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THE LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

DISCUSSION ON THE QUESTION OF

CO-EDUCATION.

Should Women be Educated Together—Refused

Admission to University College—An

Important Debate—The Budget to be Brought

Down Next Tuesday.

There was again a warm time over the

boundary award in connection with

motion for a despatch which the premier

refused to produce. A motion by Mr.

Gibson brought on a discussion on the

higher education of women in which that

was favored by all speakers but Mr.

Hay who thought there was too much

education and too many advanced educa-

tional institutions already, and also that

the training was not sufficiently practical.

Other speakers agreed that education for

women and men should not be on the

same lines, and the minister of education

approved of the action of the University

college authorities in refusing ladies ad-

mission to lectures for the present.

IN ANSWER TO QUESTIONS BY MEMBERS HON.

Mr. Wood said that it was not the inten-

tion to change the basis of granting aid to

the electoral division agricultural exhibi-

tions.

MUNICIPAL REPRESENTATIVES.

Hon. Mr. Mowat said the government

had not decided on any measure for abol-

ishing wards in municipalities, but lessening

the number of municipal representatives in

towns and cities. He intimated however,

that the question might be dealt with at a

future session.

THE BOUNDARY AWARD.

Hon. Mr. Morris moved for further cor-

respondence in reference to the boundary

award.

Mr. Meredith said the premier was

afraid of bringing down the despatch. He

had said he was willing to go to the privy

council but that was giving up Ontario's

case. The despatch which had been printed

and sent to the Dominion government was

biting in its tone and threatened the Dominion

government with the results of the elec-

tions of 1885.

Hon. Mr. Mowat said the opposition

leader was incorrect in stating what he said.

He had said that the only reference that

could be made now to the privy council

arbitration. If both parties wished to re-

fer it to the privy council, it could be done,

but Ontario would in that case have to give

up the award. The Ontario government

had asked in the most friendly manner for

three years and had not even received a

reply. The despatch asked for was only

written after a month's consideration of

that from Ontario to which was a reply,

that the want spoken of was not a general

one, and approved of the decision of the

university authorities against co-education.

Mr. Hay said both sexes were well edu-

cated already, and the education was

not practical. Young ladies came out of

schools and could not cook a breakfast or

attend to the household duties, and with no

desire to be able to do so. Young men

were made to believe they were fit for the

professions while they were not, and the

professions were overcrowded already.

What was needed was an education which

would train for the practical duties of

life. Institutions for higher education had

been multiplied beyond the needs of the

country already. He was opposed to a col-

lege for women, and the province would

not sanction it.

Mr. Metcalf (Kingston) said Mr. Hay was

behind the age. He agreed with Dr. Mc-

Laughlin that men, and that their educa-

tion should not be in the same lines nor

co-education.

Mr. Deroche said there should be provi-

sion for the higher education of ladies as

well as of men. He did not speak of the

character of the education. They ac-

knowled their responsibility in the common

high schools, and should in more ad-

vanced education. A large proportion of

the teachers were women, and those in

higher positions had to go abroad for their

training. The house should be in a deci-

sion in favor of provision being made for

the higher education of women in the man-

ner best suited for them. The tendency to

the professions was not because of educa-

tion, but because of the social system which

gave a higher place in society to those in

the professions than to those in the

education, and the women had the same

claim to it as men. Motion carried.

Mr. Waters moved the second reading

portant step in the right direction. It

was read a second time and referred to a

select committee.
