The new St. Dunstan's Cathe-dral is a clear story, cruciform with mortar. On these the main dral is a clear story, cruciform church, with twin towers in front. The architecture is English Gothic of the second period. It is 200 feet long and 120 feet across the transept. The nave is 88 feet in length, and the transept is 50 feet wilder. The same material is used in the base wilder. It will thus be seen that the transept itself, being 120x50, is as large as an ordinary church. The height from floor to ceiling is 60 feet. About 3 feet of this masonry is yet to be completed. On these will be built the lantern towers, of which we will speak presently. The basement speak presently. on either side of the nave there ing are 28 feet high. In other words, the walls from the foundation to the side roofs are 48 feet in height. Ottawa advices of the 19th say the members of the Government are more than astonished at the action of General Foster of the United States in publishing correspondence on the Sealing and other questions while negotiations are still in progress. What object he can have it is difficult to conceive. Following is the protocal published: At a conference on November 16th with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Louis Davies, and Wr. Adams, of the British embasey, Gen. Foster proposed: First, that the governments of Great Britain and the United States agree at once to a modus vivendi providing for a complete suspension of the killing of seals in all waters of the Pacific ocean and Behring sea for one year from Decem-ber, 1897, and for the suspension of al killing of seals on the Pribyloff Islands for the same period. Second, that the British ambassador and one or more representatives of the Canadian governy ment on the one part, and such representative or representatives as may be designated by the President of the United States on the other part, shall, with as little delay as possible, take up for consideration, with a view to settlement by means of treaty stipulations, the fur seal question, the protection of fish in the waters of rivers and lakes contiguous to the United States and Canada, the subject of reciprocal emigration, commercial recibetween the United States and Canada, which either of the governments may see proper to bring forward. No reply December 2nd has yet been sent, the government being in communication with the home authorities to see how far Mr. Foster's views can be met. The general impression at Ottawa however, is that nothing can now come of the negotiations.
