These proceedings, however, were distinguished by the severest integrity, if we can believe a contemporary historian who has perpetuated in the London Free Press the opening speech of the presiding divinity, Bro. Brunton himself, who said: "We have to congratulate ourselves on having done something unprecedented in the annals of gift enterprises in America. You all know that the men who are interested in the enterprise would not lend themselves to any-

O Tempora! O Mores! Who would have believed that even then this honest lottery manager was the secret owner of ticket number 58,205, which was destined to win \$7,500—the second largest prize in the whole lottery—but which was clandestinely held in trust for him by his friend brother Strong.

By what inscruitable combination of circumstances was it that the manager's ticket alone amongst 100,000 others should capture this glittering prize.

What inimitable prescience enabled manager Brunton to privately pre-arrange that Bro. Strong should act as his trustee in holding this fortunate ticket?

Bro. Strong relates the wondrous story with refreshing simplicity in the pleading filed in the court of common pleas in the suit of Thomson vs. Strong, which we quote omitting the legal phrases:

"The defendant says he held the ticket in the lottery known as the London masonic benevolent gift enterprise as trustee for and on behalf of one Thomas H. Brunton, who was the beneficial owner thereof. 
