

WATERING STOCK.

These same cattle were always well fed; that is, they had plenty of good hay and fodder—the cows were usually dry during the Winter—but the effects of the want of sufficient water in the proper places and times was very observable in the condition of the stock every Spring, and I have often heard the remark, "I don't see why Blank's cattle are so poor, as he always feeds them enough." Very different from this was it a neighbor's near by. At this farm a log aqueduct carried spring water into a long trough in the yard, where the water seldom froze entirely over, so that the cuttle, whenever out in the yard, could take a drink of water any time, consequently would never any time, consequently would never the water again; and the crowd at the water, drink a little, then go back to the hay rack, eat a little, and trot off to the water again; and the crowd at the water tub was fully equal to the crowd at the water-tub was fully equal to the crowd at the bar of one of our Pittsfield liquor saloons, but not quite so noisy. For mileh cows in severe weather, it is better to give water with the chill off if possible, and I always notice a falling off, in our milk when the cows have to drink ice-cold water. — Mirror and Farmer.
