeavor to effect a settlement of their arrears.

6. I deem it but just to Mr. Swabey and the Sheriff to state that on this, as well as the former occasions of the same nature, they have performed onerous, responsible and disagreeable duties in a manner highly creditable to themselves, and beneficial to the public service.

Annexed to the Minute is an account of £157 8s., a sum which was disbursed on the same occasion by the Local Government for the passage, &c., of the companies of the 15th Regiment from New Brunswick to Charlotte-town. This amount the Council trust will be repaid to the Colony.

Extract from Minutes of Executive Council.

His Excellency having referred to the Executive Council in Committee the Despatch from the Right Honorable Mr. Cardwell, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, of the 23rd December last, with respect to a claim made by the Director of the Transport Service for the expense of conveyance from Prince Edward Island to Halifax in October last of the detachment of the 2nd Battalion 16th Regiment, previously stationed in this Island, the undersigned would respectfully submit for the consideration of Her Majesty's Government the peculiar hardships that will be imposed upon this Colony if the Local Government should be required to pay the charges referred to in the Despatch in question.

The Council, while willingly submitting to the cost of the original transport of such de-

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tachment from Halifax to this Colony, and that of the movements of the troops while actually employed within the Colony, did not conceive that Her Majesty's Government would, under any circumstances, expect that the Colony should be called upon to meet the expenditure consequent upon repeated movements of troops to and from this Island, within the period of one year; and the Council trust, when Her Majesty's Government consider the peculiar position of this Colony, under the grievance of its land tenures, and the evils which those tenures have inflicted upon the inhabitants of this Colony, under a system created by the British Government itself, and the great expense to which the local revenues of the Colony are now subjected in the efforts of the Colonial Government to preserve the maintenance of the Law, and the peace of the Colony under the excited state of public feeling upon the subject of the grievance referred to, the Council entertain the hope that the claim now made under the Despatch in question will be waived.

In addition to the request now respectfully

made upon the justice and generosity of the Imperial Government, the Council trust that the cost attending the conveyance of the detachment of the 15th Regiment from Shediac, in New Brunswick, to this Island, consequent upon the removal of that of the 16th Regiment referred to, and the other expenses connected with such conveyance, (amounting in the aggregate to the sum of £157 8s. 1d. sterling), which the Local Government has in the meantime disbursed, will be repaid to it out of the Imperial Exchequer.

The Council conceive that if any Colony be justly chargeable with the cost as a portion of the cost of removing the detachment of troops from this Colony in October last, that Colony should be the one for the benefit of which the troops were intended to be employed.

Joint Resolution providing for the Termination of the Reciprocity Treaty of June 5, 1854, between the United States and Great Britain.

Whereas it is provided in the Reciprocity Treaty concluded at Washington, the 5th June, 1854, between the United States of the one part, and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland of the other part, and this Treaty "shall remain in force for ten years from the date at which it may come into operation; and further, until the expiration of twelve months after either of the High Contracting Parties shall give notice to the other of its wish to terminate the same;" and whereas, it appears by a Proclamation of the President of the United States, bearing date 16th March, 1855, that the Treaty came into operation on that day; and whereas, further, it is no longer for the interests of the United States to continue the same in force; therefore,

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that notice be given of the termination of the Reciprocity Treaty, according to the provision therein contained for the termination of the same; and the President of the United States is hereby charged with the communication of such notice to the Government of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

In a Despatch addressed to me by Her Majesty's Secretary of State, No. 95, of June 17, 1865, a copy of which, I am aware, has been communicated to you, Mr. Cardwell informs me, in reference to the Reciprocity Treaty with the United States of America, that Sir F. Bruce had already received instructions to negotiate for a renewal of the Treaty, and to act in concert with the Government of Canada.

I have the honor to transmit to you a copy of an approved minute of the Executive Council of Canada, which will show you the course intended to be adopted by this Government in order to arrange with Sir F. Bruce the mode in which the Provincial authorities may most advantageously co-operate with him in the management of the proposed negotiations.

It is the intention of the members of this Government, who have been deputed to confer with Sir F. The Committee have had before them a memorandum dated this day from the Honorable the Minister of Finance submitting for the

consideration of your Excellency in Council, that by the Despatch from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, dated 17th June, 1865, it appears that the British Minister at Washington had been instructed to negotiate for a renewal of the Reciprocity Treaty, and to act in concert with the Government of Canada in reference thereto.

That as it is advisable that no time should be lost in reference to this important subject, he recommended that a Committee, consisting of two members of the Provincial Government, should proceed to Washington for the purpose of conferring with Sir Frederick Bruce, and of determining in concert with him on the steps it may appear most expedient to adopt.

Copy of a Report of a Committee of the Honorable the Executive Council, approved by His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, on the 22nd December, 1865.

The Committee have had under consideration the Memorandum dated 18th December, 1865, from the Honorable the Minister of Finance, submitting for the consideration of Your Excellency in Council, that it appears from the Report to Congress of the Secretary of the Treasury of the United States, as well as from information obtained by him, the Minister of Finance, in recent conversations had at Washington with the Secretary of State, and the Secretary of the Treasury of the United States, that the American Government are not disposed to submit to Congress any proposal for a renewal of the Reciprocity Treaty, but consider that the commercial relations between the United States and the British North American Provinces, should form the subject of concerted legislation.

That under these circumstances he submits that inasmuch as the treaty will expire on the 17th March next, there is no reasonable probability that the Congress of the United States will, before that date, decide in any way upon their policy in this respect, while it is manifest that no corresponding legislation could possibly take place in each of the British Provinces; that it is therefore evident that unless some understanding be arrived at with the American Government for a temporary continuance of existing arrangements, the Trade between the two Countries must be subject to serious disturbance, by the expiry of the Treaty on the 17th March.

That the proposal of the Secretary of the Treasury to substitute legislation in lieu of the Treaty, can only apply to those portions of the Treaty which refer to commercial subjects. That the national rights involved in the engagements relative to the Fisheries and to the Navigation of the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence, cannot, he believes, be dealt with otherwise than by Treaty or Convention between Great Britain and the United States.

That the subjects embraced in the Reciprocity Treaty are two-fold. That those relating to Trade and Commerce can, if it be so determined, be reserved for the action of the respective Legislatures—each country pursuing the

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policy that is most in accordance with its own interests, while those relating to International engagements must either be continued by Treaty, or each nation will revert to its position prior to the execution of the Reciprocity Treaty.

That as the latter class of subjects has not been referred to by the Secretary of the Treasury, it is possible it has not received full attention in the decision that would appear to have been arrived at for the abrogation of the Treaty, as it can scarcely be supposed that the United States desire to reproduce the state of things which was happily put an end to by the execution of the Treaty.

That the concessions which were considered to be made by Great Britain in relation to the Fisheries question were, however, so intimately blended with the commercial advantages alleged to have been granted by the United States, that it does not, at this moment, appear possible to consent to the concessions by Great Britain being continued and made permanent in favor of the United States by a new Treaty while the latter country determines to retain within its own control all the subjects by which equivalents were considered to have been given to the British Provinces.

That if the objections by the United States to a renewal of the Commercial Treaty rest upon its being an unconstitutional act on their part, it no longer becomes a subject of discussion, and some other course must be devised for the division of the subject, dealing with national rights by treaty and with commercial relations by legislation, and he offers as his opinion that no insuperable difficulty need be apprehended in this course, if the subject be approached in a spirit of mutual desire to perfect and perpetuate the friendly intercourse and trade between the two countries—but that it is manifestly impracticable within the time limited for the termination of the Treaty to give the required consideration to the subject, and to settle all the various details connected with it, and that it is therefore very much to be apprehended that the whole engagements of the Treaty will end on the 17th March, unless the Government of the United States acquiesce in their temporary continuance with a view to negotiations. But in case it should be ultimately found necessary to deal with the question of Trade by legislation it must be apparent

to the United States Government that extreme difficulty must be experienced in bringing into harmony the views of so many different Legislatures, and much time will be required for the purpose. That in view therefore, of the proposed Confederation of the British North American Provinces probably taking place at an early day it would appear most desirable to refer, if possible, any legislative arrangements with the United States to the Legislature of the Confederated Provinces, especially as the earliest duty of that body will be to revise and assimilate the existing separate systems of Finance and Trade now existing in each—thus affording the most favorable opportunity for the consideration of any proposals of the American Government relating to Trade and Revenue.

He, the Minister of Finance, therefore, recommends that communication be had with Her Majesty's Representative at Washington, for the purpose of submitting to the Government of the United States a proposal for the continuance of the existing Treaty for such period as may be agreed upon for the purpose of negotiation, and that two members of the Council be instructed to put themselves in communication with His Excellency and (subject to his concurrence) with the authorities at Washington on this subject.

The Minister of Finance further recommends that the action proposed to be taken for the purpose of obtaining delay in the abrogation of the Treaty be communicated by Your Excellency to the Lieutenant Governors of the Maritime Provinces, and that they be requested to inform their respective Governments that it is not the intention of the Canadian Government to depart from the course proposed by the Confederate Council on Commercial Treaties, or act in any manner separately or distinctly from the other Provinces in the ultimate discussion and decision of the various questions involved, but solely in view of the vast interests in Canada, affected by the possible termination of the Treaty, to use every exertion, in the meantime, to obtain delay, with the intention, hereafter, of considering, in connection with the Sister Provinces, any suggestions that may be made on the part of the United States, in relation to the future commercial intercourse between the two countries, and that the Maritime Provinces be invited to send Representa-

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tives to Washington, for the same purpose, and be informed that it is proposed to hold a meeting of the Confederate Council on Commercial Treaties at Ottawa, so soon as the position of the question would warrant it, founded upon the information to be received from Washington, as to the probable extension or final abrogation of the Reciprocity Treaty.

Read the Despatch dated 7th August, ult., from His Excellency the Governor General to the Lieutenant Governors of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, and to the Governor of Newfoundland respectively, communicating to those Governments the sug-

gestion of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and requesting that the Representatives of each of the Provinces should meet at Quebec on Thursday the 14th September, instant, for the purpose of consulting on the important matter referred to by Mr. Cardwell, and reporting their joint opinion to Her Majesty's Government.

Read the order of His Excellency the Governor General in Council, of 14th September, 1865, appointing the Honorables John A. McDonald, George E. Cartier, George Brown, and A. F. Galt, to represent Canada in the proposed Confederate Council.

The Governor General communicated to the Council, in explanation of the appointment of four gentlemen instead of two to represent Canada, that this arrangement was determined on in consequence of Messrs. McDonald, Cartier, Brown and Galt having constituted the deputation from the Canadian Government which lately had conferences with Her Majesty's Government in relation to this question; and that it was considered desirable that these gentlemen should all be enabled to take part in the discussions of the Council, but with the distinct understanding that in case of a division in the Council, only one vote each should be allowed to Upper and Lower Canada.

Read a Despatch dated 7th September, inst., from the Administrator of the Government of Prince Edward Island, intimating that he had appointed the Honorable James Colledge Pope to represent that Colony in the proposed Confederate Council.

Read a Despatch dated 8th September, inst., from the Administrator of the Government of New Brunswick, intimating that he had appointed the Honorable Robert Duncan Wilmot to represent that Province in the proposed Confederate Council.

Read a Despatch dated 11th September, instant, from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, stating that he had nominated the Honorable John W. Ritchie to represent that Province in the intended Confederate Council.

Read a Despatch dated 4th September, inst., from His Excellency the Governor of Newfoundland, intimating that he had appointed the Honorable Ambrose Shea to represent that Colony in the proposed Confederate Council.

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Resolved, That the Honorables Messrs. McDonald, Cartier, Brown, Galt, Shea, Pope, Ritchie and Wilmot, be constituted a Committee of the Confederate Council to report to the Council on Monday the 18th instant.

The Council then adjourned until Monday the 18th instant, at 11 o'clock, a.m.

The Report from the Committee appointed on the last day of meeting was read, and in conformity with its purport, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted by the Council :

1st. That the existing treaty of Trade with the United States is acceptable, and that its renewal, as it now stands, would be assented to by the respective Provinces.

2nd. That, in the opinion of the Council, any reasonable proposals for the modification or extension of the Treaty that may be suggested by the United States Government, ought to be entertained by the Provinces.

3rd. That in the event of a new Reciprocity Treaty being negotiated, it would be highly desirable that the coasting trade and the registration of vessels should be included in its provisions.

4th. That in the event of the abolition of the Treaty by the United States Government, it is the opinion of this Council that all the British North American Provinces should combine cordially together in all commercial matters, and adopt such a common commercial policy as will best advance the interests of the whole.

5th. That in the opinion of this Council, it would be highly desirable that application

be made to Her Majesty's Imperial Government, requesting that steps be taken to enable the British North American Provinces to open communication with the West India Islands, with Spain and her Colonies, and with Brazil and Mexico, for the purpose of ascertaining in what manner the traffic of the Provinces with these countries could be extended and placed on a more advantageous footing.

6th. That in the event of negotiations for a new treaty of reciprocity with the United States being opened by Her Majesty's Government, but not concluded before the 17th March next, application be made to Her Majesty's Government, suggesting that an arrangement be entered into with the United States Government for such a continuation of the existing Treaty as may afford time for concluding the pending negotiations.

7th. That Her Majesty's Government be requested to authorize the members of this Council, or a Committee to be appointed from amongst them, to proceed to Washington, in the event of negotiations being opened for the renewal of the Reciprocity Treaty, in order to confer with the British Minister there, and afford him information with respect to the interests of the British North American Provinces.

The Council then adjourned.

Copy of a Report of a Committee of the Honorable the Executive Council approved by His Excellency the Governor General in Council, on the 23d September, 1865.

On a Memorandum, dated 23rd September, 1865, from the Honorable the Minister of Finance, submitting that it is most important steps should be taken for the further development of the trade between the British North American Provinces and the British West Indies.

That the products of the Northern Provinces, consisting of lumber, breadstuff and fish, can be most advantageously exchanged for the sugar, coffee, molasses, and other productions of the Tropical Colonies, and that a trade which is now almost wholly engrossed by the United States ought, he believes, be carried on direct to the advantage of British Commerce.

That for the purpose of ascertaining how far it may be possible to promote this most desirable object by mutual commercial concessions, and by corresponding changes in the tariff of the several Colonies and Dependencies referred to, the Minister of Finance recommends that a Commission be named to visit the several British West Indian Islands and Demerara; and he further suggests that Your Excellency will be pleased to bring the subject under the notice of Her Majesty's Government with the view of causing an official recognition of the Commissioners by the Imperial Authorities in the West Indies, with instructions to Her Majesty's Representatives to afford them all reasonable support and encouragement.

The Committee respectfully report their concurrence in the views and suggestions submitted by the Finance Minister, and recommend them for Your Excellency's approval.

Copy of a Report of a Committee of the Honorable the Executive Council, approved by His Excellency the Governor General in Council, on the 23d September, 1865.

On a Memorandum, dated 22d September, instant, from the Honorable the Minister of Finance, submitting that in view of the possible abrogation of the Reciprocity Treaty with the United States, it is most desirable that measures should be taken for ascertaining the practicability of developing new markets for the products of Canada and of the Maritime Provinces, which will thus be deprived of admission into the United States.

That an examination of the impost trade of the Spanish West Indies of Mexico and the Brazils, shows that a large proportion of that commerce consists in articles which are abundantly produced in the B. N. A. Provinces, viz.: breadstuffs, lumber and products of the fisheries.

That if it be possible, therefore, to effect Treaties of Commerce for the exchange of these productions for those of the Countries above referred to, it is believed that a new and lucrative trade would be developed for these Provinces.

That even should arrangements be effected with the United States for a continuance of

free commercial intercourse with that nation, it would still appear most desirable that arrangements should be made for obtaining access, if possible, to new and important markets; he recommends that Your Excellency will be pleased to direct the attention of Her Majesty's Government to the subject with the view of obtaining their consent to the appointment by Canada of Commissioners to visit the Spanish West Indies, Mexico and the Brazils, for the purpose of endeavoring to effect arrangements for the interchange of the products of these countries with the B. N. A. Provinces, and that for the purpose of aiding in the accomplishment of the design of the Canadian Government, Her Majesty's Government be requested to communicate with the Courts of Spain and Brazil, and to instruct Her Majesty's Representatives at Brazil, and the Consuls at the Spanish West Indies, to co-operate with the Commissioners from Canada.

The Committee concur in the recommendation submitted by the Honorable the Minister of Finance.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of Viscount Monck's Despatch of the 23d September, No. 187, forwarding copies of two approved minutes of the Executive Council of Canada, suggesting that measures should be taken with a view to the extension of the Commerce of Canada in the British and Spanish West Indies, in Mexico, Brazil, and other places. I request you will assure the Provincial Government that Her Majesty's Government cordially approve the suggestion they have made, and will support it by all the means in their power.

The scheme is, of course, not applicable to Canada alone, but to the B. N. A. Colonies collectively.

On that understanding, I shall request the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs to recommend the object in view at the requisite Foreign Courts, and to introduce to the British

Minister abroad those gentlemen who shall be selected for the Mission.

I, on my part, shall be happy to instruct the Governors of the British Colonies to afford them every assistance they can. For this purpose, however, it will be necessary that you furnish me with the names of the gentlemen who will undertake this office. I have by this mail sent copies of the Correspondence to the Lieutenant Governors of the Maritime Provinces, to Newfoundland, and Prince Edward Island, and have instructed them to communicate to you without delay the names of the gentlemen who shall be willing to represent the respective Colonies. On the receipt of this information, and after consultation with your Executive Council, you will inform me of the result. Her Majesty's Government will then take the further steps which I have indicated.

Having been in communication with the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade upon the subject of this proposed extension of the Commercial relations of the B. N. A. Provinces, I have received from their Lordships a letter of which I think it advisable to send you herewith a copy.

In reply, I am directed to request that you will state to Mr. Secretary Cardwell that my Lords fully approve of the object which the Confederate Council appears to contemplate, and they are of opinion that Her Majesty's Government should signify its approval of the steps about to be taken.

It appears to my Lords beyond the provinces of this Department to enter upon the question of the advisability, as a matter of general principle of separate Commercial Conventions being established between groups of Her Majesty's Colonial Dependencies and Foreign Countries. At the same time my Lords think it right to call attention to the difficulties which may arise with respect to Foreign Countries having Reciprocity Treaties with this country, if any Colony or Colonies should make arrangements for giving to one Foreign Country advantages which are not given to others. This point was so much discussed on the occasion of negotiating the Treaty between the United States and British North America that it is unnecessary now to do more than express a hope that it may be found possible to avoid similar difficulties in the present case.

The original papers which accompanied your letter of the 25th instant are herewith returned.

I think it right to acquaint you that I have been informed by the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs that, in the opinion of Her Majesty's Representative at Washington, the necessity of having to submit a Treaty of Commerce to the separate action of the various Provincial Legislatures would be a serious difficulty in his way; and that the Union of the Provinces would afford the best hope of obtaining such a Treaty.

It is evident that if the gentlemen who are now about to proceed to Mexico, the British and Spanish West Indies, and Brazil, for the

purpose of ascertain ng in what manner the trade and commerce of those countries with British North America can be extended, shall bring their journey to a successful conclusion, and shall be able to suggest to Her Majesty's Government, on the part of the British North American Provinces, any new arrangements with the countries in question for the benefit of those Provinces. A similar difficulty may be expected to arise in every such case; and, on the other hand, the Union of the Provinces would, in every such case, afford the best hope of bringing such arrangements to a speedy and satisfactory conclusion.

SIR;

I have the honor to enclose an Address of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly to Her Majesty the Queen, praying that Her Majesty will be pleased to recommend to the Imperial Parliament, the continuance of the salary of the Lieutenant Governor of this Island.

The principal reasons urged in this Address, are the alienation of the lands in this Island in 1767. The fact that at the time of the surrender of the Crown Revenues to the Colony, provision was not required to be made in the Civil List for the salary of the Lieutenant Governor, and that at that time the Secretary of State informed the Lieutenant Governor, in his Despatch No. 93, of 27th December, 1849, (§4) that he had no reason to suppose that the Imperial Parliament was likely to withdraw the provision made for that service.

The Crown Revenues surrendered at the time of the introduction of Responsible Government, were those derived from the permanent

I wish that the Legislature had placed it in my power to recommend this Address for your favorable consideration, without any reservation; there are, however, some points, which, in the interest of the office which I hold, I think it right to bring under your notice.

I regret that the Legislature should apparently have thought proper to have reduced, as low as it well could, the comparatively small expenditure incurred in connection with the maintenance of the office of the Lieutenant Governor.

Amongst other retrenchments, I may remark, on the Legislature having ceased to make any provision for the salary of a Private Secretary.

I have no hesitation in stating, that a Private Secretary is necessary to the Lieutenant

Governor of this Colony, in his official capacity, and that the salary of the Lieutenant Governor is barely adequate to meet the requirements of his position, much less to enable him to appropriate, out of it, a sufficient sum to pay a salary of a Secretary.

On my arrival here, in 1859, I found the Government bound, by hustings pledge, to discontinue the very small amount, £66 13s. 4d., which had previously been appropriated for that service: In consequence, I believe, of the knowledge that I had brought from England a Private Secretary, on the understanding that the small salary I have mentioned, was attached to that office, that sum was granted for the period he was with me; at the expiration of a year, he resigned his office on receiving another appointment elsewhere, and since that time no provision has been made for the salary.

For more than five years I have, in consequence, been dependent upon the chance circumstance of a relative of my own, having given me his assistance as Private Secretary.

Another retrenchment was made about the time of my arrival, by the withdrawal of two out of three men who had previously been allowed as Gate-keepers or Messengers.

Government House is only partially furnished at the expense of the Colony: the rest, by the Lieutenant Governor for the time being: the House itself has been of some expense to the Colony, owing in a great measure to its having been constructed of wood. I am glad to be able to report that considerable improvements have been made in it since I came here, principally at the time of the visit of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.

But for keeping it and the Farm Buildings, &c., in repair, £100 a year appears to be now considered adequate, a sum hardly sufficient to make the repairs which cannot by any possibility be avoided.

In fact, the whole Expenditure of the Colony towards the support of the Lieutenant Governor, according to the Estimates for the present year, will be—

Guard at Gate, - - -	33	6	8

I may further add, that the Lieutenant Governor does not receive any Fees or Allowances of any kind.

In my Despatch No. 93, of 26th October, 1863 (§15), I enclosed a plan of a small farm

of about 80 acres attached to Government House, which was granted in 1789 by Lieut. Governor Fanning for the use and accommodation of the Lieutenant Governor for ever.

It was with surprise that I observed from the Journals of the Legislature (Extract enclosed), during last Session, that a Petition signed by Citizens of Charlottetown had been presented, praying that the Legislature would procure a portion of that ground for a Public Park. I think it but just to remark that many of the leading citizens did not sign that petition.

As no action was taken on the subject by the Legislature, I trust that this attempt to deprive the Lieutenant Governor of a portion of his land may not be renewed. Apart from other considerations, the Farm itself (consisting not of 100 acres as would appear from the Petition, but of about 80 acres), although, perhaps, it hardly pays its working expenses, is of very great convenience in many ways, and is more particularly valuable on account of the privacy which it affords.

SIR ;

I have postponed any remarks on the subject of the Militia until after the termination of the Session of the Provincial Legislature, in order that I might be enabled to inform you of the changes which might be made in the Militia Laws, and to report to you the sum which might be appropriated for that service for the current year.

2. I am glad to observe that the Legislature, in its Address to Her Majesty on the subject of Confederation, recognizes it to be the duty of the Colony to use every means to the extent of its limited resources to aid in its self-defence.

3. It is, however, unquestionably in time of peace that a community ought to take those measures of precaution by which its independence against foreign aggression can be secured. I have, therefore, to express my regret, that the measures which my Ministers have thought proper to propose, and which the Legislature has sanctioned, are not more in accordance with the sentiments which the Legislature has expressed in its Address.

4. I have the honor to enclose copy of an Act in amendment of the Militia Laws, to which I this day signified my assent.

5. While I am willing to admit that the Legislature, in passing this Act, has complied with the strict letter of the suggestions which you made in your Despatch No. 24, of 15th October, 1864 ; it has, I fear, ignored the spirit of those suggestions which contemplated

more than the mere revival of obsolete Laws ill suited, in my opinion, to the present time.

6. I enclose copies of the Act which this measure repeals, and also of the Acts which it revives. From these you will perceive that I am now empowered to call out the Militia "once" in the year.

7. The grant for Military purposes has been increased from £266 13 4, (£400 currency), to £666 13 4, (£1,000 currency).

8. Besides this, there is a small amount available for military purposes arising from the interest on the sum realized by the sale of certain ground, formerly reserved by the Imperial Government for Barracks, and sold under the Local Act, 26 Vic., Cap. 8.

9. Until a late period of the Session just ended, I was under the impression that my Government would have proposed to the Legislature an Act calculated to effect a systematic organization of the local forces, and would have asked a grant more suitable to the financial condition of the Colony.

10. It was, therefore, with regret that I received from my Ministers the announcement that after deliberate consultation with their supporters in the Legislature they were unable during the Session to do more than repeal the Act 14 Vic., Cap. VI., and that they were not prepared to ask a larger grant than £666 13s. 4d.

11. I did not fail to represent to them, in language as forcible as I could use, the regret I felt at the determination at which they had arrived; and my opinion that the measure and the sum they proposed were entirely inadequate to the occasion.

12. To attempt any satisfactory organization of the Militia with the sum placed at my disposal, and under the present Militia Law, is, of course, out of the question. I shall, however, be enabled, by giving some additional encouragement to the Volunteer Force, to promote the excellent spirit by which that force is animated.

SIR;

I have received your Despatch No. 28, of the 3rd April, enclosing an Act which has just been passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island to amend the Laws relating to the Militia.

I am glad that you did not fail to represent to your Ministers, in language as forcible as you could use, your regret at the determination at which they had arrived, and your opinion that the measures and the sum they proposed were quite inadequate to the occasion.

It seems to me somewhat singular that this Despatch (No 28) should immediately follow that (No. 27) which conveys an Address of the Legislature to Her Majesty objecting to the proposed Confederation of the British North American Provinces: speaking with satisfaction of the steadily increasing revenue of Prince Edward Island, its low tariff, and the lightness of its taxation generally, and recognizing it as a duty to provide a reasonable contribution towards the defence of the Colony, and to place the Militia Service upon a sounder and safer footing.

Your Legislature express a hope, which is certainly well founded, that so long as they remain a loyal and attached Colony of Great Britain, the powerful aid of the Mother Country will continue as heretofore to be extended to them.

But they evince in their Address a consciousness of obligation incumbent upon themselves, which, I must say plainly and with regret, they have not shewn any sufficient disposition to fulfil in the measures which you have reported to me, coupled with the rejection of a Scheme approved by Her Majesty's Government for this, amongst other reasons, that it was intended to provide for the easier and more effectual defence of all the British North American Provinces.

You will bring this Despatch under the consideration of your Responsible Advisers.

I have the honor to enclose copy of an Act passed during the late Session of the Local Legislature "to assist Leaseholders in the purchase of the Fee Simple of their farms."

The Local Government is authorized by this Act to issue Debentures to the amount of £50,000 currency, and to advance the sum to be raised by these Debentures as a loan to tenants who may enter into an agreement with their landlords for the purchase of their farms, provided that the purchase money does not exceed 16s. 8d. currency per acre.

The advance to the tenants is not in any case to exceed one half the purchase money, and is to be repaid by ten annual instalments

Under the Act 27 Vic., Cap. 2, tenants on several Estates have the right to purchase at fifteen years purchase of the reserved rent. The rent received in leases is usually 1s. stg. per acre; but under this Act, 17 Vic., Cap. 6, sterling money, in the case of leases entered into before the passing of that Act, is converted into currency by the addition of one-ninth part to such sterling money; 16s. 8d. currency (11s. 1d.) per acre is, therefore, generally equivalent to 15 years purchase.

I have had under my consideration an Act passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, entitled (Cap. 37) "an Act to consolidate and amend the several laws imposing an assessment on all lands in this Colony, and for the encouragement of education."

I am not aware whether any lands in the Island belong to the War Department or to the Crown for defence or Imperial or public purposes. But, if so, the Act does not exempt such lands from the tax to be levied under it. The general rule, that the Crown is not bound by an Act unless expressly named therein, is subject to modifications, and according to the latter opinion, it seems that this rule has reference to the Prerogatives of the Crown, and that its other rights are not more favored than those of subjects.

In Canada and Nova Scotia, lands belonging to the Crown, or held in trust for it for public purposes, are expressly exempted from all taxation; and until a clause saving the rights of the Crown in this respect shall have been introduced into the Act now under considera-

tion, Her Majesty's final decision will be suspended.

In reply to your Despatch No. 16, of 23rd ultimo, respecting an Act "to consolidate and amend the several laws imposing an assessment on all lands in this Colony, and for the encouragement of education," I have the honor to inform you that the only lands in this Island, belonging to the War Department or to the Crown for defence or Imperial or public purposes, consist of about 30 acres reserved for military purposes.

The only other land which might come under the head of land for Imperial purposes is the farm of 80 acres granted by Lieutenant Governor Fanning, in 1789, for the use of the Governor or Lieutenant Governor for ever.

In this Colony such lands have not hitherto been exempted in similar Acts by a saving clause, but the assessment has never been levied upon them.

As the Session of the Legislature had ended before I received your Despatch, an opportunity for passing an Act saving the rights of the Crown will probably not occur until next year.

Under these circumstances I venture to hope that you will be able to advise Her Majesty to bring this Act (which is reserved by a suspending clause for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure) into immediate operation, and I have no doubt that the Legislature, during its next Session, will readily pass a clause saving the rights of the Crown, if you still consider it desirable.

I am directed by the Board of Trade to acknowledge the receipt of your letter, of the 14th instant, forwarding the transcript of an Act passed by the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, entitled “An Act to compel Masters of Vessels to exhibit a Light while in the Harbor in the night time.”

With reference thereto, I am to observe that, by the 1st Section of the enclosed Act, it is provided that “every vessel, foreign or otherwise, shall, while at anchor or under weigh, in any Harbor, Roadstead or Fairway, in the Island, exhibit between sunset and sunrise a bright light.”

If this enactment is applicable exclusively to boats, barges, and river craft, i. e., to vessels belonging to the Island other than seagoing vessels, then the Board of Trade would have no objection to offer; but, as it is intended to be applied to seagoing vessels, this Board wish to call the attention of Mr. Secretary Cardwell to the terms of the Imperial and International Regulations for preventing collisions.

These Regulations apply to seagoing ships belonging to the countries named in the list prefaced to the Regulations, so long as those ships are at sea, and to all seagoing ships,

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whatever their nationality, when within the limits of any country or place under British jurisdiction. Seagoing vessels, of whatever nationality, when at anchor or under weigh in the Harbors, Roadsteads and Fairways of Prince Edward Island, must, therefore, be bound by the Imperial Regulations, and cannot be required to comply with the terms of the enclosed Act, which is in contradiction of those Regulations.

Under these circumstances I am to suggest to Mr. Secretary Cardwell that before the enclosed Act is submitted for Her Majesty's sanction, it should be so altered as to confine its provisions within legitimate limits, viz., to vessels belonging to the Island that never go to sea.

I have the honor to enclose to you a copy of the Colonial Naval Defence Act, which has recently received the Royal Assent, and to request that you will bring it under the consideration of your Council.

I enclose also a copy of the regulations at present in force for the Royal Naval Reserve in this country, and a copy of a letter addressed to this Office, by desire of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, indicating generally what their Lordships will require as to Colonial Ships of War.

You will observe that the Imperial Parliament has not made the adoption, by every Colony, of precisely the same regulations as those in use in this country, a necessary condition of obtaining for men raised in the Colony, the advantages of the Reserve, but has left

it to the Authorities of each Colony to submit for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, such regulations as may seem to them expedient. It will, of course, be necessary in every case, that the regulations should be such as to secure the end in view, viz., the training in time of peace of men who may be relied on for service in time of emergency, and it will doubtless be convenient to you to know what regulations have been found, in practice, most convenient for that purpose in this country.

I am sure I need not enlarge upon the importance of the object which Parliament has had in view in passing this enactment, and I trust that your advisers will fully appreciate the advantages which will result from its adoption by the Colony under your Government.

APPENDIX (J).

An Act to make better provision for the Naval Defence of the Colonies.

7th April, 1865.

Whereas it is expedient to enable the several Colonial Possessions of Her Majesty the Queen to make better Provision for Naval Defence, and to that end to provide and man Vessels of War, and also to raise a Volunteer Force to form part of the Royal Naval Reserve established under the Act of Parliament of 1859 "for the establishment of a Reserve Volunteer Force of Seamen, and for the Government of the same," (hereafter in this Act called the Act of 1859), and accordingly to be available for general service in the Royal Navy in emergency :

Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :

1. This Act may be cited as the Colonial Naval Defence Act, 1865.

2. In this Act—

The Term "Colony" includes any Plantation, Island, or other Possession within Her Majesty's Dominions, exclusive of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the Islands being immediate Dependencies thereof, and exclusive of India as defined by the Act of Parliament of 1858 "for the better Government of India."

The Term "the Admiralty" means the Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom, or the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral.

3. In any Colony it shall be lawful for the proper Legislative Authority, with the approval of Her Majesty in Council, from time to time to make provision for effecting, at the expense of the Colony, all or any of the purposes following :

(1.) For providing, maintaining, and using a vessel or vessels of war, subject to such conditions and for such purposes as Her Majesty in Council from time to time approves.

(2.) For raising and maintaining seamen and others entered on the terms of being

bound to serve as ordered in any such vessel.

(3.) For raising and maintaining a body of volunteers entered on the terms of being bound to general service in the Royal Navy in emergency, and, if in any case the proper Legislative Authority so directs, on the further terms of being bound to serve as ordered in any such vessel as aforesaid.

(4.) For appointing Commissioned, Warrant, and other Officers, to train and command or serve as Officers with any such men ashore or afloat, on such terms and subject to such regulations as Her Majesty in Council from time to time approves.

(5.) For obtaining from the Admiralty the services of Commissioned, Warrant, and other Officers, and of men of the Royal Navy for the last mentioned purposes.

(6.) For enforcing good order and discipline among the men and Officers aforesaid, while ashore or afloat within the limits of the Colony.

(7.) For making the men and Officers aforesaid, while ashore or afloat within the limits of the Colony or elsewhere, subject to all enactments and regulations for the time being in force for the discipline of the Royal Navy.

4. Volunteers raised as aforesaid in any Colony shall form part of the Royal Naval Reserve, in addition to Volunteers who may be raised under the Act of 1859, but, except as in this Act expressly provided, shall be subject exclusively to the provisions made as aforesaid by the proper Legislative Authority of the Colony.

5. It shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council, from time to time as occasion requires, and on such conditions as seem fit, to authorize the Admiralty to issue to any Officer of the Royal Navy, volunteering for the purpose, a special Commission for service in accordance with the provisions of this Act.

6. It shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council, from time to time as occasion requires, and on such conditions as seem fit, to authorize the Admiralty to accept any offer for the time being made or to be made by the Government

of a Colony, to place at Her Majesty's disposal any vessel of war provided by that Government and the men and Officers from time to time serving therein; and while any vessel accepted by the Admiralty under such authority is at the disposal of Her Majesty, such vessel shall be deemed to all intents a vessel of war of the Royal Navy, and the men and Officers from time to time serving in such vessel shall be deemed to all intents men and Officers of the Royal Navy, and shall accordingly be subject to all enactments and regulations for the time being in force for the discipline of the Royal Navy.

7. It shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council from time to time as occasion requires, and on such conditions as seem fit, to authorize the Admiralty to accept any offer for the time being made or to be made by the Government of a Colony, to place at Her Majesty's disposal for general service in the Royal Navy the whole or any part of the body of Volunteers with all or any of the Officers raised and appointed by that Government in accordance with the provisions of this Act; and when any such offer is accepted such of the provisions of the Act of 1859 as relate to men of the Royal Naval Reserve raised in the United Kingdom when in actual service shall extend and apply to the Volunteers whose services are so accepted.

8. The Admiralty may, if they think fit, from time to time by Warrant authorize any Officer of Her Majesty's Navy of the rank of Captain or of a higher rank to exercise, in the name and on behalf of the Admiralty, in relation to any Colony, for such time and subject to such limitations, if any, as the Admiralty think fit, any power exercisable by the Admiralty under this Act.

9. Nothing done under this Act by Order in Council, or by the Admiralty, or otherwise, shall impose any charge on the revenues of the United Kingdom without express provision made by Parliament for meeting the same.

10. Nothing in this Act shall take away or abridge any power vested in or exercisable by the Legislature or Government of any Colony.

In reply to your letter of the 3rd instant, stating that the Colonial Naval Defence Act has received the Royal Assent, and requesting to be informed what my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty would require in regard to Colonial Ships of War, I am commanded by my Lords to state, for the information of Mr. Secretary Cardwell, that they will require, in order that the Flag of a Colonial Vessel of War may be recognized as a lawful cruizer, that she should be commanded by a properly Commissioned Officer.

To facilitate compliance with this requirement, my Lords will send to the Senior Officer on the various stations, blank forms of Commissions and Warrants signed by their Lordships and their Secretary, in which the names of such Commissioned, Warrant, or other Officers of the Royal Navy, selected to command or serve as such Officers in the Royal Naval Reserve, or in ship or ships of the Colony, may be inserted.

My Lords will, if desired, select from among such Officers as may volunteer for the service, those whom they deem fit for these special duties, and who can be spared for a time from service in Her Majesty's ships.

In order to obviate any difficulty in bringing the Act into operation, my Lords will, under the 8th Clause of the "Colonial Naval Defence Act, 1865," authorize the Senior Officer of any station to exercise in their name and behalf those powers exercisable by the Admiralty, which it may from time to time seem desirable to delegate.

My Lords will, when Mr. Cardwell wishes it, give authority to Senior Officers to fill up blank Commissions and Warrants, sent to them by their Lordships, with the names of persons duly qualified to be Officers, who may be nominated by the Authorities of a Colony, and who are not actively engaged in Her Majesty's service.

They will further authorize them, if called upon by the proper Authorities, to give an Acting Order to an Officer of the Royal Navy, who may volunteer from any of Her Majesty's

ships returning to England, and whose services can be spared, or to a properly qualified Officer who may be found ready to serve, in order that there may be no delay in fitting out a vessel or in replacing an Officer in command, who may die or be removed from the service.

My Lords would suggest, that Colonial Governments should be warned to give the longest notice in their power of their desire for the appointments of Officers of any rank to serve in the Royal Naval Reserve, or on board any Colonial man-of-war.

Any vessel of war fitted out by a Colony, and commanded by a properly Commissioned Officer of the Royal Navy, should wear a Union Jack in the usual place, and the White Ensign, with either the Arms of the Colony, or such other distinguishing mark as may be chosen by the Colony, and approved by the Colonial Office and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

My Lords send herewith a Copy of a Form of Appointment of an Officer to command, altered as they propose to use it, under the 5th Clause of the 3rd Section of the Act, also Copy of the Queen's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions.

They propose to appoint Officers for periods of five years, during which time, unless in case of great emergency, they will not be called upon to serve in the Royal Navy of the United Kingdom.

When any Officer receives a Commission or Warrant, he should also receive a Copy of the Statute, 28 Vic., Cap. 14, the "Colonial Naval Defence Act, 1865."

My Lords send Copies of the Commissions and Warrants for Rank in use in the Royal Navy, which can easily be altered to suit the purposes of the Royal Colonial Navy, and the Form of which my Lords suggest should be retained as nearly as may be found convenient.

My Lords would suggest to Mr. Cardwell, that whenever the privileges created by this Act, are actually conferred upon any Colony, due notification should be made to other Maritime Powers, informing them of the mode in which such Colonial vessel will be commanded, and acquainting them with the Flag which will be worn by the said Colony, and that my Lords have accorded to such war vessels of the Colo-

ny in question, the status and rights of a vessel of war of the United Kingdom of Great Britain.

With reference to my Circular Despatch of the 10th May last, enclosing a copy of the Colonial Naval Defence Act, 28 Vic., Cap. 14; I have now the honor to inform you that the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have laid down the following rules as to the Flag to be borne by any vessels maintained by any Colony under the clauses of that Act:—

1. That any vessel provided and used under the 3rd section of the Colonial Naval Defence Act, should wear the Blue Ensign, with the Seal or Badge of the Colony in the Fly thereof, and a Blue Pennant.

2. That all vessels belonging to, or permanently in the service of the Colonies, but not commissioned as vessels of war under the Act above referred to, should wear a similar Blue Ensign, but not the Pennant.

You will take care that these instructions be in future strictly complied with.

I have at the same time to request you to furnish me with a list of any such vessels belonging to the Colony under your Government, and to send me, for the information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a correct drawing of the Seal or Badge, which is to form the distinguishing mark adopted by the Colony of Prince Edward Island.

enclosing a transcript of an Act of the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, which you have reserved for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure, entitled "An Act to carry into effect certain unexecuted agreements made by the late John Hodges Winsloe, Esquire, deceased, for the sale and leasing of certain parts of his estate in this Colony."

Although I am not aware of any objection to this Act, which appears to be one of no Imperial interest, and would not have advised the Queen to disallow it, if it had received your assent in the usual way; yet, I think that a Law varying the legal rights of private persons should be called into operation by the Governor acting with the advice of his responsible Ministers, and not by the direct action of Her Majesty, whose advisers have no means whatever of estimating the effect of the Law.

I have not, therefore, felt at liberty to advise Her Majesty to assent to this Law, but, on the other hand, I do not consider that you are precluded from assenting to it by the Royal instructions.

In your Despatch No. 28, of the 23rd May, 1865, you informed me that for certain reasons you had not felt at liberty to advise Her Majesty to bring into operation "An Act to carry into effect certain unexecuted agreements made by the late John Hodges Winsloe, Esq., deceased, for the sale and leasing of certain parts of his estate in this Colony."

With the advice of the Law Officers of the Local Government I reserved this Act for the reason that it appeared to come under the clause in the instructions which directs the Lieutenant Governor to reserve for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure any Act of importance by which the rights and property of Her Majesty's subjects, not residing in the Colony, may be prejudiced.

The legal authorities in Prince Edward Island never saw any objection to this Act, which was merely intended to avoid lengthy proceedings in the Court of Chancery, but they concurred in its being reserved because it might affect certain persons, resident in England, who had not time between the introduction of the Bill into the Legislature, and its being laid before me for my assent, to make any protest against it, had they been inclined to do so.

As no objection has at any time been raised in Prince Edward Island to the passing of this Act, and as sufficient time has now elapsed to allow any person interested in it, and resident in England, to make representations against it,

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I venture to bring this Act again under your consideration, as one which I consider you may safely advise Her Majesty to bring into operation.

Should you think fit to do so, the delay and the expense of carrying the Bill again through the Legislature will be saved to the persons interested in it.

for Her Majesty's sanction an Act entitled "An Act to carry into effect certain unexecuted agreements made by the late John Hodges Winsloe, Esquire, deceased, for the sale and leasing of certain parts of his estate in this Colony."

As, however, I find that this mode of proceeding by reservation is not authorized by usage in Prince Edward Island, and as it appears by an opinion of the Law Officers of the Crown, of which I annex a copy, that the Governor is at liberty to assent to a Bill of this kind after the expiration of the Session in which it was passed, I consider it, on reconsideration of the matter, the safest and best mode of proceeding, that you should yourself assent to the Bill, which will thereupon become effectual for its purpose.

We are honored with your commands, signified in Sir F. Rogers' letter of the 20th March, ultimo, stating that he was directed by you to request that we would take into consideration the following circumstances:—

A doubt has arisen in Vancovers Island whether the Governor can give his assent to a Bill passed by the Legislative Council and Assembly after the expiration of the Legislative Session.

That the present Legislature of Vancovers Island was constituted under Letters Patent of 16th May, 1851, being the Commission of the then Governor, now Sir James Douglas, modified in certain respects by other Letters Patent of 8th October, 1862. That in the revocation of these Letters Patent, provisions to same effect were included in the Commission of the present Governor, Captain Kennedy, of which a copy was enclosed. That that Commission provides for the constitution

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of a Legislative Council, and the convening of a Legislative Assembly, and empowers the Governor with their consent to make Laws for the peace, &c.

That similar Legislative Bodies are established in other Colonies, sometimes by Letters Patent, sometimes by Act of Parliament or Local Law; but neither in the Letters Patent constituting the Council of Vancouvers Island, nor (it is believed) in the instructions establishing any other Colonial Legislature, is any express provision made for limiting the time within which the Governor may assent, on behalf of Her Majesty, to a Bill passed by the Legislature.

That in some small Colonies legislation is effected, not by a single annual session, but by summoning the Legislature *pro se nata* as Laws are wanted.

Sir Frederick Rogers was further pleased to state that, under these circumstances, you desired to be informed, whether in Vancouvers Island, and other Colonies possessing Representative Legislatures, the assent of the Governor to any Bill passed by such a Legislature must, in the absence of any express Legislative provision, be given before the expiration of the Session within which such Bill was passed, and in case this necessity does not exist, whether there is any limit to the period within which such assent must be given?

In obedience to your commands we have taken this matter into consideration and have the honor to report:

That we do not think it is necessary that the assent of the Governor to any Bill passed by such a Legislature as is supposed by the question should be given before the expiration of the Session within which such Bill was passed. If, indeed, it were provided by the Constitution of any such Legislature that the law and custom of the British Parliament should, as far as practicable, be observed therein, the point might admit of more question, but we conceive it to be certain that when Bills passed by such Colonial Legislatures are reserved for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon, the Royal assent need not be given, and generally is not given, during the Session in which the Bill is passed, so that the usage in such cases, is generally different from that of the British Parliament.

We are not aware of any limit within which the Governor's assent must necessarily be given to a Law passed by such a Colonial Legislature, and not revoked or altered by any subsequent legislation.

SIR;

With reference to the correspondence noted in the margin,—(36, 22d April, '65—28, 23d May, '65—49, 4th Nov., '65—55, 1st Dec., '65),—I have the honor to enclose a Minute of the Executive Council of this Island to the effect that it is, in the opinion of the Council, inexpedient to introduce the procedure recommended in your Despatch No. 55, of the 1st December, 1865, viz.: that I should give my assent during the recess of the Legislature to the Winsloe Act, which I reserved during last Session for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure.

The Council suggests that either this Act should be specially confirmed by Her Majesty, or that the Act should be introduced during the next Session of the Legislature.

As it is now so near the time of its meeting it is not of so much importance which course be adopted in the present case.

But, as Bills of a nature which require to be reserved for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure, may from time to time be presented to me for my assent, it will be well that no doubt should exist as to the course which will be pursued respecting them.

Previous to 1861 the Governor General, and in his absence the Officer Administering the Government was directed by his instructions

not to give his assent to such Bills unless they contained a clause suspending their operation until Her Majesty's pleasure was made known.

Lord Monck's instructions, of date 2nd Nov., 1861, were different from those of his predecessor. His Lordship, and in his absence, the Officer Administering the Government, was instructed to reserve certain Bills for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure.

In consequence of this the Legislature has, I understand, now discontinued to insert what is commonly called "a suspending clause," deeming it the intention of Her Majesty's Government that it should be left to Her Majesty's Representative to defer the operation of Acts of this character.

I am of opinion that if you consider the objection raised on the part of the Imperial Government to be insurmountable, and if the Local Government presses its objection to the assent being given during the recess, there would be no difficulty in inducing the Legislature to revert to the old method of inserting suspending clauses, if it were known that such a course is recommended by you.


As your Council are adverse to my recommendation that you should assent to this Bill, the right course will be to re-enact it; no suspending clause will be necessary or proper.

The clause in Lord Monck's instructions which refers to the reservation of Bills must, I think, have been founded on some misapprehension.

The Reservation of Bills, passed by Colonial Legislatures, is a process peculiar to these Colonies in which such reservation is expressly provided for by some Imperial or Local Act. Where no such provision exists any Act which is of such a nature that it cannot be brought into operation without the concurrence of the Home Government should contain a suspending clause, and in that shape should receive the Governor's assent, and be sent Home for Her Majesty's approval.

Report of the Superintendent of Public Works for the year 1865.

To His Excellency George Dundas, Esquire,
and Gentlemen of the Executive Government.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY, &c.:

I have the honor to submit to Your Excellency and the Honorable Gentlemen of the Executive Government the following Report of the Public Service under my management during the past year, with the sums expended on each contract, and a detail of the requirements for the current year—1866 :

1st. A new bridge has been built across Lewellyn's mill dam, King's County, by Mr. John Collin's, for two hundred and fifty-two pounds fifteen shillings (£252 15s.) The extra expense incurred amount to four pounds, making the whole cost two hundred and fifty-six pounds fifteen shillings (£256 15s.) This bridge, I think, gives general satisfaction.

2nd. A contract has been entered into for a wharf at Wheatly River, for the sum of two hundred and fifty-two pounds ten shillings, to be finished in August, 1866.

3rd. An additional block and span has been built to the wharf at Summerside, by J. Roper, junior, for three hundred and thirty pounds (£330). A balance of fifteen pounds remains unpaid in consequence of his not having driven all the piles required by his contract. The block also requires some additional filling.

4th. A contract has been entered into with John Roper, senior, for the erection of a bridge across Pinette River, for six hundred and forty-eight pounds (£648). This work was to have

been completed in November, 1865, but in consequence of prevailing high winds until July of the same year, he has not been able to complete his contract. Two hundred and seventy pounds of the above amount has been subscribed by the people of the district. The sum already advanced by the Government is three hundred and fifty pounds (£350.) But although the contract is not completed, the bridge is passable for carriages, and will be finished in the spring of 1866.

5th. A contract has been entered into with John Roper, senior, for the erection of a new wharf at McAulay's point, north side of Pinette River, for the sum of four hundred and ninety pounds (£490.) Ninety pounds of this sum was subscribed by the people. The sum advanced by the Government is two hundred and eighty-three pounds (£283.) The contract should have been completed in November, 1865 ; but for the reasons above stated, the wharf could not be finished.

6th. A contract has been entered into for certain repairs to the wharf at Hurd's point, Lot 26, with Malcolm McFarlane, Esquire, and Mr. James R. Watt, for the sum of two hundred and forty-six pounds (£246.) Three of the spaces have been built up and filled in solid. Three of the blocks have been raised up two feet and filled in solid, to make the wharf level with the block at the outer end, and to prevent the tide from breaking over. Also, twelve new span beams have been laid across two of the arches, and a new cover laid

thereon. The additional sum of seven pounds has been paid for fitting two sticks of timber in the side of the outer block, which was broken by the ice, owing to the block not having been sufficiently strengthened by means of cross-ties. The wharf is now in a very efficient state of repair.

7th. A contract has been made with Mr. John McLellan for the erection of a Light House at the North Cape for the sum of six hundred pounds (£600.) The building would have been completed last fall, but in consequence of the lantern not having arrived in time, the light could not be shown; but it will be ready to light early in the spring. The building is a very substantial one, standing about seventy-six feet above the level of the sea, and reflects great credit on the builder. The lantern is of a very superior construction. I think I may safely state that there is no lantern to compare with it in the Lower Provinces. I hope that some intelligent person may be appointed as keeper.

8th. A new bridge has been built across the Run near Stanfield's mills, Tryon River, for the sum of forty-nine pounds ten shillings (£49 10s.) Also, a new bridge has been built across the stream near Mr. Clark's, on the north side of Tryon River, for the sum of sixty-five (£65.) The sum appropriated for these two bridges was three hundred and seventy-five pounds (£375.) By the advice of the Representatives of the District I have laid out the balance of the appropriation as follows: building anew the Causeway or Bridgé near Mr. Caulbeck's, on the south side of the River, measuring 330 ft in length, and 20 in width, and averaging about 3 feet in height; walled on both sides and across the sluice-way with square timber fastened with cross-ties and bolted together; the whole space being filled with stone, forming a good McAdamized road on the top, for the sum of ninety pounds (£90). The causeway, near Mr. James Lord's, on the same side of the river, has been built anew with square timber, measuring on each side of the sluice-way 45 feet. The sluice-way has been built anew and raised two feet. The whole bridge has been raised with brushwood and clay on a level with the sluice-way a length of 540 feet. This work has been completed for the sum of forty-three pounds (£43). The sum of nine pounds ten shillings has been paid for stoning

the Aboiteau on the south side of the river from the sluice-way to the end of the road, fourteen feet wide fourteen inches deep in the centre, and eight inches at the sides.

A contract has been entered into with Mr. Samuel Howat for McAdamizing the north side of the Aboiteau from the sluice-way to the end of the bridge, for the sum of twenty-one pounds. This contract was not completed in accordance with the specification. I could not, therefore, recommend the contractor to be paid for the work. The sum of five pounds was paid to James Laird for repairs to cause-way at Laird's point. The sum of thirty pounds was paid to Mr. Charles Howat for stoning a piece of road leading to Upper Westmorland, and putting in a timber sluice-way across the road. A contract has been entered into with Mr. Richard Howat for building a breast-work along the bank leading past the Wesleyan Chapel, seven hundred feet in length, and three feet six inches in height. This breast-work is built of square timber cross-tied and bolted together, and filled with brush-wood and clay. The amount of the contract is seventy-eight pounds fifteen shillings. A balance of fifteen pounds is retained in consequence of my not having been able to examine the work before the frost set in.

9th. A new Court House has been erected at Georgetown, by Mr. William McDonald, for the sum of seven hundred and fifty-six pounds (£756). This contract was to have been completed and ready to have been occupied on the 1st day of March, 1866; but in consequence of its not having been plastered before the frost set in, a part of the plastering will have to be taken down; therefore, the building could not be taken off the hands of the contractor. In all other respects the contract has been faithfully performed. The amount advance has been six hundred and thirty pounds (£630).

10th. A new fence of cedar has been erected around the Jail yard, at St. Eleanor's, for the sum of two hundred and sixty-one pounds twelve shillings and six pence (£261 12s. 6d.) Also a small provision store has been built, and some extra repairs to the cells of the Jail, amounting to thirty-eight pounds fifteen shillings and ten pence. One of the contractor's, Mr. David McFarlane, has sustained very great loss by this contract, in consequence of his

partner having drawn the balance of the contract unknown to him and absconded therewith, leaving him to pay large sums for the materials and other expenses incurred by the contract. This case I would recommend particularly to the consideration of the Government to help to relieve him of a part at least of the liabilities.

11th. The sum of one hundred and forty pounds has been expended on the bridge at Fyfe's ferry. The repairs were let in two contracts—one to Benjamin Bell, and the other to Peter Praught. Mr. Bell, for building up three of the arches, and filling in the abutment with brushwood and stone, on the north side of the river, for the space of one hundred and fifty feet, the sum of eighty pounds (£80.) Mr. Praught, for the same number of feet on the south side, for sixty-five pounds. In consequence of the lateness of the season, and the difficulty of procuring timber, I did not deem it advisable to let any further contract on the bridge. But during the winter of 1866, the remaining part of the appropriation has been spent as follows: A contract has been let to Mr. Thomas Reid for one hundred and eighty-five pounds (£185), for building two hundred and fifty feet of solid work, starting from the piece built by Mr. Praught last summer, and running out to the block near the channel. New beams are to be put across the outer span and block and a new cover laid thereon; and the whole of the dead work filled with brush and stone. The contract is to be finished in October, 1866. A part of the north side remains to be repaired.

12th. A new plank cover has been placed on the bridge at New Glasgow for the sum of twenty-five pounds ten shillings.

13th. A very considerable amount of repairs has been done to the wharf at Southport. The sides have been built anew with square timber, commencing from the new work built during the summer of 1864, and run out in a direct line with the T block, increasing the width of the wharf at the outer end about nine feet. The sides have been fastened together through the arches by means of cross-ties, and the whole firmly bolted together. The whole of the arches and blocks have been filled with brushwood and clay. The clay has been taken from the hill on the south side, thereby improving the road very considerably. This contract was taken for three hundred and seven-

ty-five pounds (£375). I have retained twenty pounds to provide for the settling of this brushwood and clay. As it was very late before the contractors completed their work, in consequence of prevailing high winds, as I before remarked, preventing them from commencing at a suitable season. I think when this wharf is completed and covered with broken stones, as the dead work of all bridges and wharfs ought to be, no further repairs will be required for many years. If the sum of three hundred and fifty pounds were appropriated for two years successively, the block on the east side that forms the dock might be repaired and the piles in the dock faced with plank to prevent their breaking off, thereby saving a large expense in future years.

14th. A new bridge has been built across the stream at Peter Burke's mill, Georgetown Road, for the sum of one hundred and nineteen pounds (£119.) In consequence of the lateness of the season, in which the contract was completed, I deemed it advisable to retain nine pounds to provide for any additional filling the bridge might require.

15th. A contract has been entered into with Ronald McCormack for building anew the abutment on the north side of Wilmot Creek bridge one hundred and seventy feet long, and keeping the bridge in repair until the spring of 1866. The contract to be completed during the summer of 1866. The amount of contract two hundred and sixty pounds (£260.)

16. A contract has been entered into with Nathaniel Huestis for building a wharf at Ellis River Ferry, north side, for one hundred and six pounds (£106.), the contract to be completed during the summer of 1866.

17th. The sum of one hundred and forty-nine pounds has been paid to Mr. Austin McDonald for the repairs of Beers' Bridge, Montague. The bridge is now in a very efficient state of repair.

18th. A contract has been entered into with Mr. George Douglas for the erection of a breakwater at the Wood Islands for the sum of eight hundred and seventy-nine pounds (£879.) This contract will be completed during the summer of 1866.

19th. The sum of fifty pounds has been paid to Mr. Wm. Match for repairs to the wharf at Rocky Point.

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20th. The sum of twenty pounds has been expended on the bridge at Hope River, New London. This work was performed by Mr. John Dickieson to prevent the bridge from being carried away. The sum has not yet been paid in consequence of my not having been able, on account of the state of the travelling, as yet, to examine the work.

21st. The contract for building the new bridge across Ellis River, Lot 16, is not yet completed. This is a work of considerable magnitude, the bridge being sixteen hundred and twenty feet long—nearly one-third of a mile—and in some places the blocks are laid in very deep water. The contractor has labored under very great inconvenience, the road not having been opened in time for him to commence his work, and having had to cart his material principally from one side. A considerable portion of the work remains to be done; but although the bridge was not completed within the time specified in the contract it will be much better for having remained over the winter, as the blocks and abutments will have had time to settle to their respective bearings. The bridge, I think, when finished, will be a very creditable structure. The amount of this contract is eleven hundred and ninety-five pounds (£1195.) The sum already advanced is nine hundred and fifty pounds. Care and judgment are required in advising the advancement of money on contracts which are taken so exceedingly *low*. I may state here, however, that in this instance, I think the contractor has tried to do every justice.

22nd. The wharf at Georgetown is not yet completed; and the public, no doubt, has been inconvenienced thereby. This is another contract which was taken very low. One of the parties in the contract has absconded, leaving the other to finish the work. These two large blocks and spans were taken for the sum of two hundred and forty pounds (£240). The sum advanced on the contract is one hundred and thirty pounds.

23rd. The contract for the block and span at Aitken's wharf, Montague, has been completed. This contract was taken for thirty-nine pounds ten shillings (£39 10s.) Extra work, eight pounds ten shillings.

24th. A new wharf has been built at McConnell's shore, north side of the Hillsborough,

for the sum of three hundred and seventy-five pounds (£375). The sum advanced towards the work is three hundred and thirty-two pounds. Owing to the prevailing high winds he was not able to raft his timber until too late in the season to complete his work satisfactorily. I, therefore, did not deem it advisable to pay him the full amount until satisfied that the work was properly completed.

25th. Two stone bridges or culverts have been built on the St. Peter's Road. One over McLaughlin's Run, six miles from Charlotte-town, and one over the run at Nine Mile Brook. The contracts were taken by Mr. James Wyatt, that at McLaughlan's Run for one hundred and thirty pounds (£130), and the other for one hundred and forty-five pounds (£145). The railing on each of these bridges will cost seventeen pounds ten shillings, or thirty-five for the two. These culverts answer the purpose remarkably well, and wherever it is possible to obtain stone for such a purpose, I think it would be advisable to adopt the practise, as it is more durable than any wooden structure that can be made; and further, it will be the means of raising the hollows and levelling the hills. Wherever an arch is carefully erected across the road, the hills may be dug down and thrown into the hollows at the convenience of the person or persons superintending the repairs of the road.

The contracts let during the winter of 1866 are as follow :—

1st. A Keeper's cottage and a fence of cedar around the ground have been contracted for, at the North Cape Light House, for the sum of one hundred and ninety pounds, to Mr. John Chiasson.

2nd. Thomas Reid, for certain repairs to Fyfe's ferry bridge, one hundred and eighty-five pounds.

3rd. George Praught, for building a new wharf at Morris's ship-yard, New London, fifty-eight pounds. Forty pounds to be paid by the Government, the remainder to be made up by the people.

4th. John Creed, for building anew the bridge at Sturgeon, four hundred and eighty pounds.

5th. Peter Landrigan, for repairs to the bridge at Burnt Point, Murray River, five hundred and twenty-two pounds fifteen shillings.

Requirements for the year 1866:

1st. Poplar Island Bridge, the centre of which has been built upon piles which are constantly being eaten off by the worms. In consequence of vessels hanging to it in the spring and fall it is now becoming very dangerous. I would suggest the propriety of rebuilding the centre with blocks and spans. The abutments also require to be repaired, as the timber is becoming very much decayed. Three

hundred and fifty pounds were appropriated for this purpose last year. This sum, with an additional sum of three hundred pounds that was appropriated for three other bridges on the Tryon Road, which may do without so large an outlay for some time, will go a considerable way towards the repairs required. The traffic across this bridge is very considerable.

2nd. Wilmot Creek Bridge: The abutment on the south side will require to be rebuilt this summer. The blocks and spans also, in the centre, require to be repaired; but I think they can be made to do another year.

3rd. The bridge across Anderson's Creek, New London, requires to be rebuilt. I think a stone culvert would answer well in this place. The stones, I think, could easily be obtained in this locality.

4th. There are three bridges on the Georgetown Road that require to be rebuilt. A stone culvert would answer well for one of these places, as the hills on both sides could be dug down, and the road much improved thereby. The other two require wooden structures.

5th. Another bridge is required at Hayden's mill, on the Murray Harbor Road.

6th. The bridge across Pisquid River, asked for last year, has not yet been built. A bridge in this locality would, no doubt, be a great boon to the inhabitants.

7th. A new cover will be required on Mabey's bridge, Tryon Road, this summer, and some other repairs, railing, &c., &c.

8th. The Jail for Queen's County, in Charlottetown, will require a large amount of repairs and alterations to render it suitable for the accommodation of the prisoners, and to separate the different classes of prisoners. Humanity and justice demand, independent of the injury done to the morals of the public, that the same apartment in which is confined the convicted felon, should not enclose the debtor and untried prisoner, as well as him whose offence is not of an aggravated nature. Where there is a mixture of the several classes of those who have violated the laws, the young soon become infected by the old offender with whom he comes in contact, and returns to society after undergoing his punishment a much worse member of it than before his incarceration. I need hardly say that the separation of the sexes in the prison is indispensable.

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A dredging machine, if procured, would be of great service to the Island generally in clearing, deepening, and improving its harbors. When not used in this way, it would be useful for other purposes. The docks and middle ground of the Charlottetown Ferry, particularly, require it at present, as well as many of the harbors on the north side of the Island.

9th. A sum sufficient to ballast the outer block of Prince Street wharf in Charlottetown is required. One of the blocks has already been thrown off its foundation by the ice; and if the large block on the eastern side of the dock be not secured, I fear when the ice is moving in the spring it may go also.

10th. The bridge at Indian River requires to be repaired. I have not had time to examine it yet. I hope a sum sufficient will be appropriated for that purpose.

11th. The wharf at Gallas Point will require considerable repairs before it can be made available for shipping purposes. I have not seen it myself. It was reported to me by the Commissioner of roads for that district.

12th. Three stone culverts are required on the Princetown Road. I am not sufficiently acquainted with the locality to know if stone can be easily obtained there. But if they were built they would improve the road very much. A number of bridges at the north side of the Island require to be repaired. I hope the

Members of the District in the several localities will report thereon.

13th. A new block is required to the wharf at Cascumpee, and some other repairs.

The floaters in the docks on both sides of the Charlottetown ferry have been repaired during the past winter. Tenders were called for and received; but the Government would not accept them, owing to the lowest tender being above the estimate of probable cost. The Government, therefore, ordered me to purchase materials and repair them by days work, which I have done. The lowest tender for repairs was five hundred pounds. The sum expended by me in building two new ones and repairing the other two was two hundred and fifty pounds. They are now, I think, in a very efficient state of repair; and if a time were set for the taking them up in the fall of the year—say the 25th November—they might be made to last for a number of years.

In conclusion, wherever a large contract is taken, I hope the Government will authorize me to appoint competent persons to see that all the iron is driven, and the work faithfully performed during my absence in other parts of the country. All of which is respectfully submitted.

Letter of the Hon. J. Aldous, Commissioner of Public Lands, in answer to a return moved for, of all persons who have been deprived of their farms by the operation of the Land Purchase Act.

To the Hon. James C. Pope, M. P. P., President of Executive Council.

SIR,

Having been furnished with the accompanying extract from the Order Book, H. A.,

“ WEDNESDAY, April 11, 1866.

“ Mr. Warburton will, to-morrow, move for a return of all persons who have been deprived of their farms by the operation of the Land Purchase Bill,”

for the information of the House of Assembly, I beg respectfully to state, that during my management of the Public Lands Office, extending over a period of nine years, and embracing over 2,200 separate transactions, occasions have arisen from time to time for my having to avail myself of the provisions of the Land Purchase Act for the collection of

amounts due for the purchase of lands; but in no case am I aware of any settler, *who having made improvements, and settled on his land, being dispossessed therefrom*; but in all instances where the lands have been disposed of at Sheriff's sales, it has been wilderness land, purchased probably for fire wood, or, as in too many instances in the early settlement of the Worrell and Selkirk Estates, persons were anxious for the possession of the wilderness lands, and made purchases which they were unable to complete.

SIR, —

I have been requested by the Legislative Council and House of Assembly to forward the enclosed Address to Her Majesty the Queen, respecting the proposed Confederation of the British North American Provinces, upon the terms adopted at the Quebec Conference.

The prayer of this Address is, that "Her Majesty will be graciously pleased not to give Her Royal Assent or sanction to any Act or Measure founded upon the Resolution or Report of the said Conference or otherwise, that would have the effect of uniting Prince Edward Island in a Federal Union with Canada, or any other of Her Majesty's Provinces in America."

In accordance with the instructions conveyed to me in your Despatch, No. 29, of 8th December, 1864, I submitted to the Local Legislature, during the late Session, the project of the Quebec Conference.

The Legislative Council, without a division, passed Resolutions disagreeing to the proposed

Union; copy of these Resolutions is herein enclosed.

In the House of Assembly, Mr. William Henry Pope, the Colonial Secretary, moved Resolutions in favor of Union; Mr. James C. Pope, the President of the Executive Council, moved an amendment condemnatory of the proposed scheme.

The amendment was carried by the majority of eighteen; the numbers being:—

Copies of the Resolutions moved by the Colonial Secretary, and of the amendment, are also enclosed.

The Joint Address to Her Majesty, which I have the honor to enclose, thereupon passed by both branches of the Legislature.

SIR,—

I have the honor to enclose an Address of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly to Her Majesty the Queen, praying that Her Majesty will be pleased to recommend to the Imperial Parliament the continuance of the salary of the Lieutenant Governor of this Island.

The principal reasons urged in this Address, are the alienation of the lands in this Island in 1767. The fact that at the time of the surrender of the Crown Revenues to the Colony, provision was not required to be made in the Civil List for the salary of the Lieutenant Governor, and that at that time the Secretary of State informed the Lieutenant Governor, in his Despatch No. 93, of 27th December, 1849, (§4) that he had no reason to suppose that the Imperial Parliament was likely to withdraw the provision made for that service.

The Crown Revenues surrendered at the time of the introduction of Responsible Government, were those derived from the permanent Spirit Duties, the sale of Crown Lands and the Quit Rents, which were together estimated by Sir Donald Campbell to be of the annual value of £2,600.

I wish that the Legislature had placed it in my power to recommend this Address for your favorable consideration, without any reservation; there are, however, some points which, in the interest of the office which I hold, I think it right to bring under your notice.

I regret that the Legislature should apparently have thought proper to have reduced, as low as it well could, the comparatively small expenditure incurred in connection with the maintenance of the office of the Lieutenant Governor.

Amongst other retrenchments, I may remark, on the Legislature having ceased to make any provision for the salary of a Private Secretary.

I have no hesitation in stating, that a Private Secretary is necessary to the Lieutenant Governor of this Colony, in his official capacity, and that the salary of the Lieutenant Governor is barely adequate to meet the requirements of his position, much less to enable him to appropriate, out of it, a sufficient sum to pay a salary of a Secretary.

On my arrival here, in 1859, I found the Government bound, by hustings pledge, to discontinue the very small amount £66 13s. 4d., which had previously been appropriated for that service. In consequence, I believe, of the knowledge that I had brought from England a

Private Secretary, on the understanding that the small salary I have mentioned, was attached to that office, that sum was granted for the period he was with me; at the expiration of a year he resigned his office on receiving another appointment elsewhere, and since that time no provision has been made for the salary.

For more than five years I have, in consequence, been dependent upon the chance circumstance of a relative of my own, having given me his assistance as Private Secretary.

Another retrenchment was made about the time of my arrival, by the withdrawal of two out of three men who had previously been allowed as Gate-keepers or Messengers.

Government House is only partially furnished at the expense of the Colony; the rest by the Lieutenant Governor for the time being. The house itself has been of some expense to the Colony, owing in a great measure to its having been constructed of wood. I am glad to be able to report that considerable improvements have been made in it since I came here, principally at the time of the visit of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.

But for keeping it and the farm buildings, &c., in repair, £100 a year appears to be now considered adequate, a sum hardly sufficient to make the repairs which cannot by any possibility be avoided.

In fact, the whole expenditure of the Colony towards the support of the Lieutenant Governor, according to the estimates for the present year, will be:—

Government House,	£100	0	0

I may further add, that the Lieutenant Governor does not receive any Fees or Allowances of any kind.

In my Despatch No. 93, of 26th October, 1863, (§15), I enclosed a plan of a small farm of about 80 acres attached to Government House, which was granted in 1789 by Lieut. Governor Fanning for the use and accommodation of the Lieutenant Governor for ever.

It was with surprise that I observed from the Journals of the Legislature, (Extract enclosed), during last Session, that a petition signed by citizens of Charlottetown had been presented, praying that the Legislature would procure a portion of that ground for a Public Park. I think it but just to remark that many of the leading citizens did not sign that petition.

As no action was taken on the subject by the Legislature, I trust that this attempt to deprive the Lieutenant Governor of a portion of his land may not be renewed. Apart from other considerations, the farm itself, (consisting not of 100 acres as would appear from the petition, but of about 80 acres), although, perhaps, it hardly pays its working expenses, is of very great convenience in many ways, and is more particularly valuable on account of the privacy which it affords.

We, the undersigned, having been appointed to examine and report upon the necessity of opening a road from Linkletter road to James Darby's, beg leave to acquaint you for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor in Council that we have examined the site of the proposed road, and after giving the matter our best consideration, we consider that unless said road would be continued from Linkletter road to Joseph B. Perry's, Miscouche, thereby connecting Summerside more directly with the western part of this country. We cannot recommend the opening of the first part, believing that the number of persons to be benefitted thereby would not warrant the outlay required. We beg leave respectfully to refer His Excellency in Council to Messrs. W. E. & A. A. Baker's Map, where it will be seen that from Joseph B. Perry's, Miscouche, by G. W. Linkletter's, to James Darby's, is nearly a straight line, which we have learned from actual observation is correct. A road opened on said line would, in our opinion, be a general benefit.

SIR,—

You will please lay before the Government the enclosed report of the Commission appointed to examine on the necessity of opening a road to the shore of Howe Bay. I fear the report is very imperfectly drawn up. It was done under much difficulty and obstruction. You will perceive that Mr. McCallum has written his dissent to the report, he being in favor of opening the road, and prepared a very

urgent report before leaving home to that effect. The report we now submit was drawn up to meet Mr. McWade's views on the subject, which I agreed to rather than not come to any conclusion, particularly as I think it quite sufficient to show to the Government that a road is not required; but I wish to make a few remarks in the way of information. We found that the shore of Howe Bay is much exposed—open to the roll of the sea facing the South-east. The shore as far as we could see is formed of piled up rocks and surrounded by a cape of about thirty feet high; there is no flat or sand beach to land a boat upon. Where the road is asked for the shore is nearly straight; there is no cove but two slight indentations where occasionally sea-weed is driven on shore. The owners of the adjoining lands have a road dug out of the side of the bank leading to one of these places to haul up the kelp; but the whole of the shore is piled up with large stones that are driven in by the heavy sea that there is no passage for any conveyance to haul the kelp to the end of the road, consequently it has to be carried on forks or hand barrows. With respect to its being a place likely to afford accommodation to fishing boats or vessels loading with produce I do not think there can be any inducement to incur so great a risk, particularly when there is two convenient harbors in the immediate vicinity; nor do I think that any wharf or fishing stages that are commonly erected would stand on this shore for six months.

The fact is the road is wanted by six or eight persons living in the neighborhood who are desirous of having a share in the kelp thus thrown ashore in one of these indentations extending about one hundred yards, and they are supported by their friends at a distance; and it appears to me that the matter is altogether one of a private nature to be arranged between the parties wanting the kelp and the owners of the right-of-way. It is therefore, my decided opinion that the road, if opened, would not prove the least public benefit.

We, the Commissioners appointed by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council to examine and report on the necessity of opening a road to the shore of Howe Bay across the farms of Charles and James Dingwell, beg leave to inform you that we have this day attended at the place above named, and heard evidence for and against the opening of the said road, and that we are of opinion that the opening of said road will be of no great public benefit at the present time, but more of a local accommodation excepting for fishing purposes, and that should the Government see fit to order the said road to be opened across the private property above named, we recommend that the inhabitants immediately interested be called upon to subscribe the sum of fifty pounds towards the erection of a public wharf directly opposite the end of said road to accommodate the fishing boats, as we conceive that without a wharf the road will be of little service and will entail a serious expense on the public revenue in maintaining a road on the side of the bank. To His Excellency George Dundas, Esquire, Lieutenant Governor, &c., in Council.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :

In the year 1859 I submitted to the Lieutenant Governor in Council a statement relative to the price of Lots in Princetown and Royalty, urging, from its then slow progress as a town, that the price of said Lots should be reduced.

An order in Council reduced the upset price from four pounds to two pounds, nevertheless, no Lot has been sold subsequently, nor for 8 years previous thereto.

By the Act 24 Vic., Cap. 21, Princetown and Royalty were divested of the right to return two members to the House of Assembly, consequently it was considered as other Township lands, and became chargeable to a like assessment; having, therefore, no exclusive privileges, it is hardly to be expected that the land known as Princetown will realize the price now demanded, being at the rate of about fourteen pounds per acre.

There remains unsold about 400 Town Lots and 120 Pasture Lots. Several applications have been made for purchase at such prices as may be deemed the value of Township Lands.

I would beg to suggest the laying off the unsold portions of Princetown into blocks, and submitting it to public competition, as also the residue of the Royalty Lots, as the only means of its disposal.

Report of Adjutant General of Militia for the year 1865.

ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE,
18th April, 1866.

SIR,—

I have the honor to submit a report of the local forces, 1865.

Militia. The Act of 1858 was repealed, but no steps were taken towards the organization of this force.

Volunteer Brigade. The members present at the Annual Inspection (of which a return is annexed) were 742, an increase of 104 on those present at the inspection of the preceding year.

During the summer the arms, &c., of the Queen's County Regiment were ordered to Head Quarters.

I have to report that I found considerable difficulty in some cases in collecting these arms, &c.; and I would suggest as an amendment of the present law some provision for dealing in a more summary way with volunteers who refuse or neglect to deliver up, on demand by due authority, any property issued to them.

Finances. The accounts with vouchers are annexed, and also an abstract of those accounts, showing under general heads the disbursements of the year. The accounts are made up to 16th April, 1866.

The largest item is the care and repair of arms, £312. The greater number of the arms of the Queen's County Regiment required browning; this has been done, and the whole

thoroughly repaired, under the superintendence of the Armorer Serjeant, 2 | 17th Regt., sent from Halifax for the purpose. These arms, together with those previously in store, in all 1078 stand, are reported by the Armorer to be now in a serviceable condition.

The sum of £287 has been paid for military stores, &c. A large portion of these are still in store.

The sum of £113 has been paid as allowance to companies. The sum of £20 in addition has been withheld for various articles issued to companies, which are not forthcoming.

State of Arms, &c. The arms of the Prince County Regiment have been ordered immediately to Head Quarters to be browned and repaired, after which, those of the King's County Regiment will be similarly treated.

Of the rifles loaned to the Colony by the Imperial Government, few have been condemned by the Armorer. Three are missing: one was accidentally destroyed by fire in the house of the volunteer in whose possession it was; and one has been altered by a volunteer for which he is ready to pay the value.

The remainder of the 1400 are forthcoming with the exception of five, which have already been accounted for to the Imperial Government, and two which Captain Carson has neglected to return, for which he is held accountable.

representation of the industry and resources of the colony; and that it should place one special Executive Commissioner in direct communication with the Science and Art Department at South Kensington.

It is desirable that each colony should inform the Lords of the Committee of Council on Education, with as little delay as possible, if it will undertake to fill the space offered; and if not, to state what diminution in the space may be made.

The Imperial Commission having decided upon a particular mode of arrangement into classes and groups, which is set forth in the regulations, the same principle of arrangement will be adopted by Great Britain, and it will be necessary that the colonies also conform to it. My Lords direct me to request, therefore, that the Executive Commissioner from each colony should transmit before the 1st August, 1866, to the Science and Art Department, South Kensington, the space which the colony proposes to occupy, divided into the respective ten groups (which several divisions will be taken as the bases for the final arrangement in the Exhibition building and park), together with a list of the names and addresses of the exhibitors in each class.

THE MEMORIAL OF EDWARD LAVERTY, OF GLENFINN SETTLEMENT, TOWNSHIP No. 36, HUMBLY SHEWETH :

That a frivolous dispute and altercation having occurred some time ago, on the Glenfinn road, between Memorialist and one Peter Doyle, a next neighbour, with some of the members of each of our families; the said Peter Doyle, in the excitement of passion, ran off to one James McQuaid, Esq., (then a Tavern Keeper and Justice of the Peace), at Mount Stewart Bridge, from whom he obtained warrants or summonses against Memorialist, his sister, and his two sons, for an alleged assault, and which pretended assault your Excellency may judge of its nature, when, after all the cunning and sitting by the said Magistrate of a host of witnesses whom he subpoenaed to accumulate his own fees, had been exhausted, he could only prevail on his assistant J. P. to fine Memorialist in a sum of 2s. 6d., and 1s. against Memorialist's sister and each of his sons, but on each of which fines he taxed or assessed 24s. costs or thereabouts.

That Memorialist believing himself aggrieved by the said judgment, himself and his sons having proven Doyle to have been the first aggressor, appealed to Her Majesty's Supreme Court, at its then next sitting, paying the said McWade, the fees he demanded therefor, 5s., and making the necessary affidavit to obtain the same, which, with much reluctance, he had to grant, insisting that I should pay him 5s. for each of the four fines so made by him.

That before the sitting of the said Supreme Court, at which said appeal was to have been tried, the said Peter Doyle, the said prosecutor and Memorialist, settled the whole of the said cases through the intervention and recommendation of the Hon. Francis Kelly; Memorialist paying over £3 at said settlement, and the sum of 5s. 6d. being the amount of the four several fines, aforesaid, he paid to McQuaid's assistant Magistrate at the trial, who paid the same into Her Majesty's Treasury. That the said prosecutor, Doyle, signing a full written discharge and satisfaction for each and all of the said fines and costs, and which written discharges were duly filed in the Prothonotary's office, of the said Supreme Court, before its said sitting. When Memorialist thought he was free from further trouble or annoyance, and that the matter was at an end, but Mr. Justice McQuaid thought otherwise, although he well knew that when he took my money and securities for the said appeal, that he had no further right to interfere with a case which was then before a higher Court. He soon after sent his constables with four different warrants of distress against Memorialist, his sister, and sons, commanding them,

in Her Majesty's name, to take our property in execution to the amount of five pounds, or thereabouts, with between two and three pounds costs for his favourite constable's fees, and without ever giving any previous notice, attempted to take property for that amount, but which, Memorialist, being legally advised, refused to allow them to remove.

That the said McQuaid harassed Memorialist and his family by repeated incursions of his said constables to and about Memorialist's residence, frightening and annoying his family in their threats and attempts to take away property, or arrest himself or the members of his said family, on the said illegal warrants of distress. That subsequently, he, the said McQuaid, issued his warrants of apprehension to his said constables to arrest the bodies of Memorialist, his sister, and sons, commanding the keeper of Her Majesty's jail to imprison each of the said parties for the different terms of imprisonment ordered in the said warrants of commitment.

That Memorialist was thereupon arrested, and on his way to jail, although a very poor man, and had to employ an attorney, who obtained an order from His Lordship the Chief Justice liberating Memorialist on bail, until the legality of the said Mr. McQuaid's proceedings should be tried at the ensuing term of the Supreme Court. Where, after all the arguments and excuses of the learned counsel retained for that purpose by the said McQuaid, his tyrannical, illegal, and arbitrary conduct and proceedings, in the whole of the foregoing was condemned by both the learned judges of said court, who also condemned him to pay costs in the matter to the amount of twelve or thirteen pounds, as by records of said Court will fully appear.

That the said Quaid, (or McWade, which, since his elevation he stiles himself, that he may not be thought of Irish descent), was also condemned by the said Supreme Court, some time previous, to pay a similar or greater bill of costs for a like arbitrary, tyrannous, and illegal imprisonment of another poor man named Edward Fechan, of French Village, in Lot 37, as may also be seen in the records of the said Supreme Court.

That the said McQuaid was likewise convicted before a bench of magistrates of an aggravated assault on an Engineer of the Hillsborough steamer, from which conviction he appealed to the Supreme Court, and which conviction was also confirmed by the said Supreme Court, which can also be seen on its records.

That he has been guilty of many other equally, if not more aggravated, practises as a magistrate, for which Memorialist, if necessary, could furnish sufficient proofs of the unfortunate victims of his tyranny, being too poor to have him brought before a proper tribunal.

That the said McQuaid, for the purpose of acquiring the paltry fees attached to the office which he disgraces, encourages litigation to a grievous extent in the neighbourhood, which may be seen from the fact that, whereas there are many respectable, intelligent, and honest magistrates in the immediate neighbourhood and surrounding settlements scarcely a half dozen cases in the twelvemonth are entertained by the whole of them together, who generally caution and advise an excited or litigious individual to peace and quietness; but who are sure, if not gratified by the peaceably inclined magistrates, to be willingly and attentively attended to by the said McQuaid, with as many warrants, summonses, and subpoenas, as they may wish for; and who are sure, let their complaint be ever so frivolous or wrong, to be gratified with the recovery of all their costs and expenses, together with the said justices fees, coupled with a nominal fine of 1s.; or if the defendant be a party not likely to appeal, the larger fine of 2s. 6d., or sometimes more, as in the foregoing complaint of the said Doyle against Memorialist, who had to pass six or seven J. P.s, some of whom not a mile distant, others two miles, and all of them far nearer than McQuaid, who was over ten miles distance; but none of whom would entertain the said complaint, till he went to McQuaid, who gladly encouraged him to proceed.

Memorialist, therefore, humbly prays your Excellency will be pleased to take the foregoing premises into consideration, and as Her Majesty's Supreme Court has at least in the three foregoing instances convicted the said J. P. of being a tyrant, an assaulter, and a false prisoner, as by the records of the said Court he cannot controvert, besides being ignorant of all law and destitute of moderation or prudence, as Memorialist can further prove, if necessary, to your fullest satisfaction. That your Excellency will relieve the neighbourhood from a very

great pest and nuisance, and not permit Her Majesty's commission to be longer disgraced by an ignorant, bullying, and tyrannical rumseller. And Memorialist will, as in duty bound, ever pray.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :

Most respectfully I again beg to lay before your Excellency and the Government, that since presenting my humble Memorial respecting Mr. James McWade, J. P., he has obtained another opportunity of executing or gratifying his vengeance against me for so presuming to complain against him. On Friday, the 16th June, one of my sons, Peter Laverty, in endeavouring to clear a piece of woodland for crop, happened to be burning some rubbish out of the way ; at the same time, a certain fire, which was for a day or two previous also out in a neighbouring farm, unfortunately spread into the farm of one Michael Comisky, a neighbour of mine, who knowing the envenomed feelings of the said McWade against me, forthwith applied to him and obtained the annexed summons for the said burning. That on the morning of the trial, hearing that one Peter Laverty, a cousin of my own, could testify that it was the first fire which was out that run into Comisky's wood, I accordingly called on him to obtain his evidence, but he declined to come, as he was not subpoenaed by a constable, for which I had not time. I, and my son, both at the trial, applied for a postponement, in order to procure his evidence, and offering to prove on oath that he was a material and principal evidence, which the said justice peremptorily refused to grant, notwithstanding the provisions of the 26th section of the Act, 19th Vic., Cap. 23, which expressly requires the said justice to so adjourn. That by giving such judgment without having my said witness at the lower Court, I am precluded in having him at the hearing of my appeal at the Supreme Court. That the said McWade, as your Excellency will perceive, in the desire or eagerness to ruin me, far exceeded the power given to a Justice of the Peace, by the Act 5th, Geo. 4, Cap. 16, which empowers a J. P. to fine for £5 ; and also provides that the offending party shall be liable in damages, &c., but which damages are only recoverable by the verdict of a jury. But McWade thought himself Judge and Jury when he got me before him, as will be seen by the minute of his sentence, hereto annexed.*

I beg further to state, that on the day after trial, after procuring two bails whom I brought with my son early in the morning, a distance of about ten miles, to obtain an appeal, he refused giving such appeal till the afternoon, until he would finish butchering a Calf which he was then employed at, and upon my respectfully representing to him the inconvenience we were under in being away from our business so long, he took a lump of carrion, or offal, of the said Calf in his hand, holding it to me, and asking me to lunch thereon, in the hope I might commit a breach of the peace. The whole of the foregoing facts I can testify on oath, and by the oaths of several others.

May it please your Excellency: I will, if required, procure copies from the Crown Office of the facts stated in my former memorial, namely, that he issued warrants to apprehend and imprison myself, my son, and sister, long after the said cases were appealed and entirely out of his hands ; that I was a prisoner under his false warrant, and he was condemned, there on, by the Judges of the Supreme Court, as he was also in the cases of Edward Feehan and the Engineer of the Hillsborough Steamer. He is now travelling the neighbourhood looking for signatures to documents to lay before the Government, many of whom know nothing of the nature of what they are signing. Again, most humbly beseeching your Excellency's protection and relief, from the above named tyrant, I will, as in duty bound, ever pray.

We, the undersigned inhabitants of Glenfinan Settlement, and near neighbours of one Edward Lafferty, who, it appears, has complained to your Excellency in Council, of the conduct of James McWade, Esq., as a Justice of the Peace, towards him, the said Edward Lafferty, as shewn by a copy of the said complaint, furnished said James McWade, Esq., by C. Desbrisay, Esq., C. E. C., with an intent to damage his character, socially and morally, as we verily believe, and know from the well-known sayings, doings, and low character of the said Edward Lafferty and family. We certify that we have known McWade for a long time, we may say since his boyhood, many of us have dealt with him, and have always found him upright, honorable, and honest, far above the low cunning of his mean accuser, and we hope and trust, and verily believe, that your Excellency in Council will dismiss the complaint of the low Edward Lafferty from your Honorable Court, as we are satisfied he is not the person to encourage litigation, as stated in the complaint of said Edward Lafferty, but on the contrary, he has endeavoured, to our knowledge, to make peace and keep order in the steamboat and other places where his authority was interposed for that purpose :

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council.

THE HUMBLE PETITION OF MARY MITCHELL, OF FORT AUGUSTUS, MOST RESPECTFULLY SHEWETH :

The Petitioner is a poor widow, left with four orphan children to support in affliction and distress, since the decease of her late husband, John Mitchell, who died of Cancer, about three years since ; that by reason of his long illness, and other difficulties, she was obliged to sell her little farm of 50 acres, to one James Mitchell, a neighbour, to clear off the incumbrances thereon, retaining her little house and garden, about $\frac{1}{4}$ of an acre, as her sole shelter to struggle for existence with her little ones.

That the said James Mitchell, to whom Petitioner so sold her said farm, being covetous and

greedy, and conceiving my little dwelling to be an eyesore on the farm, felt desirous of getting me off the premises and enjoying all himself; and procuring the assistance of one James McWade, who held Her Majesty's commission of Justice of the Peace, to harass and annoy me. And among other persecutions, the following:—

Petitioner having retained the right to cut and haul her firewood from off the said farm, which she so sold, and having procured a neighbour to haul a few loads about the month of January last, the said James Mitchell obtained summonses from the said James McWade, against myself, and also against the person who hauled the said wood, and fined both of us in 2s. 6d. each, and heavy costs, which I had to pay,—(the offence being for laying down the said firewood on my own wood-pile, on the snow, within about 3 yards of my own door.)—and in a few days after, sent me another summons for not removing it, instantler, and fined me in a similar sum and costs, from which judgment, Petitioner appealed to the Supreme Court, but which fine and costs the said James Mitchell, or his counsel, gave up, and prevented Mr. McWade's judgment from exposure in court.

That immediately after the Easter Term, (last May), the said James Mitchell commenced to fence Petitioner from access to the public highway, and because Petitioner removed and cut 3 or 4 of the longers, so used in unlawfully fencing me from the road, the said McWade again had me dragged before him and fined me in a sum of 50s., and 53s. costs, which is far beyond any costs lawfully incurred therein, as may be easily seen if your Excellency call on his bill of costs in the case.

Against this sentence, Petitioner had to demand an appeal, and although Petitioner had to pay two of her neighbours to leave their plowing, and travel from Fort Augustus to McWade's residence, at Mount Stewart Bridge, he, the said McWade, endeavoured to evade granting me the said appeal, at that time, asserting that he had six days, and that I must wait on his leisure, thinking that by reason of my poverty I could not get any to come again with me; and when several of the audience, then in his court, or bar-room, expressed their disapprobation and disgust at his thus trifling with a poor widow, he said he had no paper whereon to write the appeal papers. That Petitioner had, thereupon, to get a person to go to a neighbouring shop, at Mount Stewart Bridge, and procure two pence worth of paper, whereon he wrote the said appeal, exacting from me on the spot the full fees allowed him for said appeal papers, but declining to refund me the money paid by me for said paper; and also, before granting the said appeals, compelling my said bail to justify, on oath, their solvency, as such bail, although he well knew that the worst of them was worth more than ten times his own worth, his motive being to obstruct me in getting them to go for me, thinking they would decline before bearing in insult in swearing the said oath.

That after complying with all his requirements, he reluctantly made out, or pretended he made out, the said appeal papers, to which I most humbly pray your Excellency's attention; instead of the said appeal being made returnable, on the 27th day of June, the day of opening the Supreme Court, he inserted in the affidavit, he made me swear to, that it was to be on the 6th day of June, and also, inserted the 6th of June, in the recognisance, thinking, thereby, that my case would be lost on that account; and which affidavit and recognisance can now be seen in the office of the Clerk of the Crown; and to which office he declined to send the conviction, and the bill of costs, which, by the 11th Sec. of the Act 19th Vic., Cap. 23rd, respecting convictions, and an Act of the last Session of the Legislature, respecting bills of costs, he was bound and entitled to do.

May it please your Excellency: I can furnish positive proof, on oath, of the said McWade's using all the efforts, above named, to obstruct mein obtaining the said appeal; his unwarrantable amount of costs, 53s., and his false return of the date of the Supreme Court, the 6th of June, instead of the 27th, will be seen by that document in the Crown Office; and his disregard to the Statute, requiring him to furnish the conviction, and the bill of costs to the said office, is thus evident. Beseeching your Excellency's Government to take the foregoing into consideration, and Petitioner will, as in duty bound, ever pray.

APPENDIX (CC)

In the matter of investigation, ordered by the Lieut Governor in Council, into certain charges against James McWade, Esq., in his character as a Justice of the Peace, by Edward Laverty and Mary Mitchell.

EDWARD LAVERTY sworn: When Deponent demanded the appeal papers in the case of Peter Doyle, Mr. McQuaid said, that he should take out four appeals, that each appeal would be five shillings, the cases being, he said, 4. Peter Doyle against Deponent, his sister, Mary Laverty, and his two sons, James, and Peter. Hon. Mr. Kelly was present, and he told Mr. McQuaid that he considered one appeal was sufficient. A day or two after, Deponent took out one appeal in his own name. Before the time for hearing the appeal before the Supreme Court, through the means of Hon. Francis Kelly, the case was settled, and Deponent obtained Doyle's receipt for the costs. Deponent caused the fines to be paid, five shillings and sixpence. In December, following, Executions were issued against Deponent, his sister, and sons, the constable made levy on a horse. Deponent said, the constable should not take the horse, and he was ready to go with him. That the constable could not take property, and take his body, also. The constable offered to take levy on a cart. Constable went away that time. Towards the spring of the year, three constables' came to Deponent, Bernard McKenna, Pat. Sherry, and Thomas Duggan, informed Deponent that they had Executions from Mr. McWade, to put them in jail. Deponent caused his son James, to read the receipts he held from Doyle. Duggan said he would do nothing further with the warrants until he saw Mr. McWade. They then went away. In July or August, Bernard McKenna came again with an Execution. After a few days, Deponent was in Charlottetown, when Deponent was arrested by Edward Gay, constable, under Execution issued by Mr. McWade, in Doyle's suit. Went with Gay to the Attorney General, and afterwards to Mr. Charles Palmer's office. Gay permitted Deponent to go home for eight days for his appearance. During the time, application was made to the Chief Justice. When Deponent next came to town he was discharged on an order of the Chief Justice, and Doyle and McWade were ordered to appear before the next October Term. Deponent appeared before the Court and was discharged. The costs of the order and discharges were ordered to be paid by Mr. McWade. Previous to being arrested by Gay, Deponent informed Mr. McWade that he had settled the matter with Doyle, and held his receipts for the costs. Mr. McWade said that they had got the fines, had paid them into the Government, and had nothing more to do with the case. Deponent supposed that Mr. McWade meant himself and his trother magistrates. When Doyle's cases were tried, Deponent heard Mr. McWade say, when sitting as a magistrate, addressed Mrs. Doyle, "By God that he would commit her if she would not hold her tongue, that he might be damned to hell, that if she did not hold her tongue he would commit her. Deponent told Mr. McWade that he had paid the fines also. Have seen Mr. McWade when not sitting, as a magistrate, on other occasions, under the influence of liquor.

Cross examined: Did go to Angus McDonald's for the purpose of asking for the appeal, having learned that Mr. McWade was to be there. Went to R. G. McDonald, Esq., for the appeal, and he accompanied him to Jas. McDonald. They agreed to grant the appeal. R. G. McDonald then went to Mr. McWade. Deponent received a note from Mr. McWade, stating that he should be down to his house in so many minutes, or he would not get the appeal. Deponent went down and entered the appeal, and paid Mr. McWade 5s. costs of appeal. Deponent did not pay Doyle himself. Mr. Kelly arranged the case between them, and Mr. Kelly brought Deponent Doyle's receipt for the amount of costs. Before I left Mount Stewart, when the case for burning was on trial, I determined to make second complaint against Mr. McWade. On my return home went to see Hon. F. Kelly, and told him what had taken place at the trial of the burning, and when the calf was killed. Cannot remember whether Hon. F. Kelly suggested to me about a second complaint, or whether I asked him if it could be done. Mr. Kelly was not the first person who advised Deponent to complain. When it was suggested to Deponent to complain, Deponent went to talk to Mr. Kelly about it. Mr. Kelly said, if James McWade was broke, that John Roche Bourke would be put in his place. I have confided in Mr. Kelly throughout, and he may have named some of the witnesses to be subpoenaed.

EDWARD LAVERTY.

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PETER LAVERTY SWORN : Was present at the trial of Doyle's case against his father. Was one of the persons summoned. James McWade was the sitting Magistrate, assisted by two other Magistrates. Heard Mr. McWade, during the trial, swear at Mrs. Doyle, by his God, that he would commit her if she did not behave herself; also heard Mr. McWade say that he might be damned that if some of the people did not keep quiet that he would commit them. Believes that Mr. McWade was speaking to Mrs. Doyle, but cannot say positively. Was the party sued for the burning. When I went to Mount Stewart for the appeal, Mr. McWade was in the act of killing a Calf. Father, and Edward M. Lavery, went to go security. Father told Mr. McWade, that if he would go and make out the appeal, that one of them would kill the Calf for him. Mr. McWade would not consent—but continued butchering the Calf—and said, when they complained of being detained, that they should have stayed home until he was ready. Got to Mount Stewart about 9 or 10, forenoon. Did not get the appeal until between 3 or 4, afternoon. Kept us waiting, and delayed us purposely, as Deponent believes. Father told me to tender the money a second time for the appeal, that we should not wait. Father said, if we did not get the appeal, to tell Mr. McWade that we would get the appeal some where else. Mr. McWade then took some of the offals from the Calf and held it his father, and asked him if he would have a bit of it. The damage sustained by myself and sureties, was the loss of the time of each person.

PETER E. LAVERTY.

EDWARD GAY SWORN : In summer '64, arrested Edward Lavery, at the suit of Doyle. Lavery showed Deponent receipts, and Deponent took him to the Attorney General. Lavery was permitted to go home, and to appear at a given day. Hon. F. Kelly undertook that Lavery, as well as the other parties, should appear. Deponent acquainted Mr. McWade, in the mean time, that Lavery held such receipts. Mr. McWade said, that he had nothing to do with such receipts, that Deponent should have put him, Lavery, in jail. Mr. McWade issued the Execution. His signature was on the document. Read the receipts. Understood from the receipts that the fine and costs were both paid. Witness understood, from Mr. McWade, that he had been informed that the receipts were given before Deponent informed him. Am not certain whether Mr. McWade said, receipt, or receipts.

EDWARD GAY.

FRANCIS KELLY SWORN : Edward Lavery requested him to see Doyle and try and settle the case. Saw Doyle, and saw the amount of costs marked on the affidavit, on appeal paper, marked 24s., as he believes, in Prothonotary office. Some time previous, Doyle expressed a wish to have the matter settled. Witness made up an account of what he thought the costs ought to be in all the cases; the amount of appeal, as well as the other three. It came to something over three pounds. Deponent drew a receipt, in each of the four cases, and Doyle signed them. Deponent had previously passed his word, to Solomon Mutch, for the payment of a debt due by Doyle to Mutch. And this money was paid to Mutch for, and on account of Doyle, with Doyle's consent. These receipts were for the costs only. Was present and saw the amount of the fines, 5s. 6d., paid to one of the convicting Magistrates, James Macdonald, Esq. Some days afterwards, witness heard that Doyle disavowed a settlement, and witness took him to the next Magistrates house. Doyle admitted, and signed duplicate receipts, before Allan McDonald. Some days afterwards, Deponent met Mr. McWade at McBride's, Fort Augustus, and then Mr. McWade spoke to Deponent about his having interfered in the settlement of the case. Deponent told Mr. McWade that he had done so, and had succeeded in reconciling both parties. This took place in November. Lavery was not taken in Execution, until the following summer, in July or August. At the time Mr. McWade issued the Execution, he was distinctly aware, from the information given him, by Deponent, that the cases had been settled. On the day of the funeral of Arthur Mullins, Mr. McWade was under the influence of liquor, and attempted to lay hold of Deponents person. Called Deponent a liar. On another occasion, in the fall of 1864, after the hearing of Lavery's case, on board the steamer on the passage to Mount Stewart, Deponent was in the steerage, in conversation with two of his neighbours, when McWade came up and contradicted, and said that what De-

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ponent said was not true. McWade made some allusion to Lavery's trial. McWade said, Deponent had sworn to words in his affidavit, that were not true, and that he would have him indicted (by God) for perjury. He said, by God, and by the Holy Ghost he would, him, Deponent, indict for perjury at the next term. Deponent said he would not hold any conversation with him; that he was blaspheming, and was the worse for liquor. The five receipts now produced by the clerk of the Supreme Court, one for the four fines, and the other four for the costs, signed by Peter Doyle, and witnessed by Allan Macdonald, were drawn up by himself, and signed in my presence. Believes that the amount expressed in the receipts for costs, are the amounts they were entitled to pay, according to the information received from parties who attended that Court, and according to the scale of fees. Doyle expressed a wish to witness, that he would try and effect a settlement. He expressed that wish before Deponent drew up the receipts. Am not certain whether Doyle expressed a wish that witness should effect a settlement, or that the case should be settled. I did not interfere in the case, at that time; but after, when spoken to by Lavery, and believing it to be for the interest of both parties, I then applied to the Prothonotary's office, and saw both parties to get the matter settled. I frequently interfere in matters of this kind, to make peace, and never make a charge for it. The duplicate receipts, witnessed by Allan McDonald, were signed by Doyle at James McDonald's. The original receipts were signed near the road near Pat. Sherry's. I found Doyle, when I went to look for him, at Pat. Sherry's. Receipts signed on the road, were witnessed by myself; read them over, and explained them to Doyle. Might have called at Terence Carrol's, for to see Doyle, to induce Doyle to make a settlement. No recollection of it now. Might have said to Doyle, that the appeal papers, or merits of the case, would be fatal to the cause; such was his belief. Felt anxious that Doyle should get clear of the case, as he is a poor man. Did go to Doyle, to see him about a settlement, it was then I found him at Sherry's. Mrs. Doyle did say something about Jenny Lind Potatoes to pay Mutche's debt. Did not say to Mrs. Doyle, that if she would use her influence, with her husband, to get him to sign the papers, that he would pay the debt, himself. Do not recollect having said to any person, that Doyle asked me to liquidate a certain note due to Solomon Mutch. Does not recollect the amount paid Mutch for Doyle. Thinks it was about 50s., or 60s. Believes that Doyle contracted the debt with Mutch, under my guarantee. The amount recovered for costs might be greater than Mutche's debt. Thinks Doyle owed him for drawing an affidavit, or a bill of sale. If there was any balance, I might have kept it for that. Did not keep any part of it, for the trouble I had in the matter of Doyle and Lavery. Am not certain, but believes that I did not go on purpose of James Macdonald, J. P., to pass the fines. Did not call at Mr. McWade's, as he had previously insulted him. I never expressed a wish to Lavery, that McWade should be struck off the list of a Magistrate. I persuaded Lavery, at that time, from making complaint. Lavery came to witness again, and witness said that he had a right to complain to Government; and witness drafted the Memorial for him. Never said to Mrs. Hand, that I would manage to get McQuaid struck off the list of Justices; nor did I make use of the words—that I never allowed any eel to slip through his hands—or words to that effect.

F. KELLY.

DANIEL HUDSON sworn: Am Clerk of the Supreme Court, and have possession of the Court Records. Produces the minutes of Court, and the decision of the Court in the matter of the application of Edward Feehan, to set aside an Execution at the suit of James McWade, together with the affidavit and Judge's order. The Court ordered the Execution to be set aside, and McWade to pay the costs.

In the case of James McWade, appellant, vs. Philo C. Brown, respondent. In this case, the judgment below affirmed, on 28th October, 1862.

In the case of Edward Lavery, appellant, vs. Peter Doyle, respondent. The rule granted by the Chief Justice, at Chambers, and the affidavits and orders, thereto annexed. In this case, the Court make the rule absolute, with the costs to be paid by James McWade, the Justice of the Peace who issued the Execution.

D. HODGSON.

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In the case of Mary Mitchell, appellant, and James Mitchell, respondent. Before James McWade and James McDonald, J. Ps., the amount of the costs stated in the affidavit of appeal, 53s. costs of suit.

ELIZA FISHER being sworn, deposeth. About two or three years ago, was on board the steamer 'Experiment,' on her way from Charlottetown to Mount Stewart Bridge. Was present and saw Jas. McWade assault the Engineer Brown of the steamer. Thought McWade the worse for liquor. Brown did not give any provocation. Brown was going into the Engine-room, when McWade caught hold of him. When McWade took hold of the Engineer, witness told him who he was. McWade said he did not care a damn for him, or for any other man. Brown sued McWade for assault, and the case was tried in Charlottetown. I was examined as a witness. McWade was convicted and fined.

ELIZA FISHER.

EDWARD FEEHAN sworn: Cunningham sued me before McWade. McWade gave a judgment against me. Applied for appeal. Offered surties for appeal. McWade refused to take the persons who were tendered. McWade refused to take security, unless each person was worth £250. Deponent was in dread of Mr. McWade, and he passed his Promissory Note to Mr. McWade, in favor of Mr. McWade, for the amount. The amount of the Note included the fees of several witnesses who did not make any charge. John McMullan, Savage Harbour, and John McCaskill, French Village, gave up their demand as witnesses. Deponent took their receipts for such demands. Took them to Mr. McWade, who would not look at such receipts. The balance of the note, over and above the amount of those who forgave their fees, Deponent paid to Mr. McWade in potatoes. McWade sued Deponent to the Commissioners Court, in Lot 49, for the full amount of the said Promissory Note. Covehead Court was nearer, both to McWade and myself, than the Lot 49 Court. Deponent's health prevented him from appearing before the 49 Court, and knew nothing of the suit until the constable came with the Execution. Deponent was ultimately committed to jail under the Execution, at the suit of Jas. McWade. Applied to the Supreme Court and was ordered to deposit a certain sum of money to the Prothonotary, when he was discharged. The case came on to be heard before the Supreme Court, when the money deposited was ordered to be refunded to him, and McWade ordered to pay costs. This is the same case referred to by Daniel Hodgson, Esq. About two years ago, McWade convicted me for being drunk and disorderly, and offered that if I would give him 10s. 6d., that he would let me go. Sooner than pay the 10s. 6d., Deponent was put to jail for 48 hours. Am quite certain the amount of the fine was ten shilling and sixpence. That was the first and last time Deponent was fined for being drunk. Hopes it will be the last time.

Cross examined: Paid the balance with potatoes at the Bridge. Have not spoken to Mr. Kelly on the subject since I was in jail, until this day. Heard nothing of the summons until Execution was out.

EDWARD FEEHAN.

DANIEL HODGSON re-examined: Introduced appeal papers in the case of Philo C. Brown, vs. James McWade, for assault, in which the judgment below was affirmed in the Supreme Court.

In the case of James McWade against Philo C. Brown, for assault, and carried by appeal to the Supreme Court, marked on the Records of the Court, as settled by consent of the attorneys.

In the case Brown, vs. McWade, the fine was Two Pounds.

In the case of McWade against Brown, the fine was Fifty Shillings.

D. HODGSON.

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Inquiry resumed, this 9th day August, 1865.

EDWARD LAVERTY sworn: Am a son of Michael Lavery. About a month ago, accompanied Edward Lavery and Peter Lavery, to the residence of Jas. McWade, for the purpose of going security in an appeal in a case where judgment had been given against Lafferty, at the suit of Michael Comisky. Mr. McWade was engaged. Lavery asked for an appeal. Mr. McWade was about killing a Calf. Lavery offered, that if Mr. McWade would go and get the appeal papers ready, that he would finish the butchering of the Calf for him. McWade would not leave off. Said he was not in a hurry, as he had six days to do it in. Witness offered to assist. Mr. McWade declined Deponents services. McWade delayed a long time: Twice as long as necessary required to butcher a Calf. Kept us waiting. Detained much longer time: Thought that he delayed us purposely to detain and annoy us. After he had taken the intestines out of the body of the Calf, McWade took up some of the offal, and said to Lavery, "if he would take of that,"—holding up the offal, at the time, to his face. Lavery said that such conduct was a shame for a Magistrate. After some further delay, he at last made out the papers, and granted the appeal papers.

Cross examined: McWade did delay us. When we arrived, the Calf was bleeding. Said it was too bad to keep people waiting all the day, a long way from their homes.

WILLIAM SWABEY sworn: Have sat with Mr. McWade, as a Justice of the Peace, frequently, the last four or five years. Sat in the case of Edward Lavery, against Peter Doyle, for assault. Mr. Kelly, Mr. Macdonald, Tracadie, John Allan Macdonald, and James Macdonald, sat with him on that case. The complaint of Lavery was dismissed, each party paying his own costs. The case commenced before John Allan Macdonald, Esquire. Has in one instance issued a warrant on the complaint of a party who he knew had been Defendant in an action for a similar charge; but at the time of trial, the party making the complaint, made affidavit, before witness, that some time had elapsed between the committal of two assaults. This case was Jas. McWade against Philo C. Brown. At the hearing before myself, Mr. Worthy, and Jas. Macdonald, Brown was fined. Does not remember the amount. Brown put in an appeal. Mrs. Fisher was one of the witnessed examined on that trial. She said that Mr. McWade might have put his hand on Brown, at the time, but she did not see it. Thinks Jas. Macdonald, line farm, was a witness in the case. In his examination, he said, that he saw nothing done by Mr. McWade, but what a Magistrate ought to have done on such occasions. Knows that Mrs. Fisher was an abusive person. About 3 years ago, was requested, in a note from Kelly, to issue summonses, for trespass, against several parties at the suit of Francis Murphy. Mr. Kelly was a witness in the case, and asked witness to act in the case himself; as one Magistrate was competent to hear such a case. Does not remember whether McWade's name was mentioned. Remember sending for McWade, who attended, and sat in the case with witness. Thinks Mr. Kelly was examined in the case. Does not remember Mr. Kelly refusing to be sworn. Thinks after the case was tried, Mr. Kelly saying something about costs. Has no recollection of hearing McWade say to Mr. Kelly—that as he was the cause of the case—if he was going to pay the costs, that he must do it at once. Does't think there were any money paid that day.

WILLIAM SWABEY.

SAMUEL McCALLUM, being sworn: In the year, 1859, Edward Feehan put about ten bushels of potatoes, on board of his vessel, on account of the Priest. About three or four bushels, Feehan told witness he wished to put in for Mr. McWade, to pay him something, or to get some goods on account.

SAMUEL B. McCALLUM.

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JAMES MACDONALD, Allishry, sworn : Sat as a Magistrate with Mr. McWade, in case Lavery, vs. Doyle. Mr. McWade conducted himself, as a Magistrate, with propriety. Thinks that the fine, on that case, was properly laid on. The judgment was unanimous, as far can recollect. Thinks the case deserved a larger fine ; but there was provocation given. Saw nothing to induce witness to suppose that McWade had induced Doyle to subpoenas unnecessary, a number of witnesses, to augment costs. Lavery's son paid the fine. Mr. Kelly wrote the receipts which Doyle signed, in his presence. McWade always acted in a becoming manner, as a Magistrate. Has no knowledge that Mr. McWade encouraged litigation. Has heard about the case of Feehan. Heard that Mr. McWade was tyrannical in that case, as well as in the case now being enquired into. In the matter of Mary Mitchell ; saw nothing improper as a J. P. Recollects John McCaskill, proving before him, 3 or 4 years ago, that the Sheep claimed by Feehan, were taken from the fold of John McCaskill. Feehan also stated, that the Sheep, in question, belonged to Little Ronald Macdonald, Sand Hills. Cunningham proved to the marks on the Sheep, on that occasion, to my satisfaction. Thinks that Feehan was properly dealt with, on that occasion. Knows Pat. Ready, and Red Neil McKay, whom Feehan offered as bail. Recollects McWade questioning them about their qualifications. Witness knew himself, that they were unfit persons to take as sureties. Feehan not a punctual person. Believe him untruthful ; that is his general character. Has seen him oftener than once drunk, himself. Was at Worthy's when Mrs. Fisher was examined. Said that Mr. McWade have put his hand on Brown's shoulder, to pacify him. Cannot recollect that McWade used oaths on that occasion. McWade had to use strong language to keep the audience quiet. Knows nothing touching the character of Mr. Lavery.

JAMES McDONALD.

JAMES COMISKEY, being duly sworn, saith : That he was a witness in case Doyle vs. Lavery. The Lavery's were not hardly dealt with. Thinks he was entitled to his costs, as a witness. Never looked for the costs. Never got any costs. If Mr. Kelly had not interfered, we would have got our costs in the case. Heard McWade refused to allow costs to Sherry, witness, unless Doyle would make affidavit that he was necessary witness. * [Did not sign my name to the paper addressed to the Governor in Council, touching the reputation of James McWade.] Was not at home when the Petition went round. If I had been at home, I would have signed it. Gave no authority to any person to sign such a paper. On the trial of Doyle vs. Lavery, heard McWade loudly censure a woman. McWade committed a blunder. He might have said, "So help me God, that he would commit her if she would not hold her tongue." Knew Mr. Lavery for 20 years. Never heard anything regarding, or against his character, only that Lavery was sometimes in a scrape of law. He never killed any person, to his knowledge, or he would have heard it. Having heard the paper read, would not have signed it, had he known of that part of it detaining Lavery. Would have signed a paper approving of the conduct of James McWade. Lavery was too ready to dip into law.

JAMES COMISKEY.

JOHN COMISKEY. Was an evidence in case referred to. McWade acted properly, if anything was wrong. He was too lenient to the Lavery's. Lives near to him. Lavery's reputation is not very good. Would not do an injury to an neighbour. He is too fond of going into law. Lavery is not on good terms with his neighbours, the last two or three years. Heard Mr. Kelly say nothing in the case of Doyle vs. Lavery, but what was proper. What he did say, was similar to what he swore to on last Saturday, before the Court. When witness remarked to Mr. Kelly, that he ought not to have interfered in any matter which would deprive witness of his costs, Mr. Kelly replied, that he thought they had a better right to loose his day, or costs of the day, as he would to loose 50s. or 60s. Thinks Mr. Kelly's interference was for the purpose of saving himself from the payment of his liability due to Mr. Mutch.

JOHN COMISKEY.

ANN COMISKEY sworn : Was an evidence in the case of Doyle vs. Lavery. Saw the affair. Thought that if Lavery had held his tongue, there would have been no trouble. The assault was clearly proven against Lavery, by Doyle and witnesses. Mr. McWade was rash towards Mrs.

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Doyle, after the judgment. Did not hear him take any oath. McWade might have made use of oaths.

PETER DOYLE sworn : Never asked Mr. Kelly to effect a settlement with Laverty's, or any one else. Mr. Kelly followed witness to Pat. Sherry's. Told him that there was a blunder in the appeal papers, that Laverty did not know it. That if witness would sign this paper, he would, his note of hand, and get the matter settled. Mr. Kelly said, that what witness owed to Mutch, could be paid out of it. Witness replied, that the money belonged to others,—the witnesses. Mr. Kelly said, that there was nothing put in for the witnesses. Mr. Kelly induced witness to believe, that if he did not sign the paper, that Laverty would get clear by paying 28s. Witness did sign that paper. Refused to sign until I heard that Laverty would get clear, by paying 28s. Kelly said he did not wish to harm him. Believes he would not. Kelly said that Laverty had no right to get off. Did not want to have to do with that money. Did not authorize Mr. Kelly to pay the money received from Laverty's to Mr. Mutch. Mr. Kelly did not return any Note of Hand. Got receipt for the money from Mr. Mutch. The fall of that year, he had other potatoes for sale, besides the Jenny Linds. I could spare a couple of carts, and intended to have put them on board of a vessel, for Mutch. Did at first refuse to sign the second receipts. Thought it did not come to the expenses which were incurred in the trial. He would sign receipts for as much as Kelly had paid to Mr. Mutch. Thought he could follow Laverty for the remainder—Mr. Kelly having said so. Would not have signed the receipts if I thought I had no remedy against Laverty for the balance. Mr. Kelly said, there was nothing put down for witnesses or constable. At the trial, or after it, Mr. McWade said, "So help his God if they did not keep quiet, that he would commit them." Mr. Kelly met witness on the day of Comiskey's frolick, standing on the road inside of the fence; it was before the day Mr. Kelly got him at Sherry's, where he signed the original receipts. Mr. Kelly told witness that the appeal was lifted: that there was to be no more about it. Mr. Kelly said it was well, or he would have to pay 20s. to a lawyer. This happened on a Thursday. Said he was glad the appeal papers were lifted. On the following Saturday, Mr. Kelly met him at Sherry's, with the receipts. Read the receipts over to witness, before signing them. Mr. Kelly said that only 28s. was put in the Prothonotary office, for constable and witnesses. Never asked at Mutche's schooner, if they would take Potatoes. The schooner was there. Mr. Kelly told witness that the money had been paid to Mutch. Mr. Kelly said when he went to get duplicate receipts to Doyle's house, that he was getting blame from the people and his own family, about the money had from Laverty's. Does not recollect Mr. Kelly saying that his motive, in getting duplicate receipts from witness, was having heard that Doyle, or his wife, disavowed having allowed Mr. Kelly to have a settlement, or pay the money. Mr. Kelly read over the first receipts to witness, before signing them.

RONALD GREGORY McDONALD sworn, saith: Was one of the Justices presiding at the trial of Doyle vs Laverty. Saw nothing improper in the conduct of Mr. McWade. He had to call out order, more than once, during the trial. Does not remember hearing Mr. McWade making use of any oaths at the trial. Mr. McWade did not make use of any improper language, as far as he recollects. Mr. McWade did not attempt to induce the Bench to fine the parties with an excessive amount of fine. Mr. Laverty afterwards applied to witness for an appeal; the appeal was made, and perfected at Mr. McWade's, who received five shillings. Did not demand any more. Did not hear Laverty say after the appeal was perfected,—that he did not design to follow it before the Supreme Court. He might have said so, and I might not now remember. Knows Edward Feehan, for many years. Has had considerable dealings with him, and have always found him correct and honorable. Met one of the Laverty's on the road, one day, and he told witness, that he had taken up the appeal. Witness replied, that he would have to go to Mr. McWade for it, as the records were there. It would have been as convenient for Mr.

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Kelly, or any one else, when at the Junction Road, near Mount Stewart, to have gone to Mr. McWade's, as to have gone to Mr. McDonald's, so witness considers. Have seen Mr. McWade, the worse of liquor; but never drunk, as we understand the word.

R. G. McDONALD.

ALLAN MACDONALD sworn: Am witness to the receipts drawn by Mr. Kelly, between Doyle and Laverty. The receipts were signed in his brother's house. Doyle objected to sign the receipts, because the amount expressed was not equal to the amount of expenses incurred on the trial. Mr. Kelly said, that if he was dissatisfied with the amount, that he could follow the Laverty's for the balance, or words to that effect. Mr. Mutche's name was not mentioned. There was no money paid then. Laverty bears a good reputation. Laverty is fond of law. Took the document, in favor of Mr. McWade, round the settlement. Some of the people asked me to read it over to them. Other persons signed it at once, on being told of the nature of the document.

ALLAN MACDONALD.

BRIDGET DOYLE sworn: Am the wife of Peter Doyle. First day Mr. Kelly came to the house, witness was digging potatoes. Told Mr. Kelly that her husband was at Comiskey's frolic. He said that Mr. Mutche's schooner was up ready to load. Asked me if we had notice for the appeal. Shewed Mr. Kelly the notice of appeal. He read it, and placed it in his pocket. Mr. Kelly said that they need not be uneasy about the appeal, as the papers were lifted. Sherry called for assistance about the Threshing Mill. Witness said that neither her husband or son could go, as they had enough to do to get the potatoes ready to go in Mutche's vessel to pay their debt. Sherry replied, that he had two pits dug himself; they could send and take one load of them, and he would send his boy down to the wharf with them, and she could have one load dug herself. Did not put any potatoes on board, having understood that Mr. Kelly had settled the matter with her husband on Saturday. Went to Sherry's, and asked Mrs. Sherry if she knew what business Mr. Kelly was on, and whatever it was, Peter was objecting to it. Peter came home on Saturday night, and told witness the nature of the settlement made with Mr. Kelly about Mutche's affair. She did not like it, nor did her husband, although he signed it. Her husband said, that Mr. Kelly wished it to be kept secret. Afterwards, on a Sunday, McKenna, constable, came to their house and asked if they knew the signing of the papers would deprive the constable and witnesses of their fees. Doyle said, if he had known that, he would not have signed the receipts. Was sorry for having done so. The night Peter signed the duplicate receipts, witness told Mr. Kelly what the constable had said on Sunday. Begged him not to leave her at the mercy of the constable. She would rather remain in the power of Mr. Mutch. This was after the money was paid to Mr. Mutch. That on the same evening, Mr. Kelly informed witness, that Mutch had already been paid, and what he wanted with Peter, was merely to let Mr. Macdonald know, that the money had been paid to Mutch. Witness then told Mr. Kelly what McKenna had told me on the Sunday. Mr. Kelly said that he was getting much blame from the people, and his own family, for having kept the money, and not having given it to Doyle. Mr. Kelly, told witness, that McKenna was a scoundrel or a ruffian, and he might go and look for his costs, as he had charged too much.

CATHARINE SHERRY sworn: Am the the wife of Pat. Sherry. Mr. Kelly came to their house on Saturday evening. Called Peter Doyle to see Mr. Kelly. They had some conversation outside. Saw Doyle put his hand to a pen, as if he was signing some paper.

PETER DOYLE, re-called. In conversation with Mr. Kelly, he, Mr. Kelly, directed witness not to let it be known how the matter had been settled.

PATRICK SHERRY sworn: Was with Doyle when he made his complaint, and took out summonses against Laverty. Did not hear Mr. McWade try to induce him to proceed to law on the case. Did not hear McWade say to Doyle, that he must subpoena a number of witnesses.

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Does not believe that McWade said so. Was an evidence on that trial. Heard the case chiefly. Did not deal hard or harsh towards the Laverty's, according to the evidence. He was leniently dealt with. The assault was clearly proven. Heard Mr. McWade refuse to allow witness costs, unless Doyle made an affidavit that he believed him to be a necessary witness. Thinks McWade advised the parties to settle before it came to trial. Applied to Mr. Farquarson, before going to McWade. He did not take up the case. Passed two Magistrates. Was not aware that any ill-feeling existed between McWade and Laverty.

TERENCE CARROLL SWORN.

PETER DOYLE, re-called : Met Mr. McWade on the ice of the river. Drove part of the way with him. Mr. McWade enquired if I had made any settlement. Told him that I never received one farthing. Some time after, I told Mr. McWade that Mr. Kelly had paid the money over to Mutch.

BERNARD MCKENNA SWORN : Am a County Constable. Applied to McWade for payment of his fees in that case. He issued Executions against the Laverty's. Levied on Horse, Cow, and Cart. Laverty rescued the Horse. Said he was ready to go to Jail. The property was not. He would have to take them. Hired Doyle's Horse to take away the Cart. Was prevented by Laverty and his wife. Then returned the Executions to Mr. McWade. Next spring, in April, Thomas Duggan came to witness with warrants of commitment, and wanted my assistance. Proceeded together to Laverty's house. The four Laverty's were there. Laverty's son produced and read the four receipts. Duggan said he would not take them until he would see Mr. McWade himself. Witness heard that Mr. Kelly had received the money from Laverty's. Witness met Mr. Kelly, on a Sunday, immediately after the term upon which the appeal was to have been heard, and asked him if he had received the money from Laverty. Mr. Kelly at first replied that he had not received it. Then, afterwards, explained how the money had been paid by him ; that a man had come to him, and asked him if he had not received some money from Doyle, that he had better pay over to him, to Doyle, or he would attach it in his hands. Witness asked Mr. Kelly if he did not know if two pounds of that money belonged to him. Mr. Kelly said that he did not. Witness replied, that he must have known it, and he had plenty of time to have got the money out of his hands before it could have been attached.

PATRICK HOLLAND SWORN : Was present at the trial. Witness in the case between Laverty and Comiskey's. I consider that McWade did not act fairly in making compensation for the burning, more than five pounds, as it was proven that the damage was twenty pounds. I remarked this to McWade, who replied that there was an angry feeling with Laverty and him, and he did not wish to go the fullest extent. Mr. McWade said that he might have gone to £10. When Laverty said, it appears you were not as bad as he might have been. McWade asked witness if he had done the same amount of damage to any of his neighbours, himself, would he consider himself bound to pay £20 for it. Witness replied, that he would feel that he was fairly entitled to do so.

PATRICK HUGHES sworn: Was an evidence in the case of James Mitchell against Mary Mitchell, before James McWade, and James McDonald, Esquires. After the trial, witness became surety in the appeal for Mary Mitchell. When Mary Mitchell at first applied for the appeal papers, McWade said that he had no paper to write the appeal on; that there was six days to make it out. Wanted us to go home and return on some other day. Witness then went and bought two sheets of paper, and McWade then made out the necessary appeal. Neil Laverty and witness being bail, McWade required Laverty to qualify. The other Magistrate said that a small qualification would be sufficient along with Mr. Hughes. Did not notice any reluctance with Mr. McWade to give the appeal after he got the paper. Laverty was required to justify to the amount of ten pounds. Did not hear Mary Mitchell ask to have the two-pence paid for the paper, to be refunded; nor did McWade, in the presence of witness, refuse it. It is not within his knowledge that Mr. Kelly prompted Mary Mitchell to complain against Mr. McWade.

PATRICK HUGHES.

NEIL LAVERTY sworn: Went with Mary Mitchell to give recognizance for her appeal. Was present at the last trial. Thought the fine of 50s. was excessive and heavy. Mr. McWade had no paper for the appeal. He said he had six days to grant it, and for them to return another day. When the paper was got by Hughes, Mr. McWade made out the appeal. Mr. McWade compelled witness to justify. Thought witness was sufficiently good without it. Asked McWade why he was required to justify. McWade said that James Mitchell, the plaintiff, said the witness had no property. Never knew that Mr. Kelly prompted Mrs. Mitchell to get up the complaint against Mr. McWade.

MICHAEL HUGHES sworn: Was a witness in the cases of Mitchell vs. Mitchell, before McWade and another. McWade wished to postpone the first case and second case, at the request of Mary Mitchell, who wanted Mr. Kelly as a witness. Mr. Kelly was there. On the second trial, Mr. Kelly was also there. Mr. Kelly took the book in his own hand. Kissed it. Said he would answer any questions that might be put to him. Did not hear him refuse to be sworn when the book was handed to him by Mr. McWade. Mr. Kelly is a good neighbour. Lives next to him. He is very revengeful when he takes a spite against a person. Thinks the case of Mary Mitchell has altogether arisen from Francis Kelly's spite towards James Mitchell. Believes that Francis Kelly is at the bottom of getting up the case against McWade. Believes that Francis Kelly was the means of forcing Mary Mitchell to remove her door from the North side to the South. In 1851, did sign a petition against F. Kelly. Am not on very friendly terms with him. We speak sometimes when we meet. The chief thing between us is the matter of the Mitchells.

MICHAEL HUGHES.

JAMES MITCHELL sworn: Was the plaintiff against Mary Mitchell. Considers that he had just cause of complaint against her. The first fine was paid. Mr. McWade did not encourage him to proceed. The second fine was appealed from to the Supreme Court. Did not, himself, withdraw the appeal from the Court. Believes it was settled between his and her lawyer. Think McWade recommended him to go home and give her a reasonable quantity of room. We applied for a third suit. Went home and gave a space of ten feet before the door, and seven feet at the porch. Her gardea fronts on the main road. Therefore, if the road of 10 by 7 feet, alluded to, had not been given, should not have been deprived of access to the road, as stated

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in her Petition. Witness has heard the Petition of Mary Mitchell read. Her garden fronts on the road. Thinks, and believes, that Francis Kelly is the means of causing trouble between Mary Mitchell and himself. For 12 months after her husband's death, was on the best of terms with her up to the time when witness voted against Mr. Kelly's son, John, being elected school-master for the village or settlement school in Port Augustus.

JAMES MITCHELL.

SOLOMON MUTCH sworn : Resides at Southport, keeps shop and does business there. Knows Peter Doyle. Have had dealings with him. On the 24th July, 1860, I furnished Doyle with a barrel of Flour. Does not know the price. It was given to Doyle on the order of Francis Kelly, and charged to Mr. Kelly's account in his books. On the 28th October, 1863, Francis Kelly paid witness 50s. on account of the said barrel of flour. Did not hold Doyle accountable for its payment. Never took a promissory note from Doyle on that occasion, or in any other case.

SOLOMON MUTCH.

The foregoing deposition of Edward Lavery and following depositions on pages 1 to 24, inclusive, and concluding with Solomon Mutch, were taken on the 5th, 9th, and 10th days of August, 1865, before us.

To His Excellency George Dundas, Esquire, Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island, Prince Edward, and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c., in Council.

Most respectfully, in reply to the allegations against me, James McQuaid, in my capacity of a Justice of the Peace, contained in a certain Memorial, signed Edward Lavery, and dated 22nd May last, which has been laid before your Excellency in Council, and of which, by your Excellency's command, a copy has been transmitted to me, with a request that I will furnish the Clerk of the Council with a reply thereto, for the information of your Excellency in Council :

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :

With respect to the allegations against my conduct and character, in my capacity of a Justice of the Peace, in the said Memorial set forth and laid before your Excellency, I, in the first place, most respectfully beg leave to assure your Excellency, that, were I conscious that even a tithe of any one of them could, on a fair hearing, and by credible testimony, be established against me, I should be so confounded and overcome by the mere fact of their having been brought under your cognizance, as—self-convicted—to be rendered altogether incapable of advancing one word in vindication of myself, and could only think myself most undeservedly fortunate in being allowed silently to acquiesce in my removal from a position which I had proved myself so unworthy to occupy.

So far, however, am I from being thus self-convicted, and prepared silently, but thankfully, to acquiesce in the only decision concerning me, as respects the said allegations, at which your Excellency in Council could possibly derive, should they, either by credible witnesses or by my own silence, evidencing against me, be established as facts before you ; that should your Excellency be pleased to direct that the said allegations shall, by commission or otherwise, be fairly and fully investigated to the end, that I may, if able to do so, be afforded an opportunity of freeing myself from the odium which, unrefuted, they are calculated to throw upon me ; or that, should they be found to be based in truth, I may, forthwith, be justly

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furnished by your emphatic condemnation of my magisterial conduct in the cases brought under your notice, and the disgraceful erasure of my name from the Magisterial Roll,—confident in my integrity and the propriety of my conduct, as touching all the matters concerning which I have been arraigned, as guilty of tyranny and injustice, before your Excellency in Council, I shall rejoice in the institution of an enquiry into my conduct, if your Excellency in Council shall be pleased to direct that such an enquiry shall be made; for I am persuaded, that such an enquiry, if fairly and fully prosecuted, will not only afford me an opportunity of completely rebutting the derogatory charges which have been exhibited against me to your Excellency in Council, but will also, I verily believe, afford me the means of proving that the Memorial, in which those charges are set forth, has not proceeded from the individual in whose name it has been written, and whose name is appended to it; but that, with the aid of the distorted facts which have been wrung from the so-called Memorialist, it has been most malignantly concocted by a man, who, were he possessed of but a moderate share either of those public or those private virtues which are generally found necessary to elevate a man to the position which he occupies, would have scorned to countenance, even in the most distant manner, the preferring of calumnies so groundless and malicious, much more the becoming—as I have the strongest reasons for believing he did—the unsought for, the voluntarily, and suggestive instigator, and most active contriver and fartherer of their fabrication and exhibition.

In the meanwhile—as it behoves me to do, even uncertain as I am whether your Excellency in Council will deem it proper to direct that an inquisition shall be held for the purpose of clearly ascertaining the truth or the falsehood of the allegations which have been preferred against me,—I now beg leave, most respectfully to submit, for your Excellency's consideration in Council, a simple statement of all the facts, matters, and proceedings adverted to in the said Memorial; merely further premising, with respect to them, that, if allowed an opportunity to do so, I can, by the most indisputable evidence, establish the correctness of my statement of them in every particular.

It is true that the Memorialist, Edward Lavery, his sister, and his two sons were brought before me, R. G. Macdonald and James Macdonald, Justices of the Peace for Queen's County, for an alleged assault, on the complaint of one Peter Doyle, of Glenfinin Settlement; and that the said alleged assault was fully proved, before us, on the evidence of four respectable witnesses, near neighbours of both parties, to have been committed on the person of the said Peter Doyle, by your Excellency's Memorialist, the said Edward Lavery, his sister Mary Lavery, and his two sons, James and Peter Lavery, on Sunday, the 19th day of July, 1863; and that they (the defendants) were accordingly convicted and sentenced by us, the Magistrates, to pay, Edward Lavery a fine of One Shilling, Mary Lavery a fine of One Shilling, and James and Peter Lavery, the first, a fine of One Shilling, and the other Two Shillings and sixpence, besides the legal expenses consequent upon the information, trial, and conviction. Some four or five days after the trial, the said Edward Lavery, your Excellency's Memorialist, having accidentally met me at the house of one Angus Macdonald, of Scoth Fort, asked me for an appeal against the decision of myself and brother Magistrates, in the case of himself and his sister, and his two sons, and insisted that I should, there and then, comply with his request. I told him, in reply to his demand, that it was unreasonable to suppose that I could do so; because such a supposition would imply the belief in the person entertaining it, that, I not only carried about with me when from home on private business of my own, paper, pens, and ink, but also the necessary blank forms, and the records of the Magisterial decisions to which I had been a party; but, at the same time I told him, that, provided he would call at my house the next day, I would willingly comply with his request. The next day, he, the said Edward Lavery, applied for the appeal to R. G. Macdonald, Esquire, one of the two Justices of the Peace who, besides myself, had sat on the trial, but that gentleman, not having the records of the several amounts of the fines, costs, &c., was unable to comply with his, the said Edward Lavery's, request. He, the said Mr. Macdonald, however, came in company with the said Edward Lavery, to my house, the same day; and I, then and there, filled up the Appeal papers, and took from him, the said Edward Lavery, for the service so per-

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formed, the sum of Five Shillings only, and did not, as he has stated in his Memorial, demand Twenty Shillings, as the amount of my fees for the said service. And this sum, it is proper that I should here state, is the only money, which, from first to last, I received on account of the whole affair; and, of this amount, I gave one half to the other Magistrate, Mr. Macdonald, for his assistance.

After the said Appeal papers had been filled up, the said Edward Lavery, your Excellency's Memorialist, demanded that they should be given up to him, declaring, at the same time, that Mr. Francis Kelly—the Hon. Francis Kelly, J. P. and M. P. P.—had instructed him to make that demand, and to insist that all the Appeal papers, when signed, should be handed over to him; and, further, he declared to us, my brother Magistrate, Mr. Macdonald and myself, that it was not his intention to carry his Appeal through the Supreme Court. We then told him that, if that were the case, he had taken a false oath to obtain the Appeal. His answer was—“No, he had not; but his object was, as Mr. Kelly had advised him to do, to bring a Cross Action.” If this be true, your Excellency in Council will, I doubt not, well know in what estimation to hold such conduct on the part of a Justice of the Peace. True it is, at any rate, that the Cross Action was brought, and it was tried by John Allan Macdonald, of Lot 35, (who issued the summons) James Macdonald, of Line Farm, Lot 35, and William Swabey, of Mount Stewart, Esquires, Justices of the Peace, and the Hon. Francis Kelly, J. P., who happened to be there at the time of trial. In stating who were the Justices of the Peace, who sat on this trial, I find I have inadvertently omitted to add the name of James McDonald, of Allisary, Esquire, who sat with me on the previous trial; I now supply the omission, for the valuable assistance which he gave to his brother Magistrates, who adjudicated in the matter of the Cross Action, should not be allowed to pass unnoticed. The issue of the trial of the Cross Action was, as I believe it ought to have been: the complainant, Edward Lavery, was mulcted in the costs of the action,—the complaint having been dismissed. But I have been informed, by a most respectable individual, that the complainant's “favorite Justice of the Peace”—why “favorite?” it may be asked—used his best endeavours to have the Defendant, Peter Doyle, fined in the same amount to which the complainant himself, as one of the Defendants in the previous Action, had been fined, when that Action was determined by me and my brother Magistrates, the aforesaid R. G. Macdonald and James Macdonald, Esquires. Such a manifestation of favouritism towards himself, was no doubt, naturally expected by the complainant, from “his favorite Justice” and adviser; but he must have been a good deal surprised, I should think, to find the suggestion in his favour warmly supported,—as I have likewise been most credibly informed it was,—by the above named Justice of the Peace, James Macdonald, of Allisary, Esquire, who, notwithstanding his full concurrence in the propriety and justice of the decision arrived at in the previous trial of the Action between the said parties with reference to the same circumstances—the identical circumstance and no other—involved in the Cross Action, and in the absence of any evidence sufficient to warrant a change of opinion on his part, argued, with Lavery's “favorite Justice,” in the very teeth of law and reason, that it would, perhaps, be as well to fine Doyle, as Lavery had been fined on the previous trial, and then they would both be satisfied! If the said Mr. Macdonald acted in the manner in which I have here stated, on good authority, he did, the inconsistency in his conduct was certainly very great and glaring; but, when the fact that he is now nearly in the eightieth year of his age, is considered, it may, perhaps, be excused as merely a natural consequence of senility.

Your Excellency's Memorialist, the said Edward Lavery, in addition to the other unfounded and malignant calumnies, which he had been induced to embody in his Memorial against me, accuses me of having acted in a most tyrannical manner towards a certain individual of the name of Edward Feehan. In order that I may exculpate myself from this charge, I must crave your Excellency's indulgence whilst I here narrate, as briefly as possible, the real circumstances and facts, on which your Excellency's said Memorialist bases the allegation of tyranny against me. This man, Edward Feehan, I was compelled reluctantly to sue, before the Small Debts Commissioners, Lot 49, for the payment of a certain sum of money, due by him to me,

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as set forth in a certain Note of Hand, which he had given me for the same ; and judgment was given against him by the said Commissioners. Some three or four months after judgment had thus been given against him, the said Edward Feehan, an Execution, on account of the said judgment, was issued against his goods and chattles ; and, it being then found that all his goods and chattles had been made over to his son, the body of him, the said Edward Feehan, was taken by the constable in charge of the said Execution, and lodged in jail. After he, the said Edward Feehan, had been in jail some five or six days, he wrote to me, begging that I would let him out ; and stating that, if I refused to do so, he would swear out. To this, his application for unconditional enlargement from jail, I paid no attention ; and, concluding, I suppose, that it was not likely I would accede to his request, he, in his strait, applied to Mr. Theophilus Stewart for his legal counsel and assistance. The counsel and assistance sought were not withheld, and he, the said Edward Feehan—the well-known Edward Feehan—contrived, with the aid of the said Mr. Stewart, to make out a statement by which it was made to appear that he had overpaid me the amount of the Note of Hand for which I had obtained judgment against him, and, for the non-satisfaction of which judgment, he was then lying in jail. And strange enough ! he, the said Edward Feehan, actually succeeded in proving, to the satisfaction of the Supreme Court, that the balance which had been due to me on the said Note of Hand, had been paid, by him, in potatoes, put on board a vessel of mine for exportation. Now the fact is,—although unfortunately it could not be elicited at the trial—that the potatoes put on board my said vessel, by the said Edward Feehan, were potatoes so put on board by him, for the Rev. P. McPhee, P. P., in payment of his, the said Edward Feehan's "Dues," due to the said Rev. P. McPhee ; and I recollect—but not perhaps quite correctly as respects quantity—that the said Edward Feehan, sold me two or three bushels, which remained over to him, after he had measured out, and put on board my vessel, as much as was sufficient to satisfy the amount of the "Dues," owing by him to the Rev. P. McPhee, and that, immediately afterwards, I paid him, out of my shop, for the overplus quantity which he had sold to me. The truth of this statement I can now prove—and had I been aware of the manner in which the said Edward Feehan, meant to proceed for the purpose of defeating my just claims upon him, could have proved at the time of the trial—by the evidence of two or three respectable witnesses.

With respect to the Steamboat affair, and the alleged assault, said to have been committed by me on the Engineer of the said boat, the facts are these : After having been called upon, as a Magistrate, by several people, to interfere and endeavour to suppress the row which had arisen on the deck of the boat, partly, I believe, through the fault of the Engineer, I cautioned him, the said Engineer, to be guarded in his conduct, and to attend only to his engine. To my caution and advice, his reply was, "D—n you ; you have no business on board the boat ; and I will shew them fair play. I will shew you some New Brunswick boxing too, if you want it." The fellow's insolence and threats were unheeded by me ; but I endeavoured, and, after a time, happily succeeded in suppressing the row. There were, at the time, two or three other Justices of the Peace on board the boat, who might have assisted in quelling the fray ; but they, either through the influence of wit, or fear, kept pretty well out of sight, until the disturbance was over. When peace was restored, I went to the Engineer room for the purpose of asking the Engineer his name. He gave me his name, and some abuse besides, telling me that "he did not care a d—n for me, and that I might do my best, &c., &c., &c." As soon as the boat touched at Mount Stewart, I proceeded directly to the residence of William Swabey, Esquire, J. P., for the purpose of having the said Engineer brought up before a Bench of Magistrates, to answer for his conduct on board the Steamboat. A Warrant was issued for his apprehension ; but, owing to Mr. Swabey's absence from home, the matter was allowed to stand over for five or six days. In the meantime, the Engineer had applied to Theophilus Desbrisay, of Charlottetown, Esquire, J. P., for, and obtained a Warrant against me, for an assault, alleged by him, to have been committed, upon him by me, at the time of the occurrence of the said row on board the Steamboat. He, the said Engineer, at the same time, employed Charles Palmer, Esquire, to get up a case of assault for him out of the simple fact of my having asked

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him to tell me his name. He, the said Engineer, also subpcenned a Mrs. Fisher to swear that, after the row was ended, I, James McQuaid, took hold of him, the said Engineer, by the collar of his coat and threw him down upon the deck of the boat. His Honor, the Chief Justice, when commenting in open court, upon the facts connected with the case, as elicited in the course of the trial, declared that great credit was due to me for the manner in which I had acted for the suppression of the row on board the Steamboat, and that, "had it not been for the evidence of Mrs. Fisher, who, his Lordship said, appeared to be a respectable woman, he would have set aside the judgment of the Justices of the Peace, who tried the alleged Assault." It is not my intention to say anything concerning Mrs. Fisher's character, she is well known in the neighbourhood of Mount Stewart. But the following fact, with a view to my own vindication, I hope your Excellency will think it is perfectly allowable to state. William Swabey, Esquire, J. P., and myself, acting in our Magisterial capacity, had fined Mrs. Fisher, for wilfully burning Mr. George Clarke's fences, on two different occasions; and, afterwards, "she repeatedly told her neighbours that, if ever she got the chance, she would be revenged upon Mr. Swabey and myself, for having so convicted and fined her." And further, I trust, I may be allowed to remark, with respect to the evidence of Mrs. Fisher, as above referred to, that to me it seems very strange that, out of some thirty or forty passengers, who were on board the boat at the time when, as she swore, the alleged assault was committed by me, she should have been the only person who witnessed it; and that too, when, as I have been informed was the case, "she was running backwards and forwards with an iron bar in her hand for the purpose of assisting her friend, a John Grant, who was one of the principal rowdies on the occasion." And, further, this Mrs. Fisher when examined before William Swabey, Esquire, J. P., and the late L. C. Worthy, Esquire, J. P., denied that she had ever seen me put my hands upon the said Engineer; although she had previously sworn, before the Magistrates in Town, that she had seen me assault him, and afterwards swore to the same act of violence on my part before the Supreme Court.

Further, with respect to this alleged assault on my part, I now beg most respectfully to submit to your Excellency in Council, that a certain James Macdonald, Esquire, J. P., who was a witness of the whole affray on board the Steamboat, and who could have testified that I never so much as laid one of my hands upon the Engineer, was absent from the Island at the time when the charge against me, on the score of the said alleged assault, was heard and disposed of by the Charlottetown Justices of the Peace; and that, when he appeared as a witness on the trial of the same case by the Supreme Court, although prepared to contradict the evidence of Mrs. Fisher, his testimony, unfortunately for me, owing to his having, through deafness (with which he was then and is still afflicted) misunderstood a direct question put to him, when on the witness' stand, by His Lordship the Chief Justice, his answer was inconclusive and of no avail for my exculpation from the charge. The question put by His Lordship was this: "Could McQuaid have taken hold of the Engineer and have thrown him upon the deck without your seeing him do so?" The answer to this question given by the witness, who, owing to his deafness, did not hear it so distinctly as to be able to comprehend its real import, was simply, "I don't know." Had the witness fully understood the question put to him by His Lordship, his answer, as he, the witness himself afterwards declared, would have been to the effect that "he did not believe I could have committed the assault, as particularized by Mrs. Fisher, without his having seen me commit it; which he certainly did not. Now, may it please your Excellency, with respect to this fact, and, at the same time bearing in mind what His Lordship the Chief Justice said in Court, in commendation of my conduct, and what he declared would have been his decision had it not been for the evidence of Mrs. Fisher, I think I am fully warranted in assuming that, had the witness Mr. Macdonald fully comprehended the question put to him by His Lordship, his answer would have been such as, in the estimation of His Lordship, "to completely invalidate the testimony of Mrs. Fisher, and to exculpate me from the charge which had been urged against me; and that he (His Lordship) would consequently have set aside the judgment which had been given by Justices of the Peace against me.

APPENDIX (CC.)

As respects my having issued a Warrant against Edward Lavery for the costs of trial, which had resulted in his being fined, &c., together with his sister and his two sons, the facts—which I am prepared to prove before your Excellency in Council, if allowed an opportunity to do so—are simply these: When I issued the Warrants against him, I was not aware that any settlement had been made, by and between him and Peter Doyle, concerning them (the Costs); and the said Doyle had repeatedly applied to me for a Warrant against him, the said Lavery, to compel him to pay the costs of the said trial; and, besides, the constable who served the summonses had also applied to me, at my own house, two or three times, for the same purpose, before I issued the Warrant of committal, stating to me, on each of these occasions, that he was sent by Doyle, the complainant, to demand a Warrant of Distress. “I did not, however, at any time issue four Warrants of Distress in the matter, as stated by Lavery.” When James Macdonald, Esquire, J. P., who sat with me on the trial, told me that Lavery had paid the fine to him, “I gave Lavery credit for it, and marked it paid at the bottom of the Warrant of committal.” Besides, before I moved in the matter of the Warrant at all, I consulted the Attorney General on the business, and he advised me to issue a Warrant for the Costs only, the Fine having been paid. To state more, at present, with reference to this point, would only be a needless spinning out of my reply. I shall, therefore, just now, only further observe, in the most summary way, that “in the whole of Lavery’s statement concerning the trial, &c., there is hardly one word of truth.”

For the present, I beg leave only further most respectfully to submit to your Excellency in Council, that I confidently believe that, with one exception only, there is not, I firmly believe, either in Queen’s County or King’s County, among my brother Magistrates who have personal knowledge of me, one who, if interrogated with reference to the allegations preferred against me in Edward Lavery’s Memorial to your Excellency in Council, would not declare that he believed me to be wholly incapable of acting in any way contrary to justice or derogatory to my position and character as a Magistrate; that every individual amongst my neighbours at Mount Stewart,—many of whom have already expressed their abhorrence of the malignity of the man who has been chiefly instrumental in getting up the foul and false charges, which have been preferred to your Excellency in Council, against me, in the name of Edward Lavery—would, if allowed an opportunity to do so, cheerfully bear testimony to the integrity of my character, both as respects my private business dealings with them, and my conduct among them as a Justice of the Peace; and, that (as I have herein before said) strong in conscious integrity, I shall rejoice in having my conduct, with reference to the allegations preferred against me as above stated, submitted to the most unreserved and searching inquiry, under the authority of your Excellency; confident that such an inquiry cannot fail to result in my complete exculpation from the odium which those allegations were intended to throw upon my character.

Fully satisfied that, whatever course of proceeding your Excellency in Council may adopt or direct to be pursued, with respect to the allegation against me, set forth in the Memorial of Edward Lavery, and this my reply thereto, you will be actuated solely by a sincere desire to elicit the truth.

JOINT ADDRESS ON THE PROTECTION OF THE FISHERIES.

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

THE HUMBLE ADDRESS OF THE LEGISLATIVE
COUNCIL AND HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY OF
NOVA SCOTIA.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,—

1. We, your Majesty's dutiful and loving subjects, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of Nova Scotia, in Provincial Parliament assembled, would respectfully beg your Majesty's gracious consideration of the important subject of the efficient protection of our fisheries, which will be rendered necessary by the abrogation of the Reciprocity Treaty with the United States on the seventeenth day of March, instant.

2. Under the provisions of that treaty, subjects of the United States are allowed to prosecute the inshore fisheries in common with our own people, and a very large number of vessels owned and manned by United States citizens have been engaged since the ratification of that treaty in this branch of industry.

3. With the termination of the treaty, their right to participate in these fisheries will expire ; but we have reason to fear that a pursuit which has engaged so much capital and given employment to so many men, will not be abandoned when the right to prosecute it ceases.

4. While this province is ready to contribute to the utmost of its ability to the protection of these fisheries, we would respectfully submit to your Majesty that the means in its possession are obviously inadequate for the purpose, and that the rights of your Majesty's loyal subjects can only be effectually upheld by the assistance of an Imperial naval force.

5. We would therefore humbly pray that your Majesty may be pleased to direct that such measures may be taken as will effectually prevent the encroachment of foreigners upon our fishing grounds, and will fully protect those rights which we consider to be of the most vital importance to the prosperity of our country.

6. Trusting that your Majesty will be pleased to give to the subject of this Address your grave and gracious consideration, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly will ever pray.

Report of Superintendent of Public Works on contemplated Breakwater at Campbell's Cove, East Point.

Return of the number of barrels of Mackerel inspected during the quarter ending 31st December, 1865, at the Ports of Cascumpec and Tignish.

Report of the Superintendent of Public Works on the site of a new Road through the farm of Alexander Hayden, Township No. 36.

CHARLOTTETOWN,

Jan. 19th, 1866.

SIR; In accordance with your direction, I visited Campbell's Cove, East Point, and after making as careful an examination as was possible, at this season of the year, I think the erection of a Breakwater to form a Harbour for small vessels perfectly feasible. Though I could not get the accurate measurements, I had the advantage of seeing how the ice formed and piled across the Cove. A Ledge of Rocks running across the mouth of the Cove affords a natural protection to the structure from the Gulf ice. This ledge extends from the Point on the North side over one thousand feet, and leaves a channel of about one hundred and fifty feet in width as an entrance for vessels. In the channel, we found eleven feet of water, at low tide, while on the ledge there was but three or four feet. Inside the Basin or Cove, the depth of water was ten feet at low tide, and that within one hundred and fifty feet of the shore. I think that if a Breakwater was constructed say forty-five feet wide, one thousand feet long, and twelve feet high on the inside of the

Ledge, it would effectually prevent the heavy sea from rolling in and injuring vessels laying at anchor. This may be done by means of making a timber erection bolted firmly together, fastened with cross ties and braces, and filled with stone, of which there is an abundance around the shores. The people in that locality labour under a very great disadvantage from having no shipping place to dispose of their surplus produce unless they convey it from seventeen to twenty miles over bad roads to Souris.

The probable costs of the structure required may be estimated at two thousand pounds.

SIR ; In accordance with the direction of His Excellency the Lieut. Governor in Council, I have examined Mr. Alexander Hayden's farm on Township Number Thirty-six, and have laid out the site of a new Road leading from the Saint Peter's Road to Mr. Robert Longworth's shipyard, opposite Fisher's wharf on the South side of Hillsborough River. The said Road to start from a stake set at or near the end of the Road leading to Alexander Hayden, jrs. house, and to run in a straight line down to another stake set at Mr. Robert Longworth's shipyard, opposite Fisher's wharf.

This is the only place that I could see which would answer for the purpose, as a deep ravine runs all along the front of the farm, which

would involve a large outlay of money in bridging it over ; and this expense, with the sum awarded Mr. Hayden for the Road site, would make the whole amount considerable.

Although the site I have selected cuts across the Angle of Mr. Hayden's farm, I think it would be better to pay for the Road there than to construct one across the ravine.

When the Commission is appointed to open it, I shall attend to point out the site.

Copy of Correspondence of the Government with Mr. Robert Gordon, and extract from Minutes of the Executive Council in reference to his removal from the Commission of the Peace.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE,
25th September, 1865.

SIR ; I have the honour to inform you that on the 21st day of July last, with the advice of the Executive Council, I caused the name of James Laird, Esquire, one of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for Queen's County, to be removed from the Commission of the Peace. Mr. Laird had publicly aided and assisted the Association known as—the Tenant Union or League—contrary to the Proclamation of His Excellency Lieutenant Governor Dundas, dated 22d March, 1865, and the fact of his having taken an active part as a Member of the League being personally known to Members of the Government, caused the Board to advise his being summarily dismissed from the Magistracy.

I have also the honour to inform you that on the 19th September, instant, with the advice of the Executive Council, I ordered Mr. John Balderston to be removed from the office of Commissioner of Small Debts, and the names of William Campbell, Hugh Carr and Robert Gordon, Justices of the Peace, to be removed from the Commission of the Peace.

The Executive Government having received information that Messrs. Balderston, Campbell, Carr and Gordon, had taken part in promoting the objects of the Tenant League, caused letters to be addressed to them, enquiring whether

they had aided or assisted the Tenant Association contrary to the Proclamation referred to.

The Letters written to these Gentlemen, together with their respective replies thereto, were referred to a Committee of Council, with whom was associated the Attorney General.

In accordance with their report, a copy of which I have the honour to enclose, these dismissals were ordered.

SIR; I have been requested by Mr. Robert Gordon to forward the enclosed Memorial to Her Majesty.

Mr. Gordon was removed from the Commission of the Peace by the Officer Administering the Government of this Island, as reported in his Despatch No. 75, of 25th September, 1865. To that Despatch and the Report of the Committee of the Executive Council, enclosed in it, I have the honour to refer you for the particulars connected with Mr. Gordon's removal from the Magistracy.

In your Despatch No. 58, of 15th December, you informed me that you did not see any reason for interfering with the discretion exercised by the Officer Administering the Government in this case.

I do not think that Mr. Gordon's Memorial calls for any comment on my part. His case appears to be founded on the idea that the Officer Administering the Government has not the power to remove a Magistrate from office.

The IX clause of Governor General Lord Monck's Commission (dated 2d Nov. 1861), is as follow:—

“ And we do hereby give and grant unto you, so far as we lawfully may, full power and authority, upon sufficient cause to you appearing, to remove from his office, or to suspend from the exercise of the same any person exercising any office or place within our said Island or its Dependencies, under or by virtue of any Commission or Warrant granted, or which may be granted by us, or in our name, or under our authority.”

This power, in the absence of the Governor General, devolves upon the Officer Administering the Government.

I feel confident that a moment's reflection will convince His Honor the Administrator of the Government in Council, that my rights and inalienable inheritance as a loyal British subject, is sought to be most grievously trampled upon in the terms of the Letter before me. I am sure, therefore, that I will be excused from furnishing information, which, if lawfully enquired for, I would be most happy with all cordiality to furnish.

You may, however, inform His Honor the Administrator of the Government in Council, that I am not a Member of the Tenant Union

CHARLOTTETOWN,
September 16, 1865.

In respect to the communication of Robert Gordon, Esquire, as that gentleman has thought fit to decline to answer the inquiry of His Honor, an inquiry which appears to us to have been properly and constitutionally propounded to him, as to whether he had encouraged or promoted the formation of an institution which had by the Representative of the Sovereign been publicly proclaimed to be illegal, we conceive that His Honor has a just right to assume that if Mr. Gordon had fairly met the question, the reply must have been in the affirmative. If Mr. Gordon had a legal and constitutional right to decline to answer the inquiry referred to, he had the same right in regard to the question which he has thought fit to answer; and, therefore, the inference to be drawn from the whole letter in question, is clear that Mr. Gordon did encourage or promote the formation of a Branch of the said League. We conceive, therefore, that His Honor cannot, under the circumstances of the case, any longer retain the said Robert Gordon in the Commission of the Peace.

Report and opinion of Her Majesty's Attorney General

on the subject of certain charges made by Edward Lavery and others, against James McWade, Esq., with the report of the Clerk of the Crown on the same subject.

The Special Committee appointed by the House of Assembly to examine and report on certain papers and documents laid before the Government last year, relative to the removal of James McWade, Esq., from the Commission of the Peace, with costs incurred thereon, have to request, the Honorable the Attorney General will inform them on the following queries, viz :—

1. In the investigation of complaint against Magistrates by Commissioners appointed by Government, as in the foregoing, are the complainants not entitled to lay the proofs of their allegations in such complaint or charges before such Commission at their own expense ?

2. And are not the Defendants in such cases entitled to lay the proofs of their innocence to such charges (if such they can) before the said Commission at their own expense ; or is the Government entitled or liable to pay for a host of witnesses which they may choose to call on ?

3. Have such Commissioners the power to compel or enforce the attendance of such witnesses, particularly witnesses on behalf of the Defendant, before them, by a common subpoena ?

4. Has such Commission any power or right to try the merits of the cases already adjudicated on, and decided by Her Majesty's Supreme Court ?

Does the Commission, hereto annexed, give the power to enforce the attendance of witnesses in cases like the foregoing ; and does it give the power to order the Government to pay the witnesses of all parties, Plaintiff and Defendant ?

The Attorney General, in compliance with the wish of the Special Committee appointed by the House of Assembly, to examine and report on certain papers and documents relating to James McWade, Esquire, as expressed in the case annexed hereto, has the honor to submit the following opinion, viz :—

In the investigation of complaints against Magistrates by Commissioners appointed by Government, the mode in which proceedings are to be conducted, the powers given to the parties, Complainant or Defendant, and the obligations imposed on, and privileges extended to them, depend wholly on the nature and tenor of the Commission issued by the Government. To enable the Commissioners to bring witnesses before them by compulsion, the Commission issued to them must give them that power, without it the parties must bring their witnesses as best they can.

The expense of adducing evidence in support of the charge, as well as in adducing evidence

in disproving it, must, assuredly, be defrayed by the respective parties who produce such evidence, unless there be some special provision to the contrary in the Commission issued to the Commissioners.

The Commissioners may, or may not, according to their discretion, inquire into the merits of the cases already adjudicated on and decided by Her Majesty's Supreme Court. The result, however, of their inquiry, and any decision they may come to, thereupon, cannot in any manner effect the decisions of the Supreme Court, unless this extensive power were expressly given to the Commissioners by the terms of their Commission.

Ans. Court set aside the Execution, and direct the said James McWade to pay the costs.

Ques. 2. In the Appeal case, by the said McWade, against a conviction against him for assaulting one Philo C. Brown, the Engineer of the steamer "Experiment." Was McWade condemned by the Supreme Court or acquitted for the commission of the said assault?

Ans. James McWade, convicted before the Magistrates for an assault or appeal, judgment below was affirmed.

Ques. 3. In the application of Edward Feehan to the Supreme Court, to be released from a false or unjust imprisonment by James McWade, Esq.—What was the Judges sentence?

Ans. Court quash conviction made in the case by J. McWade, and direct him to pay the costs of Feehan's application.

Ques. 4. In the Appeal case between Mary Mitchell, Appellant, and James Mitchell, Defendant, from a conviction by the said James McWade, against the said Appellant—What was the Chief Justices decision?

Ans. In this case, Court took time to consider and reverse the Justices decision with costs.

Ques. 5. In another Appeal, wherein the said James McWade made a judgment against one Peter Laverty, wherein the said Peter Laverty was fined in a sum of £10, and over 40s. costs, for putting out a fire in the woods which run through part of Michael Comesky's farm, who obtained said judgment against said Laverty—Was that judgment affirmed by the Judges?

Ans. This Appeal not heard by the Court, it was settled by the parties.

Having examined the document upon which is founded the claim of the representative of the late Paul Mabey, Esquire, for Land Tax and Land Assessment paid by him, and them, on Pasture Lots Nos. 294, 296, 336, 335, 352, and 355, in Charlottetown Royalty, it appears, that that gentleman, in the year 1829, conveyed to the then Surveyor General of this Colony, and several other Public Officers thereof, in trust, for the use of the Public, to be used as there-in expressed—a Race Course—running through these Lots; and that the said Grantees covenanted to pay the Land Tax, and all future Land Assessments to be imposed thereon, but which they omitted to pay ever since the year 1829, as appears by the account rendered by Mr.

Mabey's Executors. By the strict rules of law, these taxes would be payable by the survivors of the Grantees, (I do not think by their successors in office), but, as the right is still preserved for the use of the public, I think it would be equitable and right towards the survivors, for the Government to relieve them of all liability for this demand, and to defray it out of the Public Revenue.

DEAR SIR,—I received yours, of this date, with a copy of a Deed of a Race Course, which is quite different to what was asked or proposed, and would render the place useless altogether. There was one lot ungranted, and one under license of occupation to Rodd. I proposed, if there could be another granted to Rodd in place of the one under license, and they would grant the two to me, I would get 33 feet wide, which they all then said was wide enough, stumped and levelled across the end of the said two lots, and the North side of one of them which I had done immediately. And Croker, who had a lease of three lots for Eight years from me, proposed to open the course for two days, once a year, for the purpose of Racing, and allow the hill near the winning post for the spectators to stand to view the sport. Mr. Haviland asked, if I would give a lease to run on, for a Race Course, for 2 days in each year, for twenty years. I said, if Croker would, for the term of his lease, I would give a lease in trust for the Club, to have Public Races three days in each year, for nine hundred and ninety years, on the Club paying a proportion of the Quit Rent and Land Taxes already imposed, or hereafter to be lawfully imposed, they giving twenty days notice each year, and keeping up posts, to the Proprietor or person occupying the farm, and nothing to be sold on the premises without the consent of the person occupying the Farm. The course is now 40 feet wide, and the last quarter of a mile, or coming in, may be extended to sixty, and no more, which I am ready to give a Lease to run on three days in each year, on Croker giving leave on the three Lots for the unexpired term of four and a half years of his lease from me.
