A SERIOUS FORGERY.

The Title to the Townsite of Des Moines said to be obtained by Fraud.

The Forger being Arrested Makes Full Confession Implicating Prominent Business Men.

TAOUMA, July 18.—Considerable excitement was caused here to-day by the arrest of O. J. McCauland, who came over from Tacoma for the purpose of charging a charge of forgery of a deed to property valued at nearly \$160,000, owned by the original owner, Des Moines, in King county, who was lodged in jail and made a full confession, which resulted in the arrest of Joseph S. Cook, a prominent business man on the Sound. Cook was brought before Justice J. C. Clark at 7:30 to-night and held in bonds of \$3,000 to appear Monday evening on a charge of being an accessory before the fact.

The Post-Intelligencer correspondent learned the following facts from Mr. Des Moines, president of the Des Moines Land Company, who was a witness for Cook's arrest. In July, 1889, the Des Moines Land Company purchased from F. O. Cheung 121 acres of land in King county, which they subsequently patented on January 8, 1890, a deed was recorded for the same property, purchased by Des Moines, which was signed by John Moore, the original owner of the property, who was alleged that the younger Moore had never released his claim to the property, which, as the only child of the older Moore, he was supposed to have had it to learn what new phase had presented itself in the matter that would make a deed. The deed was signed by John Moore, Jr., conveyed the property to Joseph S. Cook, who had been arrested and acknowledged in San Diego, Cal., January 8. The witness to the same deed, however, was John Smith, who was acknowledged, and a man named Smith, Joseph Cook, it is claimed, offered to purchase the property, which was valued at \$8,000, about one-third of the present value of the property. The land was bought elsewhere, and sent a detective to San Diego to look the matter up. The notary who testified to the deed, the Smith, Smith's statement was that he had been approached by a man who represented himself as John Moore, Jr., and had been asked to have him from Smith's old home in the East and was familiar with all his former relations. Smith was easily convinced and readily accompanied Moore to witness the deed, though an innocent party to the transaction.

As soon as Moore, or McCauland, had the deed properly acknowledged, he immediately telegraphed to Tacoma. The address to which the message was sent was given to a detective by Cook. McCauland was soon located at Port Blakely, where he has been shadowed ever since. It seems that he got wind of his followers and made arrangements to decamp, and accordingly fled for Portland yesterday. He was arrested upon his arrival in this city on Wednesday.

The forged deed only affects the original townsite of Des Moines, but it is believed that the Des Moines Land Company, which at some time ago he was approached by McCauland, who is an old timer on Puget Sound, and sold the title to the town of Des Moines had been obtained by fraud, and that a quit-claim deed, purporting to have come from young Moore in King county, which the land was obtained, was a forgery. McCauland further stated that young Moore, the legal heir, was living in San Diego, and that a title from him to the property would hold good, and that Cook would furnish the money to be used to go to San Diego and obtain the deed from young Moore. Cook claims that he furnished the money to be used to go to San Diego, and instead of getting Moore's signature, forged the papers.

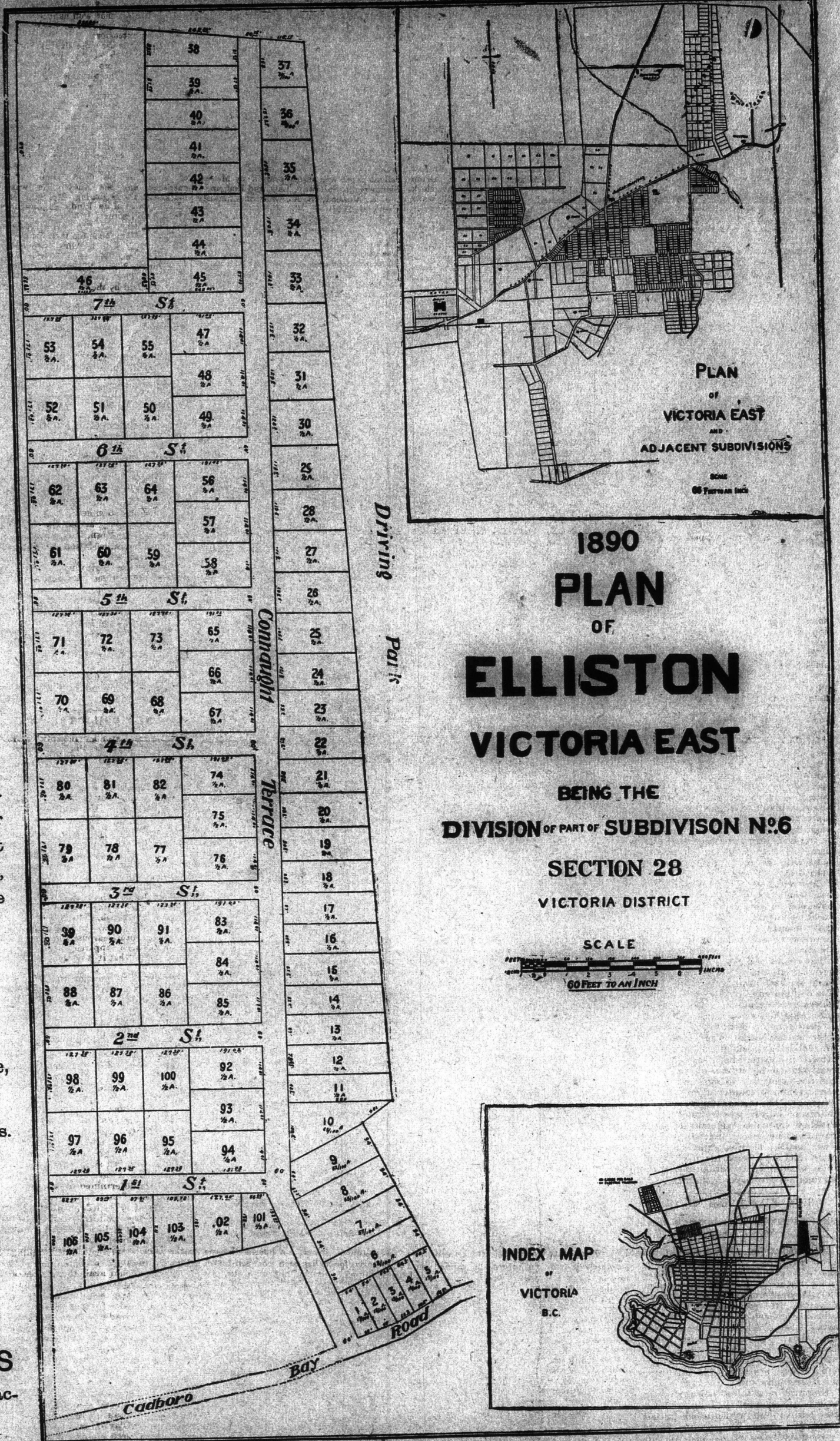
