

Canada's Foreign

In spite of the coal shortage, the weather and other matters to grumble about there are still things be thankful for. For instance, our trade for the first eight months of the fiscal year shows a handsome ncrease over a corresponding period year ago, whereas our imports showed a very trifling increase. The crease of exports, this year over Nov. 30, amounted to \$123,778,000, the same period amounted to only widening in spite of Fordney tariffs

The chief fly in our ointment consists in the fact that we appear unable to balance our budget. That is to say in spite of all the taxes so far imposed, and they seem plenty, we are unable to keep our expenditures inside our income. Between November, 1921, and November, 1922, we increased our national debt by \$40,-000,000, and at that we are getting an income of some \$400,000,000 per annum. When the Hon. Mr. Fielding recast our annual budget he was of the opinion that not only would we be able to meet our cost of maintenance, but that we would have something over to pay on the national debt itself. Such however, has not proved the case. There is one thing sure we must either have more economy or more taxes. Suppose we first try economy.—Saturday Night,



sidering this situation, one ar in mind that Britain is arywhere a crowded country, ripe for emigration. To her refore, the rule that liquor urvives longest in cities applies with especial force. Next, she is an ancient country where the tradition of liquor was established long before there were alternative drinks, like tea, coffee, cocoa, lemonade and ice cream sodas. This means that, in Britain, it has never been unusual for a woman to drink a glass of wine or beer, nor for a clergyman, in the Established and Roman Catholic Churches, similarly to indulge a moderate taste. The brewer is no pariah among good folk. He speaks at congresses, goes to Court, enter tains his Bishop, marries his daughter to a foreign missionary and buys an organ for the church where

Lady Astor's temperance bill has no chance of becoming law and for the moment nothing worth mentioning in comparison with prohibition is likely to be achieved in Great Britain. In the opinion of the British adccates of prohibition, Britain is not earning and is not perhaps eager to earn what those advocates insist are the true facts with regard to prohibition in the United States. They say the evasions of the law in America are magnified, that the achieve ment is belittled. Dean Inge of St. Paul's Cathedral denounced prohibition as an evil worse than all , the diseases of drink and other desires, and attributes the Eighteenth Amendment to the direct agency of the devil. Whether the women and the great industrial magnates will agree permanently to accept this view, remains to be seen, he says.

By general admission, the next country to face this issue is Great Britain. The very violence of the emotions there aroused by prohibition indicate the consciousness of a reluctant people that here is a probem which will have t obe though out and fought out. What happens in Great Britain is of an especial importance because it effects the policy pursued by that country in those Crown colonies which are still directly governed from London including territories held under mandate of the League of Nations.

Reckoned according to American standards, he says the British Parliament elected a few weeks ago is almost solidly wet. Mr. Scrymgeour, who defeated Winston Churchill in Dundee, is the only member labeled "Prohibitionist," and he is regarded as a wholly exceptional personality. It is an interest that is omnipotent over the Conservative majority which supports Bonar Law as Prime Minis-He dare not introduce even the mildest restriction of the liquor traffic, and at the instance of Sir George Younger, his chief whip and a brewer, he is known to be contemplating

It is a simple fact that the wettes proposals suggested for the United States—namely, light wines and beers for home consumption and restaurants—are more dry than the driest proposals suggested as practical politics for Great Britain, where, save in Scotland, there is not ever local option.

It was proceeding outwards by the mouth of the river Clyde, and passing southwards down the strait that separated the counties of Argyll and Renfrew, towards the Irish Sea, on its road to Chatham to undergo repairs. While proceeding, a shot was fired from one of its six-inch guns. On the shore, in just that same direction, stood Innellan, a village, and in its neighbourhood was Ashgrove House, then the residence of Mr. Paton, a sugar refiner, of which trade the seaport town of Grennock, has become, since 1765, the chief British seat. Considerable damage was thus caused to his property, and three persons received bodily injury, though happily there was no loss of life. On July 18 of the same year the "Ajax" met with an accident through a serious collision with the "Devastation." while on their way to Spithead. Eighty years previously, on the evening of February 14, 1807, a melancholy accident befell another warship named the "Alax." seventy-four guns, Captain the Hon. Henry Blackwood, of Sir John Duckworth's squadron, in the Dardanelles. At 9 p.m., just as the captain had retired to rest, the officers of the watch ran into the cabin and acquainted him' that there was a fire in the after-part of the ship. Signals of distress were in. mediately made and enforced by guns. The fire had broken out in the after utes, notwithstanding every attempt to stifle it. the smoke became so dense that, although the moon shone bright, the officers and men on the upper deck could only distinguish each other by speaking or feeling. All attempts to hoist the boats except the jolly boat were effectual. The flames burst up the main hatchway, thereby dividing the fore from the after part of the ship: and with the greatest difficulty the captain and about 381 of the officers, seamen, and marines of the ship, effected their escape, chiefly by jumping into the few boats that were enabled to approach in time to be useful. Captain Blackwood leaped from the spritsail yard, and, after being about half an hour in the water. was picked up, much exhausted, by one of the boats of the "Canonus." 

SHOP WINDOWS BROKEN.

A series of robberies occurred on Water Street West, Thursday night, and three shops at least were victimized. In each case a window in the front of the store was broken, and goods such as eigarettes, tobacco, and chocolates were stolen. Tre robberies occurred at the stores of Mrs. Squires and Mrs. Ash, Water Street, near Sudbury, and Mrs. O Reilly's, near Alexander Street, and were apparentthe work of the same individual or individuals. It is understood the matter has been reported to the police. It is now some time since occurrences of this kind have been re-

Innocent Man Convicted

A singular case of mistaken indentity yet in the recollection of many people occurred in 1851. It is doubly remarkable as instancing the conviction of an innocent man and the liberation, according to the law, the man who was really guilty. On February 17, 1851, in the dead of night, the house of David-Williams, at Truasth, in the county of Brecknock. was broken open by forcing the shutters and windows of an outhouse. Williams, an old man, who, with his wife, alone occupied the cottage, was alarmed by the noise, and going to the head of the stairs saw by the light of a candle the person of a man whom he recognized as one Tom Williams, a blacksmith who had formerly done some work in the house. This was only for a moment, as the light was struck out, and the burglar attacked old Williams and his wife in the dark. However, they proved too strong for him, and compelled him to take to flight. Nothing was stolen, but the drawer of a dresser in the kitchen had been ransacked, some papers of no value turned out of it. Tom Williams, the blacksmith, was tried at the following spring assizes at Brecon for the burglary, and as the old man, who had known him from his vas convicted, and sentenced to transportation. Happily for him, however, a person named Morris was present at the trial, who, on hearing the verdict, at once exculpated the convicted man, and directed the attention of the police to one Powell as the real criminal. Strict inquiry was immediately instituted, the result of which was that Powell was committed. He was tried and convicted on evidence perfectly conclusive. It seems that old Williams had lent Powell £600 on mortgage, taking as security certain title deeds. Williams commenced proceedings to recover frincipal and interest, and Powell committed the burglary to possess himself of the documents hence the ransacking of the dresser drawer in which he believed they had been deposited. The blacksmith was, of course, "pardoned" and discharged. But the real criminal was also discharged although his guilt was as clear as the sun at noonday. The jury convicted him of breaking open the house "with intent to steal the title deeds": the indictment charged him with intent to "steal the goods and chattels." The Appeal Court held the conviction bad, and so, despite of fact, and thanks to law. Powell shook the gaol dust from his feet and walked forth a free man.

Wealthy Indian Has no Heirs.

fortune of Jackson Barnett, reputed to be Oklahoma's wealthiest Indian has been arranged at his request to keep it out of the hands of "designing persons" when he dies, Charles H. Burke, Commissioner of Indian Affairs, has announced. The plan, it was said, assures Barnett an income of about \$50,000 a year during his life and disposes of the bulk of his estate, comprised of his allotment in the Cushing oil pool of Oklahoma and Liberty Bonds and cash approximating \$1,500,000, through gifts and trust funds in such a way as to explode the schemes of a host of "designing persons" whose activities and ingenuity have added considerably to the work of the Indian bureau. Barnett, who has no living relatives with legal or moral claims upon him, according to Mr. Burke's announcement, has been in the public eye more prominently perhaps than any other Indian, not only because of his great wealth, but because of his sensational marriage about three years ago, when his bride is alleged to have kidnapped him from his guardian in Oklahoma and taken him to Kansas, where they were married. The disposal of the estate includes gifts of \$500,000 each to Barnett's wife and the Baptist Home Mission Society of New York. Out of the gift to Mrs. Barnett she estbalishes a trust fund of \$200,000 through Washington bank, with the provision that Barnett is to receive \$7,500 of the annual income, and the entire gift to the mission society is deposited with a New York trust company, which agrees to pay him \$20,000 a year from its proceeds as long as he lives. It is explained that the gift to the society, which will go to its permanent endowment fund, is not a denominational of church donations, but is made solely because the organization has administrative control over Bacone College and the Murrow Indian Orphans' Home in the heart of the Indian country of Oklahoma. Barnett in addition to the \$27,500 a year thus assured to him from these two gifts, it is explained, retains title to his allotment in the Cushing oil field, which is bringing him more than \$18,000 annually and is receiving about \$5,000 a year in interest on loans which have been made for


