LONDON, To-day. In the House of Lords yesterday, Earl Derby, director of recruiting when questioned regarding the results of his recruiting campaign, de clined to give any figures in advance of Premier Asquith's statement, which will be made public next week. The Earl declared, however, that we were absolutely snowed under with recruits last week, that the gross total of enrolments was very large. He added it would be impossible to call up married men, until the country was ab solutely convinced that single men had come forward to enlist to such a extent as to leave only a negligible quantity unaccounted for. "We must keep faith to the pledge Premier Asquith gave the married men," said the "Nobody can yet say whether or not single men have come forward sufficient numbers. That will be known Tuesday."
