



MR. BLAKE AND THE PACIFIC RAILWAY.

Mr. Blake at St. John is alleged to have given a lucid history of the Pacific Railway. An honest as well as a lucid his tory of that business would have left the gentleman with few friends and no supporters in that

assembly. In 1873 he denounced as mad, wild, and wicked a bargain by which a company engaged to go on with the work at a cost of \$30,000,000 and 50,000,000

acres of land. In 1874 he helped to put up. on the statute book a law involving a policy of building th road as a Government workand, as he has since confessed the work was to be done out o cash raised by means of wha must have been enormous taxation, irrespective of the lands which it appears he did not con-

sider, even as late as 1880, as o any value. in 1875 he was first respon. sible for the Carnarvon termswhich he subsequently intrigued against, inflicting on his personal honour a stain which all the waters of Lake Ontario could not efface—for it involved treachery to Mr Mackenzie. treachery to Lord Dufferin, and treachery to Lord Carnarvon,

as well as a breach of faith with British Columbia. In 1876 he was a party to a negotiation by which it was proposed to compensate British Columbia for the loss of the Esquimalt railway; and during these three years he was fully and personally responsible for the expenditure of the Government on the railway, and for the increase of the taxation and on the raising of a new loan expressly for the purpose of that

railway. In 1877 he was responsible for an offer of the Government to any company to build the road on terms that all have made the work coa at least \$20,000,000 more than the bargain of the present Government.

In 1878 he was responsible still for the policy of his friends, and for the orders-in-Council, advertisements, and contracts which all tended to commit the country to the bilding of the through line, including the line north of lake Superior and the Yale..Kamloops portion.

In 1879 he was out of public life, and may be allowed the benefit of his unwilling exclu. sion. But an earnest "Reformer" would not have remained silent on the serious topics of the

In 1880 he was to the fore again; and in criticising the policy of the Government he ridiculed the value of the lands of the North.. West, in order to make it appear that the Government is trusting to them as a source of revenue was leaning on a broken reed.

In 1881, after having been com-
