Much Hot Air on Jack-Wills Bout.

DEMPSEY'S MANAGER DISLIKES FOE PLAN AND VICE VERSA.

NEW YORK, July 8.—Jack Dempsey and Harry Wills, negro challenger for the heavyweight championship, failed to get together at a conference called for the signing of a contract for the contest to-day, and the meeting broke up without result.

Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, presented one contract and Paddy Mullin, who handles the negro, put forward another. Dempsey refused to sign the Wills contract and Wills the Dempsey.

Mullin's contract was so drawn that the bout would have to be held within 90 days at the most, providing someone "financially offered to stage it, the promotion to be done by the highest bidder." Mullin also insisted that the articles of agreement, to be drawn when a promoter is found, be under the New York athletic commission's rules. Kearns' chief objection was that Wills' document placed both boxers "at the mercy of promoters," his construction being that, regardless how small the best purse offer may be, it would have to be accepted. Mullin's argument that the bidding would be spirited enough to force a big purse counteracted by Kearns' assertion that a combination of promoters could force the boxers to meet for an inadequate purse.

The Dempsey document provided that the bout be held within 90 days after a promoter's contract was signed. In addition to that, Mullin's proposals placed a 30 day limit from to-day for the obtaining of bids. Mullin said his first object was to arrange the bout for this summer regardless of the size of the purse, but the Dempsey contract permitted the refusal of all bids if none was satisfactory. A battery of camera men waited four hours while the wrangling proceeded in the hope of recording the signing.

A Fish Protected by Government.

The memory of "Pelorus Jack" the now defunct sixteen-foot aquatic animal of the dolphin species, until lately so popular among travelers passing between the north and south islands of New Zealand, is a well-known fact, according to a writer in an English periodical.

For many years the fish was a great attraction to both passengers and crew of steamers on the run from Wellington to Nelson. Off the entrance to the Pelorus Sounds "Jack" was eagerly looked for by all on deck, and it was only on rare occasions that he caused disappointment. Usually about three or four chains away, he would make his debut by a leap out of the water, and in a few seconds would be racing along under the bow of the ship keeping even pace, and actually rubbing himself against the sides alternately. At times he would only favor us with his company for a few minutes, but one moonlight night I watched him gamboling in the clear phosphorescent water for nearly twenty minutes.

"Pelorus Jack" was esteemed such an attractive asset that the New Zealand Government granted him protection by special Act of Parliament, especially in the face of a wanton act of folly on the part of some irresponsible person who fired at him from the deck of the Ialusa, which ship he never after favored with a visit. It is said by many sailors that he would distinguish the different steamers by the sound of their screws.

British Olympic Games Put Off For Twelve-month -- S.S. Canadian Commander Off Shoals -- Provisional Government Determined to Suppress Revolution.

MINERS REJECT HARDING'S OFFER.
WASHINGTON, July 16. The General Policy Committee of the United Mine Workers voted unanimously late to-day to follow the recommendations of John L. Lewis and the national officers for rejection of President Harding's offer of arbitration in the coal strike. The meeting adjourned until Monday and E. Lewis said no formal statement would be made in advance of presenting their answer to President Harding.

VALERA DIRECTING OPERATIONS.
DUBLIN, July 16. The publicity department of the Irish Irregulars to-day announced that Eamonn De Valera is at Field Marshal Headquarters serving on the staff as director of operations. It is believed headquarters have been transferred from Malloy to Limerick. The Provisional Government reaffirms its determination to suppress the rebellion. Government headquarters issued a bulletin confirming the capture of Dundalk with three hundred regulars.

CANADIAN COMMANDER REFLAGGED.
NORTH SYDNEY, July 16. The Canadian Commander, ashore at Platte Point, Little Miquelon, since July 8, has been reflagged and is now St. Pierre Roads, according to advice received here.

RACE GAMES OFF FOR A YEAR.
NEW YORK, July 16. The Irish Race International Track

and Field Games scheduled to be held in Dublin on August 6th to 14th, have been postponed one year, according to cable advices received to-day by Murray Hulbert, President of the New York Board of Aldermen, and member of the Commission on Irish games.

THURLES NEW BATTLE CENTRE.
LONDON, July 16. A Central News despatch from Dublin yesterday said Thurles, County Tipperary, had become a battle centre, heavy fighting being in progress there for the past few days. Nationals occupied the town and the Regulars attempted unsuccessfully to surround them. The Irregulars, commanded by a brother of Austin Stack, were themselves surprised and eighty-four prisoners captured by Free State forces.

KILLED IN COLLISION WITH TRAIN.
BELFAST, MAINE, July 16. Six persons were killed when a Maine Central train struck an auto near Burnham Junction to-day.

CANADIAN MAINTENANCE OF WAY MEN REDUCED.
MONTREAL, July 16. Reductions amounting to from twenty-four to forty cents per day for maintenance of way employees on the Canadian Roads, went into effect to-day involving approximately 40,000 men.

NEWFOUNDLAND BOOZE RUNNER CAPTURED.
NORTH SYDNEY, July 16. The Newfoundland schooner Sea King, has been seized by the customs

cruiser Margaret. She had thirty ten gallon kegs of liquor on board.

FLIER AT BASRA.
LONDON, July 16. Major Blake has arrived at Basra, Asiatic Turkey, about 270 miles south-east of Bagdad.

SCHER SINKS, THREE DROWNED.
VICTORIA, July 16. The steam schooner Henry T. Scott has sunk in the Straits of Juan De Fuca and three of the crew drowned.

"Our Dumb Animals."

Report of S.P.A. Inspector for Week Ending July 15, 1922.

Was called to humanely destroy a dog which had bitten a resident on Pearce Avenue; went to Cornwall Avenue to examine a horse suffering from rupture, owner would not have it destroyed without the consent of a veterinary; went to town for veterinary who ordered the horse destroyed immediately, as it was beyond aid. At the request of Mr. Thistle, I humanely destroyed a horse owned by him which had fallen and met with an accident; sent in 6 horses for a rest and treatment, and insisted on some drivers not to be overloading their horses; also supervised the landing of 50 head of cattle, some sheep and pigs from the Canadian Sapper; saw them all watered and fed. Humanely destroyed dogs belonging respectively to Hon. R. Watson and P. H. Hudson, Esq., who are subscribers to the Society's funds. I received a report of some horses employed at Government work, being lame; investigated and found owner willing to carry out my instructions. Received word from Marconi Station of a horse being over-driven and cruelly whipped, owned by a city baker. I secured the evidence and issued a summons, and will be prosecuting the case in a few days. Any complaints telephoned to No. 653 will be courteously and promptly attended to.

The Strange Adventure of "Pete."

During the autumn Mr. C. E. King and family of Port Arthur, Ontario, drove out into the woods to enjoy the foliage and an outing at the old Shuniah mine. With them were their young son, Bill, and their Irish terrier, "Pete." The dog ran to and fro, now and again disappearing in the woods, but reporting for supper. When it came time to go home Pete was not to be found. The family started back, however, feeling sure that the terrier would join them somewhere on the way. But he did not come, and at bedtime he was still missing. Early the next day a searching party was organized, and all the trails and bridle paths were carefully explored, but no Pete was found. Day after day the search was renewed, and a "Dog lost" advertisement placed in the News-Chronicle, the evening paper, but all with no result.

Two weeks passed, when by mere chance a lover of nature strolled by the old Shuniah mine. To his surprise, he saw Pete near the bottom of an old shaft, huddled upon a small seat just out of the water. For a full fortnight the terrier had fasted and waited. Quickly followed a telephone call, and Pete's family hurried to his rescue. It was then dark and great care had to be exercised. Mr. King was lowered with a rope into the shaft. Another rope was dropped and placed around Pete. Both were then raised to the surface. The prodigal was given fresh milk and a warm blanket, and taken home to the family fireside, where it took three weeks' nursing to restore him to normal condition.—Our Dumb Animals.

High Maternity Death Rate.

M.C.A. TAKING MEASURES FOR PREVENTION.
NEW YORK. (Associated Press.)—The high death rate among women of the United States during childbirth and the ignorance of the proper methods of nursing and care of the mother have led the Maternity Center Association of New York to publish 12 talks for mothers, stressing the vital importance of complete maternity care. More than a million of the pamphlets will be distributed nationally. The association asserts that more women between the ages of 15 and 45 die from causes incident to maternity than from any other cause except tuberculosis. Dr. Haven Emerson, of the association's advisory board estimates that only one woman out of 17 in the United States receives the benefit of modern medical and nursing science at childbirth. The result, it is said, is that more than 20,000 women lose their lives during childbirth each year, more than 100,000 babies are born dead and more than 100,000 die under the age of one month. The association hopes to convince expectant mothers that parental care is needed, and lead them to present their cases to local nursing and public health organizations and receive personal advice and direction.



Canadian Retaliation

We agree to the last letter by the editorial article in the current issue of the Trade Review dealing with the new Canadian Tax on our fish products going into that country, and that the Newfoundland Government should remit the export duty on similar articles because of this, apparently, retaliatory action of the Dominion. Newfoundland's export duty on fish and fish products has ever been considered an abomination by fishermen and exporters alike. When this tax was put on as a war tax by the late Government it then did not meet with general approval, and though submitted to without any great degree of protest, it was only because everybody held the impression that immediately peace was declared it would be dropped. That, unfortunately, has not been the case. The Government which imposed it went out of power the same year, and the present successors of that administration have not deemed it to be good finance to remove it. As a revenue producer, the export duty makes good. But that is not all that there is to it. As a handicap to inter-dominion trade it is seemingly doing its work with effect. Hence Canada's recent imposition of a duty against Newfoundland produce. Trade should in all cases be encouraged, not hampered, and especially should this be the case between this country and our big sister across the Gulf. Commercial war within the Empire is not calculated to improve or increase Imperial trade, and building up tariff walls to insuperable heights will not tend to strengthen the bonds of union. Our weekly contemporary sums up the situation to a nicety in concluding a well reasoned article as follows:

"We need markets for our fish and it is our business to make conditions for these markets as satisfactory as possible for the exporters and the fishermen of Newfoundland. The authorities of this country have adopted a fiscal policy that has led to retaliatory action in one market, to action that imposes a heavy handicap on the classes whose interests are the highest interests of Newfoundland. So while apparently taking only a small export tax from our own people, the Government of this country, in reality, takes double the amount of that tax and has so arranged things that our fishery products reach the Canadian market heavily penalized. If a Government profits only in so far as its people prosper, then the Government of this little island home of ours has embarked on a very unprofitable line of conduct in deciding to maintain an export tax on fish, no matter how small that tax may be. The fishery industry of Newfoundland is in a condition that calls for help, not for handicaps."

At the Kirk.

DR. STANLEY MARTIN PREACHES.
The morning service at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church yesterday was attended by a large congregation. The service was conducted by Rev. T. B. Darby, M.A. The pulpit hung with ten large, handsome silk banners inscribed in Chinese characters with addresses of appreciation was occupied by Dr. Stanley Martin who delivered a powerful sermon on his work as a medical missionary in China. He referred to the greatness of the field, the sincerity of the converts and the opportunities for further service. Dr. Martin who has seen six years service in the field related how he had made up his mind to offer himself as a medical missionary during his school life and by study in Toronto and Montreal had prepared himself for the work, spending seven summers on the Labrador with Doctor Grenfell, first as wireless operator and later as medical assistant. Being released from service in Egypt as a medical officer during the war he was appointed to a mission station near the borders of China, Korea and Russia, where his labors were begun with only a pocket case of eight instruments as his entire surgical equipment. Then followed a sketch of how the station had grown from two small houses to a centre of importance in the district, having an academy and a large well equipped hospital heated with steam and lighted by electricity, with a well equipped operating room. The Doctor stated he had personally attended 160,000 patients during his six years in the field, not counting many more who had been looked after by his assistants. The Doctor closed his splendid address with an appeal for further help, not so much in a financial way, but for prayer which has a value beyond price. He will be in St. John's for about a month and plans to visit St. Anthony during the summer. Other opportunities will be given to hear him describe the work in the mission fields of China and Korea.

Tribute to Minister.

REV. E. W. FORBES' FAREWELL SERMON.
A tribute to the good work of Rev. E. W. Forbes, M.A., B.D., Pastor of the Church, and to the ability and personality of the Rev. Hammond Johnson, of Moncton, who assumes the Pastorate on August 10th, was paid at Gower St. Church yesterday morning by Rev. Mr. Goodwin. At night the Rev. Mr. Forbes preached his farewell sermon. Taking as his text, Philippians, 4:1: "Therefore my brethren dearly beloved and longed for, my joy and crown, so stand fast in the Lord, my dearly beloved," he spoke with manly feeling and sincerity of the events of the four years of his pastorate. Mr. and Mrs. Forbes leave by s.s. Sable I. on Wednesday for their new circuit at Guysboro, N.S.

At St. Mary's.

AMERICAN MISSIONARY PREACHERS.
Rev. G. H. Seavey, B.A., occupied the pulpit at the Church of St. Mary the Virgin at evensong yesterday. Mr. Seavey preached an eloquent sermon which was greatly appreciated by the congregation. A graduate of Berkeley College, New Hampshire, Mr. Seavey is here en route for Battle Harbour, where he will take up parochial duties. While in St. John's he is the guest of Rev. Dr. Facey at Queen's College.

At Mount Carmel.

REQUIEM MASS AT CEMETERY.
There was a very large attendance at the annual Requiem Mass at Mount Carmel Cemetery yesterday morning. Mass was celebrated by Rev. Joseph Pippy, who also delivered a very eloquent and touching sermon on the Doctrine of Purgatory and the duty of praying for the dead. The preacher took for his text "It is a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead that they may be loosed from their sins." The graves at Mount Carmel were in splendid order as was also the different walks, and great credit is due the Cemetery Committee. The new bell presented by Mrs. Margaret Howe was tolled for the first time yesterday.

Shot to Scare.

ACCUSED BOUND OVER.
"That he only shot to scare" was the defence of a man charged in the Police Court this morning with firing a revolver at two men on the Topsail Road last night. Plaintiff met the accused and asked him where he was going. He told them it was none of their business and as they passed on, they heard a shot behind them. The police were informed and accused was arrested. He was placed under bonds for his future good behaviour and the revolver was confiscated.

Six Planes Coming.

WILL BE USED AT HAWKE'S BAY AND FOR WINTER MAIL CARRYING—SIX HUNDRED MEN WANTED.
The development of Hawke's Bay by the Aerial Survey Company is rapidly progressing and several aeroplanes will be used on survey work during the next few months. Mr. F. Sidney Cotton, local representative of the Aerial Survey Company, who has been on a business trip to England during the past two months, returned by Saturday's express and leaves this week for Hawke's Bay. He told the Telegram to-day that six aeroplanes would arrive shortly from England. Three of the machines are Westlands, one is a Martinsyde, another a Bristol, and the sixth a special machine which will be used in flights to the Labrador. This plane is capable of crossing the Atlantic, can carry twelve passengers, and is fitted so that the airman can live in it. Two engines are coming with it, one a Napier 600 horse power, which will be installed when the machine is used as a seaplane. For winter work there is a 370 horse power Rolls Royce engine. Three photographic experts are coming out from England and will air map the Hawke's Bay district and other parts of the country. They will carry special apparatus, including a motion picture camera. Two hundred men are now permanently employed in timber cutting at Hawke's Bay. Mr. Cotton said that six hundred more are required, but owing to the large number obtaining Government relief, it is impossible to get them. There is, he said, work for 800 men, who could be permanently employed in developing Hawke's Bay. The Aerial Survey Co. is paying \$2 per cord at the stump, and the cost of transport to Hawke's Bay is advanced. Within a few days, a boat will arrive to take a quantity of pit props which is ready for export and has been sold under contract. The capacity of the steamer is 2500 cords. Mr. V. S. Bennett is supervising the work at Hawke's Bay. Mr. Cotton has obtained a 25 ton yacht "Hawke," which will be used in connection with the company's Northern activities. It has a 250 horse power gasoline engine and when opened out can do 20 knots, while its cruising speed is 14 knots. Mr. Cotton boarded her at Portland, Me., and with Capt. Olsen, an engineer and a steward, brought her up to Port au Port. She is now waiting at Humbermouth for Mr. Cotton who will soon make a trip to Labrador. Mr. A. S. Butler is coming to Newfoundland in November to assist in winter flying. He is an entrant for the King's Cup for a flight around England. This contest will take place in the near future.

Mr. Mercer was engaged threading up the main press and his hand caught when the big machine was set in motion. Only prompt action and presence of mind prevented a more serious accident. It is regrettable that after long years of service without accident Mr. Mercer should meet with such a painful mishap.

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At Congregational Church.

DR. W. J. GUNN PREACHES.
At the morning service in the Congregational Church yesterday the preacher was Rev. Dr. Gunn, Secretary of the Canadian Congregational Union. Prefacing his sermon on Pilgrims of Faith, with greetings from the Union and from several old friends and pastors of the Queen's Road Church, Doctor Gunn outlined the situation in Canada, which was leading to the reunion of the Methodist Presbyterian and Congregational Churches. Already several important steps have been taken, beginning as far back as 1817 with a union of two Presbyterian bodies. Since then there have been a number of amalgamations and the present scheme is the culmination of a natural development. Then the three churches already co-operated in several ways: the Sunday School publications are identical, the colleges pool both their students and professors and there are some 1500 pastoral charges or preachings stations on a united basis. In these ways the ground has been well prepared and the complete fusion now planned will be an accomplished fact almost before it is realized. The text of the sermon was taken from the adventure of Abraham as related in Gen. XII-1-3. From this Doctor Gunn showed that pilgrimage is the law of life. In all sorts of ways God is always stirring us up to go forward. When the child goes to school he ventures into the unknown, when he goes to a higher class he starts new and difficult work, when he leaves school and takes on the responsibilities of manhood, he is venturing into the unknown. God is always stirring us up and preventing us from settling down in our comfortable ways. He is always calling us to a life that is a pilgrimage.

In the afternoon Dr. Gunn addressed the children on the pioneer work in the Northwest of Canada. At night Rev. J. B. Thompson, an old member of the Church and well known to many people in St. John's, took part in the service and was welcomed by the Minister, Rev. B. T. Holden. Dr. Gunn preached from Revelation 21.15 "And the gates of it shall not be shut at all by day, for there shall be no night there." His sermon was listened to with rapt attention as the speaker unfolded his theme, showing how the gates of Heaven were wide open to those who wished to enter.

RAISING THE SPEED LIMIT

In one of the largest states in the United States a law was passed last year raising the speed limit at which automobiles can travel. Terrible isn't it?

Where are we going to end? The pedestrian will have no rights in the streets at all if this keeps on. We shall surely have to have underground tubes for him in the cities and leave the streets to the automobiles.

"Doubtless, you are shuddering at the thought of the number of deaths that this law's raising the speed limit will cause."

Too Many Laws.

Too many laws and too strict laws always defeat their own end. A group of clergymen, met for civic reform, tried this interesting experiment. They read over all the city ordinances to see what they were and if they were keeping them. There was not one who did not break some of those ordinances.

"There are few communities that would not be better off with half or a quarter as many laws really enforced and respected."

For Better Children.

And there are many homes where the same thing is true. Better let Johnny's bedtime be 3.30 and see that he goes, than have it theoretically 8, and actually somewhere between quarter past eight and quarter of nine (the peace of that half hour being punctuated at regular intervals by "Johnny, go to bed." "Just a minute, Ma. I want to finish this chapter. Johnny, you must go to bed." "Yes, Ma, I'm going." "Johnny, if you don't go to bed—")

Fewer prohibitions and commands and stricter enforcement of those few, reasonable requirements completed with as a matter of course, will make for peace, harmony, efficiency and better disciplined children.

Save Your Shudders.

Save your shudders until I tell you something. In the year since that law was passed the number of deaths has been reduced by one-half.

No, your eyes are not deceiving you. The reason for the reduction is this. The speed limit was made reasonable and then enforced.

I know of another state in which the outside speed-limit in the open country is 20 miles an hour. If I had \$1 for every automobilist who has never exceeded it, do you think I would have to pay an income tax? The law is a joke. No one tries to stay within the limit and the result is

The Fisheries of Newfoundland.

Editor Evening Telegram

Dear Sir—In welcoming our distinguished countryman Lord Morris, and his son the Hon. Michael Morris back to their native land, I will give to Caesar, etc., by first stating that I did not at all times see eye to eye with him politically, but as a Newfoundlanders, thank God, I am not made up of the type that is prevalent amongst us, jealous of one another's uprise, which unfortunately is to be found in the majority of Newfoundlanders in their native land (and foreign lands there are none more loyal). I am sorry to state that through illness caused by hardships endured in making an effort to modernize our fisheries I was unable to welcome, in person, Lord Morris and his son back to their native land. How grateful are those countrymen of mine, many of whom, had Lord Morris been a native of South Africa, or the far away Indies, etc., they would have done some neck-breaking in trying to outdo one another to welcome Lord Morris from India, Africa, etc., and the result would be additional emergency cases to our Sanitarium and Hospitals. I do not for a moment insinuate that Lord Morris is doing any worrying, oh no, he knows his countrymen too well to worry; but they are worrying to see him, the first Newfoundlanders to be given so great an honor by the Motherland, a peer of the Realm, a Member of the House of Lords in the History of Newfoundland, the oldest British colony, and now a Dominion of the British Empire. Is there one per cent. of us that would refuse such an honor? I say no; it would be easier to find a diamond in the sands of Quidi Vidi Lake.

And as to our fisheries, the main stay of the Dominion, Lord Morris' equal is hard to be found in writing up the fisheries and demonstrating to the world the great possibilities to the investor and the consumer of Newfoundland's greatest mine in the world (the great mine of the sea—food for the human race). That our fisheries with modernized methods and the re-planting of the various fishes wasted, and the by-products of our fish now thrown away, would mean millions of dollars annually to our native land, and that we to-day should be able to maintain a population of at least a million. Norway's fisheries equal 85 per cent. of her total revenue from two and three quarter millions of people, or close on a million (85-500) of a population, and Newfoundland's fisheries are by far superior to Norway's, and Lord Morris can see as I do, as have we not the continents of North and South America at our door, and our Codfish, Herring, Salmon, and Caplin, the best in the world—Modernized ideas as to our fisheries, will stop emigration from our native land, and will bring hundreds of thousands of emigrants to Newfoundland and our countrymen and women back to their homeland, and then you need not worry about our railways, main and branch lines, when operated with economy, which I will refer to in another article.

Had Lord Morris remained in his native land I would have succeeded in my great undertaking to revolutionize and modernize the fisheries of our native land, as when Prime Minister in January, 1918, he gave me an interview of well over an hour's duration. He then strongly endorsed my ideas as to the modernizing of our fisheries, and he repeated the same since, in wishing me success from the Motherland, but he believed that he

would be leaving behind him, men that would take charge of the Government that would do, all in their power to uplift the fisheries of their native land, the main stay, or ninety per cent. of the total revenue of our Dominion, and personally I would not be like I am to-day, slowly recovering my health, that precious gem to us all, that I lost in trying to uplift my country.

As to modernized ideas in our fisheries, when associated with Newfoundland's greatest statesman, the Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Bond, P.C., that great lover of his native land, were they not the great pioneers in erecting bait depots over twenty years ago at Petty Hr. and Fogo for to help the fisheries. So let Newfoundlanders be united and loyal to their countrymen and give him or them, that precious gem to us all, credit for the gifts that a merciful Providence has given away, to many of our countrymen in various walks of life, and not to be knocking them. Be united and loyal, and then we will, with a combination of brains, equal, if not surpass, any quarter of a million of people (isolated as we have been) on God's earth.

Wishing Lord Morris and his son a pleasant home-coming to their native land, and thanking you for your valuable space, I ask my readers to remember, that I have not fully recovered health, which would give me greater energy and a clearer brain to write on the various subjects for the welfare of our native land, which I will give from time to time before I leave for foreign lands to regain my health in this dream of life, and to uplift, with God's help, that gem of the ocean, Newfoundland, and as to her fisheries.

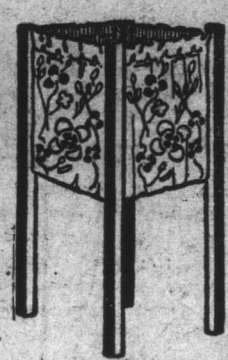
Increasing Ore Exports From Sweden.

STOCKHOLM—Europe has increased its consumption of Swedish iron ore, a fact taken here to indicate that European industries are on the mend. 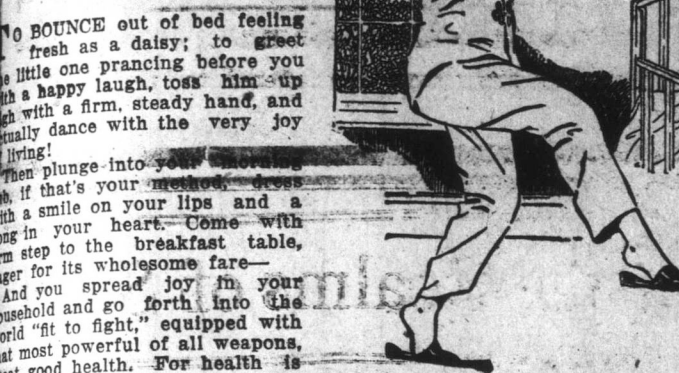

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After Fifty-Seven Years.

MR. JAMES SILVEY RETURNS TO HIS NATIVE LAND.

Oh! give me back my home again—
My home beyond the deep blue sea—
My island home nearby the main
Where I had nothing to restrain.
And I was happy, young and free!
These sunny skies and gorgeous
scenery
Are brilliant, beautiful and grand,
Yet all their vista never weans,
My heart from those far brighter
scenes.
The treasures of dear Newfoundland!

On Signal Hill on night to stray,
And watch the countless stars above,
The white-winged ships upon the bay,
The lights beyond that led the way
To homes of simplicity and love.

We extend to our fellow countryman, Mr. James Silvey, a cold mille-faitha, or, in other words, a whole-hearted old time Newfoundland welcome, after his long absence of fifty-seven years from his Native Land. We have often stated that no matter what part of the globe our fellow-countrymen have cast their lot, by their honesty, integrity and ability they have carved out for themselves a prosperous and honorable position in life, and Mr. James Silvey is no exception. It must indeed be a pleasure for Mr. Silvey to once more in his life visit the scenes of his childhood, and yet this pleasure is not an unmixed one. In looking back over that vista of time, there are many regrets to be called forth by the changes all those years have wrought. How many familiar faces will be absent? The companions of his youthful days, where are they? Some gone to that undiscovered country from whose bourne no traveller returns, and others scattered to the farthest part of the earth. Mr. Silvey will find the old and familiar scenes, scarcely changed by the hand of time, and although they are still as dear to his heart as when he parted from them fifty-seven years ago, yet, they call up recollections that cannot but be tinged with melancholy. They will remind him of the happiest days of his life-days now gone and never to be recalled. They remind him of the companions of his youth, and they emphasize their absence. He indeed must feel like an exile returning to the home of his childhood. Few will remember him, but the name of Silvey will live forever in the annals of our country. It was his famous father, and such as he who made Newfoundland what she is to-day.

James Silvey, youngest son of the late famous Viking, Capt. John Silvey, was born near Maggoty Cove Bridge (as it was then called), near Holywell-street, at that time a river ran down through the land where Temperance Street is now, and discharged its waters into Wood's Cove. His famous father bought a home on Cochrane Street, next door to Ryan, the pilot. After his father's death, which occurred on March 14th, 1861, on board his brigantine "Fanny Bloomer" at the seal-fishery, his mother sold the house on Cochrane St., and built a new one on what was then called the New Road, now Gover St., where Mr. Feaver, the blacksmith, has his residence. In 1866 Mrs. Silvey, four daughters and young Jim left the land of their birth and settled down in Boston, where the daughters were employed in remunerative work. Two daughters, Mrs. Denis Brien and Mrs. Richard Boggan remained in St. John's—the latter being still with us. James Silvey received his education in Boston, and served his time as a printer, at which he worked for a considerable time. But the roving spirit of old-time Newfoundland asserted itself, and one of his sisters (Mrs. Dempsey) being in California,

he decided to move on to that distant part of the United States. With the inborn grit and enterprise of his famous father, he quickly rose to a prominent position in the land of his adoption, in the city of San Francisco, and has been for many years one of the most outstanding figures in the Public Service, in the land of the Stars and Stripes. His kindness and hospitality to the delegates of the Knights of Columbus during their visit to San Francisco will never be forgotten by the Newfoundland delegates, and Mr. Charles J. Ellis is warm in his praise of the attention and welcome extended to them by Mr. Silvey. He placed his motors, his house and everything possible at their disposal, and was untiring in his efforts to make them comfortable and enable them to view the scenes of that beautiful and prosperous country.

This was characteristic of such a true-born Newfoundland— a descendant of one of our greatest Vikings. His father, Capt. John Silvey, was contemporary with all the great "jowlers" of former years, when the seal-fishery was at the zenith of its glory, and the names of Captains Silvey, Barron, Feehan, Graham, White, Malloway, Jordan Pike, Ned Purcell, Harry Andrews (Billy Lindy), Thomas Duff, Din McNeely, Joe Houllin, Rhodes, Billy Kean, Billy Keese, Daniel Green, Harahan, Thomey, Fitzgerald, Jim Wilcox, St. John, Mundens, Bartlett, Clarke, Spracklins and scores of others were as of familiar to the people of the whole country as that of the Governor, and perhaps more so. It was they who built up our country, and in their efforts Capt. John Silvey performed his part, and performed it well. We cannot say too much about this highly respected and heroic old Viking, just to show the class of heroes of those days. Capt. John Silvey was in command of many vessels during his eventful life at the seal-fishery and other enterprises. He had the Piscator, Lovely Mary and Telegraph, but it was after he purchased the well-known brigantine "Fanny Bloomer" and the brig Elizabeth (the largest vessel of the fleet) that his name became a household word. He purchased the Elizabeth in 1859, and he gave charge of the Fanny Bloomer to his brother-in-law, Capt. John Flynn, and took charge of the Elizabeth himself. During the fall and summer months both these vessels were employed in the foreign trade, principally between Liverpool, England, the United States, and Newfoundland. In the year 1860 the Elizabeth, which was in charge of Capt. Flynn, was lost about Christmas time, near the Gut of Canso, and the next spring Capt. Silvey again took charge of the Fanny Bloomer, and died as described above. And now after fifty-seven years, Mr. James Silvey comes back to the scenes of his childhood in his native city of St. John's—to those scenes so familiar to him near the historic Quidi Vidi Lake, where he viewed the struggles for supremacy with the oar, which took place in years gone by—the years of his happy childhood. He will recall the days when the women rowed on the pond, and the good dames of Quidi Vidi proved their metal against their opponents of their sex, and when the rigs Undine, Banishee, Weasel, Black Cat, Witch of the Wave and other racers competed on the pond, as well as when the pilot boats, with their hardy crews of the Gallishaws, Vinnicombes, Lewis, Ryans and others plied their 18 foot oars, in their endeavors to reach the goal when the gun went off, announcing the winner of the race. As Mr. Silvey purposes to remain for the annual Regatta—the only day when all meet on an equality—when even the ubiquitous small boy can proudly stake his twenty cents with the highest in the land without fear of being snubbed, it will surprise us much indeed if Mr. Silvey will not be amply repaid for

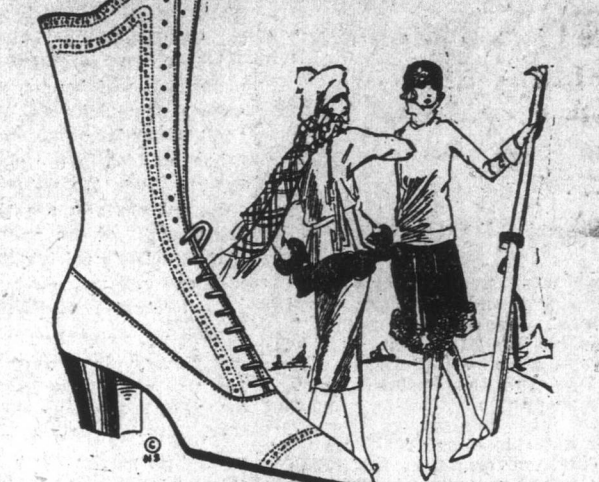

Football Reminiscences.

21st LEAGUE MATCH. B.I.S. vs. C.L.B.

Played on Llewellyn Place, July 30, 1897.—Result: C.L.B., 1 Goal; B.I.S., Nil.

In beautiful weather, and considering the contra attraction on the Banks of Quidi Vidi Lake before a fairly large gathering of spectators, this match was lost and won on Llewellyn place last evening. There were present the usual number of football enthusiasts, who, previous to the kick-off were indulging in discussing—one with the other—the probable result of the game. This was particularly noticeable on the northern stand, which afforded, with the setting sun behind, the best possible view of the entire match, and here quite a number of noted sports had congregated. On the teams making their appearance it was observed that the Irishmen had only 10 players, and of these, two were new men, making their first appearance in a League Match, and being respectively the genial and well known King of Comedy (P.F. Moore) and a true born and popular Irishman (Sheehan). The latter took his place as full back and Moore replaced Jordan in the half back line. The kick-off took place at 4.40, the C.L.B. defending the Western Goal and thus having the ground in their favor. The Irishmen at once rushed matters, and the Brigade lads settled down to play together, beginning to press their opponents, whose forward line was decidedly weakened by the absence of McKay, thus having only 4 forwards.

The game was about 10 minutes old when from a corner, nicely placed by Warren, the ball was hustled past Connolly, and the only goal of the match, notched up for the Brigade. From this till half-time the game was considering the teams—fairly evenly divided, but no scoring took place and the teams crossed with the score C.L.B. 1; B.I.S. 0.

With little delay play was resumed and the Irishmen now had a "look in." Brownrigg in particular putting in some brilliant little bits of dribbling and giving evidence of possessing a considerable amount of speed. During this half J. Crofty, the noted half back of the B.I.S., unfortunately got disabled, colliding with an opponent when in the act of playing the ball, and after lying on the field for a few minutes had to be taken off the ground with the assistance of Doctor Mitchell, who was a spectator of the match. It was thought at first, by a good many present, that it was certainly a case of broken limbs, and whilst we did not ascertain what the injury really was, we trust that nothing of a serious nature occurred, and that he will be all right again in a short time. Play, which of course, had been suspended, was now resumed, the B.I.S. being now reduced to 9 men who fought hard to equalize, but the faces seemed against them, as shortly afterwards Collins, their centre forward, collapsed for a few minutes from an accidental kick, and though he pluckily kept his place till the finish, he was certainly very much shaken up. The most noticeable feature during the last half, as regards play, was the remarkable save made by Herbert Hayward, C.L.B. goalkeeper. From a long drop shot beautifully put in by Kent, he fisted the ball from just under the cross bar, with a force quite equal to the average goal kick, and sent it at least some thirty or forty yards up the field. It was certainly the most brilliant piece of goalkeeping yet witnessed during the season, and was deservedly applauded all over the ground. The game ended as given above in a win for the Brigade, although it was really good value for a draw, considering the chapter of accidents and infelicitous numbers of the B.I.S. team. Referee, F. Maynard. Linemen, P. C. Mars (Sains) and H. Donnelly (C.C.C.)

Notes on the Game. For the winners, the forwards all played well, giving a better exhibition of the passing game than their opponents. Warren was particularly good at half back, and Warren Hayward, whilst not apparently in the best of condition, was a team in himself. We have seen Garland to better advantage, but he is an invaluable full back. Brownrigg was the most brilliant amongst the Irish forwards, whilst Collins and Tobin also did good work, but they were handicapped by the absence of McKay. Crofty, up till the accident, was undoubtedly the most conspicuous player on the B.I.S. team, doing grand work with both head and foot, whilst Sheehan was a success at back. McLaughlin and he making the best back division for their side yet put on the field. The genial East End plumber (P.F. M.) for his first appearance, played remarkably well, only making one or two mistakes, and treating the spectators to an exhibition of head as well as foot ball. Connolly in goal was good, but fatigued at times to rush too far out. He saved some difficult shots, however, and will make a capital goalkeeper. Referring to the C.L.B. goalkeeper in the above match, the following is extracted from Evening Herald of July 31st, 1897: "Yesterday evening at the football match Mr. T. H. Hayward was keeping goal for the C.L.B., when the ball came flying towards the post. Drawing back he struck it with his fist sending it back over the ground 40 yards—almost half the field—where it went beyond the touch line. It is seldom that such a blow is given, especially as this was up the grade."

Produce and Provisions.

(From Saturday's Trade Review.)

Codfish.—The week's exports from St. John's have been confined to one fish and a few small shipments by the Rosalind amounting to about 2,000 quintals. The schooner Easton sailed from Hokenman's for Oporto, with 3,800 qtls. and the Donald II., from various shippers with 2,623 qtls., sailed for Barbados. The greatest activity is on the South West Coast where new fish is being loaded for market. The first new cargo has reached Oporto by schooner Ronald Douglas and has been sold at 49 shillings. Old fish sold in this market, as late as last week for 45 shillings according to advices received by shippers. Other cargoes have cleared from South West Coast ports as follows: End E. Legge from the Burgeo and LaPoile Shipping Co., of Burgeo, 6,000 quintals for Oporto; Iris from Courtney Bros., of Rose Blanche, 2,500 quintals for Oporto; Faustina from the Burgeo and LaPoile Shipping Co., 4,884 quintals for Oporto.

The following vessels are loading: H. Patten, RIA, General Wood, Gordon S. Tibbo, at Grand Bank; Gray, Cornum at Belleoram and the Fulton is on the way to Rose Blanche to load for Portugal. The report of the Oporto market for the week ending July 10th, showed a healthier condition of affairs there than has existed for years. The week's consumption amounted to 11,428, quintals, while stocks then on hand amounted only to 11,778 qtls. None of this fish, moreover, was disposed of at a price below 45 shillings. Two cargoes had entered viz. the Frank Forsey and Svalen, while the Harriet and Ronald Douglas were outside. No forecast has yet been hazarded by exporters as to what the opening price for shore fish shall be. Cod Oil.—Cod oil has held firm since last report and advices confirm our statement that prices will not greatly decline. The leather industry on which our oil largely depends has picked up wonderfully during the past thirty days, and the demand for oil is comparatively better than for some time. The figure prevailing locally is still forty-five cents per gallon. The week's exports amounted to 3,721 quintals shipped by the Digby and Rosalind. Flour.—The market is somewhat firmer than last week when continued favorable weather reports were responsible for a temporary weakness. Throughout the week the market was characterized by uncertainty but it is now holding firm at an advance of about twenty cents. There has been considerable buying the past few days principally of old wheat, a fact which was mainly responsible for the market steadying down. American advices state that black rust has appeared in the winter wheat but the crop is too far advanced to be damaged to any extent. Spring wheat areas are so far reported to be free of it. Continued favorable growing conditions give the outlook as bright as it has been in recent months. Local imports are reported favorable. Local imports are low, only a few thousand barrels having come in during the week. Quotations remain unchanged. Pork.—The market is firmer with Fat Back leading as a popular buy. Latest advices are to the effect that an advance of fifty cents per barrel in leading qualities may be looked for. There are at present practically no stocks held locally but an actual shortage is not feared as small shipments, sufficient to meet immediate requirements are coming in all the time. The only imports for the week were 300 barrels by the Canadian Sapper. Up to the present writing the reported advance has not been reflected in the quotations made by local dealers. Beef.—Beef is still weak and the market shows no signs of strengthening in the immediate future. Transactions have been few during the week and very little beef is being imported locally. The indications are that lower prices will obtain for the balance of the season. Molasses.—The almost clean market has been unrivaled this week by any further arrivals and there is now only a very limited supply available. The Barbados crop is now finished but

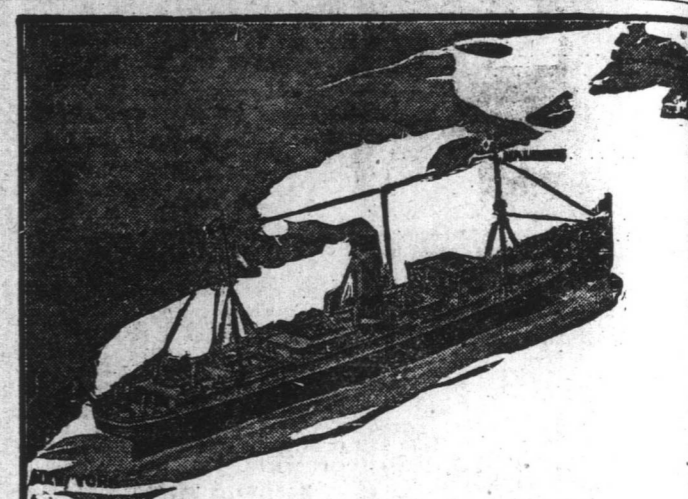

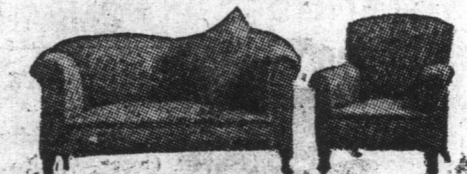

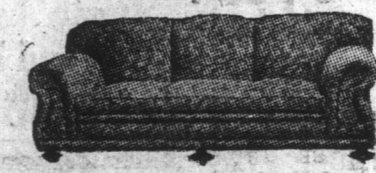
