

The greatest danger to our forests seems now to come from the making of pulp for newspapers. Already the United States pulp manufacturers have nearly destroyed their own forests. and they are now seizing upon Canadian areas-purchasing them, of course at good prices, but denuding the land and devestating the forests with the certainty of impoverishing whole townships. In nine months of last year 453,896 cords of pulp wood were sent to the United States from Canada. The yearly export from Canada to the United States is from 800,000 to 1,-000,000 cords! Prices are going up rapidly. Spruce and poplar trees ar the most in demand. The consumption is continually on the increase. Over forests, and devising means of renew ing the ruin already wrought. It is secured from 12,000 to 15,000 square miles of spruce forest in Canada supply the paper mills of Maine and New York. Canada ought very vigilantly to guard her forest treasure and to start new forests whereever poss ble. Newfoundland has sold large areas to English and America companies ginning to teach and train young men to take charge intelligently, of our forest interests. There is no good rea-
