





SCHR. ATHLON LOST LAST NIGHT AT BLACKHEAD.

Five men walked to the city to-day rom Blackhead, where they lost their ressel, the Athlon, last night. The Burton, master, left Spaniard's Bay on Friday evening last, bound to Sydney for coal. The weather was oderate. On Saturday morning she bunded Cape St. Francis, and Saturay night at dark was off the Narrows The weather continued very calm'with a heavy ground sea running. Last vening the schooner was off Black-ead, and not being able to make eadway, as she was becalmed, two anchors were put on shore to hold her. Between nine and ten o'clock the tide and sea increased in violence causing a great strain on the anchor chains. In a short time the chains parted and the craft went ashore. The crew of five managed to reach the shore in a boat. Scarcely had they abandoned here when the schooner was dashed to pieces on the rocks and became a total wreck.
