ANNOUNCEMENT

Armistice Signed and Continued Peace Expected

Monday morning at five o'clock telegrams arrived giving official notice that the Germans had signed the Armistice making an unconditional surrender to the Allies. By 5.30 the bells, whistles, horns and guns pealed forth notifying the sleeping and awakened citizens that the expected news had arrived and the war was ended. The streets were soon alive with people and Mayor Yould having proclaimed a holiday the people closed all places of business and gave up the day to praise, thanksgiving and celebration.

At 2.30 o'clock the people repaired to different churches and there joined full heartily in thanksgiving to God for His guiding hand in overruling despotism cruelty and injustice. The Methodist, Baptist and Presbyterian united in their service in the stone church where the pastor Rev. R. B. Layton gave an inspiring address.

In the afternoon a procession was formed and paraded the town. This was again repeated in the evening where a magnificent procession of most gaily decorated autos, teams, fire wagons with bands, mounted citizens and people on foot paraded all over the town and went to the Cornwallis bridge where a bonfire was burning and fire works blazed forth from the Sanatorium hill.

Before the parade prayer, was offered by Dr. Donohue and addresses were given at the Band Stand by Mayor Yould, Hon. Barclay Webster, H. H. Wickwire, Pros. Blair, Lieut. Estabrooks, Lieut. Ralph Layton, G. E. Graham and Dr. J. Borden. Patriotic music was furnished by the bands.

The demonstrations throughout the town was not only impressive but everwhelming outpouring of joy of people who had suffered and suffered much through four long years. Mothers, fathers, wives, sisters, sweethearts, brothers who had made sacrifices of loved ones rushed forth to acclaim the good news which proclaimed a happy homecoming in the future with but few sad messages of death somewhere in France.

Daughter of Kentville Family Dies at Brockton.

Brockton Mass., October 25th—Apparently recovering from a severe illness of influenza contracted while she was nursing epidemic patients at the local field tent hospital, Miss Nellie A. Gray aged 25, expired suddenly this noon at the hospital. Miss Gray was one of a group of nurses rushed to aid Brockton physicians during the serious epidemic which raged here for nearly a month. Arriving here she was assigned to the temporary tent hospital and did yeoman service. With the situation rapidly clearing she eventually collapsed from overwork. Pneumonia threatened but she escaped it. Mayor Gleason chatted with her this morning and she stated that she was feeling so well she would probably leave for home Thursday. An hour later a message was received that she had died. She was a great favorite at the camp and an untiring worker.

Peace Armistice has Been Signed.

The Terms in Brief.

Evacuation of all countries seized by Germany including Alsace Lorraine within 14 days.
Surrender in good condition of 5000 heavy guns, 30,000 machine guns, 2000 airplanes, etc.
Evacuation by Germany of her own land on left bank of the Rhine.
Repatriation of all Allied prisoners of war without reciprocation.
German troops to be withdrawn from Russia, Roumania, Turkey, etc.
Unconditional capitulation in East Africa.
Reparation for damage done and money and fines taken from cities etc., to be returned.
Surrender of entire submarine

fleet also large number of battle ships, cruisers, destroyers etc to be interned in neutral ports and rest of ships disarmed.
Freedom of the Baltic to the Allies.

The full terms show how complete has been the surrender and how fully Germany must pay for all the devastation and damage she has done.

The Victory Loan

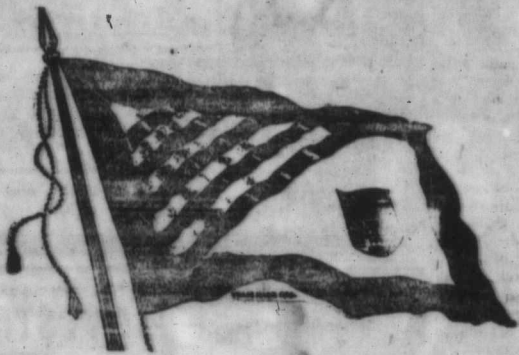

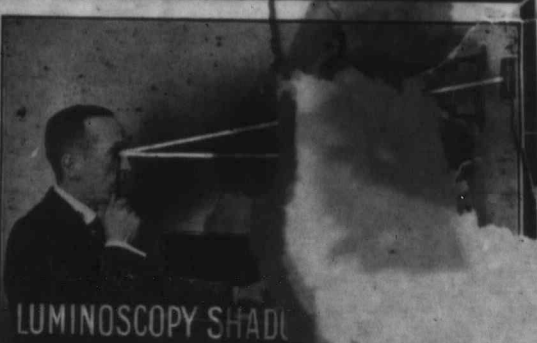

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OBITUARY.

Mrs. Kenneth Ronaldson Sutherland, for many years past a highly respected resident of the town of Kentville, died at her home, "Dunrobin" on Main St. on Tuesday, Nov. the 5th, in the eighty-third year of her age. She was a woman of the highest integrity, and a devoted and faithful communicant of St. James' Church, where she always worshipped until ill-health compelled her absence from the services. Mrs. Sutherland was of a North of Ireland family settled in Colchester County. Her father was John Tays, of Lower Sewnacke whose grandfather, Samuel Tays came from Ireland, to this

part of Nova Scotia about 1781. Her maiden name was Nancy Jean Tays, and her marriage to Kenneth Sutherland took place May 20, 1861. Mr. Sutherland, died July 27th, 1885, aged fifty-three, and is buried at Oak Grove Cemetery. Of this marriage there was but one child, Mrs. Rufus W. Eaton. One of Mrs. Sutherland's six brothers, the Rev. Joseph Wilkin Tays, was a graduate of King's College and a clergyman of the Anglican Church. Her only sister, who is still living, was married to Thomas Blake, son of a retired commander in the British Navy, who had settled in Colchester County. Thomas Blake was a brother of Mrs. Harry Leigh Yewans, wife of the Rev. H. L. Yewans who as our older people will remember, was Rector of St. James' parish in Kentville for ten years, from 183 to 1863.

Rev. S. B. Kempton D. D.

Notice has previously been given in an column of the death of Rev. S. B. Kempton D. D. at his home in Dartmouth. A more extended notice of this theologian, pastor and friend has been delayed in our publication.

Dr. Kempton was educated at Acadia and took up pastoral work as soon as his arts and theological education was completed. He was called to the pastorate of the 1st Cornwallis Baptist Church Canard and there he laboured most efficiently and with the best results to the spiritual life of the community in which he labored. With his wife the religious tone of the whole circuit he touched was advanced in the interests of the Kingdom of the God he served. At Canard two children were born to Dr. and Mrs. Kempton; Rev. Austen T. Kempton M. A. now pastor at Cambridge Mass, and a disciple of Christ following in the footsteps of his beloved father and William who died quite early in life bringing deepest sorrow to his parents.

After 26 years of most faithful service Dr. Kempton moved to Dartmouth where he was pastor of the church there for some time failing health compelled him to resign and the last ten years of his life was spent in the best kind of home mission work in ministering to the colored people in Dartmouth. No man could have been beloved as he was by the colored hethren.

In education Dr. Kempton was most prominent and served his beloved Acadia most faithfully as a governor and also as secretary to the Board as long as he was able to attend to his duties.

The body was brought to Kentville and service was held in Baptist Church on Friday Nov. 15th at 2 p. m.

Representatives of Acadia in the ministry and his church at Canard participated in the funeral service including Dr's Cutten, Manning, DeWolfe, Rev. A. J. Prosser etc. The addresses of Dr. Cutten and Dr. Manning were most impressive as they told of his work at Acadia and in the ministry. The burial took place at the Oakes Cemetery. The floral offerings were very many showing how much he was beloved by all.

A memorial service was held at Upper Canard church the Sunday following and was most largely attended there worthy tributes to the life labors of Dr. Kempton were fully told and the whole community felt they had lost a true friend.

His only son Rev. A. T. Kempton attended the funeral here and the service at Canard. His two sons are overseas and all well rejoice with him now that the war is over and they will be spared to return to their family.
