





That Robert Scott came to his death by wounds inflicted upon his per-son by a knife in his own hands while in a state of mental aberation.'' Scott had been a school teacher in the neighborhood of Seatorth for some years. Lately he and his wife went to live in Detroit. Some months ago, Mrs. Scott, being in poor health, returned to her father-in-law's for a change of air. She was there when her husband came to take a school near her. Scott scems to have been a man of violent passions, and has evident-ly followed a very irregular life. He had been in the American army during the war, and had jumped the bounty twice, if not three times.
