There are portable saw mills about forty miles west and they market from 100 to 200 thousand feet of lumber per winter at Penhold. Most of the coal is imported by rail and retails at from \$5.00 to \$6.00 per ton. Local paper cordwood retails at about \$3.00 per cord.

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BUSINESS GOOD IN WESTERN CANADA

Reviews of Trade Situation Show Satisfactory Trade Conditions Everywhere

Winnipeg, March 22.—The commercial, in its weekly review of the trade situation in the west, will say tomorrow: A brief return visit of cold weather has been responsible for a more comfortable feeling in business circles. The possibility of a premature spring, succeeding by dry frosts, temperatures the anxiety is relieved. General trade is in good shape, and there is a reasonable amount of activity in all classes of goods. Particular activity is shown in the building trade, of course, and the movement of supplies for construction work is well developed.

Money conditions show little change except that the banks are disposed to allow their customers more headway than they did a few weeks ago. The supply of funds in London and New York continues to be abundant and this factor exerts some influence in Canada. Rates are steady.

Trade is satisfactory at Winnipeg, with great activity in shipments from wholesale businesses. Business men here are convinced that the coming season is likely to be a very prosperous one for the whole west, and they are laying their plans for big business.

Dun's Review for Week. New York, Mar. 17.—In the Canadian trade dispatches to Dun's Review from branch offices to R. G. Dunn & Co., the leading trade centres of the Dominion of Canada state that trade generally continues to make further progress with the opening of spring. At some points, however, notably in the east, some complaint is heard that activity is not developed with the rapidity expected. Nevertheless, even at these cities, there is a normal demand for staples and but for the fact that comparison is being made with last year, which was about the most active on record, there would be little disappointment regarding the volume of business. At Montreal, the wholesale trade is hardly up to expectations, though sales of dry goods are well maintained and in metals, hardware and structural materials, the transactions are light, while cotton and spinning mills are still very busy.

The demand for footwear is rather light as it is between seasons and in consequence leather moves slowly and hides are dull.

At Quebec, while trade has not shown any considerable improvement during the week, some fairly light goods have been received and the pace for general activity is considered good. Building operations are commencing and the demand for all kinds of staples such as groceries, dry goods, leather, grain and provisions is of good proportions.

The demand for general merchandise at Toronto increases as the season advances, the movement of dry goods, groceries, hardware, building materials and agricultural implements making a comparison with that of a year ago. Little change is noted in leather and hides are dull.

London reports most preparations for spring are general and wholesalers report business conditions satisfactory. Agricultural prospects are good, which induces the feeling of confidence in practically all lines.

The general situation at Hamilton is very satisfactory, increasing activity is appearing with the opening of spring. Shippers are preparing for the opening of navigation, manufacturers are busy, labor is well employed and the business outlook is regarded with much confidence.

DELAY VETO BILL TILL CORONATION

GOVERNMENT UNDERSTOOD TO HAVE ABANDONED HOPE OF EARLY PASSAGE.

Canadian Associated Press. London, March 21.—The Lord Mayor has offered to head a movement to secure a national expression of public opinion on the arbitration proposed by President Taft and Sir Edward Grey.

It is understood that the government has abandoned its idea of getting the Veto bill passed before the coronation, and will adjourn parliament during the month of June so that legislative struggles will not interfere with the coronation festivities.

In the meantime tentative proposals for the settlement of the constitutional difficulty by compromise continue to come from the Unionist speakers and press.

Fears Political Union. Lord Ashfield, writing to the Times, says that in his view of President Taft's speech, the Atlantic agreement must be regarded as embodying only so much complete free trade between the two countries as applying as practical to Canada. The question of legislative struggles will not interfere with the coronation festivities.

No Need of Commission. In the House of Commons the Premier, replying to a question in that connection, said that there would be no advantage gained in appointing a royal commission on the fiscal question.

MANITOBA WANTS HER NATURAL RESOURCES

Offer of the Federal Government will be refused by Roblin—Liberal Members of the Manitoba House also Oppose it Offer.

Winnipeg, March 21.—The boundary question will likely be discussed in the Manitoba legislature tomorrow afternoon and it is certain that the offer of Sir Wilfrid Laurier will be refused by the Government, especially as the Liberal opposition is also opposed, saying editorially that the time for subsidies is past and the province should get its resources. This is the general opinion of the House and it is possible that an unanimous resolution will be passed demanding lands, timber, minerals, etc.

LAKE UNCERTAIN AS TO HIS STAND

DOES NOT KNOW WHETHER HE FAVORS OR OPPOSES RECIPROcity.

Ottawa, March 21.—The most interesting event during Tuesday's session of the Commons was a short speech by R. S. Lake (Qu'Appelle) in reply to the statement made by D. D. MacKenzie (South Cape Breton) that he alone, of all members representing Saskatchewan in the Legislature and Federal Parliament is opposed to reciprocity. Mr. Lake said he had not so far expressed an opinion. He added that he was inclined to favor the pact as it was announced, but that he would not accept the policy laid down by the Premier that there would be no further reduction at present in the duties on manufactured goods.
