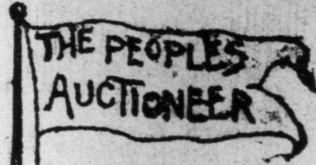

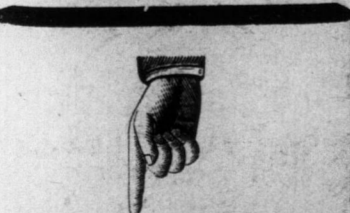

The Evening Chit-Chat

By RUTH CAMERON



With every new year, the woman who had to earn all or a part of her livelihood is finding new ways to do so and new niches to fill.

Below are some of the latest and most interesting ways to make herself useful which she has discovered. To the woman who already found her niche in some business or profession, or in work, or in homemaking, I hope these will be interesting as showing what the other woman is doing. To the woman who is still without her niche, perhaps some word here may be directly or even indirectly suggestive. I sincerely hope so, for if there is any person for whom I have a deep and never decreasing well of sympathy, it is the woman who has not yet found her niche in the world's work.

A girl who was studying to be a teacher had to give up her course because her eyes gave out, and further study was a definite impossibility. She is now earning twice as much as most of her classmates who completed the course and became teachers. And her occupation is playmate to invalid children. Through a series of happenings she found out that she seemed to have a talent for playing with children, and especially with lame and sickly children. She was successful in getting such unfortunates to try to use their limbs when everyone else failed to persuade them. Upon this talent she built up her profession. After demonstrating her ability by her success in getting one child who had been crippled by infantile paralysis to use his limbs, she was widely recommended by the boy's physician, and soon had every hour taken during six days a week as playmate to invalid children. In some cases she encouraged and helped the children in the use of their limbs, so that they were eventually cured. In others where she could not cure, she helped, and in still others simply managed to brighten an invalid's ex-

istence and teach him to be more cheerful.

The talents required for such a profession are unusual, but doubtless there are a good many women who possess them, and since the terrible scourge of infantile paralysis has come among us, there would probably be sadly many opportunities for such work.

Many specialists in scientific and other lines do not like to do all their reference and routine work themselves, and clever, well-educated women are constantly finding opportunities in the line of looking up references and arranging manuscripts. Somewhat similar to this is the work which a woman I know is doing in collecting family records for national and historical societies and sometimes for family use.

A letter friend sends in this description of a decidedly unusual way in which one woman earned some money:

"Mrs. S. is making a fair income by travelling in towns where summer tourists are wont to go and making it her business to find out what cottages are for rent. She then takes down a complete description of them and of their surroundings, number of rooms, size, color, etc., and notes if there are any repairs needed. She then does a real estate agent's business, but being interested in her clients and having more details at her finger tips, does the work in a much more individual and careful way than an ordinary real estate agent."

A woman, whose husband was a butcher, has conceived the idea of using the bones to make soup stock. She puts it up in neat glass jars and sells large quantities. She says that being a butcher's wife is not a necessary requirement for such work but that any woman could probably make arrangements with all the butchers in her vicinity for the use of their waste and would, undoubtedly, make good pin money this way.

Who knows but that "Pin-money Soup Stock" may some day be a by-word too!

Legislature Opened.

Yesterday afternoon the fourth session of the Legislature was opened by His Excellency the Governor. Squads from the Police, Royal Naval Reserve and the Boys' Brigades were present to receive His Excellency and suite. Inside the Chamber were the Councillors and a number of ladies and gentlemen, including the Lord Bishop of Newfoundland and the Chief Justice. When the Speaker and members of the Legislature appeared at the bar, His Excellency the Governor read the usual statement of the Government's progress and programme. We have been provided with a copy, but the statement is so verbose and empty that we do not feel justified in taking up space to publish it verbatim. Instead, we proceed to give the gist of the statement, which His Excellency was called upon to read.

In it is recorded the Coronation, the subsequent Durbar, the appointment of a Royal Prince as Governor General of Canada, the holding of the Festival of Empire and the transfer of the Colony's exhibit to the Imperial Institute. The Colony is stated to be probably more prosperous than at any period in its history.

The fishing operations of our people, as regards catch, were on the whole fairly successful, and the prices obtained for dried cod amongst the highest ever realized, a result due to short catches by our competitors in the foreign markets, and to the purchase by American dealers of considerable quantities of green fish to supply their domestic demands.

Then follows the stale platitudes about cure and new methods. The increased catch of lobsters during the past three seasons is referred to and intimation is given of the introduction of new lobster legislation. The holding of agricultural shows at Burin, St. George's and Harbor Grace is reported, as is also the opening of the Bonavista branch, and the hope is expressed that the Trepansey and Heart's Content branches will be completed this year. More money will be asked for a steamer for the North East of the Island and for other steamer services. At an early date the Executive propose to consider opening up new main lines. The Legislature will be asked to give more money to the Government to spend on telegraphs, wireless and otherwise, telephones, lighthouses and for alarms. Money will also be asked for to administer and maintain the Sanatoria which the Reid brothers have offered to build. Twenty thousand dollars more will be asked to give a few more worn out men of 70 and over, the thirteen cents a day, which the Government misnames Old Age Pensions. An addition is also to be made to Poor Relief. A Teachers' Pension Scheme is to be submitted to the Legislature.

The present Lunatic Asylum is to be turned into a Poor House, and a new Lunatic Asylum built. Negotiations are proceeding to secure improved ocean steam service.

"At the Imperial Conference in London last summer, it was resolved that His Majesty should be approached with a view to the appointment of a Royal Commission representing the United Kingdom and the self-governing Dominions, to investigate and report upon the natural resources and the improvement of the trade of the Empire, and in accordance with the terms of this Resolution my Ministers have been invited to nominate a representative for Newfoundland thereon, and have done so accordingly.

"During my stay in England I had the honour of being commanded to visit Their Majesties in their Highland home at Balmoral. Our King and Queen both display a keen interest in the progress and advancement of Newfoundland and its people, and, before my departure, His Majesty charged me with a message to all who dwell in this ancient Colony, wishing them health and happiness and the fullest measure of success. I was specially pleased to be in a position to assure Their Majesties, not alone of the unwavering loyalty and devotion of the people, but that Newfoundland was enjoying a degree of prosperity unequalled in her history, and with every prospect of its long continuance."

The Speaker, and the members of the House of Assembly then left for their own Chamber. The Speaker then read the Speech. Sir Edward Morris next proposed the resolution of sympathy, which was seconded by Mr. Kent in the absence of Sir Robert Bond.

RESOLVED—That this House of Assembly desires to record an expression of its heartfelt sorrow at the decease of Sir James Winter, Alexander J. W. McNelly, K.C., and the Hon. Daniel J. Greene, K.C., for many

years members of this Branch of the Legislature. Their high attainments and thoroughness in the work undertaken, rendered them a valuable acquisition to the Legislature. Whilst mourning their loss, the members of this House desire to convey to their relatives deep sympathy in their bereavement.

In moving the resolutions the Premier made a touching reference to the memory of the three deceased gentlemen. He gave a synopsis of the public life work of each as lawyers and legislators. Sir James Winter was one of the most painstaking lawyers that ever practised in this Colony. He was rather a statesman than a mere politician, and always stood unflinchingly for what he deemed to be the right course, even at the sacrifice of private advantage. The impress of his astute mind was on the legislation of the country for the past 40 years. As to the late A. J. W. McNelly, the Colony sustained a distinct loss in his demise. He was a man of rare scholarly attainments, a graceful writer and poet, as well as a lawyer and legislator. It is to be hoped that his writings will be collected and published. Formerly Speaker of the House, he filled the position with grace and dignity. The last of this brilliant trio to leave us was Hon. D. J. Greene, who was also a prominent factor in the life of the Colony for the past 40 years. He was a brilliant and witty speaker and would adorn by his high attainments the legislative halls of any country. We do not, unfortunately, value our friends and co-workers while we are "on the way with them" in this life. It is only when they are gone that we show our feeling. We adorn the caskets with wreaths and flowers and speak the kindest words we can think of them at the obsequies. If we would only show half this kindness and sympathy while in life how much better would it be for all, and how much more pleasant would our existence be in this world.

Mr. Kent, speaking on behalf of the Opposition in seconding the resolution, added a glowing tribute in endorsement of what the Premier said. Three great men had been taken from amongst us since the House last met. They had all been closely identified with the political life of the country and were associated in the House and the Law Courts for many years. Sir James Winter was a great lawyer with a gift of unlimited powers for patient research, a hard worker and an uncompromising champion for what his conscience deemed to be the right course. He was very closely identified with the legislative work of this Chamber and it was fitting that we express our sorrow. He (Mr. Kent) also endorsed what the Premier said of Mr. McNelly and Hon. D. J. Greene. Both were brilliant lawyers and eloquent speakers. Mr. McNelly, formerly Speaker of the House, was a poet and a scholar. Mr. Greene who so long graced the Upper Chamber by his brilliant talents had underneath his wit and humor a keen, unerring judgment that was rarely proved to be in the wrong. Those who knew him best knew that beneath his brilliant sallies of wit and humor lay a deep thinking mind whose acumen could estimate men and things with marvellous quickness and precision.

Mr. Moore, in moving for a Committee to draft an Address in Reply to the Speech, commented on its chief features, referring to the Coronation, Festival of Empire, the visit to India, and opening the branch line to Bonavista. He commended the intention of the Government to extend the Old Age dole to more people, the giving of pensions to teachers, the provision proposed to provide money to run the Reid Sanatoria, the building of a new Lunatic Asylum, the equipment of the present building as a Poor House, and expressed the opinion that vast strides towards prosperity were being made.

Mr. LeFevre covered much the same ground, paid a tribute to the Premier's pedestrian feat in the Burin District, admired the Government's shows at Burin, and made an incursion into the lobster and green fish business. He was also impressed with the prosperity of the Colony.

After Mr. LeFevre had finished his pleasing effort, Mr. Kent rose on behalf of the Opposition. He explained that he was taking the place of the leader of the Opposition, Sir Robert Bond, who was unable to be present from the fact that there had been no train pass through Whitbourne for the city since Saturday. He himself had been hung up at the beginning of the week at Brigus Junction and had been an eye-witness of the conditions which prevailed on the railway. As there had been a clear rail from Whitbourne to the city for the past two days, it was absolutely inexcusable that the mail and train service should have been suspended during that time. This state of affairs he denounced strongly. He complimented the mover and seconder on their effort to deal with the most diffused and empty Speech which had ever been presented. Like a big balloon, it was huge in proportions and contained little but gas. Reference was made in it to the prosperity of the

Colony. True it was people were earning more, but the Government was forcing it out of them by excessive taxation. The people were not prosperous. Their extra earnings were all going to the Government. People with salaries were finding it more and more difficult to make ends meet. This applied to Civil servants and wage earners generally. Prosperity was flaunted in the faces of people who were being pinched more and more by Government burdens. Civil servants could not live, and yet the Government refused out of the superfluity which they spent in picnics to give many of their servants even a living wage, and there was absolutely no indication of any intention of the Government to reduce taxation, as they had promised, and relieve the people of the burden that they were forced by the Government to carry. Mr. Kent also pointed out that the Government had not successfully entered a single new industry since they came into power, but that they were squandering the income from what their predecessors had inaugurated. He complained also of the treatment the Government had accorded to the Opposition. They had not even provided him with a copy of the Speech, and he had been forced to offer his criticism without seeing a copy, and to rely solely on hearing it read. As Mr. Kent made his points, those present rapturously applauded. This was in marked contrast to the cold reception accorded to the Premier, who tried to make some kind of a reply. He, however, had the grace to permit the debate to stand open to give an opportunity to the Right Honourable Sir Robert Bond to take it up.

The House then adjourned till Monday next.

Parliament Opened by the King.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Feb. 14. The second session of the second Parliament in King George's reign, was opened to-day by the King, in person. No speech for many years has been awaited with such absorbing public interest. Blank disappointment, however, was read on the faces of the hearers, owing to the colourlessness of the King's references to the historic legislation mapped out by the Government. The speech was a short one. Referring to the measures to be brought before Parliament, the King said: "A measure for the better government of Ireland will be submitted to you. A Bill will be laid before you to terminate the establishment of the Church in Wales and make provision for its temporalities. Proposals will be brought forward for the amendment of the law respecting the franchise and the registration of electors." This is all that the King said concerning measures which, if they become law, will radically alter the constitutional history of the Kingdom. The speech made no mention of British relations with Germany, and did not allude to Lord Haldane's visit to Berlin. The most interesting reference to foreign affairs was in the clause relating to China. "I trust the crisis in China will soon be terminated satisfactorily to the establishment of a stable form of Government, conforming with the views of the Chinese people. My Government will continue to observe an attitude of strict non-intervention, while taking all necessary steps to protect British life and property. It fully recognizes that both sides in China have shown every desire to safeguard the lives and interests of foreigners residing in the Empire." The speech stated that the Government was ready to associate itself with the other Powers in mediation with a view to terminating the war between Italy and Turkey, and was striving with Russia to enable Persia to re-establish order. There was a brief reference to the wide-spread labour unrest—"I firmly trust that a reasonable spirit will prevail on both sides in order to avoid a development which will seriously affect the trade of the country and the welfare of the people." No intimation was given as to the magnitude of the coming naval estimates. The Suffragettes were not even mentioned.

LONDON, Feb. 14. Earl Carrington has resigned the office of Lord Privy Seal, and the Marquis of Crewe succeeds him. Lord Pentland has resigned as Secretary of State for Scotland, and is succeeded by Thomas McKinnon Wood. The changes were officially announced this evening, and caused surprise as it was thought that Crewe had decided to retain his portfolio of Secretary of State for India.

Visit Made at Germany's Request.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Feb. 14. The opening day of the Parliamentary session, which deals with Home Rule, Welsh Disestablishment and Electoral reform, was marked by a statement from Asquith, that the visit of Haldane to Berlin was made at the invitation of German Authorities, and had reference to a desire on the part of both countries to relieve the existing tension. Interest in this statement completely overshadowed the Government's huge legislative programme. Since Haldane's visit to Berlin, the English people had been prepared for an announcement that it had to do with Anglo-German relations, but they hardly hoped that conversations proceeded so far as the Prime Minister's guarded speech shows. Speeches on domestic affairs dealt only generally with the Government's legislative programme. Bonar Law, in a fighting speech, promised to offer a stubborn resistance to Home Rule and other measures; while Lansdowne intimated that Home Rule will meet its fate from the Lords and will, therefore, have to be re-passed in the Commons. Only a passing reference was made to Electoral reform, and the possibility of woman suffrage. These measures will come in for longer debate when the amendments to the address, proposed by the Opposition Leader severely criticised the Home and Foreign politics of the Government and the changes of the Government in India. As to Home Rule, he insisted that the Premier had adopted an unusual course in leaving the explanation of the measure to Churchill, instead of making the explanation himself.

Strong Desire for Better Understanding.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Feb. 14. The first official glimpse of the progress made in Anglo-German negotiations was given by Premier Asquith, in a debate in the Commons this afternoon. He said that the British Government received, last month, an intimation that the visit of a British minister to Berlin would not be unwelcome, and might facilitate the attainment of the common object of the two nations. Lord Haldane was consequently sent to Berlin. Perfect freedom of statement and frankness of explanations had prevailed. I genuinely believe that these conversations, said Asquith, may have more than a merely negative result. There is unmistakable evidence of a sincere desire on both sides for the establishment of a better feeling between us, and it is in that spirit both nations are now engaged on a careful survey of the practical possibilities. Referring to the overclouding of Anglo-German relations as a most lamentable fact, he took occasion to deny the story that the British fleet last autumn was preparing for an aggressive attack on Germany. Concluding, he said: "I cannot at this stage enter into matters of detail, but I may say that in the course of Lord Haldane's visit there was unmistakable evidence of a sincere and resolute desire on both sides for the establishment of a better footing between us, without either side in any way sacrificing or impairing the special relationship in which each of us stands to the other Powers."

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


