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
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SUNDAY-SCHOOL LESSONS, SECOND QUARTER.

Matthew 11. 20-30.

GOLDEN TEXT.—Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest.—Matt. 11. 28.

MEMORY VERSES, 28-30.—Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest.
