country alike, and the rural population
will be put to a great amount of trouble
in properly caring for stock, unless we
are yet favored with some open weather.

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Professor McCandless and his Maid.

(To the Editor of the Globe.)

Sir.—Professor McCandless is out in
the *Mail* to explain and justify the ar-
rangement of bedrooms referred to by
the Provincial Secretary in his speech
before the House on Wednesday evening
last. He states that it was owing to the
paucity of accommodation furnished by
the Institution building, and conveys the
impression that there was but one other
bedroom, which was occupied by the ma-
tron's servant—a married woman—and
that Mr. McKellar desired her husband
to be employed in some capacity, in
which case, he would, of course, share
his wife's room.

Like most of the Professor's state-
ments this is utterly untruthful. The
fact is, that there were at the period re-
ferred to several unoccupied bedrooms in
the Institution. Two of them were ad-
joined to that occupied by the matron's
servant. The natural arrangement would
surely have been that the Professor's
servant should have had these vacan-
t rooms assigned her. That, with
several spare rooms in the building, the
Professor's servant girl was located in
one adjoining his own bedroom, with an
inside door connecting them was just
what excited the comment of a sensi-
ble and respectable public. It will be
borne in mind that the Professor's
family inhabited the Institution build-
ing for some months prior to the coming
of students. It was during this period,
and while there was plenty of room that
the Professor's servant girl was located
in one of the vacant rooms in which
the Provincial Secretary made allusion.
When I went up to the Institution this
arrangement had ceased. I paid no at-
tention to the floating rumours in re-
gard to the matter then, though subse-
quent circumstances have given me ad-
ditional weight to them. However un-
founded public suspicion may have been,
it certainly has a new look, that the ar-
rangement in question existed when bed-
room accommodation was plentiful and
was terminated when it became scarce.
The Professor's maid cast about for an-
other and better explanation of the
matter than the one he has published in
the *Mail*.

The Professor endeavours to account
for Mr. McKellar's reference to this mat-
ter by the remark that the girl informed
her master of certain "nocturnal visits."
I dare say she did. From first to last
she acted the part of a spy on every-
body, and proved herself quite com-
petent to supply facts and accusations to
order. A system of espionage and tra-
ditionary falsehoods is a most important
feature in the Professor's machinery of
government, as it does in that of all
tyrants of the world over.

It is passing strange if, in this free
country, a Minister of the Crown cannot
visit a respectable lady or see her apart
from church, and pay her the usual at-
tentions of a lover looking forward to
honorable marriage, without a base at-
tempt being made to blast the characters
of both. That under the circumstances
the Provincial Secretary should have
mentioned the fact which the Professor
makes such a lame attempt to explain
and defend, is not at all to be wondered
at.

The Press on McCandless and his Backers.

The letter of McCandless is a childish
production, taking the ground that he
was right and pure, and that all the
other officers of the College were both
ignorant and knavish. He speaks neither
the men nor the women, attacking the
honesty and capability of the former and
the virtue of the latter. It is the walling
of a dishonest man, whose chief con-
cern is to defend himself, and whose
conscience is insensible to the wrong
and the injury which he is doing to the
outgrowth of ignorance, arrogance and
pride. The Professor came to this
country with the notion that he would be
surrounded by people of an inferior type,
and he at once assumed the airs of an
autocrat. In the evidence that will be
given before the committee it will be
shown that he was utterly ignorant of
practical agriculture, and that his ridi-
culous theories made him the laughing-
stock of the whole community in the
neighborhood of Guelph. He wanted to
pass a roller over turnips after the seed
had come up, believing that by so doing
he could get rid of the bugs that were
seen on the leaves. Mr. McKellar dis-
covered his incompetence, and because
of the welfare of the college, he took
means to have the upstart removed, the
sons of the doomed man was turned a-
gainst the Provincial Secretary. Mc-
Candless relies upon a facility of his for
grinding out smooth, unmeaning sen-
tences to blind the eyes of the people, but
he will be brought to a realizing sense of
his mistake when he finds that he can-
not delude honest Canadians, who de-
spise a snob, no matter how well he may
be recommended. When the Opposition
have used him for their own ends, poor
McCandless will be turned out, and he
will be left alone to repent the unwarrant-
able folly which will expose his incapacity
to all the world. His conduct has
robbed him of the sympathy of the few
who were disposed to pity him, and
henceforth he can expect no considera-
tion from those he had done his best to
injure. As a boon companion to Rykert
and Leader he will find a congenial place.
—Toronto correspondence of the *Stratford
Neuron*.

Judging from the letter published by
McCandless, it is quite evident that he
was not in the right place as Principal of
the Agricultural College. He should
have been the old woman of the estab-
lishment, though, indeed, there are not
many old women who would have been
as pithy.—*Hamilton Times*.

Mr. M. C. Cameron is understood to
have made up his mind not to take any
more briefs until he fully studied up the
great rharbarb and turnip questions. He
is quite convinced that the price of rhar-
barb must be made one of the chief po-
litical issues of the day at the next
general election, and that the propriety
of rolling turnips in order to get the bugs
out of them, must be made a plank in
the platform of the great Liberal-Con-
servative party. Mr. Cameron is also
prepared to go to the country on the
further issue that it was Mr. McCandless
who should have had the hiring of the
female cook for the Agricultural College,
and that any interference with that right
had a tendency to sap the foundations of
the British Constitution and destroy
civil and religious liberty. It will be re-
membered that some years ago Mr.
Cameron devoted his great intellect to
fishing a torn-up note out of a spittoon.
The country may rest assured that the
same mighty brain is equal to the task
of deciding on the proper qualifications
of a female cook.—*Ibid*.

PARIS, Dec. 7.—The Bureau of the As-
sembly charged with investigating the
validity of M. Baring's election in the
Department of Navarre, have requested M.
Tollhand, Minister of Justice, to furnish
documents in his possession relative to
the Bonapartist Election Committee.
This the Minister refuses to do. Should
he persist in his refusal the bureau will
refer the matter to the Assembly which
would produce a cabinet crisis. It is re-
ported that Gen. Cizay, Minister of
War, has reconsidered his intention of
resigning, a compromise having been ef-
fected in the matter of the military
Nadros.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—The *Times* states
that England in reply to Russia's in-
vitation to attend the International Law
Conference to be re-opened at St. Peters-
burg has declared her willingness to do
so, but regrets that she is unable to an-
ticipate any practical result of its delibera-
tions.

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—Contrary to gen-
eral expectations a Jury was readily ob-
tained for the trial of Coroner Croker,
under indictment for the murder of
James McKenna, on election day.

Mayor Vanoe has been requested by
the assistant Alderman to tender the
hospitalities of the city to the King
Kalauka.

Burglary and Robbery in Hamilton.

Between seven and eight o'clock last
Sunday evening a daring burglary and
robbery occurred at the residence of Rev.
W. H. Rensselaer, No. 52 John street
north, during the absence of the re-
verend gentleman and his wife at church
services.

The thief or thieves secured entrance
to the premises by breaking a pane of
glass and opening one of the windows in
the rear. After hurriedly ransacking the
drawers, etc., in the several rooms, they
carried off a silver-plated tea service,
consisting of eight pieces, with a sugar
bowl and spoon dish. One dozen solid
silver forks, ten solid silver teaspoons,
six solid silver table spoons and a solid
silver soup ladle were also taken, be-
sides a cheque for \$20 in favor of Mar-
garet Childs upon the Permanent Build-
ing Society Toronto.

Mr. Rensselaer feels especially aggrieved
at losing the plated service, as it was a
wedding present which was valued highly
by Mrs. Rensselaer and himself, and
which cannot be replaced. It was worth
about \$150; the solid silver was valued
at about \$60. No trace of the burglars
has been discovered.

The Transit of Venus.
To-day (Tuesday) is set down for the "transit of Venus," or the day upon which that planet will pass directly between the earth and the sun. This is a rare event, and one upon which the astronomers all over the world have seized upon to settle certain vexed questions, deemed by them to be of great importance to science. We doubt if ever an astronomical event has been met with such extensive preparations, to get out of it all that is possible. And these preparations are such as can only be afforded by governments. No private astronomer, or observer, or scholar, is rich enough to afford the expenses involved in these observations, which require the most costly instruments and the stationing of observers at the most remote points upon the face of the earth. For the purpose of observing this event, Russia has sent twenty-seven different expeditions, fully equipped with astronomers and instruments, to the four quarters of the globe. France, Germany, and England have sent out ten or twelve each. And the Government of the United States has also done its full share with the other Governments of civilized nations. Congress appropriated \$150,000 for the necessary apparatus, and placed all the vessels of the Navy necessary for eight separate expeditions, at the command of the men of science. These expeditions will make the Pacific Ocean, west of California, Northern Europe and South Africa the points of observation. Among the questions to be settled by these observations are certain theories in relation to the constituent elements of the sun. The distance of the sun from the earth and other planets, it is believed, will be more definitely settled by this opportunity than heretofore, and it will afford an opportunity for the solution of various other mooted questions of great interest to scientists.
