



We have now seen that the variet and extent of our mineral reso as well as the physical features affect ing their development, are such as to leave but little to be desired.

If, therefore, the human factors, viz. Ability, Enterprise and Capital, are forthcoming, I see no reason why Newfoundland should not in the nea future take her rightful place among the Mineral producing cou the world.



FIFTY YEARS AGO.

Now that our heardy sealers are preparing for their annual voyage. I crave space to record an incident of over fifty years ago, of which I had personal knowledge. On March 1st, 1862, the veteran seal kiler, Captain Samuel Winsor, grandfather of Capt. W. Winsor, M.H.A., with 35 men, sailed for the icefields in the brigantine "Mary Jane", 64 tons. When about 15 miles from Cape Freels the two masts were carried away. Capt. Sam managed to get his vessel in tide water lane and work her back to Greenspond, arriving on March 5th. Two new spars were made, and the vessel was again under sail as a brigantine on March 12th. On March 25th, Capt. Winsor was again back to port with 2,500 seals stowed down. 
