PROTECTION, BUT WITH FAIR PLAY

A Republican Opinion Why the McKinley Bill Was Obnoxious—It Will Not Be Revived. Washington, Dec. 5 .- Representative J. W. Babcock, of Wisconsin, who was chairman of the Republican Congressional Campaign Committee, said to-day no attempt would be made by the Reno attempt would be made by the Republicans to revive the McKinley Bill.

"That bill," he continued, "did not have the support of one Republican in five when it passed. It was responsible for the Republican defeat in 1890 and that defeat was one of the strongest expressions of the intelligence of the American people. This widespread intelligence is one of the most gratifying things to me as an American citizen. Our people will cross party lines at any time to rebuke their own party when they think it has not dealt fairly with them. There was a deep-seated prejudice against the McKinley Bill. It was regarded as too friendly to the interests of the people, and they put the manufacturers and not sufficiently in the interests of the people, and they put the party out of power that was responsible for the legislation. The average Ammerican citizen believes in the principle of protection, but he believes still more in the principle of fair play, and that principle, he thought, was violated in the McKinjey bill

principle, he thought, was violated in the McKinley bill.

"If the people of the country want lower duties, why aren't they satisfied with the present law, which the Democrate enacted as the last session."

"The present bill is not a Democratic bill It is really a protection measure. "The present bill is not a Democratic bill. It is really a protection measure, for the Republicans added to it after it went to the Senate something like 250 amendments. It is not such a bill as the Republicans would have framed, nor does it suit the wishes of the extreme Democrats. It is highly protective in some particulars, more so than the Mc-Kinley bill, while touching the extreme of free trade in other directions. We shall have the House and Senate and the President in 1896. Meanwhile, we shall see how the present law works and then it will be time enough to smooth out its crudities and make it what it ought to be."

"Do you think the Democrats can win

"Do you think the Democrats can win in 1896 with a candidate standing on a free coinage platform?"

"No, sir. No party can win on such a platform and if the Democrats nominate such a candidate he will be swept out of existence. The sentiment of this country is strongly favorable to nonest money. That's what the Republicans will advocate two years from now and on that platform they will win."





BIGGEST HOTEL ON EARTH.

John Jacob Astor Will Put \$8,000,00

Into a New York Tavern. It is announced that the greatest hotel on earth will be opened in New York November 1, 1897. It will surpass the Waldorf in size, and, while its interior may not be more beautiful, it will be far more imposing. This superb structure is to be erected by John Jacob Actor yarder the percent supervision of structure is to be erected by John Jacob Astor, under the personal supervision of George Boldt, the proprietor of the Waldorf. It is to stand upon the ground now covered by the Astor mansion, at Fifth avenue and Thirty-fourth street. Mrs. Astor and John Jacob Astor are now building a house at Fifth avenue and Sixty-fifth street, which, it is expected, will be ready for occupancy in about six months. As soon as Mrs. Astor moves the 'old homestead will be torn down and the work on the foundation of the 'new hotel will be started. torn down and the work on the foundation of the new hotel will be started. The hotel will face 100 feet on Fifth avenue, and run 360 feet on Thirty-fourth street, and will be from sixteen to twenty stories high. While it will adjoin the Waldorf, and be under the management of Mr. Boldt, it will be run entirely distinct from that hotel. Under his contracts with both the Astors, Mr. Boldt has leases for both hotels, which cover a long period of years. To a New York reporter Mr. Boldt said: "My whole aim will be to make the hotel the crowning glory of the greater New York. The rooms, of course, will be larger than the rooms in the Waldorf. The dining-room will face Fifth avenue, and will have a rooms in the Waldorf. The dining-room will face Fifth avenue, and will have a seating capacity for 1,000 people. The cafe and lounging rooms will be much larger than those of the Waldorf. On the second floor, on the Thirty-fourth street side, I intend to have a ball-room 100 feet square, without a pillar in it. Of course this is going to be a great piece of work for the architects. No high building has yet been erected where this amount of floor space has been clear. Henry J. Hardenburg, the architect of the Waldorf, will draw the plans for the new hotel. He says the ball-room can be built as I have planned. There will be assembly rooms and apartments for be assembly rooms and apartments for germans and small receptions. In short, I intended to have a hotel the capacity of which will meet the demands of our social and political life. In the new structure there may go on at one time on the same night a ball, a banquet, a lecture, and two or three assemblies without a clash. There may also be 1,000 guests in the hotel at the same time and no one be disturbed by crowding or sounds."
