#### Syncpsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole Lead of family, or any male, over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of Saskatchewan or Alberta. The appli cant must appear in person at the Do minion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother of easier of intending

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each o three years. A homesteader may liv within nine miles of his homestead of a farm of at least\_80 acres solely owner and occupied by -im or by his fathe mother, son, daughter, brother or sie

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price

·Duties-Must reside upon the home stead or pre-empfich six months in each of six years from date of home stead entry (including the time required a homestead patent) and cultivate fift acres extra.

A homesteader who has oxhauste his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchas ed homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties, -Mnet reside cix months in each of three years cultivate fifty acres and freet a hous W W CORY.


