The Redistribution Bill.

Mr. Mowat on Monday introduced the Government Bill to provide for the readjustment of seats in the Legislative Assembly, and in an able speech explained its provisions. It gives six additional members to that House, which will bring the number up to 88, the same as Ontario's representation in the Dominion Parliament. One of these is given to Parry Sound and Muskoka, one to the new County of Dufferin, and one each to Huron, Grey, Kent, and Lambton.

The feeling in favour of forming the new County of Dufferin is universal among men on both sides of politics in the municipalities which will form part of it, and the Government, therefore, is only acceding to the general desire of all interested. This being so, he thought they might give Dufferin a member for itself. The new county, he believed, was proposed to consist of the Townships of Melancthon, from Grey, with a population of 2,043; Mulmy, from South Simces, 5,705; Mono, from Cardwell, 3,930; East Garafraxa, 2,573; Orangeville, 1.-158; and Amaramth, 1,343; all from the County of Wellington. These figures, and those which he had named, the population would be 16,368. #### The Transit of Venus.

To-day (Tuesday) is set down for the "transit of Venus," or the day upon which that planet will pass directly between the earth and the sun. This is a stronomers all over the world have seized upon to settle certain vexed questions, deemed by them to be of great importance to science. We doubt if ever an astronomical event has been met with such extensive preparations, to get out of it all that is possible. And these preparations are such as can only be afforded by governments. No private astronomer, or observer, or school, is rich enough to afford the expenses involved in these observations, which require the most costly instruments and the stationing of observations, which require the most costly instruments and the stationing of observers at the most remote points upon the face of the earth. For the purposes of observing this event, Russia has sent twenty-even different expeditions, fully equipped with astronomers and instruments, to the four quarters of the plobe.

Congress appropriated \$150,000 for the necessary apparatus, and placed all the vessels of the Navy necessary for eight separate expeditions, at the command of the men of science. These expeditions will make the Pacific Ocean, west of California, Northern Europe and South Africa the points of observation. Among the questions to be settled by these observations are certain theories in relation to the constituent elements of the sun. The distance of the sun from the earth and other planets, it is believed, will be more definitely settled by this opportunity than herotofore, and it will afford an opportunity for the solution of various other mooted questions of great interest to scientists.
