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CHINA'S END IS DRAWING NEAR.

WITH THE JAPS BEFORE PEKIN THE DYNASTY IS DOOMED.

Peikin is Terror-Stricken - Japan's Terms for Peking - How to Bring it to B-C Peace - by China - Li Hung Chang's Life in Peking, and His Fighting to Save His Kingdom.

Shanghai, Dec. 5.-Field Marshal Count Oyama has politely declined to remove wounded Chinese soldiers from Port Arthur, as being against the rules of war.

Disbanded Chinese soldiers are beginning to commit depredations in the vicinity of the Red Cross Society.

China Cannot Accept Japan's Terms. It is believed China cannot accept Japan's conditions unless peace can be made by the Red Cross Society.

China will probably give any chance offered to escape from the clutches of the Japanese in order to prepare for further resistance to the invader.

Wounded Not Allowed to Land. A Central News despatch from Shanghai says the Japanese, which was returned to Taku, the Japanese authorities there having refused to allow those on board to disembark.

The same despatch states that the Governor of Kiang-tsu has been degraded from the rank of second rank, first class, for allowing the troops under his command to pillage the population.

Winter Dr. Had More Than Japs. London, Dec. 6.-The Daily Graphic has a despatch from Shanghai, saying that the Chinese have lost more than 100,000 soldiers, as the rice supply has been withheld too long.

PROTECTION, BUT WITH FAIR PLAY

A Republican Opinion Why the McKinley Bill Was Obnoxious—It Will Not Be Revised.

Washington, Dec. 5.—Representative J. W. Babcock, of Wisconsin, who was chairman of the Republican Congressional Campaign Committee, said to-day Republicans to revive the McKinley Bill.

"That bill," he continued, "did not have the support of one Republican in the House of Representatives. It was responsible for the Republican defeat in 1890 and because of the intelligence of the American people. This widespread intelligence is one of the most gratifying things to me as an American citizen.

Our people will cross party lines at any time to rebuke their own party when they think it has not dealt fairly with them. There was a deep-seated prejudice against the McKinley Bill. It was regarded as too friendly to the manufacturers and not sufficiently in the interests of the people.

"If the people of the country want lower duties, why are they making war with the present law, which the Democrats enacted as the last session?"

"The present bill is not a Democratic bill. It is really a protection measure for the Republicans added to it after it went to the Senate."

"Do you think the Democrats can win in 1896 with a candidate standing on a free coinage platform?"

"No party can win on such a platform and if the Democrats nominate such a candidate he will be swept out of existence. The sentiment of this country is strongly favorable to honest money."

A SATISFACTORY REPORT.

Surprising Decrease in Contagious Diseases.

Ald. Bailey was not present at the meeting of the Board of Health yesterday afternoon, Ald. Allen being elected to the chair in his absence.

The report of Dr. Sheard showed a remarkable decrease in contagious diseases, as will be seen from the following figures:

Diphtheria—1892, 1723 cases, 410 deaths; 1893, 943 cases, 263 deaths; 1894, 301 cases, 34 deaths.

The expenditure for Isolation Hospital for 1892 was \$17,431, for 1893, \$17,700, for 1894, \$18,377.

Concerning Locomotives. The cash value of a locomotive averages \$10,000, and there are now in use on the railroads of the United States about 35,000 locomotives, representing a total investment of \$350,000,000.

The life of an ordinary locomotive, shining brass, glittering steel, iron and hard wood, is shorter than the life of an individual, and it is in three divisions. First, when bright and new from the machine shop, it is run along the tracks to the roundhouse, flags flying from the cab, and a broom or a horsehoe on the cowcatcher for good luck.

The second stage is when, after having been in active use, the outer gloss is dimmed by dripping oil and its beauty grimed by smoke.

BIGGEST HOTEL ON EARTH.

John Jacob Astor Will Put \$80,000,000 Into a New York Tavern.

It is announced that the greatest hotel on earth will be opened in New York November 1, 1897. It will surpass the Waldorf in size, and while its interior may not be more beautiful, it will be far more imposing. This superb structure is to be erected by John Jacob Astor, under the personal supervision of George Bock, the proprietor of the Waldorf. It is to stand upon the ground now covered by the Astor mansion, at Fifth avenue and Thirty-fourth street. Mrs. Astor and John Jacob Astor are now building a house at Fifth avenue and Sixty-fifth street, which is expected to be ready for occupancy in about six months. As soon as Mrs. Astor moves the old household will be torn down and the work on the foundation of the new hotel will be started. The hotel will face 100 feet on Fifth avenue, and run 350 feet on Thirty-fourth street, and will be from sixteen to twenty stories high. While it will adjoin the Waldorf, and be under the management of Mr. Bock, it will be run entirely distinct from that hotel. Under his contracts with both the Astors, Mr. Bock's whole aim will be to make the hotel the crowning glory of the greater New York. The rooms, of course, will be larger than the rooms in the Waldorf, and the dining-room will face Fifth avenue, and will have a seating capacity for 1,000 people. The safe and lounging rooms will be much larger than those of the Waldorf. On the second floor, on the Thirty-fourth street side, I intend to have a ball-room 100 feet square, with a pillar in it. Of course this is going to be a great piece of work for the architect. No high building has yet been erected where this amount of floor space has been clear. Henry J. Hardenburg, the architect of the Waldorf, will draw the plans for the new hotel. He says the ball-room can be built as I have planned. There will be assembly rooms and apartments for Germans and small receptions. In short, I intend to have a hotel the capacity of which will meet the demands of our social and political life. In the new structure there may be on at one time on the same night as many as 1,000 guests in the hotel at the same time and no one be disturbed by crowding or sounds.
